1 It was moved by Fisher, seconded by Owen, and carried that the football report be accepted with thanks.

BASKETBALL REPORT

This report could not be made until the Manager had conferred with EX-Track Manager Seth Van Patten.

2. TRACK SEASON—It was moved by Foley, seconded by Owen, and carried that hereafter it shall be understood that the Track Season starts with the first day of February.

3. SWIMMING SEASON—It was moved by Moore, seconded by Foley, and carried, that hereafter it shall be understood that the Swimming Season starts with the first day of April.

4. INTERPRETATION OF EXTRA MAN—(See Minutes of April 25, 1925, and January 18, 1923.)

It was moved by Moore, seconded by Green, and carried, that the rule regarding the entrance of an extra man in the Southern California preliminary track or swimming meet be interpreted as follows:

"If a man has placed in one or two events in a league meet the school may enter him in a third event or a school may enter a man who did not take part in the league in the three events permitted under the rules. A school may not take advantage of both of these situations. The extra man must be approved by the League representatives. If a man has competed in the league meet he may not be entered in more than one extra event. This rule applies to Track and Swimming."

5. THE ENTRIES FOR THE SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA PRELIMINARY TRACK OR SWIMMING MEET.

It was moved by Wadsworth, seconded by Moore, and carried, that:—

a On the same day immediately following the league track meet the entries for the Southern California meet shall be compiled by the League Representatives and forwarded to the Southern California Track Manager or Swimming Manager on one blank. It is the duty of each school to give the name of the extra man at this time to the League Representative.

b Hereafter there shall be no entry fee for Track or Swimming.

c Entries to League Track or Swimming meet must be accompanied by eligibility sheets.

d When the League representative certifies entries to the Southern California Track or Swimming Manager he must forward the League eligibility blanks to the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S.

6. JAVELIN

a It was moved by Moore and seconded by Fisher that this year the javelin be held as an exhibition event. Carried.

b It was moved by Collins and seconded by Green that the following question be referred to the several Leagues: "Shall the javelin be made a regular event in the Southern California Track Meet?" Carried.

7. Recommendations of Swimming Manager were approved as follows:

To Members of Council of C. I. F., S. S., Swimming Coaches and Principals of schools maintaining swimming teams under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F., S. S.:

I am hereby recommending to the Council as follows FOR 1926 (Only):

1. The contestants in the 1926 championship shall be qualified by leagues.—Limited to four in each "A" event and three in each "C" event.—Certified by League representative. (See Motion 4, these minutes.)

2. "C" contestants may compete in two events and the relay instead of one event as stated on page 26 of the 1924 handbook. "A" contestants, three events and relay. Contestants may not enter both 220 and 440.

3. That only school men be used as officials in the Championship Southern California Meet.

4. That Long Beach High School be awarded the meet for 1926.

5. That the meet be staged on the last Friday and Saturday of May (May 28 and 29). The trials to start at 3:00 o'clock sharp on May 28 and the trials at 2:30 on May 29.

6. That the diving consist of four compulsory dives: (a) running plain front dive (rigid or swan); (b) running front jack knife; (c) plain back dive rigid, and (d) back jack knife; and three voluntary dives selected at will from the five groups of Diving Table "A," (2 for "C"), in the 1926 A. A. U. Rules. (pages 98 and 99). All seven dives shall be judged in accordance with these 1926 A. A. U. Rules and as described in above mentioned Table A (pages 97 to 103—of 1926 A. A. U. Rules).

7. All entries, together with choice of dives and complete description of same shall be due in the hands of the Swimming Manager at the office of the Boys' Gymnasium of the Garfield High School, 6th and Pribson Avenue, Belvedere Gardens Square, not later than Tuesday, May 25th, at 3:00 o'clock P. M.

8. Three places shall be awarded in the class "C" events, points to count 5—3—1, and suitable medals awarded. Places in the Relay count 10—6—4; medals for first place only.

9. This announcement when approved by the vote of the Council shall be mailed out as the Official Announcement of the 1926 Swimming and Diving Championship.

8. WRESTLING MADE C. I. F. SPORT

It was moved by Moore, seconded by Owen, and carried, that we hold a Southern California wrestling tournament in April, 1927, and that Mr. Ferrell of Long Beach be appointed Wrestling Manager for the school year 1926-27.

9. CHANGE IN LEAGUES.

(Annual Meeting, third Saturday in May, May 15th, at Y. M. C. A.)

It was moved by Fisher, seconded by Oliver, and carried, that each school wishing changes in Leagues for the year 1926-27, submit to Secretary George M. Green, not later than May 4th, constructive suggestions for such changes and that Secretary Green send to each Southern California school a copy of the proposed changes.

10. COMPENSATION OF MANAGERS.

It was moved by Foley and seconded by Collins, that a committee consisting of President Adams, Mr. Oliver and Mr. Wadsworth be appointed to recommend increases in the salary of the Secretary and Managers of the various sports of the C. I. F. Carried.

11. WEIGHT AND HEIGHT.

It was moved by Wadsworth and seconded by Green that the following rules in reference to weight and height be passed—

a All boys should be weighed in at the beginning of the gymnasium periods during the first two weeks of school and this weight and height so measured must be understood as the boy's normal weight and height.

b We especially recommend that the C. I. F. go on record as against the practice of any boy attempting to vary his normal weight in order to change his four point classification.

c Should it be proven that any boy deliberately trains down to make lower classification under the four point system, it is the duty of the boy's school to declare him ineligible for competition during that semester.

12. TABLED.

It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Wadsworth that the above motion be laid on the table to be taken up as the first order of business at the Annual Meeting.

13. TWO MEETS.

It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Green that the Preliminary and Final Meets be considered as two meets and that to win medals and points in the Final Meet, May 1st, contestants must "place" in that meet but that records made in either meet should "stand" as the Southern California C. I. F. record. Carried.
