

# MINUTES OF 1927-1928 CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION Southern Section

FIFTH MEETING

April 21, 1928

The Council of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, met in adjourned meeting at Manual Arts High School at 9:30 A. M., April 21, 1928, with President Ely in the chair.

### 1.—PROTEST

The Secretary stated that he had in the minutes of April 4th compiled all of the rules for track except those listed under track manager on pages 19, 20, and 21; that he had written a followup letter to each Principal on April 16th as follows:

Inglewood, California,

April 16, 1928

To the Principals of Southern California:  
 Gentlemen:—

Each and every high school of Southern California that has men in the try-outs this Saturday, April 21, is supposed to send a list of the men and \$0.50 entrance fee to Jim Reinhard at the Central Intermediate High School of Los Angeles; a pink sheet for all Class "A" men supposed to be filed with the Secretary. All teams entering Class "C" boys will be protested by the Secretary on Saturday unless a four-point record and pink sheet are in his hands by Thursday, April 19, so that these Class "C" boys may be checked.

Please attend to this at once if you are planning on entering men.

In spite of all this information it was his duty to protest as follows:

### CLASS C PROTESTS

Antelope Valley High—2 men—Howard Gish, 58 exponents;  
 Lyle Hatley, 59 exponents.  
 Bell High—No four point record on file.  
 Brea-Olinda High—No four point record on file for the 2 men entered. (There is a four point record on file but it does not have these men on it.)  
 Burbank—Two men on pink sheet have incomplete data: Walter King and Leslie Krueger. They are not on the 4 point sheet either, dated 3-23-28. There is another 4 point sheet dated 1-11-28 which has these boys names but the dates of birth differ. This 4 point is last semester's.  
 Carpenteria High—No four point record on file.  
 John C. Fremont High—One man, Tom Jones, 37 exponents.  
 Gardena—No four point record on file.

Pasadena—Pink sheet sent to me but none of the men qualified to enter Southern California meet.

Phineas Banning—No four point record on file.

Riverside Poly—Both men entered—Willard Preciado and Robert Titus have 57 exponents.

Huntington Beach—No 4 point record on file.

Los Angeles High—Three men not on four point: Chas. McClean, Jack Hamilton and Albert Shabazian.

Monrovia—Four point ages given incorrectly: 14-6, 13-6, etc.

Nathaniel A. Narbonne—No four point record on file.

San Diego Senior High—No four point record on file.

South Pasadena—Ages given incorrectly on four point: 14-6, 13-6, etc.

Van Nuys—No four point record.

2. President requested Mr. Moore and Mr. Seth Van Patten to check the exponents of Gish, Hatley, Preciado, Titus. The Committee reported the Secretary was correct.

3. It was moved by Green and seconded by Monroe that the schools listed in the Secretary's Protest be denied the right to compete in the Class C Track Meet.

The motion was unanimously carried.

4. After a general discussion it was agreed to place on table final action of the report of the Committee on Reorganization. See No. 14, of minutes of April 4th.

5. It was moved by Moore of Banning, and seconded by Green that the President appoint a committee to meet with the C. T. A. Council, Southern Section, in order to link the C. I. F. Secretary with the C. T. A. Secretary. Carried.

6. Committee was appointed as follows: Mr. Lewis, Mr. O'Mara, and Mr. Wood.

7. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the President get in touch with the Boxing Commission of the State with a view to an understanding on the question of High School boys boxing.

8. It was moved and seconded that all athletic teams or individuals taking part in C. I. F. competition must be coached by regularly certificated teachers. This matter was referred to the several Leagues.

9. It was agreed to discuss at the May meeting the question of Coaches receiving part compensation or a bonus from other sources than the school board.

10. Request of Lancaster to leave the state for competition was denied.

11. At this juncture Coaches from the protested schools appeared and demanded an interview with Mr. Green. Mr. Green refused to be interviewed and demanded that the Coaches state their protest to the Council.

12. Mr. Ely, President of the Council, called their attention to the following facts:

a. Each pupil must be classified by finding four point rating during first two weeks of each semester. Rule 8, page 13.

b. This four point rating MUST be filed with the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S., before the first league game in each sport. Rule 9, page 13.

c. School NOT filing will not be scheduled in any semi-final game. Rule 9, page 13.

d. The track season started the first day of April. Rule 13, page 5 of insert. Therefore four point record should have been filed before that date.

e. The reason for filing early was to insure a true rating of boys before ability was discovered.

f. Four point data filed by the Principal with the Secretary is the official list. Rule 14, page 4 of the insert.

g. Rule 8, page 3 of insert instructs the Principal how to report.

h. Teams entering semi-finals must file with the Secretary duplicate copy of "pink sheet **THREE DAYS** before semi-finals. See Rule 11, page 4 of the insert.

i. It is the duty of the Secretary to check four point record of all schools who enter semi-finals. Rule 9, page 3 of insert.

j. Secretary had checked Lancaster, Fremont, Riverside, and found the boys out of class.

k. Secretary could not check Bell, Brea, Olinda, Carpenteria, Gardena, Huntington Beach, Narbonne, Pasadena, Phineas Ban-

ning, San Diego or Van Nuys, for he had no four point record.

l. Secretary could not check Monrovia or South Pasadena for ages were given 14-6, 15-8, etc.

m. Therefore the Council had sustained the Secretary's protest.

n. President requested the Coaches not to go away dissatisfied for the Secretary was simply obeying the rules.

13. Report of Fred M. Johnson, manager of Water Polo and Swimming:

To Officers and Members of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section:

#### REPORT ON WATER POLO SEASON OF 1928

Nine schools participated in the water polo contests during the 1928 season. These schools were divided into two divisions during a preliminary schedule.

Division A, Hollywood, Los Angeles, Pasadena and Long Beach played under international polo rules through a double schedule of games, from which Hollywood finally emerged as leader.

The final game was taken to Inglewood as a neutral pool. The manager appointed Messrs. Yuill and Carey as officials and the game resulted in a Hollywood victory.

Division B, Venice, El Segundo, Inglewood, Huntington Park, and Fullerton played through a one round series using new rules devised in the Bay League from suggestions of Mr. R. E. Squire of Huntington Park.

The games were satisfactory in every way and proved the new method of conducting Water Polo to be practical.

Venice was undefeated leader in this division in the final series for the championship. Mr. Ralph Summerl and Mr. Ivan Carey were appointed officials.

Hollywood defeated Venice at Hollywood, Venice defeated Hollywood at Venice, and Hollywood defeated Venice at Inglewood in the final game for the championship.

The championship plaque has been ordered sent to Hollywood.

To Officers and Members of the Council California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section:

The following recommendations for revision of the Southern California High Schools' Swimming Program is the result of much discussion, extending over a period of about five years, a special meeting held during June of 1927, and subsequent discussion with interested parties who could not be present at the meeting.

While there have been instances of differences of opinion on the part of some; the following items are the approximate composite idea of the following men: R. E. Squire, Arthur H. Fadenoch, C. S. Wiseman, and Coaches Nagle, Dawden, Johnson, Carey, Dietrich, and McCauley. In addition much of value has been gained from discussions with Fred Cady, Elmer Orr, Merl Bailey, Fred Oster, C. P. L. Nichols, Clyde Swenson, and J. B. Huehler, who has so ably started and refereed the 1926 and 1927 championships.

#### ITEM NO. 1

"C" Division events have become of enough moment to warrant a separate meet of more events and conducted on a different day,—therefore we recommend that: the "C" Meet be one or two weeks preceding the "A" Meet and in a different pool.

Further the following program of events is suggested:

1. 50 yard Free Style
2. 50 yard Breast Stroke
3. 50 yard Back Stroke.
4. 100 yard Free Style.
5. Medley Relay 1 length—Back, Breast, and Free Style in this order.
6. Fancy Diving—6 dives—Back compulsory, and two voluntary Front, Back nont, Jack-Back, and two selected from A. A. U.—9 board tables.
7. 4 man relay—1 length each

#### ITEM NO. 2

That the Plunge for Distance be omitted from further Swimming Meets and that the Medley Relay be substituted.

#### ITEM NO. 3

That the "A" program be as follows:

1. 50 yard Free Style.
2. 220 yard Free Style.
3. 100 yard Breast Stroke.
4. Medley Relay—2 lengths each—Back, Breast, Crawl.
5. 100 yard Back Stroke.
6. 100 yard Free Style.
7. 440 yard Free Style.
8. Medley Race—1 length each of Breast stroke, Back stroke, Crawl.
9. Fancy Diving.
10. 4 man relay—2 lengths each.

#### ITEM NO. 4

These recommendations if adopted will necessitate a change in the following sections of the "Duties of Water Polo and Swimming Manager."

Section No. 7. To read: As Swimming Manager he shall conduct the Southern California "C" Meet, on the Saturday before Memorial Day and the "A" Meet on the Friday and Saturday following Memorial Day.

Section No. 8. To read: "Entries shall be qualified by leagues—four for each event in the "A" Meet and three for each event in the "C" Meet. Free Lance schools may be grouped by the manager so as to arrange a qualifying meet. If this is impossible the Free Lance school may be allowed not to exceed two men in each event.

Section No. 17. To read: 'The order of Events for the "C" Meet shall be:

1. 50 yard Free style.
2. 50 yard Breast stroke.
3. 50 yard Back Stroke.
4. 100 yard Free Style.
5. Medley Relay 1 length—Back, Breast and Free Style in that order.
6. Fancy Diving—6 dives—Four compulsory Bank Front, Jack; Back-Jack and two selected from A. A. U.—Spring tables from two separate grades.

The order of Events for the "A" Meet shall be:

1. 50 yard Free Style.
2. 220 yard Free Style.
3. 100 yard Breast Stroke.
4. Medley Relay—2 lengths each of Back, Breast and Crawl.
5. 100 yard Back Stroke.
6. 100 yard Free Style.
7. 440 yard Free Style.
8. Medley Race—1 length each—Breast stroke, Back stroke and Crawl.
9. Fancy Diving.
10. 4 man Relay—2 lengths each.

Section No. 18. To read: "The word "Relay" to be changed to "Relays."

Further, in addition:

Three places shall be counted in the Class C Events, and medals given for each. Points shall be awarded as follows: 5, 3, 1, with the exception of the relays which shall count double, 10, 6, 2, as in A. A. U. events.

Section No. 22. To read:—

(Strike out the first sentence.)

The rest to read: "Each individual limited to three events and one relay or two events and two relays. No individual allowed in both 220 and 440 Free Style races.

Section No. 23.

Strike out the first sentence.

Rest to read: "Each individual limited to two events and one relay or one event and two relays.

New Section, No. 25.

The relay race for Class C shall consist of not less than 75 feet nor more than 100 feet for each of four men.

The relay race for Class A shall consist of not less than 150 feet, nor more than 200 feet for each of four men.
