BULLETIN

Minutes of the April meeting of the Executive Committee held in the Cave Room of the Maryland Hotel in Pasadena, April 3 at 4:00 P.M. Members of the Committee present:

1. The Minutes of the March meeting were approved as mimeographed.

2. The State Council of the Knights of Columbus requested a sanction to hold an invitational tennis tournament in San Diego on May 16-17 in which some of the Catholic High Schools that are members of the C.I.F. will be invited to take part. The Committee directed that the sanction be granted if St. Augustine High School of San Diego sponsors the event.

3. Mr. Hayhurst of the Herbert Hoover High School in Glendale asked for an interpretation of the track rule that states that a boy in Classes B and C may not compete in more than two events in addition to the relay. The Committee ruled that even though a boy does not compete in the relay he may compete in only two other events.

4. The Point Loma High School asked a ruling on the following question:

"A boy, after making a varsity letter in football in school A, drops out of school and goes to a CCC Camp for a year and a half. At the beginning of the second semester of this year, (February, 1936) he enrolls in school B and lives with his brother who is granted temporary legal guardianship by the boy's parents. His parents still reside in school district A.

Under these conditions when will the boy be eligible in School B?"

The Committee ruled that the boy will not be eligible until February, 1937. The following rule applies to the case.

"Letter men moving from one school to another within the C.I.F., Southern Section without a change of residence of parent or legal guardian must be in the second school one year before they become eligible. This letterman rule applies to Classes A, B, C, and D."

The Committee questions the age of the boy as he was supposed to be eighteen years of age before he enrolled in the CCC Camp.

5. A boy in the San Luis Obispo High School, Albert Trejo by name, who engaged in A.A.U. boxing bouts during the 1935 summer vacation, asked for a reinstatement to high school eligibility. The Committee denied the request. He must wait one year following his last boxing bout.

6. Principal Branigan of Needles asked that Needles be allowed an additional \$8.00 over C.I.F., S.S. regulation team expenses for the Needles basketball team which took part in the semi-finals of basketball at La Verne College. This additional amount would make it possible for the team to break even on the trip.

The request was denied. The Committee felt that to grant the request would be establishing a questionable precedent.

7. Mr. Root, Principal at Burbank, asked for an interpretation of By-Law XI in the new Constitution and Rulings on semester of competition for grammar school and junior high school graduates. Mr. Root wished to know if the new rule is to be retroactive.

Moved by Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Hamilton that the provision is not intended to be retroactive. It is to apply only to boys entering senior high school in future terms. Carried.

8. A sanction was asked by the Ojai Tennis Club for C.I.F. schools to compete in the Ojai Tennis Tournament on April 23, 24 and 25. ✓

The Committee directed that the sanction be granted so far as C.I.F., Southern Section schools are concerned but that entry blanks be sent to Mr. Van Patten for his O.K. before being sent to Ojai. ✓

This exception to the new state policy "that all events must be sponsored by one of our member schools", the Committee felt was justified because the Ojai Tournament has been running in a very satisfactory manner for over forty years.

9. Mr. Van Patten reported that a number of schools have not yet paid their annual dues of 1¢ per pupil in A.D.A. Dues became delinquent on November 1 last.

The Committee directed that the schools concerned be notified that their athletes will be scheduled in no events coming under the direct management of the Commissioner of Athletics until such delinquent dues are paid.

10. A disagreement had developed over the place of playing the final game in Class B basketball. Herbert Hoover High School of San Diego and South Pasadena High School were the finalists in the play-off. The game was to have been played on March 14.

Moved by Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Fischer that no championship be declared. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Moore presided during the discussion of the basketball question. Mr. Alman did not vote as his school was a party to the question.

The Committee directed that the net proceeds of the semi-final double header in Class B basketball which was played in the El Monte High School gymnasium be divided equally between the Herbert Hoover (S.D.) High School and the San Luis Obispo High

School. El Monte and South Pasadena, the other semi-finalists, had had little or no expense.

11. Moved by Mr. Fischer, seconded by Mr. Hamilton to recommend to the Council the elimination of all play-off matches in Classes B and C. Further that a survey of play-off in Class A events be made together with a study of a budget recommendation.

Mr. Aseltine, Principal of San Diego Senior High School spoke at length on the subject of our play-off practice and urged that a study of the whole subject be undertaken.

The above motion carried unanimously.

Entry blanks for the Class C and Class B tennis tournaments are enclosed. When these blanks are returned to the C.I.F. Office they must be accompanied by a white eligibility sheet.
