START OF FOOTBALL PRACTICE IN 1948

Several leagues had requested that for the year of 1948 leagues be allowed to start football practice by September 6. Moved by Mr. Lawson, seconded by Mr. Hamilton that this action be taken for 1948 only. Carried unanimously. (From February Council Meeting.)

STATE GROUP OF C.I.F. MEETS

The State Council of the C.I.F. met in the High School of Commerce at 101 Van Ness Ave., San Francisco on Monday, March 22 at 7:00 P.M. Southern California members present were: Mr. Homer Watson, Principal Venice High School and Mr. Robert Kelley, Principal of Eagle Rock High School representing Los Angeles City Section and Mr. S. Chester McIntosh and Mr. Harry J. Moore representing the C.I.F., Southern Section. Mr. Seth F. Van Patten was present as a listener.

The Board of Directors of the C.I.F. Protective Fund met first. Mr. A. B. Ingham, General Manager of the Protective Fund, reviewed at length the financial situation in the Protective Fund. The important point brought out by the review is that the C.I.F. Protective Fund is paying out more money in claims than it is taking in. This cannot continue. Either the claims must be cut down or the money collected must be increased. This topic will be up for discussion and settlement when the Board of Directors meet next on May 29 at Berkeley.

The Chiropractors Association of the State put in a strong argument trying to convince the Board of Directors that they be authorized to handle C.I.F. Protection Fund cases. This too will be on the agenda at the May 29 meeting.

The Council of the C.I.F. considered plans for the State Track and Field Meet. They decided to limit the entries in each event in the State Meet to sixteen. The sixteen will be made up from the eight sections of the C.I.F. as follows:

The track at Edwards Field, Berkeley, where the State Meet is to be held is not suitable for starting sixteen entries at a time. It was decided to start the sixteen boys entered in the 880 yard run and the sixteen in the one mile run at one time and let them break for the pole from the start. In the 440 yards it was decided to run two races of eight each and give points and medals for each race. The Council voted this plan rather than to run heats in the morning or to start the sixteen all from scratch.

Heats in the sprints, the hurdles and the relay will be run in the morning starting at 10:00 A. M.

It was reported that President Sproul, of the University of California, is planning a lunch and a reception for all boys entered in the meet immediately after the close of the competition.

Arrangements for housing the boys of the C.I.F., Southern Section was started by Mr. Van Patten while he was in the Bay Region.

C.I.F., SOUTHERN SECTION GYMNASTIC MEET

Our Council at the February Meeting awarded the gymnastic meet to Santa Paula High School for this season. The meet has been set for Friday, April 30 at 7:30 P. M.

Eight events will be run, two at a time in the following order. Rope climb, 20 feet; Free Exercises; Horizontal Bar; Side Horse; Parallel Bars; Long Horse; Tumbling; Rings.

Experienced officials from the L. A. City school system will be the judges of the meet.

Mr. Randall Bryden of the Santa Paula High School will have general charge of the meet.

THE LOS ANGELES DONS OFFERS

The Los Angeles Dons Professional Football Team is anxious to cooperate with the high schools of Southern California in an attempt to put all football of Southern California on a higher plane.

They have developed a fine film entitled "The Best in Football" which they are making available to our high schools.

The C.I.F., Southern Section Office has recently received the following letter from Mr. Frank Clements, Publicity Director for the Dons:

"Regarding the Don's promotional movie, "The Best in Football", it is available free of charge to any school group in this area. The film will be brought to the School by one of five Don players—Quarterback Charlie O'Rourke, Guards Ray Frankowski or Bill Radovich, End Dale Gentry, or Kicker Ben Agajanian—who will make a short talk to the group and answer football questions. The school must supply a 16 mm sound projector.

In case the school is too distant to send a player with the film it will probably be possible to mail a print out."

During June 1948 the Dons will run a clinic of several days for the football coaches of Southern California. Dates and details will be announced later.

The Dons will again extend complimentary privileges to coaches and their squads at all Don home games. The ticket tax must be paid.

SUMMER BASEBALL CLINICS APPROVED

The following letter was sent out from Mr. A. B. Ingham's office under date of March 25, 1948.

"On Monday evening, March 22, the Federated Council of the California Interscholastic Federation met and considered your request that high school boys be permitted to attend baseball clinics in the various town of California during the summer vacation.

We took into consideration that statement in paragraph three of your letter in which you state the purpose of these clinics. I quote this paragraph from your letter.

"Our purpose in this clinic is to try and help different localities, and in no way contact or talk

to any boy who still has high school eligibility left. In checking back through the years I am sure you will find that the New York Yankees have always been favorable to continued education of any boy, and have in many instances made it possible for a boy to further his education."

The Federated Council feels that these clinics have a value for the boys of California since they come during the summer vacation when the schools do not adequately serve the boys in the immediate neighborhood of the towns visited by your clinics. It is to be understood that the boys are to receive no compensation of any sort and no expense money from any source. No attempt is to be made to influence undergraduates to sign a professional contract.

We believe that this arrangement with your organization can be beneficial to the boys of our state and we wish to express our appreciation to you for the service you will render."
