## CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES April 24, 2008

### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

D. Adopt Agenda – It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda.

E. Approval of Minutes - It was moved, seconded and passed to accept the minutes as written.

### 2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Council. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes.

Father Charles Tilley from Loyola addressed their transfer requirements and restrictions as well as financial aide and athletic desires to compete against public schools.

Patrick Murphy from Mater Dei High School spoke regarding their admission policies, and financial aide. Mater Dei's championship basketball teams have been comprised of non-transfer students as the institutions pride themselves on never being sanctioned for "undue influence" by the CIF-SS. The Trinity League asked that the Century League table their proposal to split public and private schools in playoffs pending further study for a better solution.

David Chambers from Cantwell Sacred Heart spoke regarding their non-support for the divide between public and private institutions. The Catholic Athletic Association is committed to pursuing excellence in education and athletics following the guidelines set fourth by the CIF-SS and CAA.

## MARKETING UPDATE

### YOUR 2008-09 CHECKLIST

Here is a quick guide to make your athletic year a little easier:

#### TV & Radio:

- Remember all TV rights are contracted through the CIF-SS office. Any money earned for regular season TV games will be sent back to the 'home team' of the televised event later in the year. Last year, 39 schools received TV rights fee disbursement checks.
- If no paying regular TV, regional cable or web case broadcast is contracted. Each individual school may allow local cable or school district cable to broadcast the game. Remember; local cable can only broadcast in your community and not all over Southern California.
- Any and all playoff TV or radio broadcasts must contract with the CIF-SS office.



#### Regular season Championships banner requirement:

- Your school is required to display a red CIF SOUTHERN SECTION - TOYOTA CHAMPIONSHIPS banner at every home football game and all events in your gymnasium. This is the 8th consecutive year with this requirement and we are still chasing some schools that have not complied. If you need an '8th' banner, please contact our office and we can send another.

#### Gatorade ONLY at playoff games (home and away):

- Gatorade has just renewed to begin their 28th year as a Southern Section sponsor.
- Only orange Gatorade jugs, green Gatorade bottles and green Gatorade cups may be used at any Southern Section playoff event.
- If you are a non-Gatorade sponsored school, you are required to use unsponsored jugs, cups and bottles during the playoffs.

#### Official ball... be sure to play the right ball:

- We begin our 7th year with the 'Official Ball' program. In the playoffs, ONLY the officially approved brand/model of ball may be played.
- If your team does not provide the correct ball, when the CIF-SS receives information about your violation you will subsequently lose your next opportunity to play a home game... this season or next season if you are eliminated prior to the penalty being imposed.

Here is the list of balls:

- Baseball: Rawlings CIF-SS Must be this specific ball; not alternative Rawlings baseball!
- Boys Basketball: Spalding TF1000 NFHS or Spalding TF1000ZKPro NFHS
- Girls Basketball: Spalding TF1000 28.5 NFHS or Spalding TF1000ZKPro 28.5 NFHS
- Football: Spalding ball with NFHS ; any model with NFHS stamp
- Soccer: Spalding TF5000 NFHS for both boys and girls use.
- Softball: Dudley CFP12Y NFHS.
- Tennis: Wilson tennis ball
- Volleyball: Spalding with NFHS stamp in these models: TF5000, TF3000, TF1500
- Boys Water Polo: Mikasa W6000.
- Girls Water Polo: Mikasa W6009

- Last minute need? A reminder that Sport Chalet Team Sales stocks every CIF-SS mandatory ball. If you happen to be short at the end of the season, Sport Chalet Team Sales can get you the balls needed within a day at 800-250-4923. If you forget, this info is also on the last page of the Blue Book.

## COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

Adjusting  
to our  
Changing  
Rules

Last spring the Association Rule (Bylaw 313) was removed from the Blue Book. The Section office received a number of calls from principals and athletic directors who asked for clarification on just what coaches could now do, and what rules would change.

The office staff issued a clarification via the web site and sent out an opinion on the rules affected. Here is a brief summary of the rules that are now considered altered:

1. Bylaw 313, the Conditioning Rule is now considered invalid. There are no restrictions on coaches' contact with students before or after school. Coaches can conduct out-of-season club activities with their high school students after school hours.
2. The Team Practice Rule in every sport was altered to reflect how the loss of the rule affected organized team practice. There are now no set dates on when practice can start.
3. The Tryout Rule in every sport was altered to reflect the fact that now coaches may have contact with student athletes outside the season of sport.
4. The Spring Practice rule in every sport is no longer in effect.

It appears that our schools are dealing with the changes and by now the new Blue Book rules are available on the web, or hard copy at every school.

#### **Protect against abuses**

Coaches and athletic directors throughout the Section greeted the elimination of the Association Rule happily. Many hard working coaches appreciate the ability to work year round with the many talented athletes in our Section.

We offer this word of caution. Many schools and parents have called to report that club/high school coaches are telling

# RULE REVIEW



## Coaches Education Training

The NFHS "Fundamentals of Coaching" course provides curriculum for interscholastic teacher/coaches assisting them in creating an athletic experience that supports the education mission of our nation's schools. All coaches (paid and volunteer) must be certified by December 2008. This certification is mandatory and should be considered in the hiring process just as you would CPR and First Aid certifications.

### **CIF COACHING EDUCATION FAQ (taken directly from the State CIF site [www.cifstate.org](http://www.cifstate.org))**

#### **What is the purpose of the CIF Coaching Education Program?**

The purpose of the CIF Coaching Education Program is to enhance the experience of student-athletes by assuring that their coaches meet a minimum level of professional training. The program provides strong, pragmatic and comprehensive instruction for coaches of interscholastic athletics in California that is consistent with the highest national standards as set by the legislature, state Department of Education, California Interscholastic Federation and National Federation of State High School Associations.

#### **Who is required to pass the Coaching Education class?**

The revised CIF Bylaw 22.B.(9) states: "Definition of a coach, paid or unpaid: Any individual that the school/district is required to approve under Title V, California Code of Regulations, Section 5593 and 5594 and/or under California Education Code 33190-33192, 45125.01 and 45125.1." Simply stated, this applies anyone who is required to be fingerprinted and/or is approved by their local school board/directors to have contact with students. This applies to all CIF member schools, public and private.

#### **By what date must all coaches be certified?**

No later than December 31, 2008, all coaches shall be certified in the CIF Coaching Education program or equivalent as stated in Bylaw 22.B.(9).

#### **What Coaching Education Courses are accepted by CIF?**

The NFHS "Fundamentals of Coaching" Course and the ASEP "Coaching Principles" course both meet California's standards for Coaching Education. Coaches are to complete one of these programs before the December 31, 2008 deadline.

#### **How do I get the coaches certified in my school/district?**

#1. Coaches can go on their own to [www.nfhslearn.com](http://www.nfhslearn.com) and take the "Fundamentals of Coaching" course online for \$52.

#2. Any representative from a school/district can also go to [www.nfhslearn.com](http://www.nfhslearn.com) and purchase license #'s in bulk (\$52 each), for their coaches. The coaches then go online and complete the "Fundamentals of Coaching" course to become certified.

#3 The NFHS/CIF Fundamentals of Coaching Course can also be taught to your coaches in a classroom setting. Many schools/districts value the discussion component of the classroom course not available when taken online. If you are interested in teaching the blended NFHS/CIF Course, you must attend a CIF Coaching Education Instructor Training. Go back to the main Educational Programs page and find the Registration Form.

#4 A Certified Instructor in the ASEP program can still order CIF/ASEP Coaching Principles packets from the CIF State Office (Call Todd Flournoy @ 510-521-4447), but all purchases of CIF/NFHS Fundamentals of Coaching materials or online licenses will be made through the NFHS ([www.nfhslearn.com](http://www.nfhslearn.com)).

#### **We cannot always fill our coaching positions prior to the season. How do we get coaches certified when someone is hired at the last moment?**

The CIF bylaw allows for this common situation. A school/district may hire a coach that is not certified, but only for one sports season. The coach must complete the certification before they can coach another season and/or a second sport. The State law (SB39) allows for this one sports season exception.

#### **In these tough financial times, how are we supposed to pay for this new mandate?**

The Federated Council recognized that this could financially impact school's budgets. However, the overwhelming evidence is that the one-time expense is far outweighed by the return. Neighboring states Nevada and Oregon mandated coaching education several years ago and found that coaches paid the fee and the fear of coaches "quitting" did NOT materialize. In addition, the State CIF office negotiated a greatly reduced price for the class and materials.

#### **If I completed and passed the former CIF/ASEP Coaching Education program, do I have to retake the class?**

NO! If you completed the course and passed the test, you are certified for life and will be listed on the "Coaches Registry" database at [www.asep.com](http://www.asep.com) or [www.nfhslearn.com](http://www.nfhslearn.com).

Four years ago, I used this column to dispense advice to high-school students, particularly freshmen and sophomores. I'm no Ann Landers.

In fact, I consider myself just a smart monkey who can type fast - but I got a good response and still get requests for copies.

Since that column appeared, I've thought of new things I wanted to say and ways of restating some of the previous advice. Since this year starts a new cycle of high-school students, let's do it again.

My advice:

1) Realize that no one gets out of high school without emotional bruises. Your feelings are going to get wounded in everything from classes and sports, to romantic and friend relationships. These are some of the most vivid years of your life and the highs and lows come in flaming SpectraVision.

2) Realize that you can't be friends with everyone. You will "click" with some people and won't with others. It will be that way your entire life. But just getting along with 97 percent of people isn't all that difficult. The other 3 percent are criminals, bullies or weasels. Avoid them.

3) There are activities, Sports, certain teachers and classes at your school that will provide lifetime memories. Find them. They will make you smile when you are 95 years old and your teeth are in a jar beside your bed.

4) Do something extracurricular to "connect" yourself to the school, whether it's a no-cut sport such as cross country, a play or the pep band. If all you do is attend classes and go home, you are getting only part of the high-school experience. By the way, most people I know who quit a team in high school have told me they later regretted it.

5) In high school, you will have to make decisions on alcohol, sex and drugs. More cool kids say no than you realize. Show restraint. College and independence are ahead. I'm not advocating debauchery, but the only weekend beer shortage I've ever heard of was at Washington State University after Mount St. Helen's blew its top in 1980 and ash fallout closed roads.

6) Never forget that one dumb mistake behind the wheel of a car or with drugs has ended or ruined the lives of thousands of teenagers. You may think you are invincible but so did all the dead and maimed kids.

7) Read books, newspapers, magazines. Whatever you read, it will help you with your writing, speaking and thinking.

8) Be a good friend to your closest buddies but don't feel obligated to hang out with the same folks. It's like eating the same thing for lunch.

9) Keys to good grades: A) Don't fall behind. If you need help, get it immediately; B) Do your homework. You may not consider it important, but your teacher does; C) Don't be quick to form a bad opinion of a teacher. It can sour you on the material. Different teachers have different styles. Plus, you're not going to enjoy all your teachers any more than you are going to enjoy all your bosses in the real world. Also, realize that the same teacher you are ignoring today may be one you ask for a college recommendation letter two years from now; D) Don't be afraid to sit in the front row. It will make you concentrate.

10) Grades are important, but if your IQ is above that of a field mouse, you should have curiosity and get more out of school than grades. You should experience special "that's cool" jolts when you learn something fascinating or when the tumblers in your brain fall into place and you understand a concept or theory. I like what poet William Butler Yeats wrote: "Education is not the filling of a pail but the lighting of a fire." I'd rather have coffee with a curious person with a bunch of questions than someone with a 4.0 grade point and a collection of memorized answers.

11) Playing two Sports is better than playing one. It's not going to affect your scholarship chances half as much as your select-team coach is telling you. You will develop new skills and some of them can help you in your primary sport. You will also learn to deal with new teammates and coaches.

12) Get some exercise every day. Raise that heart rate and sweat. Yes, we're a nation of fat pigs, but there are more reasons to exercise than just fat -burning and general health. It will improve your concentration and your sleep.

13) The adage, "What goes around comes around" is true. If you're talking about people behind their backs, I guarantee that folks are talking about you behind your back. Be nice to people and good things happen. High schools are overflowing with insecure kids. Smile and try to improve someone's day.

14) High-school culture is notorious for sticking labels on people. Don't judge others based on secondhand opinions. Form your own.

15) Appreciate the fact that it's amazing that you are alive. It means thousands of your ancestors survived and were healthy enough to reproduce. You are special whether you realize it or not.

16) Don't totally over commit yourself. Leave some time to relax and just be a kid.

17) Be nice to your parents. They are smarter than you think and some day you will be a parent. Raising you is no picnic.



# OFFICIALS' WHISTLE



**Define It  
Develop It  
Deliver It**

In late July, Assistant Commissioner Rob Wigod and I attended the National Association of Sports Officials (NASO) conference. This is an annual event that gathers officials and administrators from around the country to discuss topical issues.

The theme of this year's conference was "Officiating to a Standard: Define It, Develop It, Deliver It".

Standards are present in many forms in the world of education- teaching standards, learning standards, testing standards and behavior standards are but a sample. Standards also are present in the officiating world- evidenced by phrases such as "quality calls" and "advantage/disadvantage" impact on competitive balance.

Standardization of officiating seems to be almost in conflict with itself. One key demand of players, coaches and administrators is consistency- calling the game the same at both ends. The hope is that standardization will help to reach that goal.

How do officials groups help to establish standardization?

- By rules testing and assessment of rules knowledge
- By putting in place mechanics and positioning guidelines
- By prescribing proper attire
- By implementing evaluation systems to assess performance

Officiating has changed rapidly in a short period of time. The use of technology and video has impacted officials, players and coaches. Standards are moving targets that often are redefined by items such as the speed of play and the required knowledge of officials.

More that ever, officials today are held accountable for their actions. Pre-game, in-game and post-game comments and actions are part of that accountability.

The challenge to meeting standards includes officials knowledge of behavior required in a school setting as well as in the context of the athletic contest. Properly communicated standards will lead to better managed contests and increase the positive nature of play.

# MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

## APRIL 16, 2008

This meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order at 1:00 p.m. by President Earl Haugen. All members were present with the exception of Wendy Doty, Sue Kuwabara and Gary Smidderks.

### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

E. Adopt Agenda – It was moved, seconded and approved to accept the agenda with the following changes: Remove item 5C, 2007 -08 CIF Federated Council Weighted votes, item was information only. Remove item 3B3, Proposal from Golden League to Revise Bylaw 3205. Move item 6B, Sanctions against Non-Dues Paying Member Schools before action items. Environmental Charter High School was in attendance at the meeting, wishing to discuss their school.

F. Approval of Minutes – Minutes of the January 19, 2008, 2007 Executive Committee Meeting – It was moved, seconded and approved.

### 2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

There were no members of the public in attendance; the agenda was posted.

### 6. NEW BUSINESS

B. Sanctions Against Non-Dues Paying Member Schools - Jim Staunton stated as of close of business on February 8, 2008, there were four schools who had not paid their dues and he recommended that these schools be placed on probation and not enter playoffs for one year from this date and at such time, we would review this position again.

Dr. Staunton stated Environmental Charter High School called and were concerned. They were in attendance at this meeting to discuss their situation. Dr. Staunton explained his interactions with the school about the dues. Netan Eli Charter called to state they had already paid their dues; however, Shirley Frazier stated they had not paid.

Mr. Haugen asked the representatives of Environmental Charter, Megan Hill and Phil Schwenk, to present their position. They gave an overview of their school and the importance of athletics to the development of their students. They have relocated to their own building, reorganized their staff, including their accounts payable person and have a new athletic director. They have taken major steps to insure this does not happen again. They stated their focus is academics and sports and their vision is to be competitive. They now have more space on their campus and have worked with local gyms to use their facilities. It was moved, seconded and approved to allow Environmental Charter full membership but to sanction the other schools by placing them on probation and not allowing entry into playoffs for one year.

Regarding South Bay Lutheran High School, Dr. Staunton stated we have not received their complete football reports. The seventeen schools who did not pay their dues as of January 15, 2008, will not receive their courtesy cards for the 2008-09 school year until their dues are paid. It was recommended the office send letters to the schools stating the Executive Committee requested the reasons the dues had not been paid. In addition, South Bay Lutheran will have to appeal and explain.

### 3. ACTION ITEMS

A. State Federated Council Action Items

It was moved and seconded to put items 3A1-3A3 and 3A6-3A8 on a consent calendar and items 3A4 and 3A5 to send the representatives uninstructed. The motion was approved.

Regarding item 3A1, Clarification of Bylaw 207.B(5)d, Dr. Staunton stated it was decreed that the rule should be interpreted to read that student who follows a coach must prove the absence of undue influence or recruiting and cannot move to escape that requirement.

B. Southern Section Action Items

1. Proposal from Boys and Girls Basketball Advisory Committee to revise Bylaw 3200 and 3214 - It was moved and seconded to support. After discussion, the motion was withdrawn. After further discussion, it was moved to take no position on this item. The motion was seconded and approved to take no position.

2. Proposal from Century League to revise Bylaws 3200.1 and 3200.2 All Playoffs Managed by Commissioner – Public Private Playoff Separation – It was moved and seconded to not support this proposal. After discussion, the motion was approved to not support this proposal. After further discussion, it was moved, seconded and approved to have Dr. Staunton form a committee of public and private school representatives to discuss the issues brought forward in this proposal and to bring a proposal to the Executive Committee to address these issues.

3. Proposal from Golden League to revise Bylaw 3205 Commissioner Determines Playoff Sites – Formation of CIF Championship Site Committee – This item was removed from the agenda.

4. Proposal from Marmonte League to revise Bylaw 1912 Length of Quarters – Freshman Football - It was moved and seconded to support this proposal. After discussion, the motion was approved to support.

5. Proposal from Girls Water Polo Advisory Committee to revise Playoff Handbook Seeding Rule – It was moved and seconded to not support this proposal. After discussion, it was voted to not support.

6. Proposal from Girls Water Polo Advisory Committee to eliminate Bylaw 313 Association Rule – It was moved and seconded to not support this proposal. After discussion, it was voted to not support.

7. Proposal from Gold Coast Athletic Conference to revise Bylaw 3214.2 Number of Team Entries into Playoffs – It was moved and seconded to take no position on this proposal. After discussion, it was voted to take no position.

8. Southern Section Proposed Budget, 2008-2009 – It was moved and seconded to support. After discussion, it was voted to support.

# OAKS CHRISTIAN AND CORONA DEL MAR CLAIM TITLES IN EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL COMMISSIONER'S CUP

The CIF Southern Section is pleased to announce the top ten girls and boys athletic programs in the 18th Annual Commissioner's Cup.

On the girl's side, Corona del Mar took top honors in scoring 13 points on the strength of four championships. The Sea Queens claimed their fourth title in five years. Corona del Mar finished the year with a title in the sport of Cross Country and added runner-up trophies in tennis and water polo. The Sea Queens also made a semifinals appearance in volleyball. Newport Harbors' season ended with the same number of points (12) as one other schools however, the second tie-breaker moved the Sailors up to the second-spot. Newport Harbor scored their points with titles in cross country and water polo and a semifinals showing in volleyball. Rounding out the top three is Poly of Long Beach also with 12 points. The Jackrabbits made the top-three with championships in track and field and basketball. Poly added to their total with a third-place finish in tennis.

On the boy's side, Oaks Christian claimed their third Commissioner Cup title in the past four years with four sports championships and a third-place finish. The Lions scored 22 points, winning CIF-SS titles in football, soccer, swimming and diving and volleyball. Oaks Christian also had a third-place finish in cross country. Loyola, the 2003-04 champions, finished with 15 points and claimed the second-place spot. The Cubs won titles in cross country and track and field. Adding to that total was a

runner-up finish in swimming and diving and a semifinal appearance in volleyball. With 14 points was perennial cup challenger, Mater Dei. The Monarchs claimed no titles, but had runner-up finishes in water polo and basketball as well as third-place finishes in soccer, track and field, baseball and tennis.

The CIF-SS developed this recognition program based upon comprehensive excellence in interscholastic competition. The purpose of this program is to enhance the spirit of competition, sportsmanship, and goodwill among the student athletes and member schools.

The winners are determined by a point system that provides: five points for a divisional championship; three points for a divisional runner-up finish; two points for advancing to the semifinal round or a third place finish in a team-place finish sport (i.e. cross country, golf, swimming and diving, track and field); and one point for a fourth place finish in a team-place finish sport. In cases where a tie occurs the top ten schools were determined by several tie-breaker methods.

"The CIF-SS would like to congratulate these outstanding programs for their championship performances," said Dr. Jim Staunton, Commissioner of Athletics. "They all have a lot to be proud of through their accomplishments and those of their entire athletic programs."

## LONG BEACH POLY/DOMINGUEZ TAKE TITLES AT 2008 CIF STATE TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

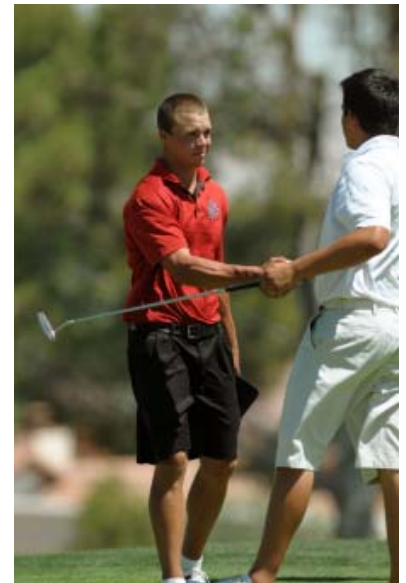

### B. SOUTHERN SECTION

1. Proposal from Century League to revise Bylaw 3214 Number of Team Entries (excluding football and wrestling) into Playoffs to be presented by Greg Bowden - voted to take No Position. Purpose is to allow extra teams (3<sup>rd</sup> place team in a 4 team league, 4<sup>th</sup> place team in a 5-6 team league or a fifth place team in a 7-8 team league) to petition to get into playoffs if they have a .500 record or better. It was moved and seconded to approve. This motion was carried 41-37.

2. Proposal from Century League to revise Bylaws 3200.1 and 3200.2 All Playoffs Managed by Commissioner – Public-Private Playoff Separation to be presented by Jerry Halpin – voted to Not Support. Century League has chosen to look at their proposal more closely in regard to the changing of language in the bylaws. There are legal concerns regarding this motion with more time needed to explore the feasibility of this proposal. The Commissioner is immediately creating a task force to look into the public/private issues so that more data can be obtained giving fortitude to a more realistic solution. Due to the need for further investigation, this proposal is being withdrawn until the October 2008 meeting. This item will need to be reintroduced for a first read.

3. Proposal from Marmonte League to revise Bylaw 1912 Length of Quarters – Freshmen Football - voted to Support. A motion was made seconded and passed (43-34) vote.

4. Proposal from Girls Water Polo Advisory Committee to revise Playoff Handbook Seeding Rule to be presented by Jason Rosenthal – voted

to Not Support. Clarification of the proposal...seeding a straight 1-16 seeding keeping teams from the same league apart in the first round for water polo only (not all sports). A motion was made, seconded and defeated.

5. Proposal from Girls Water Polo Advisory Committee to eliminate Bylaw 313 Association Rule to be presented by Jason Rosenthal – voted to Not Support. Clarification of the proposal...this proposal is intended to apply to all sports. It was moved, seconded and passed 41-37 to eliminate the association rule. This rule takes effect July 1 2008.

6. Proposal from Gold Coast Athletic Conference to revise Bylaw 3214.2 Number of Team Entries into Playoffs to be presented by Bryan Weaver – voted to take No Position. The Gold Coast Athletic Conference withdrew this motion.

7. Southern Section Proposed Budget, 2008-2009 to be presented by Bill Dabbs - voted to Support. It was moved, seconded and unanimously passed to approve the proposed budget for 2008-2009 school year.

8. Nominees for Executive Committee, 2008-2009 to be presented by Sr. Cheryl Milner - took no vote. Candidates were introduced and ballots were cast for the 2008-2009 Executive Committee representatives.

9. Proposal from Girls Water Polo Advisory Committee to revise Bylaw 3203 and 3204 Playoffs and Home Team Advantage to be presented by Scott Hinman – voted to Not Support. It was moved and seconded and unanimously defeated.

prospective athletes that if that athlete does not sign up for club ball, he/she will not be eligible to play on the high school team. The Section considers this to be inappropriate. High School sports stands alone as an opportunity for students to enhance their academic experience. Coaches who force or leverage their students into joining a certain club as a condition of being able to play on the high school team are abusing their power as coach. The opportunity to play should be available to all athletes who have the desire and will to play. Linking high school play with outside activities is ethically questionable. Please share this information with your coaches to ensure a positive and valuable experience for your athletes.

Steve Miller's school made the basketball finals for Southern Section and he heard nothing but great things from the players and coaches. He also thanked Paul Castillo for his service to CIF.

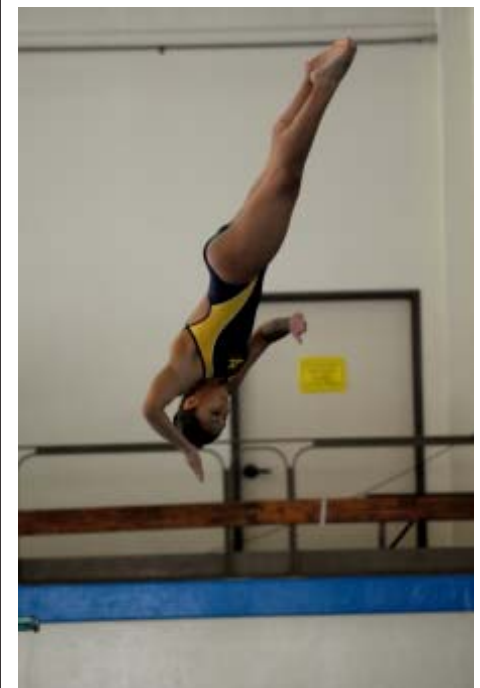
Jim Monico commended Paul Castillo. He has known him since 1975 and will miss him.
