A motion was made and seconded that Mr. S. F. Van Patten be manager of the Southern California Track Meet. Motion carried.

Upon recommendation of the Council the following men were reinstated: Charles Tonwy and Ray Hughes, Manual Arts High School; Paul Schellenbach, Hollywood High School; Elden Farrar, Orange Union High School.

The case of James Boone was held over until sufficient evidence should be submitted.

A motion was made and carried that the rule of the State Federation in regard to professionalism become operative in reference to baseball after Feb., 1, 1915, and last throughout the baseball season.

Those present were President A. H. Simons of Visalia, E. W. Oliver of Los Angeles, L. L. Besman of San Bernardine, Osmar Abbett of Colinga, J. G. Templeton of Pale Alto, I. W. Kibby of Red Bluff, and Secretary C. L. Biedenbach of Berkeley.

Mr. Oliver reported that Occidental College, Pemena College, and the University of Southern California had all agreed not to held any more Righ School contests after this year, thus strangthening the California Interschelastic Federation in its hold upon all interscheel athletics.

President Simons reported that the directors in reply to his letter of September 29, 1914 had voted by small to amend the constitution by substituting the rule of the A. A. H. defining prefereignalism for that first established in the constitution of the G. I. F. This setien was considered advisable in view of the objection of certain San Francisco High School men to the G. I. F. wording of the rule defining senteurs.

Mr. Oliver reported that Mr. Thatcher of Ojab Valley has accepted the rules of eligibility as laid down in the C. I. F. constitution to govern the tennis tournements held at his school so far as they concern high school students.

After considerable discussion the motion was laid on the table until it could be generally discussed among the schools and expert advice obtained, the matter to be taken up again at the July meeting.

MINUTES OF THE FEDERATED COUNCIL

The regular meeting of the Federated Council of the California Interscholastic Federation was held in room 107 California Hall, University of California, Berkeley, July 2, 1915, at 7:30 p. m.

Those present were President A. M. Simons of Visalia, E. W. Oliver of Los Angeles, Osmar Abbott of Coalinga, I. W. Kibby of Red Bluff, W. C. Wilson of Coalinga, W. Hyman of Woodland, and C. L. Biedenbach of Berkeley.

The minutes of the meetings of April second and third were read and upon motion duly made and seconded adopted as read.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Mr. Wilson was scated as delegate in place of L. L. Beaman, and Mr. Hyman in place of H. O. Williams of Sacra-

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the election of officers was postponed until Saturday morning, July third.

The report of the secretary-treasurer was read, showing receipts of \$298.15, and expenses of \$99.15; balance on hand, \$199.

The secretary reported that the full amount expected from the North Coast section had not been received. This brought on a discussion of the financial question relative to sections. The matter was finally laid on the table until Saturday morning.

President Simons read his financial report covering the track and field meet at Fresno, which showed total receipts of \$513.15, expenditures \$474.95, leaving a balance of \$38.20 turned into the treasury. Copy of the report with vouchers is on file with the secretary.

A vote of thanks was ordered sent to the Fresno Republican for their contribution of a plaque for the relay race, and to the Spalding Company for their per-

Mr. Wilson was appointed to take the place of ex-delegate Beaman on the various committees on which Mr. Beaman was serving.

Mr. Oliver reported the bid of the Manual Arts High School on printing. It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. Oliver he appointed to secure a cut for the federation and to attend to the printing of letterheads by October first, after obtaining a correct list of the officers of each section.

Mr. Oliver, chairman of the committee on football, reported in favor of thirty minute halves and an additional twenty minutes in case of a tie in all championship games. Action postponed until the next meeting.

Adjourned at 10 p. m. to meet July 3 at 10 a. m. in same place.

A meeting of the Federated Council of the California Interscholastic Federation was held in room 107, California Hall, University of California, July 3, 1915, at 10 a. m.

Those present were President A. M. Simons of Visalia, E. W. Oliver of Los Angeles, Osmar Abbott of Coalinga, I. W. Kibby of Red Bluff, W. C. Wilson of Pasadena, W. Hyman of Woodland, J. C. Templeton of Palo Alto, and C. L. Biedenbach of Berkeley.

During the absence of President Simons, Mr. Oliver was elected temporary chairman. Dr. Angel of Stanford University, who was present as a visitor, was invited to address the meeting. He spoke briefly on the relative merits of Rugby and American football.

President Simons took the chair at 10:30.

Upon motion of Mr. Templeton, seconded by Mr. Abbott, the present officers, namely, A. M. Simons, President, and C. L. Biedenbach, Secretary-treasurer, were declared re-elected for the ensuing year.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the report of Mr. Oliver made at the previous meeting relative to the time limit in football games be adopted. A discussion relative to the place of holding championship games resulted in a decision to leave such matters in the hands of the local committees concerned. the local committees concerned.

Individual reports were made by Messrs. Templeton, Abbott and Biedenbach, the committee on the advisability and possibility of conducting track and field contests in each school. It was finally moved, seconded and carried that the C. I. F. strongly recommends to the high schools of the State that they emphasize such athletic activities as will interest all the boys in the school and enlist them in active participation. It was then moved, seconded and carried that the matter of carrying out the details of the scheme be left to the committee to work out with power to act. G. E. Mercer was appointed to take the place of Mr. Templeton, who has moved out of the section.

Mr. Abbott presented the following report on possible improvements in the field and track meets:

1st. That the order of events be changed so as to make a better arrangement for those taking part in two or more events, e. g., mile, half mile and relay, or 100 yard and 220 yard dashes. And to this end that the committee having in charge the annual meet consider the Los Annules County order and the order of events used in the geles County order and the order of events used in the colleges and make a new order.

2nd. That in case of ties the points be divided and no medal be given. This is to prevent such inhumanity as the annual pole vault in which two contestants worked

for hours and the matter was only decided by injury to one man about dark.

3rd. That in races requiring trial heats, the time made in the trial be decisive and not the place against those who happen to be in the heat. This will prevent charges of unfairness and keep inferior athletes from taking points from superior ones.

4th. That the relay race start at the beginning of a long straightaway to prevent winning by accident of place or turn.

5th. That the schools in the past track meet be asked to vote on a six-men mile relay race and if a majority of those voting favor this relay it be substituted for the present relay.

The advantages of the six men relay are that it makes a shorter distance for each man than four men mile, is not a repetition of any power event, required skill on the part of a larger number. The disadvantage is that it may make a greater expense for schools having a great distance to travel.

6th. That the javelin throw be given points at regular

7th. That a committee of one be appointed to investigate the effect of the mile run on high school boys, and report at the next meeting of the directors.

The report was ordered filed and the motion was made, seconded and carried that the suggestions be put into effect so far as possible.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the minutes of this meeting be printed and sent to all high schools of the State during September.

The committee on basketball made a report concerning the State championship. It was then moved, seconded and carried that a State championship in boys basketball be held.

It was moved, seconded and carried that December eleventh be the date for the final State championship game in rugby football, and that the semi-finals close by December fourth.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the date for the final State championship in basketball be not later than March 4, 1916, and that the semi-finals close by February 26, 1916.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the 1916 spring field and track meet be held April 8th, with the understanding that it be the Saturday of the Spring vacation if such vacation be uniform throughout the State.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a committee composed of the president, the secretary, and Mr. Oliver consult with the proper authorities to secure a uniform Spring vacation throughout the State.

Mr. Oliver, in view of the fact that the 1916 Spring field meet is to be held in Los Angeles, promised that Los Angeles would take care of every boy who attended the meet during his stay in Los Angeles, and strongly urged the Principals to become interested and assist in making the meet a great event for the boys of their school.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the policy followed at the Fresno meet be adopted for the Los Angeles meet, namely, that only students who take first, secon or third place in the section meets be eligible, and that pupils other than those who took first, second, or third place in section meets may enter State Meets upon recommendation of their Principal, the Executive Committee of their Section, and the delegates of their Section. This recommendation must accompany a Blank. There are to be no more than twelve men from one school, exclusive of three extra relay runners, and no more than three men in one event.

It was moved, seconded and carried that after paying expenses of the Spring meet and fifty dollars into the treasury of the Federated Council, the balance may be applied pro rata among the athletes to pay the railroad expenses for distances in excess of two hundred miles. Any further balance to be paid into the treasury of the Federated Council.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the arrangements for the track meet be left in the hands of Messrs. Oliver and Wilson with full power to act.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the 1916 State Tennis championship tournament be held Friday, May 19th, and Saturday, May 20th, in Berkeley. Mr. Biedenbach was appointed a committee of one to make, arrangements for the tournament.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the President and Secretary be requested to publish a report of the year's work and furnish it to the press.

Action on unpaid contributions of sections was indefinitely postponed.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the chairman appoint an auditor for the coming year. Mr. Hyman was so appointed, and bills of the delegates ordered paid as audited.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the secretary inform the secretaries of each section that they must immediately notify the secretary of the Federated Council of the winner of championships in each contest in his section, and that the secretary of the federation is to inform the schools concerned.

The meeting adjourned at 2:30 p. m.

POMONA HIGH SCHOOL

December 7, 1915

To the Members of the Council of the California Interscholastic Federation.

Gentlemen:

The Citrus Belt Athletic League of Southern California respectfully submits to your Honorable Body the following questions which have been acted upon by the Council of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, and from which appeal to your Body was granted by the Southern Section Council at its recent meeting in Los Angeles, November 29-30.

Question A: The Citrus Belt Athletic League, through its Board of Managers, consisting of the Principals of all the schools of the League, passed upon a protest from Riverside High School, questioning the right of Pomona High School, a member of the above League, to the League Football Championship. The Board of Appeal voted that the game in question should stand as played, thus declaring Pomona High School League Champion of Football for the season just closed.

At a Meeting of the C. I. F., Southern Section, called to arrange a schedule for the semi-final and final games for the Championship of the Southern Section, the above action of the Citrus Belt Athletic Board was reviewed and set aside by the Southern Section Council, the said Council holding that the Federal Constitution gives it jurisdiction over the internal affairs of the Citrus Belt League, giving it the right to declare who is the Champion of the Citrus Belt League and entitled to represent said League for the semi-final Championship.

In this action the Southern Section Council refused to recognize the team declared to be Champions by the Citrus Belt Board of Appeal, and refused to permit said team to take part in the semifinals in the Southern Section Championship. This action was based upon Section H of Article 5 of the Constitution of the C. I. F., bearing upon "Eligibility of Pupils," which Section reads: "In the event that a member of a team is snown to be ineligible for any Championship game in which he has participated, etc." We maintain that this Section applies only to contests between Leagues or between Sections in the semi-finals for the Section Championship, or the State Championship. The C. I. F., Southern Section, Council ruled that the "Championship game" was originally and is intended to mean every game played in any League during the League schedule, even the first game played within the League during the season.

Question B: Article 8, "Protests" of the Federated Constitution provides a definite procedure in case of protests. The Citrus Belt Athletic Board maintains that the protest by a member of its own League should be, as it was in this case, presented to the Board of Appeal of the Citrus Belt League, and in the event that the protest is approved, it is the duty of the League to refer

the matter to the Section Council, which in turn should refer it to the State Council for approval, and if the protest fails with the Citrus Belt Athletic Board, as it did fail in this case (the Citrus Belt Board of Appeal refused to sustain the Riverside High School's protest), then no further hearing should have been given to this particular protest. The C. I. F., Southern Section, Council ruled that this protest may be made directly to the Section Council, and in this instance the Citrus Belt League did not refer this matter to the Section Council. No school in the League formally referred the matter to the Section Council, the question being raised at the Section Council Meeting by a member of the Council on his own initiative, based upon private conversations with individuals.

Question C: In the minutes of the proceedings of the first Federal Council Meeting, held at the Shattuck Hotel, Berkeley, July 4, 1914, is found among the large amount of business transacted, this business consisting of amendments and additions to the Federal Constitution and various motions, the following: was moved, seconded, and carried that no games or meets over which the Federation has jurisdiction be played on either Thanksgiving or Decoration Day." The question raised is, was this motion intended to include games within any League schedule, including the Championship game within the League, or was it intended to cover only interleague or Sectional, inter-sectional or State Championship games? The C. I. F., Southern Section, maintains that this applies only to inter-league, inter-section, or State Championship games. (Note: Pasadena High School and Long Beach High School scheduled and played the City League Championship game on Thanksgiving Day of the present year.)

The Citrus Belt Athletic Board is in hearty accord with the C. I. F. ruling on question C, but it is mentioned at this point to call attention to the fact that this ruling is at variance with the C. I. F., Southern Section, ruling on question A, or rather Section H, of Article 5 of the Federated Constitution, where the C. I. I Southern Section, ruled that the words "Championship game" were intended to mean every game played within any League, thus giving the State and Section Councils immediate jurisdiction over all the games played in any one League, whereas in question C, the C. I. F., Southern Section, have ruled that the words "no games or meets over which the Federation has jurisdiction" applies only to inter-section and State Championship games, granting that the Federation does not have immediate jurisdiction over any games outside of inter-section and State Championship games.

The C. I. F., Southern Section, further maintained that the resolution in question C, passed by the Federated Council in regular session, July 4, 1914, is not binding upon any of the Sections, Leagues, or Schools, but was intended only as an urgent suggestion, whereas the Citrus Belt Athletic Board maintains and likes to believe that any resolution regularly offered and passed by the Federal Council has the same effect and force as any part of the Federal Constitution upon any of the matters pertaining to School thletics, and should be respected by the Sections and Leagues under the jurisdiction of the Federation.

Question D: Bearing upon questions A, B and C, what is

the intended meaning of the statement on page 3 of the Preamble to the Federated Constitution, as submitted to the High Schools of the State by Commissioner Will C. Wood: "Leagues existing at present will not be interfered with."

est, if not the oldest Athletic League is one of the oldhas operated under a written Constitution since its organization. The games of this League have been played according to its Constitution down to and including all the games of the League season, which closed with the last game scheduled November 20, 1915.

Said Constitution reads in part as follows: "The Principals of the High Schools in this League shall constitute a Board of Appeal. They shall be the judges of what constitutes professionalism. They shall have the right to pass upon and determine the amateur standing of any member of this League. Their vote must be a two-thirds vote of all the Principals to carry. We shall be governed by the rules of the Southern California Interscholastic Council only in semi-final and final games with other Leagues, etc."

This Constitution does not include the previous semester ruling of the State Federation Constitution which provides that a student must have been in school the preceding semester to be eligible to play. Neither does it include the clause that no student is eligible to play after the first eight semesters of residence in any Secondary School. It does provide that any student who has represented any Secondary School in athletics for any part of four further participate in inter-school contests, and it of other Leagues, the members of the Citrus Belt's team must conform with the C. I. F. rules of eligibility. Furthermore, L. L. of its existence, gave it as his judgment of the Citrus Belt League within its own League, so long as it conforms to the C. I. F. rules when in competition with the Schools of other Leagues.

The C. I. F., Southern Section, Council, at its recent Meeting, ruled that any game played and won by any School within its the preceding semester, or who had been in attendance in any Secondary School eight previous semesters, said School thereby forfeited such game to the School against which the game was played, and that winner to participate in the semi-finals for the Southern Section Championship. For example, Riverside High School played all its ceding semester, and therefore the C. I. F., Southern Section, ruled during the present season.

Please have the Federal Council pass upon the above questions and notify the Citrus Belt Athletic League at your earliest convenience, as the rulings recorded above by the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Council, bar Pomona High School from articipation in the semi-finals leading to the Southern Section ampionship in American Football for the present season.

To the State Federated Council,

Through it's President, Mr. A. M. Simons:

In accordance with a telegram sent to Mr. A. M. Simons, President of the State Federation, the Southern Section of the State Federation submits the following:

A meeting of the Southern Section was called November 23, 1 15. 4:30 P.M. to consider the arrangement for the semi-finel and final games for the football season of 1915. who in any way appeared to be interested in these arrangments All teams were notified to have a representative present. tives from Fan Diego, Whittier, Pasadena, and Pomona and Representa-Riverside (both of the Citrus Belt League) were present. therefore appeared that there was a question as to the team which should represent this League. The Council requested the representatives from Pomona and Riverside to present their claims. After hearing these claims and a statement from Mr. Jantzen, President of the Citrus Belt League, and a member of the Council, the following motion was carried unanimously:

"It was moved and carried that the team of the Citrus Belt League having the highest percentage among those who have complied with the rules of the C.I.F. be declared champion and that the Citrus Belt League be requested to present the name of this team to the Council, Southern Section, at a meeting to be held at the Los Angeles High School 8:00 P.M. Tuesday, November 30, 1915, and further that any protest to this decision must be filed at this meeting "

Drawings were then made for the semi-finals resulting as follows:

San Diego versus Whittier Passdena versus Citrus Belt League

December 4th, 1915 was the date set for the semi-final games and December 11th was the date set for the final game.

Adjournment was then taken until 8:00 P.M. November 30. in order that the Citrus Belt League might have the opportunity to comply with the motion.

On the afternoon of November 30 the President of the Citrus Belt League called up a member of the Council and stated that the Citrus Belt League would enter no team in the semi-finals. At the 5:00 P.M. meeting November 30, no team was officially entered by the Citrus Belt League. Therefore, Pasadena was awarded its game by default.

(Pasadena, however, the next day arranged to play a practice game to test the relative strength of the teams. This game was played on December 4th and resulted in a victory for Pasadena by a score of 7 - 0.)

On December th, after the playing of the semi-finals (December 4th) and after all arrangements had been made for the finals, a rumor came to the Council that a protest had been filed with the State Council by the Citrus Belt League. Pomona was called up and asked if the rumor was correct and if so to forward a copy of the protest so the Southern Section might be advised as to the action taken. A copy of this protest was filed with a member of the Council on December 5th and copies sent to other members of the Council on December 9th. The President of the Citrus Belt League was called up and officially stated to the Council that no action had been taken by the Citrus Belt League authorizing this protest and that he had signed no protest. Although, the copy, as forwarded to the Council, bore his name as President of the Citrus Belt League and the name of h. P. Reynolds as Frincipal of Pomona High School.

With reference to question A the Southern Section distinctly stated to the Representatives of the Citrus Belt League that they claim no jurisdiction over the internal workings of any League but that since the section champion-ships were established and controlled by C.I.F. teams desiring to compete in these semi-finals and final games must comply with the rules of the C.I.F. throughout the year. Otherwise it might happen that Team A complying with the C.I.F., and the best of all the teams in the State thus complying, might be beaten in the League by Team B not playing according to C.I.F. rules which team would be unable to qualify a sufficient number of eligible members to make a credible showing in the semi-finals and thus Team A would be debarred from competing and the final championship of the State be won by Team C a team inferior to Team A.

The Southern Section of the C.I.F. has always understood that one of the fundamental reasons for forming the C.I.F. was the absolute necessity of uniform rules of eligibility so that the winning team would unquestionably be a team most worthy to win. We believe this principle is critical to the sprit of the Organization. Even the Citrus Belt League has seen the necessity of this and has assured us that they will revise their Constitution according to the C.I.F. rules.

Question B referring to Article 8 "Protests" must have been intended for Article 7 since Article 8 has to do with "Finances". Article 7 refers simply and only to protests between sections and has nothing to do with protests between schools of a League or Section.

We believe Question C has no vitel bearing upon the issue.

In respect to Question D. the Couthern Section of C.I. .. has made no effort to interfere with any League in its internal affairs, neither has it power to control the action of any heague but when that League desires to take part in a Section contest over which the U.I.F. has complete jurisdiction it maintains that such participant must have won the right to participate by comply ing strictly with the rules of eligibility of the C.I.E..

All other points mentioned in the protest of Fomona High School were merely expressions of personal opinion and the only definite action of the Bouthern Section was the motion proviously stated.

Le believe that the stand taken by the Southern Section is just and equitable and absolutely vital to the proper conduct of will the and to the persetuity of the Mederation.

Gentlemen:

Riverside Polytechnic High School respectfully requests that in making arrangements for the finals in the championship race for Southern California Football title the following points be considered:

Riverside feels that in deciding the championship the

best teams should be pitted against each other.

Riverside feels that with the showing made by her football team against her opponents she is entitled to be represented

in the semi-finals;

That the Pomona team is not entitled to the championship of the Citrus Belt League, since Pomona played an ineligible player in two games, both of which games under the rules in effect at the adoption of the Citrus Belt League Constitution should be forfeited. In one of these games, played against Riverside, Riverside also played an ineligible man. This should cause Riverside to forfeit this game, thus making the standing Pomona lost two games, Riverside lost one game.

The fact that these ineligible players were played in good faith is conceded. That, however, should have no bearing

on the standing of the games.

That this contention is well taken is shown by the fact that the Board of Appeal passed a rule last Wednesday that "hereafter any team playing an ineligible man, knowingly or unknowingly, shall forfeit the game to its opponent."

There will ever be a question as to which team is superior and ever dissatisfaction unless this case is settled upon its

merits.

In making this request, Riverside feels that it is only asking for its just due. We have no quarrel with any one, and are adking that your honorable body do not allow such a precedent to be established, since it puts a premium on violation of the rules, there being no penalty for such violation.

It was moved and seconded that the Council meet on the aftermoon of March 3rd. and that all Principals be informed of this meeting by a letter from the President and Secretary. This letter was to contain instructions concerning the baseball season, eligibility rules, the announcement of Mr Clayton being the manager of tennis and that all games be arranged thru him, also the date of the Southern California tennis be May 6th. and 13th.
