### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

D. Introduction of New Commissioners, Executive Committee Members and Guests: New representatives, coordinators and committee members were introduced. Executive committee introductions were made as well as the introduction of new Commissioners Scott Raftery and Kristine Palle.

E. Adopt Agenda Action: Adopt Agenda – It was moved, seconded and approved to adopt the agenda.

F. Approval of Minutes: Council – Minutes of the April 26, 2007 Meeting - It was moved, seconded and approved to accept the minutes of the April 26, 2007 meeting

### 2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION

A. Recognition of anyone wishing to address the Council. Speakers must limit their remarks to three minutes: No members of the public to address the council at this time

Paul Castillo addressed the group in regard to the new transfer form, league coordinator packet availability, new directory availability (schools who were not in compliance with the directory survey and basketball schedule survey will not receive directories but may purchase them at the CIF office. The CIF Southern Section is dedicated to providing the highest possible experience and opportunities to the student-athletes, families and schools of Southern California. From providing great venues with life long memories to cost-effective championships with the least possible burden for the participants.

Part of the success story of the Section is the dramatic growth of sponsor support from \$160,000 to over \$500,000 revenue per year. The incredible value of being associated with high school athletics brings support from many companies whose decision makers are former Southern Section families. Subsequently, that support has enable the CIF-SS to maintain 'per student' dues without increase for nearly 20 years. Likewise, what else can student or families with young children do for just \$5.00?

The continued success of marketing sponsorships requires the support of our schools. These sponsorship agreements call for just a few requirements from our member schools in exchange for the millions of dollars in support during each decade.

To those schools that have been so diligent in displaying banners year round, using the proper jugs, reading the public address announcements and sending thank you notes... MANY THANKS. In particular, these little things are notices when schools like Cathedral and Colony (2 banners) have game highlights shown on the 11pm TV news with that red Toyota Championships banner in the background or when a St. Bonaventure hangs their banner a their football game.... at the Home Depot Center... during the finals. I recently received a call from a Toyota dealer very pleased to have been a his child's road water polo match and their was a Toyota banner at the pool too. Again, many thanks.

Having said this, we still also receive the 'oh shucks' phone call when a sponsor goes to an event and the banners is missing, the wrong jug is used, the proper tickets are not distributed or even a PA is not read. While these issues are in the minority, it is those little moments that seem to stick out.

A quick hit list of things we need at the playoffs (and more):

- Toyota Championships Banner: Must be displayed at all football, basketball and volleyball playoff home games. We have distributed 7 per school (3,500 total banners) during the last 7 years. If you need another, please ask.
- Toyota Championships Banner: Please permanently display in your gym, at your pool or ball field and at home football games year round. By permanently displaying this banner, you add so much to our agreement and the continued support of our title sponsor.
- CIF-SS Ticket Stock: Please acquire and use the provided playoff ticket stock for all football, volleyball and basketball games. This also saves your school money on tickets PLUS your fans get a nice 10% off coupon for 'any' products at all Sport Chalet stores.
- Gatorade Jugs/Cups/Bottles: A sponsor for more than 20 years, Gatorade is the 'exclusive' sideline jug/cup/bottle sponsor. If you do not have Gatorade items, you must provide generic (non PowerAde or other drink) sponsored items. And at all 'finals' they must be Gatorade items.
- PA Playoff Announcements: As the 'host' of any playoff event, you are representing the Section and the State. The PA's provided for each playoff sport must be read ahead of any school announcements. This is both a State and Section contract required rule.
- Approved T-shirt Sales Only: Any use of CIF, CIF Southern Section, Southern Section or the name of your sport division is a registered mark and prohibited without prior approval. Schools, book stores and booster clubs may not create their own championships shirts with any of that information. We annually see several schools arrive at the finals with fans wearing self-made championship shirts. While we applaud the 'entrepreneurial' spirit, you should also know the school that created those items (directly or indirectly) will also receive a bill for any CIF-SS Championship items that might have gone unsold at that event.

## COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

**New  
Transfer Rule  
Provides  
Option for  
Athletes**

Last year Section Council, as well as the State Federated Council, debated the first ever-statewide transfer rule. While not enthusiastically received, it was approved by our Council and ultimately enacted at the State Council meeting. This new rule ushered in a new era in which all transfers were treated the same across the ten sections. Many wondered what this new era would bring.

Like any thing new and untried, the rule met with resistance from those who predicted massive movement by athletes. Others saw the rule as tacit permission to transfer for athletic reasons – something CIF professes to abhor. No matter what the thought on the rule, athletic administrators knew the first test of its success would be in the numbers. Would there be unchecked movement by athletes across the Section? Would we see high profile athletes moving from school to school? Would there be gainers and losers among schools with in the same district boundaries?

The preliminary numbers seem to show movement about the same as under the old rule. Since July 1, 2007, the date the proposal took effect, the Section office has processed 402 transfers under the new rule (207 A). Of those 402, 372 were approved for immediate varsity eligibility, 30 denied. Under Bylaw 207 B, the office has processed 395 requests, with 208 approved, 227 limited and 25 denied. That is a total of 797 total transfers.

Presently, we have processed 175 bylaw 208-hardship requests with some 30 waiting for a determination. Of those requests processed, 98 have been approved and 77 denied. This means that 56% of the requests for hardship have been approved, with 44% denied. This number is similar to the approval rates seen in previous years. While not quite at the half-way point in the school year, a total of 972 students have registered some

## RULE REVIEW



### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

As I'm reaching my one year anniversary with the organization I've reflected on the some of the most frequently asked questions by our membership. The depth of the CIF-SS Constitution and Bylaws seems endless with its many layers and stipulations. Don't be overwhelmed! The CIF-SS staff is more than happy to assist you in all your Blue Book interpretation needs.

#### What is a valid change of residence?

One would think "valid change of residence" speaks for itself; however there are some details that factor into a valid move determining eligibility. The most obvious caveats of a move includes the entire family unit's relocation (not just the student athlete and a parent). If a student athlete lives with mom, dad and a sibling, a valid change would include the relocation off all the family members who resided together when the student initially established their high school eligibility.

#### Misconception

The most common misconception we see regarding a valid change of residence are the cases when the receiving district allows for "open enrollment". If your district allows students to choose any school within the district he/she moved into be aware their eligibility is affected. Even though some districts allow for "school choice", a student-athlete's athletic eligibility rests with the high school whose attendance boundary he/she resides in. If high schools A, B, C, and D are all within the same school district and a student residentially belongs to high school A, that athlete is not varsity eligible at high schools B, C, and D.

#### Who does the association rule prevent me from coaching?

Most have a good grasp on the notion that a coach can not coach their own athletes in the off-season (summer not included). However, remember this is an "association rule", not a coaching rule. This rule applies to all students within your high school and isn't gender or sport specific.

#### Misconception

The most frequent violation is that where a coach of a boys' sports will coach and

## MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING - July 3, 2007

The July meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order at 2:05 p.m. by President Earl Haugen at the Doral Desert Princess Resort in Cathedral City. All members were present, with the exception of Sue Kuwabara, Sue Rainey and Larry Satterfield.

1. ADOPT AGENDA – It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the agenda.

2. MINUTES – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of April 24, 2007.

#### 3. ACTIONITEMS–

##### A. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL ACTION ITEMS-

1. Bylaw 3102 Deletion: Wrestling – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the deletion of Bylaw 3102, which required sections to conduct their wrestling championships in one day.

2. Proposal to Continue CIF State Football Championship Bowl Games – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the proposal to continue the CIF State Football Championship Bowl Games beyond the two-year "pilot" that will end in December, 2007.

##### B. SOUTHERN SECTION ACTIONITEMS-

1. Revised Proposal I from the Mountain View League to Amend Summer Dead Period – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the Mountain View League's proposal to implement a two-week Summer Dead Period for all sports that prohibits the use of any school facilities, by any school or outside group, during that period.

2. Revised Proposal II from the Mountain View League to Amend Summer Dead Period – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend no position on the Mountain View League's proposal to implement a two-week Summer Dead Period in which each individual sport program could choose the dates of that two-week Summer Dead Period.

3. Proposal from Golf Advisory Committee – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend support of the Golf Advisory Committee's proposal to revise the wording for matches to determine teams and individuals advancing to post-season play.

#### 4. NON-ACTIONITEMS–

1. CIF State Advisory Committee Proposal – A discussion was held regarding the C.I.F. State Football Advisory Committee's proposal regarding possible changes to the format for the CIF State Football Championship Bowl Games.

2. Championship/New Events Committee Sequence of New Events – Commissioner Jim Staunton led a discussion regarding the sequence of potential new CIF State Championship Events.

#### 5. NEWBUSINESS–

A. Consideration of the following schools for membership status for the 2007-2008 school year...

After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve Patriot High School for full membership for the 2007-2008 school year,

provided they attend and complete an orientation at the C.I.F. Southern Section Office. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve Bethel Christian School, High Desert Academy, Lutheran South High School, Padre Pio Academy and Testimonial Christian High School for probationary membership for the 2007-2008 school year, provided they attend and complete an orientation at the C.I.F. Southern Section Office.

B. 2007-2008 CIF Southern Section Commissioner's Goals - Commissioner Jim Staunton led a discussion of the 2007-2008 CIF Southern Section Commissioner's Goals.

C. 2007-2008 Revised Southern Section Budget – After discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the revised 2007-2008 CIF Southern Section Budget.

### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

E. Adopt Agenda -It was moved, seconded and approved to adopt the agenda deleting item 3A1 and the addition of item IV.B.2, proposal from the Lacrosse Committee to change the season of sport.

F. Approval of Minutes -Minutes of the July 3, 2007 Executive Committee Meeting -It was moved, second and approved.

G. Communications to the Executive Committee -Letters of thanks were read to the committee.

H. Welcome and Introduction of New Members - The four new members of the committee introduced themselves. They are Wendy Doty, Superintendent of Downey Unified School District, Superintendents Representative, Steve Miller, Assistant Principal, Bishop Montgomery High School, Parochial Area Representative, Ray Moore, Boys Athletic Director, Vista Murrieta High School, Boys Athletic Director Representative and Debi Weiss, Activities Director, Ayala High School, Activities Directors Representative. Rob Wigod introduced the new assistant commissioners: Kristine Palle and Scott Raftery.

### 4. NON-ACTION ITEMS

A. Southern Section Non-Action Items  
1. Proposal from the Sportsmanship Committee of the Southern Section Strategic Planning Group to insert language into each sport in the Blue Book -After discussion, revisions were made.

2. Proposal from Lacrosse Committee to Change Season of Sport -This item was discussed.

### 5. NEW BUSINESS

A. Consideration of the following schools for membership status for the 2008-2009 school year:

1. Assyrian American Christian School-Barrett Luketic presented this school's membership. After discussion, it was moved and seconded to deny membership for the 2008-09 school year. It was recommended they re-apply next year when enrollment increases.

2. Riverside Preparatory School - After discussion, it was moved, seconded and approved to accept this school under probationary status.

B. HomeSchool Multi-School Teams - John Dahlem stated home school students are forming home school associations who affiliate with a school and then multi-campus. He is working with the State Office to create rules and guidelines for these new types of associations.

Report from Assistant Commissioners on Transfers and Hardships-KristinePalle reported on the number of transfers and hardships for this year to date. There were 240 freshmen transfers, 107 transfers with limited eligibility, 138 transfers with restricted eligibility, 62 foreign exchange students and 136 hardships. There also were 344 valid changes of residences reported.

D. Report on Parent Presentations given to Section Athletic Groups-Rob Wigod discussed the parent presentations made at Downey and Elsinore. He noted these presentations are free

of charge and he also plans to go to Glendale.

E. Update on Web Site -Bulletins -All playoff bulletins will now be available on the web site only. We will only mail the preview bulletins with rule books.

F. Section Interpretations on new Transfer Rule -Discussed in item C.

### 6. OLD BUSINESS

A. Report on National Federation Meeting -The attending members discussed their experiences and information gained from the meeting.

B. Report from Section 7 & 8 Meeting -The attending members discussed their experiences and information gained from the meeting.

C. Report on Wrestling Dress Code Proposal-Rob Wigod discussed this proposal. Earl Haugen will take this recommendation to the State Executive Committee meeting. Wording was added and Earl will suggest it for all sports.

### 7. CLOSED SESSION

The committee went into closed session at 3:44 p.m. and finished at 4:00 p.m. There was no report from the closed session.

### 8. REPORT SESSION

A. President's Report -There was no president's report.

B. Treasurer's Report -The final audit report will be presented at the November 7, 2007 Executive Committee. Dues are charged at 23 cents per pupil and \$25 per sport.

C. COMMISSIONER'S REPORT -Jim Staunton stated he wanted to promote information to parents. He also presented suggestions on citizenship from an Arcadia parent.

#### D. MEMBER REPORTS

Jim Monico stated that construction will begin on a new stadium for his school in November.

Janet Berardi stated the Volleyball Advisory Committee will propose to change warm up times and make them standard.

Guy Roubian relayed information on charter schools. California has 190,000 students in 574 charter schools.

Reggie Thompkins stated there is a big focus on academic achievement in his area with athletics as part of what they do educationally. Ray Moore offered information on how to calendar games, facilities and transportation. On October 17, they will do an Ethics in Sports presentation.

Kristine Palle stated water polo finals will be moved to Woollett in Irvine.

Scott Raftery stated he has Cypress College back for volleyball finals.

Thom Simmons stated 83 games will be telecast/audiocast and there will be a larger amount of funds to share with the school. Fox and Vootage are eager to work with us.

Rob Wigod finished the fall workshops and the new principal and athletic director workshops. There were, however, no small school presentations. He plans to reach out to the small schools and keep them informed.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting adjourned at 4:20 p.m.

## OFFICIALS' WHISTLE



### QUALITY OFFICIATING

During halftime of a nationally televised high school all-star basketball game, an interview was conducted with the game director. A wide variety of topics were discussed:

- The positive character traits of all participants
- The high level of coaching skills
- The support of sponsors
- The NBA and NCAA making formal commitments to improve basketball

The director painted a wonderful picture of high school basketball and sports in general. Everyone and everything was working well. Then, the announcer asked the following question: What challenge remains for the game of basketball?

Without hesitation, the director stated "Improve the quality of officiating".

Keep in mind that this was a high level program director- not the coach who just lost a tough game; not the Principal who is dealing with a difficult administrative issue. This was a simple, matter-of-fact comment, identified as a top priority.

If we assume this observation is even partially correct, how we all reach this goal- not only in basketball but in all sports? Who plays a role in this process? How do we measure improvement?

It might be good to begin with the assumption and challenge used when speaking to officials' groups- **Improve officiating skills at a higher level and faster pace than players improve!**

Look at any sport today versus five years ago, and ask yourself the following:

- Are the players faster?
- Are the players better conditioned?
- Are the players smarter about rules?
- Is coaching better?
- Is equipment improved?
- Has the level of accountability increased?

There is little doubt that our players and coaches are far ahead of the officials in improving their game!

The CIF, Southern Section- together with its schools and officials, benefits from the continued commitment to the Recruit-Train-Retain model to improve the quality of officiating. In the end, all games benefit, as do players, coaches and officials.

## HISTORY OF THE CIF-SS 47TH HISTORICAL "TIDBIT"

by Dr. John S. Dahlem

### UNCROWNED CIFSS CHAMPIONS WORLD WAR II AND THE FULLERTON HIGH SCHOOL 1942 BASEBALL TEAM

During World War II, the CIFSS had to adjust the playing of interscholastic sports due to the war effort and the fact that many high schools could no longer field teams and hire the necessary coaches. Rations dictated that many games could not be played due to transportation concerns (gasoline) and the lack of balls (rubber was needed for the war effort). A perusal of the CIFSS record book indicates that very few CIFSS Championships were held during the 1943-1945 school years. In addition, the sport of high school baseball was suffering from a lack of popularity and the ability to make money at the gate. In 1939, a plan was developed where group

baseball Champions would be declared instead of one major Champion for the whole sport of baseball. At the close of the 1941 season, only two of the CIFSS groups played through to a Championship. Many teams were entitled to enter the play-offs but did not due to costs or lack of interest. In the Central Group of leagues Bonita defeated Brea-Olinda and in the Western Group Santa Barbara defeated Woodrow Wilson. It is interesting to note in the CIFSS Official Record Book that Santa Barbara, the winner by a score of 4-3 over Wilson, is listed as the 1941 Major Division Champion, but no mention is made of Bonita High School's victory.

The same chaos and difficulty of the war years would continue for the 1942 baseball season and again the uncrowning of a

deserving CIFSS Champion... **THE BASEBALL TEAM FROM FULLERTON HIGH SCHOOL - 1942.**

The 1942 Fullerton High School baseball team would go undefeated in the Sunset League and defeated Excelsior High School by a score of 10 – 3 in the League Championship game. The Fullerton coach was the popular Richard Spaulding. They were led by their star pitcher Vaughn Jones, a tall right hander, and catcher Kenny Sullivan. Other key members of the team included Ernie Johnson (2B), Lee Hodge (CF), Frank Munoz (LF), Ed Hill (3B), Trenton Mitchell (SS), Joe Juarez or "Yutch" Rayburn (RF), and Bob Trook (1B). They defeated San Gabriel Valley League Champion Burbank by a score of 5 – 3 in the first round

## FOX SPORTS NET PAC-10 COMMENTATOR PETROS PAPADAKIS SPEAKS AT 32ND ANNUAL FOOTBALL PRESS CONFERENCE AND LUNCHEON

Fox Sports Net Pac-10 color commentator, Petros Papadakis served as the keynote speaker at the 32nd Annual CIF Southern Section-Toyota Football Championship Press Conference and Luncheon on Monday, December 3. Hosting the event for the second consecutive year was Fox Sports Net High School Spotlight star Lindsey Soto.

Petros Papadakis has taken the local and national sports media scenes by storm since graduating from the University of Southern California in 2001. The USC football star got his start in broadcasting fresh off the field by doing television analysis for Fox Sports Net and radio work on the Trojan flagship station. Papadakis broadened his TV duties over the next couple years adding sideline reporting and magazine show hosting roles.

In 2003 Petros began hosting a Monday through Friday mid-morning radio show on radio. The "Petros Papadakis Show" started in January 2004. Every afternoon Petros touched on all aspects of sports, entertainment and life in general. His passion, rapid fire delivery and ability to zoom past politically correct boundaries have made him a controversial figure and a lightning rod for attention. Petros was named L.A.'s number one sports radio host in 2006 by the Daily News.

Papadakis debuted as FSN's lead college football analyst in September 2004 working in the booth with Barry Tompkins. Petros has become one of America's leading authorities on college football and he works on other FSN programming like the Best Damn Sports Show, the BCS Ratings Show and Totally Football.

Petros has guest starred on several television programs; the CBS hit series CSI-New York, Outside the Lines and Cold Pizza plus "I Love the 90's" on VH-1. Papadakis is in his second season as the host of Spike-TV's "Pro's vs Joe's" and he has also been on E, the Game Show Network and the KTLA Morning News.

Petros, his father John and his brother Taso all played football at USC. Petros played tailback for the Trojans and in 2000 was the captain of the only last place team in USC history. He scored 16 touchdowns for the Trojans and was voted Most Inspirational Player for the 2000 season. The Papadakis family owns and operates the Papadakis Taverna in San Pedro, one of America's top Greek restaurants. Petros still waits tables at the Taverna, except during football season.

On FSN WEST and FSN PRIME TICKET, Los Angeles Area Emmy Award winner Lindsay Soto is a familiar face in Southern California currently hosting "Trojans Live" during football and basketball season, reporting for the Trojan Press Conference, and covering regional high school athletics as host of the "High School Spotlight."

Lindsay Soto made her debut with FSN and FSN 2 in 1997 as a reporter and associate producer for "Inside Cal-Hi Sports" and the "USC Magazine Show." Soto, a USC graduate in broadcast journalism, interned both at the USC Athletic Department and later at Fox Sports Net while attending college. Her first job was at an ABC affiliate in Yakima, Washington doing weekend sports and weekday news reporting. Next she worked for KKFX (FOX) in Santa Barbara as the station's sports director.

Soto joined the "Southern California Sports Report" team in 2003 as a reporter. Soto also co-hosts the "LA Times High School Spotlight Show".

In her short time as an FSN reporter, she has covered most local teams including USC, UCLA, the Lakers, Dodgers, Angels and Ducks.

Quite simply, Soto is the face of high school athletics in Southern California and is rapidly making a name for herself in the collegiate ranks.

of the playoffs. They advanced to the finals of what was called the "Minor Division" and met a very strong Bonita High School team led by the great Glenn Davis who would go onto win the Heisman Trophy for Army in 1946. The game was tied going into the 8th inning when Fullerton scored three runs and secured the victory by a score of 8 - 6. Stars of the game included Munoz, Johnson, Hodge, Hill and the catcher Sullivan who had two hits. Glenn Davis had one hit and a run for Bonita. The "Daily News Tribune" Fullerton newspaper for that Saturday, May 30, 1942, had an article on the front page entitled, "Japanese Launch Offensive Eastward From Nanchang" and a cartoon showing Uncle Sam bowing his head and saying **WE'LL NOT FORGET** at a memorial inscribed: **IN MEMORY OF THE HEROES OF PEARL HARBOR, BATTAN AND CORREGIDIOR.** In the "Dailey News Tribune" write up of the game it was stated:

"There is a possibility that Fullerton will issue a challenge to Long Beach Poly's major champions for an extra playoff, although Coach Simpson said he would not know until next week."

The writer had the story a little wrong as San Diego Hoover actually beat Long Beach Poly by a score of 8 - 3 and the game was played at Hoover High School. San Diego Hoover is the only Champion listed for the 1942 baseball season in the official CIFSS Record Book. The CIFSS Baseball Championships would not be contested again until after the war in 1946. Finally, in 1950, the CIF "officially" divided the Baseball Championships into a Major and Minor Division configuration.

It is poignant to find out that the challenge was never made by Fullerton High School to San Diego Hoover. The restrictive issues of the war effort and the fact that beloved Coach Richard Spaulding was drafted and reported to duty that next week to serve his country put an end to a glorious CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON.

Many of the young men who played on that Championship team went onto to serve their country and some died during that great conflict. Kenny Sullivan is one of the two surviving members of that baseball team and came ashore with the Army in the second wave at Normandy. He was wounded with shrapnel and never got a chance to realize his dream to play professional baseball. He did return to Fullerton and mentored the great Del Crandall who was a successful catcher with the Milwaukee Braves.

one or all of the girls' players of that same sport in the off season. For example, the boys' high school soccer coach is affiliated with a club where he coaches high school aged girls from the same high school. Remember, no member of your athletic staff may have off season contact (association) with any athletes that have remaining eligibility at your high school. The football coach can not take the girls' soccer team to an exhibition match in April as this is considered association.

### When can I take my dead period?

A school's dead period is considered 21 consecutive days off any time between your last day of school or June 13<sup>th</sup> (which ever is sooner) and August 24. Each school reports their dead period (per sport at all levels) to our office by sending in the survey school's received from our office in the fall packet. If you need this form you can download it on our web site. Under the forms link the title is "Declaration of Summer Dead Period 2008".

### Misconception

Many think a dead period must occur at either the beginning of the end of summer. As long as your 21 days are consecutive, it can fall anywhere within the designated dates including the middle of summer. In addition, the dead period can vary by sport.

Last year there were 1,304 under 214, 426 hardship requests with a 50% approval rate, and 959 bona fide change of residence forms reported. This year thus far, (July and August) we have processed 192 1<sup>st</sup> time freshmen transfers. In addition we have processed 266 transfers that are not under the new rule.

### 7. REPORT SESSION

A. President's Report - Earl Haugen: Executive Committee commended on their diligence in disseminating information to their areas.

B. Commissioner's Report - Jim Staunton: The Commissioner commented on the guest speakers and schools that will be present at the "Champions for Character" luncheon taking place immediately following the council meeting. Kristine Palle spoke about soccer and the introduction of the "Academy League" and revisited the idea that it WILL NOT be accepted as an "Olympic development program". Local coaches are encouraged to maintain that high school athletics comes first. If there is any discrepancy in the soccer communities please call the CIF office.

C. Treasurer's Report - William Dabbs: Audits have been completed with a report to be presented to the executive committee on Nov. 7. Dues statements have been mailed and remain \$0.23 per student. Sport fees remain \$25 per sport.

form of transfer paperwork with the Section office.

The Section office has hosted 8 State Transfer Appeal hearings. In each case, the new process has afforded ample opportunity for the parent(s) to plead their case for a reversal of the Commissioner's decision. The panel members are well trained, professional and thorough. The process seems to be working well.

State-wide, there is now a cadre of 56 active hearing officers. 41 hearings have been conducted in six of the Section offices. Southern Section has seen panel members from the Los Angeles and San Diego Sections. All have been excellent representatives of the State office.

The new rule has accomplished the goal of making transfer-processing uniform throughout the state. It has also loosened transfer policies in seven of the Sections, allowing greater freedom for athletes to find a suitable school setting. It is too early to tell if this will result in wholesale movement of athletes, but the preliminary results would seem to show that the movement of students is no greater than under the old rule. We will continue to monitor and report the numbers as the year moves on.
