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MILLIKAN WINS "AAAA" CAGE TITLE

**Rams Win First Basketball Title
With 17-4 First Period "Blitz"
and Choking 2-1-2 Zone Defense**

Millikan High of Long Beach won that school's first-ever CIF "AAAA" basketball championship in the unlikely role of "spoiler" when the Rams blitzed Monrovia, 68-37, in the finals before 9,060 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena on Saturday night, March 14.

Coach Howie Lyon's quintet must have appeared octopus-like to Monrovia at the outset as the Wildcats were time and again forced into ball control errors by an intimidating 2-1-2 zone defense which provided the key for victory.

Verbum Dei Captures CIF "AAA" Title with 77-69 Win Over Lasuen in Finals

Verbum Dei, defending "AA" CIF champion, moved up a notch to "AAA" division competition this year but hardly batted an eye in breezing to the championship, 77-69, over Lasuen in the championship game played Saturday night, March 14, at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

Guards Raymond Lewis and Bobby Walters were devastating in the championship game scoring 30 and 21 points, respectively, as the run-and-gun Eagles won their 25th game of the season against four losses.

Lewis was subsequently named by Southland sportswriters as the Player of the Year in the "AAA" division. Raymond Echols and Mike Blackmore dominated the backboards in the championship game with 15 and 14 rebounds, respectively, as the Eagles built a 20-13 lead in the first quarter which they never relinquished.

Lewis and Walters fired up 47 of the 80 shots Verbum Dei took in the championship game and 22 of them went in.

"I couldn't believe that outside shooting," said Lasuen Coach Bob Espinoza after the game. "We kept extending our zone but they kept hitting."

Lasuen cut the Eagles' margin to 14-32 early in the third period but Verbum Dei unleashed a "UCLA-type blitz" and in the next two minutes

South Torrance was coached by Roger Bryant and had a league record of 10-0 with a season record of 18 and 1 . . . Dominguez, fielding a team for the first time in soccer, had an outstanding season under Coach James Gage. The Dons went 6-0 in league play and had a season record of 13 wins, 2 losses and 1 tie.

Chuck Adamson, Randy Larson, Larry Levesque, Brock Spear, Ken Steidley and Keith Watamanuk led the Spartans to the title and were placed on the coaches All-Western League team.

Physical Therapy—How Much Is Needed? Who Will Pay the Bill?

Physical therapy enthusiasts claim that this method of injury treatment hastens recovery and that it is a valuable tool to the physician whose aim is to effect complete recovery for an athlete and to return him to athletic activity as soon as it is reasonably safe to do so.

In recent years, many colleges and universities, and some high schools, have established training rooms equipped with various devices which in general utilize heat, cold, short-wave, soundwave, electric current, etc., which assist the body in bringing about a quicker healing and repair. Nature can repair the average injury in due time, but in athletics a speedy recovery permitting early return to competition is more often desired by the patient, the coach, and the doctor.

Physical therapy centers or athletic injury clinics have recently offered their services to injured athletes, and more and more of those injured seem to be seeking physical therapy treatment.

The C.I.F. Protection Fund has provided benefits for physical therapy when such treatment is rendered by or prescribed by the attending physician, but it was never intended that CIFPF benefits provide such daily, or almost daily, service as is normally provided by an athletic team trainer who is employed by a school or college and who works under the direction of a physi-

cian. Yet it appears that more and more coaches are recommending that injured athletes go to such physical therapy centers which can provide a wide variety of modalities and procedures. It is the responsibility of the doctor, not the coach, to recommend such medical care.

There is no objection to any well-intended suggestion from coach, parent, or other interested party, relative to any procedure which may be thought to be of value to the athlete. However, it must be appreciated that only that therapy which is prescribed in the proper manner for the justified treatment of a specific injury is within the proper responsibility of any insurance fund. A careful distinction must be made between physical therapy prescribed by the doctor to promote rehabilitation or healing in any injury which might not recover to the same degree without that specific therapy; and between that physical therapy which is provided primarily to return the athlete to competition a short time earlier, or to relieve for the "convenience" of the injured athlete, the aches and pains customarily associated with contact sports.

In no case can the CIFPF assume responsibility for physical therapy service unless it is prescribed by a physician subsequent to his diagnosis. The responsibility for the therapy—its frequency, type, and duration—must rest with the physician throughout the entire time the patient is under care.

There are two issues raised; one is that of medical necessity or appropriateness of much of the care; and the other is a simple matter of cost.

Physical therapy clinics have filed claims with CIFPF for services rendered to injured athletes. Many of the claims indicate that almost daily service is being rendered. It has been reported that some athletes are being treated in the evening after completion of the practice sessions, as a convenience so as not to interfere with classes or practice time. As a matter of interest, many of the claims list charges for physical therapy ranging from approximately \$200 to approximately \$1,000 for one boy for one injury. One physical therapy center has thus far filed claims for 21 boys from one school, an additional 21 boys from a second school, and 12 or 13 boys from each of several other schools. There have been unusual delays in processing CIFPF claims this year, because many of the bills for physical therapy service were submitted without evidence that this care was provided or prescribed by the attending physician, including the modalities and procedures used, and how often they were to be

administered.

The C.I.F. Protection Fund is a non-profit benefit and relief association organized by the public schools of California, and which provides adequate benefits for treatment of membership injuries. The costs of membership are set by the elected principals and superintendents who serve without compensation on the CIFPF Board of Directors. Traditionally the membership fees reflect the costs of providing benefits for the various types of coverages including football, all other sports, and pupil injuries. The schools and the parents pay the membership fees.

Based upon the claims filed this school year, it is impossible to provide benefits for the physical therapy services which have been rendered without a substantial increase in membership fees. Should this increase in fees be assessed against all schools, even those whose athletes are not provided such care? We should point out that hospital services have been expanded in recent years, and the average hospital in-patient per diem charges have risen from approximately \$57 to \$95 in the past five years according to Blue Cross of Southern California. CIFPF coverages have always included benefits for new techniques and services provided by the medical profession. But with insurance costs already rising because of inflation and expanded services, we cannot help but wonder... physical therapy? ... how much is needed? ... and who will pay the bills?

La Puente Wilson Nips Arroyo Grande for CIF "AA" Crown, 45-41; Litner MVP

Wilson High of La Puente, which entered the "AA" division play-offs as a tri-champion of the Hacienda League, won its last three tournament games by four points or less and captured the school's first-ever CIF championship.

Wilson downed Arroyo Grande High in the "AA" title game, 45-41, in the second game of a Saturday doubleheader on March 14 before 5,464 in the afternoon session of the play-off finals.

Karl Weiglin's Wildcats outscored Arroyo Grande 16-11 in the final eight minutes to capture the title despite a 19 point performance by Dan Litner of AG, who was named the Most Valuable Player in the two afternoon games.

Big Tom Bauer, 6-5 Wildcat center, scored 21 points and was a key factor on the backboards in the Wilson win.

Wilson played without its top rebounder, Bill Packard, who missed the game with a leg ailment and with a weakened Gary Blahnik who fought effects of the flu. Nevertheless Blahnik scored 13 points in a part-time role. Ken Price added seven points and Ed Peterson four.

They were the only four players to score for the winners.

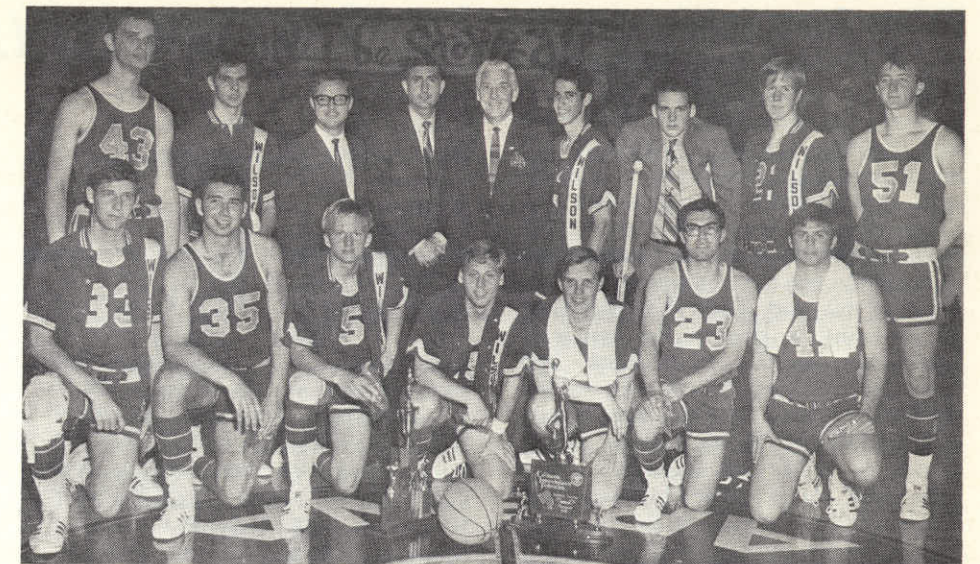
Wilson, after downing Bloomington 63-46 in its play-off opener went the thrill-a-minute route to the title with a 65-62 win over Santa Paula, a 75-71 win over Palm Springs and the 45-41 win in the finals.

Wilson finished the season with a 23-7 record while Arroyo Grande was 19-8.

Millikan jumped off to an unbelievable 10-0 advantage and built that to a 17-4 first quarter stranglehold and the story had virtually been written.

Monrovia, which was again cast in a Cinderella role, similar to that of 1967 when the Wildcats downed undefeated El Segundo for the championship, was never in this one. They shot only four for 23 from the floor in the first half.

Millikan, on the other hand, had been given little chance of making the finals because the Rams were paired with undefeated Santa Barbara in the semi-finals on Friday night.

But the Rams stopped Santa Barbara's winning streak at 26 by combining deadly outside shooting in the first half with equally dead-eye free throw shooting in the crucial fourth period.

Millikan hit 24 free throws in 29 attempts (13 of 14 in the fourth quarter) and had things pretty well in hand throughout, winning 66-53.

Santa Barbara's Keith Wilkes, who subsequently was named CIF "AAAA" Player of the Year by the Helms Athletic Board, was hobbled by an ankle injury and scored 17 points, some nine off his season average.

Monrovia got a clutch free throw from reserve guard Darrel Carr with :43 seconds remaining giving the Wildcats a 53-50 lead and insuring a 53-52 win over Palos Verdes in the other semi-final game.

A crowd of 7,401 was on hand for the Friday night session.

In the championship game, Dave Frost, Richard Plante and Dan Peters led the way for Millikan as they had all season. All three were named to the All-Tournament team and Frost was selected as the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Millikan finished the season with a 28-3 record.

Frost scored 18 points in the title game and grabbed nine rebounds while holding Monrovia center Dennis Willett to seven points.

Plante had 21 points and 11 rebounds and Peters added 14 in the final game after getting 22 in the semi-final game against Santa Barbara.

Millikan advanced to the semi-finals with wins over Dominguez, Pioneer, and Sunny Hills while Monrovia had downed Crescenta Valley, Loyola and Westminster before beating Palos Verdes in the semis.

Brawley High School made it two in a row, as it successfully repeated its 1969 accomplishments by winning the 1970 CIF, SS, Wrestling Championship at Cal State Fullerton, March 7, 1970, with a 48-38 win over its nearest competitor Norwalk High School.

Brawley placed wrestlers among the top four finishers in four of the weight divisions.

Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner; and Lou Joseph, Administrative Assistant, CIF, SS, office.

Guests in attendance were: William W. Russell, State CIF Commissioner; Clarke Coover, Commissioner, SAC-Joaquin Section; Dick Glover, Anaheim Union High School District.

1. APPROVED MINUTES. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of January 24, 1970, as published in the February monthly bulletin.

2. REPORT ON ELSINORE HS BASKETBALL. The Superintendent of the Elsinore Unified School District requested a review of the disciplinary actions given the Elsinore High School basketball team. He indicated that a letter of censure had been placed in the personnel file of each of the school officials involved, including the superintendent, principal, athletic director, and basketball coach, for violation of CIF regulations. In view of the facts that were presented, the Executive Committee was polled and voted to repeal their prior recommendation to the Council and permit Elsinore High School to enter the CIF, SS, basketball play-offs.

3. GOLF INVITATIONAL. Raney Junior High School has found it difficult to obtain a golf course on weekends and wishes to sponsor a golf invitational on Monday, March 11. They requested permission to have the starting time of their golf invitational moved to 1:00 P.M. It was moved, seconded and carried to allow Raney Junior High School to begin their golf tournament at one o'clock.

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It was also mentioned that there is some confusion relative to the 3:00 P.M. afternoon starting time of contests, and that the 3 o'clock starting time pertains to sanctioned events only. Leagues may start their contests and other events prior to the 3 o'clock starting time.

4. SAN GABRIEL MISSION. The Commissioner reported that he has been conferring with Brother Ward of the Catholic Archdiocesan office regarding the closing of the San Gabriel Mission High School in June, 1970. A list of the boys and the schools they plan to transfer to will be turned into the CIF office. It is necessary that the transfer of these students is handled in such a manner that the members of their football team do not matriculate to one school. Through no fault of the students the school is closing, therefore the Executive Committee has waived residence requirements and the boys will be granted immediate eligibility in September, 1970.

5. PROBLEMS CONNECTED WITH PLAY-OFF BASKETBALL GAMES. Reports have reached the CIF office regarding incidents that have occurred in schools and communities where play-off basketball games were scheduled. Because of recent unrest in many communities, the welfare of students in some of the communities is endangered. It was felt that future study be given to this problem and the possibility that whenever there is tension in a community or school, a play-off game be scheduled at a neutral site.

6. BASKETBALL COMMENDATION. It was moved, seconded and carried to commend Commissioner Fagans for his outstanding management of the basketball play-offs. The play-offs have increased each year in the number of teams being allowed to participate with increased financial success to the competing schools. The myriad of details and organization is handled with extreme care and efficiency by the Commissioner and his staff.

7. CLASSIFICATION COMMITTEE REPORT. Monsgr. Kiefer, member of the classification committee, reported on the progress of the classification committee that met earlier this month to discuss exponent classification. He asked Executive Committee members to discuss in their areas the classification system and if anyone had a recommendation, to please submit them to any member of the committee. The next meeting of the classification committee will be April 8.

8. REPORT OF RELEAGUING COMMITTEE. Commissioner Fagans gave a report on the formation of the new releaguings committee. The names of over 60 school men were submitted by leagues for consideration to be a member of this committee. The following men were selected to comprise this committee: Harry Bigger, retired Fillmore High School principal; Rev. Alex Manville, Principal, Bishop Garcia Diego High School; Steve Mile-tich, Assistant Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Walt Newland, Principal, Hill Junior High School; Vic Sherreitt, Principal, Ganesha High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; William Montana, Assistant Superintendent, Orange Unified School District; William Barnes, Long Beach Unified School District. First organizational meeting of the new releaguings committee will be Wednesday, March 18.

9. REQUEST FROM LINCOLN CONTINUATION HIGH SCHOOL. Another request from the Lincoln Continuation High School in Riverside for membership privileges was discussed. Because of the many ramifications that continuation high schools would present in the athletic program, it was moved, seconded and carried that this request be referred to the Continuation Educator's Association for recommendations and that a possible meeting between the Commissioner and representatives of this association be scheduled to determine a plan of action for athletics in these schools.

10. REVIEW OF INTERSCHOOL SCRIMMAGES IN FOOTBALL. It has been called to the attention of the CIF office that schools are abusing the football scrimmage regulations. Scrimmages used to be held on Monday and then were moved to Saturday at the request of the football coaches, since they felt there should be a week of recovery prior to their first game. Scrimmages are now held in many communities on Saturday night under the influence of booster clubs with the particular motive to raise money. Publicity is being given to these games, donations are being taken and spectator interest is considerable.

In addition, three or four schools have gotten together and have an all-afternoon scrimmage situation.

It was moved, seconded and carried to refer this problem to the Sports Regulation Committee for further study and to review regulations governing inter-school scrimmages in football.

11. APPLICATION FOR MEMBERSHIP. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept Tustin High School District School #4, which will

be located in Irvine, for membership in the CIF, Southern Section. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the Lycee School of Beverly Hills in the CIF, Southern Section. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the California School of Los Angeles for membership in the CIF, Southern Section.

12. ELSINORE HIGH SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY CLARIFICATION. Elsinore High School requested a clarification of eligibility on students who are placed at the Lakeside Lodge and attend Elsinore High School. Students placed by court order will be granted residence eligibility immediately. Students who are placed by a social service agency are not granted residence eligibility.

13. STATE TRACK MEET. The Commissioner informed the committee that the state CIF track meet would be held at the University of California, Berkeley, on June 6, 7, 1970. In line with past policy the CIF, SS, will provide free air transportation and bus service while in the Bay area for qualified athletes and head coaches. Arrangements are now under way to house all SS athletes and coaches at the Claremont Hotel in Oakland. Each school will be expected to pay for meals and lodging for its representatives.

14. ELIGIBILITY CASES. It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule to permit the following boys to be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics effective March 14, 1970: Ora Clark, Mira Costa HS; Mark Harris, Colton HS; Larry Cahoon, Walnut HS; Mike Aguerre, Apple Valley HS; Ralph Ridgley, Anaheim HS.

It was moved, seconded and carried to delay waiving the residence rule to permit the following boys to be eligible. Upon investigation by the Commissioner and a recommendation from the respective league, the Commissioner will have the authority to make the decision. Russell Bennett, Cabrillo HS; Don Davis, Duarte HS; Jim McCulley, Anaheim HS; Bill Miller, Arroyo HS.

It was moved, second and carried to DENY the request to waive the residence or scholastic rules for the following boys: Tom Pedrola, San Jacinto HS; Allan Morrow, Redondo HS; Frank Zaludek, LB Poly HS.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 12 noon.

CORONA DEL MAR SWEEPS SWIM TITLE

SEA KINGS COMPLETE AQUATICS GRAND SLAM

This was an aquatics year at Corona del Mar, as Coach Cliff Hooper's Sea Kings swept to the 1970 CIF, Southern Section, Swimming championship Friday, March 20, at the Belmont Plaza Olympic Pool. They defeated their nearest rival, Anaheim, 106½ to 95½.

The swim championship to the Sea Kings completed the cycle to go along with water polo and the swim relays title, a feat accomplished by only one other school in the history of CIF aquatics—El Segundo. The last time El Segundo turned the trick was in 1958.

Members of the CDM team included Bruce Black, Garth Bergeson, Brad Jackson, Bret Bernard, Kurt Krump-holz and Bill Stenehjelm. Corona del Mar also annexed the C title, defeating Sunny Hills, 100-86½. Miraleste, newcomer to CIF, won the Bee championship, 100-89½ over Sunny Hills.

Records were set in the diving competition as Don Crook of Sunny Hills scored a high 437.6 points to top Bob Wilhite's record of 424.2 set in 1964. John Halladay, North Torrance, tied his prelim set record in the B 200 yd. freestyle with a 1:46.2 mark and then he zipped to a record setting 3.46 in the B 400 yd. freestyle. Clayton Evans of Huntington Beach was also a dual winner as he set two new records. He won the B 100 yd. Ind. Medley in 55.6, the old record being 56.1, and came back to win the B 100 Yard Butterfly in 53.1, bettering the 54.3 mark. Mike Patterson of Miraleste lowered the 49.6 B 100 yd. freestyle record to 49.3. Steve Henley of Lakewood tied the existing B 100 breaststroke record of 1:03.3.

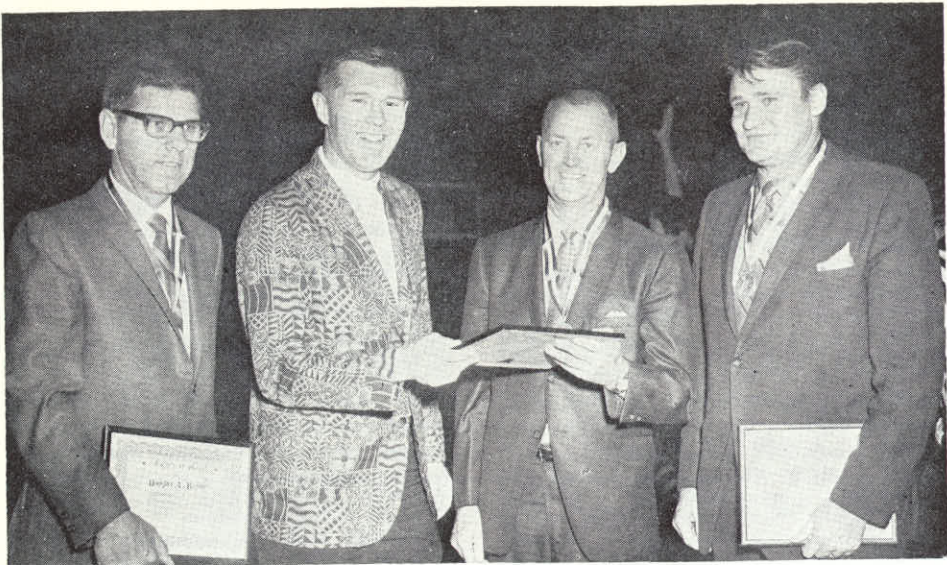

BROWN, GAGE, CLUSTKA HONORED BY COACHES AT CIF, SS, CAGE FINALS

Three high school administrators who made their mark in the coaching ranks were honored at the CIF basketball finals, Saturday, March 14, by the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association.

Merit awards were presented to Doug Brown, principal of San Jacinto High School; Jules Gage, Athletic Director at Newport High School; and Chuck Clustka, Director of Alumni Activities at Harvard School in North Hollywood at half time of the "AAA" championship game.

Brown, a long-time coach at San Jacinto, is recognized as one of the desert area's leading athletic administrators. "His leadership has been one of integrity and good sportsmanship," said Dan McFadden of Harvard School, chairman of the coaches' Merit Awards Committee, in announcing the award.

Gage's teams at Newport and Costa Mesa High Schools won 360 games and seven league championships in 17 years of coaching. The full court press was part of his coaching trade mark and he was named Orange County Coach of the Year in 1965.

Clustka's teams won 234 games and five league titles in 17 years at Harvard School. He was among the first group of coaches to popularize five man movement against the zone and changing defenses from man-to-man to zone on signal during the course of the game.

HIGH SCORING MT. CARMEL TEAM OF 1947 HONORED AT CIF BASKETBALL FINALS

Fillmore defeated Van Nuys, 10-6, for the CIF championship in 1926 and Huntington Park downed Long Beach Poly, 18-14, a year later. That's really about all the scoring that was expected of high school players in those days.

Redondo's 1943 team defeated Pasadena 38-27 for the CIF championship and people were amazed by the high score.

So you can imagine the utter shock of it all when the 1947 Mt. Carmel Crusaders ripped Whittier 68-57 for the CIF championship at Compton College. A total of 125 points in a game, unheard of!

Mt. Carmel's winning total of 68 was 21 points higher than any team had ever scored in a CIF championship game and Whittier's 57 in a losing cause was 22 points more than any losing team had ever scored.

On Saturday night, March 14, 1970, the CIF, Southern Section, paid tribute to the 1947 Mt. Carmel team during special ceremonies at halftime of the game at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

Coach Marty Martinelli along with members of the 1947 squad were recognized during the halftime ceremonies with a special inscribed plaque by Commissioner Ken Fagans on behalf of the CIF, SS. Members of the team included Ray Montes, Pat Bruno, Marty Boulger, Mike Hennessy, George McClintock, Chuck Van der Linden, Mickey Mount, John James, Norm Witte, Gene Dykes, Mark Butier, Bob O'Brien, Eddie Kennedy, Jack Brennan and Jack Putney.

One newspaper account of the 1947 championship game said: "Playing before a screaming, turn-away crowd of 1100 the Crusaders ran up an early lead and fought off three separate surges by the Cards."

"It was a spectacularly played game as both clubs hit the bucket with almost everything they threw. It was phenomenal inasmuch as they were playing only eight-minute quarters."

Mt. Carmel's Gene Dykes and Mickey Mount led the scoring for the Crusaders in the championship game with 23 and 22 points respectively. Wayne Kopren, Whittier's center, tallied an unheard of 33 points.

"SPORTS AND THE LAW"

A recent decision rendered in the District Court, Tenth Judicial District, in the County of Washington, State of Minnesota, by Hon. Carrol E. Larson, District Judge, should be of interest to those concerned with eligibility rules affecting the legality and enforceability of restrictive pre-season training by athletes and teams.

In the instant case of Terry Underhill, et al v. Washington County School District No. 834, et al, the Court was asked to issue a temporary injunction against the enforcement of a Minnesota High School League rule that would have rendered the plaintiff ineligible to compete in inter-scholastic athletics for the period of his senior year in high school if he ignored and violated the rule prohibiting attendance at summer hockey camp.

From the arguments presented, Judge Larson was not convinced that

missing two weeks of intensive training at summer hockey camp would in any way affect the plaintiff's basic rights by curtailing his ability to develop as a hockey player or diminish his present reflexes and skills.

The defendant School District contended that the stated purpose of the rule regarding summer camps and also pre-season practice is to maintain an equity among players and teams involved in interscholastic athletic competition. To permit plaintiff to ignore the rule would give him an advantage over other players in his league, or even in his school. He, and other boys whose parents could afford it, could attend summer camp while boys without the financial means could not attend. If the camp would be as beneficial as it is argued, those that could not attend would suffer a disadvantage; while those fortunate enough to attend, would gain an advantage.

In its learned opinion, the Court admitted that it was cognizant that this and some other rules of the Minnesota High School League in this subject area are not popular. The Court went on to say, however, that the test of a rule, or a law, is not its popularity, but whether it deprives a person of his basic rights. The Courts will not interfere with these rules, unpopular as they may be, unless they are manifestly arbitrary, capricious or unreasonable. The rule in question here was applicable to everyone alike and as its stated purpose was logical and did not place any unreasonable restrictions upon the students, the Court had no alternative but to find the rule valid.

The plaintiff contended that the rule in question deprived him of certain personal freedoms. The Court's answer to this argument was that in order to maintain the orderly existence of society we have to have rules and laws which may have the effect of restricting personal freedoms. Perhaps this holds true in athletics more than any other place, as the proper administration of athletics requires the application and enforcement of rules—some of which are unpopular—and many of which restrict personal freedom.

In situations such as this, Courts are most reluctant to interfere, for to do so puts them in the position of substituting their judgment in the place and stead of the association whose rules are the subject of the controversy. As the Court stated in its decision, it will only do so where the legislation it is asked to review is so arbitrary, capricious, or unreasonable as to shock the conscience of the Court.
