ANNUAL N.F.S.H.S.A.A. MEETING

Word has been received from Mr. H. V. Porter of Chicago that the Annual Convention of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations will be held in December 1949 at Santa Monica, California.

The C. I. F., Los Angeles City Section and the C. I. F., Southern Section will no doubt be called upon to act the parts of hosts to the visitors from other states.

TRACK PRELIMINARIES AND FINALS

The four preliminary meets on May 7 will be held at Oxnard, Riverside, San Diego and Santa Monica.

The two semi-final meets on May 14 will be held at Herbert Hoover (Glendale) and at San Diego.

The Final Meet on May 21 will go to Woodrow Wilson in Long Beach.

Each League in which the schools average less than 1000 in enrollment may enter three boys in each event. Leagues in which the schools average 1000 or over may enter four boys in each event.

The State Meet will be staged by the Los Angeles City Section of the C.I.F. and will be held in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum on May 28.

It looks now as if the State Meet will be a battle royal for points between the C. I. F., Los Angeles City Section and the C. I. F., Southern Section.

FIELD GOALS IN FOOTBALL

The prime objective in a football game is to score more points than the opponent and by so doing win the game. As the rules now stand you can score points by a touchdown, by a conversion following a touchdown, by a safety, and by field goals.

A coach will of course drill his team to use the plays by which they can score the most points.

During the "gay nineties" and the early nineteen hundreds a field goal scored five points for the team making it. The field goal was used very often and many games were won by a drop or place kick.

The field goal score was considered too high and the rule was changed, allowing but three points for a drop kick or a place kick. The coaches soon learned that the field goal score had been put too low when compared to the touchdown and the conversion. It took three field goals to beat one touch down and a conversion. The touch down method was the best scoring device and the field goal went out of use.

If the field goal were raised to four points, two field goals would be worth more than a touchdown and a conversion.

If the value of the field goal were thus increased we are sure that it would show up in a

more frequent use of the field goal as a method of scoring.

We love the field goal as a scoring device.

Think it over fellows.

Let us recognize the fact that baseball is not the national sport. That position is now occupied by softball, with basketball a close second.

Why not play a game that the kids enjoy more than baseball; a game that they can play all summer, and may continue to play into middle age? Let's play a game that can be played at night, even in small towns, so that the public has a chance to attend.

The cash customers like a streamlined, fast moving game. Let's give it to them in softball, which is streamlined baseball.

THE INVITATIONAL SWIMMING MEET

The Invitational Swimming Meet held at El Segundo on March 16 and 18 was a record breaking affair from the beginning to the end.

The meet drew a record number of entries and competitors. Five hundred and fifty boys entered. The number of entries was over seven hundred.

When the boys got into the plunge they proceeded to establish twelve new records in the

twenty swimming events.

Wednesday, March 16 at the preliminaries it took over six hours to swim the seventy trial heats (another new record) and allow the forty divers five trial dives each.

Our procedure in the preliminaries is due for an overhaul before we have our Invitational Meet in 1950. It looks as if two preliminary meets will be a possible solution.
