Minutes of the Meeting of the Federated Council 1951 National Federation Football Rules

#### STATE C. I. F. COUNCIL AND SOUTHERN SECTION CHANGE RULE

Recently three boys from one of our C. I. F., So. Section, high schools were selected to compete on the United States Water Polo Team in the Pan-American games, held in Buenos Aires, Argentina, over a two-week period in

February and March.

The Commissioner's Office, in reply to the high school's question about eligibility, stated that the boys would no longer be eligible for C. I. F., So. Section, swimming activities if they competed on an outside team, as quoted in Rule 'J", page 12, of the C I. F. Bluebook, and also in Paragraph 6, page 43, of the Bluebook. The high school asked that the Executive Committee waive these rules since the boys would be competing on a United States team.

A poll of the Executive Committee members in February, revealed that the members of the Executive Committee were in sympathy with the boys, and the cause, but that they felt their authority under the C. I. F., So. Section, Constitution did not permit them to waive both a

Southern Section and a State rule.

At the March 20th meeting of the State Federated Council of the C. I. F., held in conjunction with the Principals' Convention in San Jose, this subject was presented. The State Federated Council ruled that high school boys, who might be selected to represent the United States in International amateur competition, not be disqualified for further high school competition. Copies of the minutes of the Federated Council Meeting of March 20th, 1951, indicating this action are enclosed with this bulletin.

Because the State rule had now been waived the principal of the high school asked the Executive Committee to again consider the matter. In a unanimous mail vote the C. I. F, So. Section, Executive Committee voted to similarly waive the Southern Section rule on disqualification for competition on International amateur basis when competing on a United States team.

By action of both the State Federated Council and the C. I. F., So. Section, Executive Committee the request of Mr. Warren F. MacQueen, Principal, El Segundo High School, that the eligibility of Norman Dornblaser, Norman Lake, and Wm. Zerkie be restored is granted.

Many of our leading Athletic Conferences throughout the United States have similar rules

which grant exemption for competition on an International basis while competing on an official United States team.

### SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS IN MAY

Based on the fine performances turned in at the C. I. F., So. Section, Swimming Relays in February, and Invitational Meet in March, we are sure the C I. F. Swimming Championships will be an outstanding event. Entries to the C. I. F. Swimming Championships are based on league swimming meets; each league representative will certify the first three place boys from each league swimming meet as entrants to C. I. F. Championships. For free-lance schools, and for schools whose leagues do not conduct a championship swimming meet, a free-lance qualifying meet will be held at Whittier High School, Friday, April 27th, at 2:30 P. M.

The preliminaries will be held Friday, May 4th, at 1:30 P.M. at El Segundo and Whittier High Schools. Semi-finals will be held, Tuesday, May 8th, 2:30 P.M. at Woodrow Wilson High School in Long Beach. The finals will be held Friday evening, May 11th, 7:30 P.M., Woodrow Wilson High School in Long Beach.

League representatives are urged to return the league entry blanks to the C. I. F. office, 8760 Venice Blvd., Los Angeles 34, not later than Monday, April 30th. This dead line is necessary so the office may inform the entrants which preliminary meet they should attend.

### TRACK

The 1951 track championships plan prepared by a committee and approved by the C. I. F., So. Section, Council at its February meeting, is ready for action. The track committee is composed of Mr. Bruce Lawson, Mark Keppel High School at Chairman; Mr. Harry Bigger, Fillmore High School; Mr. Ed Laurenson, Muir High School; Mr. S. C. McIntosh, Puente High School; and Mr. William W. Russell, Commissioner of Athletics.

The two main objectives in conducting the track championships are (1) to provide competition for all schools beyond the league meets, and to determine team and individual champions; and (2) to determine the best boys to represent our Southern Section in the California State C. I. F. Track Meet to be held at Berkeley, May 26, 1951.

In order to get the best boys to the finals of our Southern Section championships we will conduct four preliminary meets on May 5th, for competition in four geographic areas determined to balance somewhat between the large and small

schools. Each league will qualify three boys in each event for entrance into the preliminaries. Free-lance schools will qualify under specified conditions.

Each of the four preliminary meets will qualify nine boys by placing three boys in each of three heats. As far as possible no boy will be placed in the same heat in the preliminaries with another boy from the same league. Boys placing second in their league track meet will be placed in heats with other leagues first and third place winners, thus giving every boy a chance to prove his worth against boys from other leagues. Further, in the preliminary heats all boys will be striving for first place positions rather than merely qualifying in the first three because first place heat winners will dispose of competition from second place winners in the same preliminary heat, when they come to the semi-final competition. In the preliminary meets field events will continue competition until there are nine contestants left in each event.

In the semi-final competition to be held at two locations we will qualify the first two boys from each of the two heats at each semi-final meet. This will bring together the eight best boys in the finals for track events. In the semi-final field events boys will continue competition until there are five contestants left in the event. We will therefore have ten boys in the finals in

field events.

If ties should occur in the pole vault and high jump the boy who has cleared the height in the least number of tries will be the one to go ahead in C. I. F. competition. As an example: if a tie should occur in the high jump for fifth place, at the semi-final meet, at 5 ft., 11 in., the C. I. F. would qualify the boy who had cleared 5 ft., 11 in. in the least number of tries. If both boys had cleared 5 ft., 11 in. in the same number of tries, we would consider the boy who cleared 5 ft., 10 in., in the least number of efforts, as the boy to go ahead in the finals.

Since the preliminaries and semi-finals are qualifying meets no medals will be given. In the

championship meet boys placing 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 will be awarded a C. I. F., So. Section, championship medal. C. I. F., So. Section, championship plaques will be awarded to the schools winning the most points in the Championship Meet, May 19th, in Class A, Class B, and Class C. Points will be scored on a 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 basis.

The Commissioner's Office has asked Carpinteria, Compton, Riverside, and Huntington Beach High Schools to host the four preliminary meets. Riverside, Huntington Beach and Compton have agreed to host a preliminary meet on Saturday, May 5th, and we know their facilities will be in excellent condition. The Commissioner's Office is considering possible sites for the two semifinal Meets to be held Saturday, May 12th. The Championship Meet will be held at Woodrow Wilson High School in Long Beach, at the invitation of Mr. A. H. Martin, principal, on Saturday, May 19th.

Field events at the preliminary meets will get under way at 1:00 P. M., track events will start at 1:30 P. M. The starting height in the pole vault will be 10 ft., 6 in. for Class A; 10 feet for Class B, and 9 feet for Class C. The order of events as listed on page 32, of the C. I. F. Bluebook, will apply.

The entry fee is 25 cents per boy, per event in the preliminary meet. No additional fee is required for the semi-final and final meets. Schools qualifying boys for the preliminary meet should forward their check in payment of entry fees during the week of May 1st. Checks should be made payable to C. I. F., So. Section, and addressed to 8760 Venice Blvd., Los Angeles 34.

We hope that competition will be so keen that one of our boys might achieve a new national interscholastic record, such as Stephen C. Turner, of Glendale High School, accomplished when he ran the fastest 180 yard low hurdle race ever run by a high school boy in a time of 18.9 seconds.

# CLASS B AND C TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Entry blanks for the 1951 Class B and C Tennis Championships were mailed to all our member schools the last week in March. Entry blanks should be mailed so as to reach the C. I. F. Office on Wednesday, April 11th.

Principal, Robert Farrar, of Santa Ana High School, has again offered his school's fine facilities for the B and C Tennis Championships. Preliminaries will get under way at 9:00 A.M., Saturday morning, April 14th. We hope that play through the quarter final rounds will be complete on April 14th. It is planned that the semi-final and final matches will be held on Saturday, April 21st, at Santa Ana.

Each school may enter two singles players, and two doubles teams. No boy may enter both singles and doubles. C. I. F. medals will be awarded the winner and runner-up in both singles and doubles. A C. I. F., So. Section, champion-

ship plaque will be awarded the team champion. Points will be scored on the following basis: one point will be awarded for each entry competing; one point will be awarded for each singles match won; and two points will be awarded for each doubles match won. The C. I. F. Office will furnish two balls for each match—the loser will be given the used tennis balls. Santa Monica High School is the first school to send in its entry blank.

ADDITIONAL SANCTIONED EVENTS

Mr. B. P. Gruendyke, Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation for the County of Los Angeles, has requested a sanction for the Los Angeles Coliseum Track and Field Championships to be held at the Coliseum on May 5th, 1951. The meet will be conducted in two divisions: (1) junior division, for boys thirteen to fifteen years of age, inclusive; and (2) senior division, for boys sixteen to seventeen years of age, inclusive. The meet is open to any boy who is not now participating, or who has not participated on any high school track team, including A, B, and C, and junior varsity teams. Boys may compete but in two events.

This program is designed to reach those boys who do not have an opportunity to compete in track and field events as members of a school team. It will also offer an opportunity for them to compete with youth of similar ability and to learn the basic fundamentals of track and field activities. Finally, it will give them a chance to compete on the world famous Coliseum track.

The C. I. F. is happy to sanction this event again this year.

#### BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Congratulations are in order to Compton High School, Ventura High School, and Bonita High School, for winning the C. I. F., So. Section, Basketball Championships for the Central, Northern and Southern groups of leagues, respectively, for the 1951 season.

Play in all of the games was exceptionally close. Certainly one of the most exciting games of the entire year was the championship contest in which Bonita High School defeated Calexico 55-53, in two over-time periods. In an outstanding team performance Compton High School upset the previously unbeaten Alhambra Moors 60-55, in a crucial semi-final game. Compton went on to win the championship from So. Pasadena, 47-33. Ventura won the Northern championship by defeating Santa Maria 42-30, in a game played at Santa Barbara High School, March 10th.

Reports from spectators and participants indicate that the plan for the Central group championships providing for entries by both the first and second place teams from each league was readily accepted. Double-header contests were scheduled on neutral courts adjacent to the communities involved, whenever possible. Attendance at the games was good, except on one or two occasions where we had teams competing from communities at considerable distance. Since

the C. I. F., So. Section, comprises such a vast territory this problem will forever be with us.

In winning this basketball championship Compton High School has added this title to its football and cross country championships previously won this school year.
