APRIL 1932 BULLETIN

Minutes of the meeting of the Council held April 2, 1932, in Room 151 of Central Junior High School, Los Angeles.

1. President O'Mara called attention to Item Number 7 in the Minutes for the December meeting of the Council and stated since a majority of the Leagues had not supported the motion he wished to reverse his ruling on the vote on the motion and declare the motion not carried.

Moved by Mr. Means, seconded by Mr. Teach, that the decision of the Chair declaring that representatives of a majority of the leagues in the C. I. F., Southern Section, must vote favorably on a question referred to the Leagues, in order for the vote to carry, be not sustained. Carried.

2. Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Cline, that the Minutes for December meeting be approved as printed. Carried.

3. Mr. Oliver presented a Financial Report for the school year to date (July 1, 1931, to March 31, 1932). Moved by Mr. Alman, seconded by Mr. Moore, that report be approved and printed. Carried.

4. Moved by Mr. Alman, seconded by Mr. Quicksall, that the question of Spring Football Practice be left to the decision of each league. Roll call asked.

6. Moved by Veenker, seconded by Quicksall, that the recommendation of the Committee of State High School Principals in regard to Spring Football Practice be followed. Carried.

State Principals' Recommendation

"Spring football practice should be limited to days schools are in session, and should be in the fundamentals of the game and without any competition with other schools. Summer camp football should be absolutely prohibited."

7. Report on proposed rules for Cross Country Running submitted by the Executive Committee.

Moved by Mr. Oliver, seconded by Mr. Coverdale, that the report be printed for information of schools but be tabled until the May meeting. Carried.

8. Mr. Alman, chairman of the Committee on Releaguings for 1932-1933, gave a verbal report on the work the committee had done in two meetings held. No changes from the 1931-1932 League arrangements were suggested. A summary of all changes suggested by answer to questionnaire sent out from the C. I. F., S. S., Office on March 25th were written on the blackboard for information of the Council.

9. Moved by Cline, seconded by McIntosh, that the Council go into a Committee of the Whole to consider changes asked for by different schools. Carried.

10. The Council sitting as a Committee of the Whole made the following recommendations for consideration of the Council at the time of the Annual Meeting in May:

- Moved by Mr. Coverdale, seconded by Mr. Cline, that Corona be put in Riverside League. Carried.
 - Moved by Mr. Means, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, that the Coast League be left as it is with the addition of Cathedral High. Carried.
 - Moved at 11:10 A.M. by Mr. Alman, seconded by Mr. Whedon, that discussion of releaguings end at 11:30 A.M. Carried.
 - Moved by Mr. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. Murray, that St. Agnes High School and the Spanish American Institute be admitted to the C. I. F., Southern Section, and be made members of the Preparatory League. Carried.
 - Moved by McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Whedon, that Covina be not removed from the Citrus Belt League. Carried.
 - Moved by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Quicksall, that Ventura Jr. High be not put in the Ventura Minor League. Carried.
 - Moved by Mr. Cline, seconded by Mr. Park, that Colton and Fullerton be considered for members of the Citrus Belt League. Carried.
- At 11:30 A.M., in accordance with (c) above, Mr. O'Mara adjourned the Committee of the Whole and called the Council to order again in regular session.

11. Moved by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Coverdale, that it is the sense of the Council that an Annual Report be published by the C. I. F., Southern Section, and that the Commissioner of Athletics be directed to submit a definite plan together with a possible table of contents at the May meeting. Carried.

12. The question of the playing of Curtis Allen Martin, an ineligible boy, by Covina High School in football the past season, was presented to the Council by Mr. Van Patten.

Mr. Ted Gorrell, speaking for Covina, explained that the Covina's Vice-Principal, Mr. Verne Ross, had investigated with great care and at much length the boy's family and school history before allowing him to compete in any game. It was evident from the facts presented that the boy had put over a clever piece of deception on the Covina authorities.

Moved by Mr. Means, seconded by Mr. Teach, (1st) That it is the feeling of this Council that Covina be not guilty of intentionally playing an ineligible man in football in 1931; (2nd) That all cups or like honors be surrendered to the next highest rating school; (3rd) That all monetary profits accruing to Covina as a result of final and semi-finals be forfeited and that such moneys be turned over to the 1932 Olympic Games Committee; (4th) That Covina shall not be considered in good standing if such moneys have not been delivered as above by September 15.

It was informally agreed to consider each part of the above motion separately.

Part (1st) carried unanimously.

Part (2nd) carried unanimously.

13. Moved by Mr. Quicksall, seconded by Mr. Cline, that parts (3rd) and (4th) of above motion be laid on the table until the May meeting. Carried.

14. Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Alman, that Curtis Cummings, of Beverly Hills High School, whose semesters of competition was questioned by Fullerton High School, be declared a seventh semester pupil if he enters school next semester. Carried.

15. Moved by Mr. Oliver, seconded by Mr. Skinner, that the date of the May meeting be advanced from May 21 to May 14 and that the place and hour be L. A. High at 9:30 A.M. Carried.

16. Moved by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Quicksall, that the payment of railway expenses of boys qualified for State Track Meet be taken care of as in the past. Carried.

17. Moved by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Cline, that the subject of wrestling as a school sport remain in status quo. Carried.

18. Moved by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, that where regular try-outs for the American Olympic team are concerned that for this season exceptions to rule (j), page 13 of the Constitution and Rulings be allowed. Carried.

19. Moved by Mr. Cline, seconded by Mr. Johnson, that a committee be appointed by the President to report to the May meeting on Water Polo rules. Carried.

20. Excelsior High School filed a formal protest against a ruling of the San Gabriel League in the case of Charles Nerse, of El Monte High School.

The Council sustained the protest and directed the Executive Committee to present an interpretation of Article VIII, rule 2, page 15, to the May meeting.

The above rule covers the case in question.

There being no further business the Council adjourned at 1:20 P.M.

Crosscountry Running

1. A Championship crosscountry race shall be held each year on the Friday or Saturday in December preceding the week of the annual meeting of the C. T. A.
2. The minimum length of this race shall be two miles.
3. The schools of the C. I. F., Southern Section, shall be arranged in four groups, according to enrollment, for the purposes of this race. The groups shall be as follows:

Group I, below 750.	Group II, 750 to 1499.
Group III, 1500 to 2499.	Group IV, Unlimited.

 Any school regardless of enrollment may elect to compete in the Unlimited Group.
4. There shall be a separate race for each group.
5. Each school may enter a team of ten (10) boys in the race for its group. Six boys only may start in the race. Five of the six who start may score points for his team. The sixth boy scores negatively, thus giving opponents a larger score. Any boy who fails to finish shall score one more point against his team, than the score of the boy who finished in last place.
7. The entry blank shall contain the following statement to which the School Principal must subscribe. "The boys entered in this crosscountry run have all been examined by the school health authorities and declared fit for such a contest."
8. The choice of a course shall be left to the Commissioner of Athletics with the approval of the Executive Committee.
9. Detailed instruction in regard to the work of the Head Judge of Finish and his assistants shall be furnished all schools entering teams. Instructions for boys who compete shall be furnished to competing schools by the Commissioner of Athletics at least five days before the race.
10. Regulation C. I. F., Southern Section, medals shall be given to the five boys who place one to five in each class. Suitable ribbons shall be given to each of the six boys on the winning team of each class. A C. I. F., Southern Section, Plaque shall be given to the school in each class whose team wins in the race.
