SOCCER INFORMATION NEEDED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE

All CIF, SS, member schools planning to sponsor an interscholastic soccer team are reminded that information is now being solicited for the organization of leagues for the 1972-73 soccer season.

Questionnaires have been mailed to all schools which have previously fielded soccer teams, or have indicated an interest in starting the sport next year. In order that all possible schools will be included in this survey, you are requested to have a representative contact the CIF, SS, Office if you have not as yet received a questionnaire but would desire to be placed in a soccer league.

The league alignments for the 1972-73 school year will be announced as soon as possible after all necessary information has been submitted. It is anticipated that this can be accomplished no later than May 1 so that schedules may be confirmed prior to the close of the current school year.

For Verbum Dei, the basketball beat goes on.

Winners of 112 games and losers of only seven over the past four seasons, the Eagles completed a 31-1 season March 11 with a 58-48 victory over Pasadena for the AAAA championship.

It was the fourth consecutive title for Verbum Dei in basketball. Previously the Eagles had taken the AA crown in 1969, the AAA title in 1970 and their first AAAA title last season, defeating Crescenta Valley. Once again, the Eagles ended up with the best record in the section. The championship game defeat was Pasadena's second on the year.

As was the case in 1971, the dominant feature in the Eagles' game was big Lewis Brown, 6-9½ 230-pound junior, who was subsequently named Player of the Championships (for the second straight year) by the writers covering the event; and Player of the Year in the division by United Savings-Helms Athletic Foundation Board.

Brown led Verbum Dei with 17 points and 10 rebounds in the final game. He was held to four first-half shots by a double-teaming Pasadena defense, but emerged in the third period to break the game open. It was 28-21 at halftime, but the Bulldogs closed to within 30-28, before Brown took charge. He scored six of 10 unanswered Verbum Dei points in the third period and that was the ball game.

The crowd of 9,623 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena saw coach Ken Booker cap a successful first season as a coach. Booker, only a year out of UCLA where he was a starting guard, wants to play professional ball. It wasn't the first CIF championship game for Booker. He was the center on the Long Beach Poly team that dropped to Sierra 61-60 in 1965.

Brown was the man of the hour all year when Verbum Dei needed him. The Eagles' toughest test of the year, save their lone loss, to 2A champion Murphy in the regular season, was in the quarterfinals at Pauley Pavilion against Morningside.

A nip and tuck game all the way found VD behind by a point with only seconds left. Booker's call was to get the ball to Brown. The Eagles did and

Big Lew responded with a soft left-handed jumper from the free throw line and a 63-62 Verbum Dei win.

The Eagles were given a tough go by smaller Los Alamitos in the semifinals, 65-60, but the premier difference was the 25 points and 22 rebounds by Lewis Brown.

Balance and defense also played a part in the championship. Rick Hawthorne and Donald Daniels had 10 each and Dwight Slaughter 13. Hawthorne and Slaughter also made the All-Championships team and later, first team all-CIF, SS.

Bob Taylor, Pasadena's fine defensive center, wasn't at full effectiveness, with eight points and five rebounds. Mal Kennedy led the Bulldogs with 13 and Dan Davis, promising junior sixth man, had 11.

Pasadena hit better than Verbum Dei, both from the field and at the line, but George Terzian's team could get off only 40 shots to Verbum Dei's 71. Pasadena also held a slight rebounding edge, but the inability to "run our patterns" as Terzian put it, was the difference.

Hawthorne, Slaughter and Brown have now played on three championship teams for Verbum Dei under three different coaches. The three averaged 22.0, 24.2 and 17.3 respectively for the season.

It was only the second time in Pasadena (Continued on Page 7)

Camarillo Wins 73-71 Thriller
In Overtime to Cap AAA Season

In a matchup few would have anticipated, but everyone enjoyed, Camarillo completed a successful 28-3 season and Coach John McMullen with a 73-71 overtime thriller over Cindrella team El Modena of Orange.

Coach McMullen predicted last season after Dos Pueblos' victory for the AAA crown that his Scorpions would have a good chance in 1972. He was right. Guard Jim McGlamery had his best game of the season" in out-coming El Modena junior Tim Tivenan in the point parade 28-27.

Down by seven going into the fourth period and eventually losing three starters on fouls, the situation looked grim for El Modena. But the Vanguarders were used to being the underdogs. As runners-up to Katella in the Crestview League, they had lost seven games and weren't considered a factor until they bumped off top-rated Covina in overtime in a televised semifinal game.

Tivenan's two free throws with eight seconds left sent the game into overtime but McGlamery and Mike Parrott free throws and Raoul Martinez had a basket running El Modena's clock out.

As expected, Camarillo held a heavy rebound edge, led by burly Fred Huston, 6-3, 190. Neither team shot well, and Camarillo won it from the line, taking advantage of 26 EM fouls

by shooting 44 free throws and making 29, including 12 of 13 by McGlamery. The Vanguarders missed only two of their 21 charity shots, but Camarillo shot twice as many times.

The game had a distinct similarity to last season's championship game, won by Dos Pueblos (another of the fine teams from the Ventura-Santa Barbara County area) 49-40 over Bellflower, a team which had also lost seven games, but had managed to beat the No. 1 seed (West Covina) in an earlier round game.

Huston had 14 points and center Anthony Smith added 13. Larry Johnson and Scott Wiseman each had 11

for El Modena, a six-year old school, which has enjoyed a successful 1971-72 athletic year, placing representatives in all five of the championships in which they compete.

All the Camarillo starters will graduate, but three El Modena starters were juniors.

The Crestview League proved strong in the playoffs, with third-place Football knocking off fourth-seeded Bellflower in the first round, Katella bowing in the semis to Camarillo and Football making the finals. The Marmonte League was the other circuit to have its third-place team picked to play—Oxnard, the team that handed Camarillo two of its three losses.

ment to also be scheduled during the current school year, probably in late May and early June.

Mr. Alexander further advised the committee that some problems had been developing recently because of apparent misunderstandings by superintendents, principals, and girls' athletics advisors as to the exact aims and objectives of the CIF, SS, girls' program. The committee discussed the matter, and in order to attempt to clarify some of these misunderstandings, directed Mr. Alexander to meet with members of the CIF, SS, Office staff for the purpose of preparing a "position paper" to be distributed to all superintendents and principals to explain in detail the proposed plans which have been recommended for girls' athletics.

6. REVIEW OF SERVITE HIGH SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY CASE.

Since this was the first time that the Executive Committee had met following the CIF, SS, Council meeting of January 29, 1972, the committee members discussed the results of the recent eligibility case acted upon by the Council which involved charges of "undue influence" by representatives of Servite High School in the enrollment of student-athlete Dennis Smith. The Commissioner reported that he had received many communications directed to the CIF Office commenting upon this situation and expressing concern over the procedures employed by Servite High School.

Basically, administrators from other member schools were appalled that, following a decision by the Executive Committee and pending a hearing by the Council five days later, Servite obtained a court restraining order to set aside the ruling by the Executive Committee and permit the student-athlete in question to be eligible to play. One administrator stated "it seems to me that schools which feel more attached to legal maneuvers than to the essential voluntary and self-policing controls of the CIF should not be in the CIF . . . They should form another organization which will tolerate taking advantage of every available loophole and every legal device available." Another administrator pointed out that "there have been literally thousands of cases over the years heard by the Executive Committee, and I do not know of a principal who has not abided by the decision of that group—right or wrong . . . This group is charged with the responsibility to maintain integrity in the interscholastic program;" this same letter also stated that "rather than seek a court

BASKETBALL PLAYOFF DATES

Your attention is called to the published Playoff calendar for 1972-73 which appeared in the November Monthly Bulletin after its approval by the Council. Playoffs in the AA division in basketball, it is anticipated, will be conducted in a similar manner to this season. That is, the bracket will be a large one, rather than limited to 16 teams. That would necessitate moving the beginning playoff dates in AA to correspond with AAA and A—Tuesday, Feb. 20, rather than Friday, Feb. 23 as previously listed. The announcement is made now, before Council approval of playoff divisions, in order that all leagues may adjust schedules accordingly.

injunction, I feel you should not have played the boy that week and waited for the CIF Council meeting . . . then if the Council meeting upheld the decision of the Executive Committee, you could seek legal recourse at that time." Many persons who wrote mentioned the adverse publicity solicited by the case, especially those comments attributed to the Servite attorney which publicly indicated that this case represented a victory over the authority of the CIF and other quotations which were taken by newspapers from the documents prepared for the court. Council members were also concerned about the methods which were used to disrupt the regular Council meeting procedures, and one member commented that "bringing such an offensive lawyer to literally insult the intelligence of the quality of the men who were at the meeting was highly uncalled for."

Following a complete review of these and other matters resulting from the case, the Executive Committee unanimously concurred with the reproof of the Servite High School administration which was passed by the Council for ". . . a series of events that appear contrary to the best interests of the athletic program promoted by the CIF, SS, and inimical to the cooperative spirit and goodwill desirable between and among member schools . . ."

7. DELEGATES TO NATIONAL FEDERATION CONVENTION.

The Commissioner recommended to the Executive Committee that a written policy be established with regard to attendance by committee members as representatives of the CIF, SS, at the National Federation Convention each year. It was suggested that the present procedure of rotating the delegates in order of seniority on the Committee be continued, and that a stipulation be added that the delegates must have

served on the Executive Committee for at least two years before being eligible to attend in order to provide for the most equitable representation system and assure that delegates are adequately experienced in CIF administrative and legislative matters. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the above policy, effective immediately.

8. LENGTH OF QUARTERS, BASKETBALL GAMES.

A recommendation from the Southern California Basketball Coaches' Association to lengthen the quarters of Class C and D and Freshman basketball games from six to eight minutes was presented for discussion. The coaches' recommendation was based on the fact that the number of boys participating in interscholastic basketball was highest at these levels, but the limited amount of playing time available was not sufficient to provide ample opportunities for all interested boys to be included in the programs. The Commissioner explained that the present CIF, SS, regulation governing the length of quarters for these games was developed because of the National Federation rule which states that quarters for all junior high school games shall be six minutes, but further clarified that the National Federation interprets the term "junior high school" to apply to 7th and 8th grades only—and not to 9th grades. The committee discussed the issue and concluded that it would be advantageous for the reasons outlined above to make the length of quarters consistent for all high school basketball teams. It was then moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the Council that Section 13 of Article XXXXI (Basketball Regulations) of the Blue Book be amended to read as follows: "The length of quarters for all basketball games involving teams from three-year or four-year high schools shall be 8 minutes, and for junior high school games shall be 6 minutes." This proposal will be presented to the CIF, SS, Council for approval at its meeting of May 6, 1972.

9. ELIGIBILITY COMMISSION.

The Commissioner recommended that the Executive Committee consider the development of a standing sub-committee to act as an "eligibility commission" to rule on requests for waivers of eligibility regulations from member schools. The numbers of these requests being received by the CIF, SS, Office have significantly increased during recent years; the result has been to lengthen the amount of time required to be spent on eligibility cases at each meeting by the Executive Committee, thereby detracting from other agenda items and sometimes not allowing for

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complete consideration of all necessary facts for some of the eligibility requests. In addition, the creation of this commission would permit meetings to be called at more regular intervals to provide for prompt consideration of all eligibility cases. It was moved, seconded, and passed to establish an eligibility commission composed of the three members of the Executive Committee from schools located closest geographically to the CIF, SS, Office to act on behalf of the Executive Committee on all eligibility requests. The decisions of this commission would be subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

It was further recommended that this commission be directed to develop guidelines for member schools to use in submitting information for requests for waivers of eligibility rules, and that these guidelines be published in an appropriate section of the Blue Book.

10. INCIDENT REPORTS, CENTENNIAL HIGH SCHOOL.

The Commissioner informed the Executive Committee that an excessive number of Crowd Management Incident Reports had been filed with the CIF, SS, Office in connection with recent athletic events involving Centennial High School. He reported that the Bay League Council had called a special meeting as a result of these incidents, and had taken official action to deny Centennial High School the opportunity to host any home league athletic events for the remainder of the current school year. The committee discussed this situation in detail, and moved, seconded, and passed to support the Bay League in any disciplinary action which is deemed appropriate and fair after reviewing the facts involved in this case. The committee further commended the league for taking positive steps toward the curtailment of crowd control problems, and with reference to the crowd management "enforcement code" which is presently under consideration by the CIF, SS, Council, urged all leagues to do everything within their power to develop preventive policies to deal with any similar situations.

11. REVIEW OF LA QUINTA HIGH SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY CASE.

The Commissioner brought to the attention of the Executive Committee an opinion rendered recently by the Orange County Counsel in support of the ruling made by the committee last November with regard to an unusual eligibility case involving La Quinta High School. The school had failed to request the necessary waiver required by Article XI (Residence Eligibility) of the Blue Book in order to

have eligibility approved for a boy who had moved from his mother's home in one attendance area to reside with his father in the La Quinta attendance area, and as a result, was forced to forfeit eight football games in which the boy had already participated. This request was formally submitted on November 11, 1971, and the boy was declared eligible as of the date of November 17, 1971. At the time of the decision, La Quinta had also requested that the appeal be considered to be retroactive to January 4, 1971, the date that the boy had enrolled at the school, but the Executive Committee ruled that such a precedent would not be in the best interests of the total CIF, SS, interscholastic athletic program. The administration of La Quinta High School and the Garden Grove Unified School District then willingly abided by the decision of the committee and complied with all necessary forfeiture procedures, but subsequently became concerned that the committee may not have ruled properly in not granting a retroactive waiver and requested an official interpretation from the County Counsel. Following a review of the case and the pertinent CIF, SS, eligibility regulations, the reply from the Counsel endorsed the action of the Executive Committee, stating that "we conclude that he was ineligible to participate while attending La Quinta High School prior to that date (November 11, 1971). The Executive Committee in acting on the request to de-

clare him eligible had it within its power to make the eligibility retroactive to the beginning of the football season. However, in exercising its discretion, it chose not to do so and we see no basis for finding that such action amounts to an abuse of discretion." The Executive Committee members once again extended their appreciation to La Quinta High School and Garden Grove District officials for their excellent cooperation in this matter, and thanked the District for making a copy of the Counsel's opinion available to them.

12. BASEBALL REQUEST, ANAHEIM UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT.

The Executive Committee moved, seconded, and passed to approve a request from the Anaheim Union High School District to permit Magnolia and Kennedy High Schools to participate in one baseball game each, one to be held on May 25 and the other on May 27, 1972, against the Aiea High School team of Hawaii which will be travelling to California. This request was approved with the stipulations that each school would cancel a non-league game in order to remain within the total number of games allowed by CIF, SS, regulations, and that the schools would honor any commitments they might have if they should qualify for entry into the CIF, SS, baseball playoffs.

13. ORIENTATION MEETINGS FOR COACHES.

The Executive Com-

mittee reviewed a recommendation which has been proposed by the Area Commissioners of Officials to conduct orientation meetings for all CIF, SS, coaches prior to the beginning of the seasons of sports each year. Increasing problems in the areas of crowd control and coach-and-official relationships at athletic events in spectator sports have prompted this suggestion in order to attempt to assure that all coaches may be made aware of the standards of conduct expected of them. Basic rules of conduct and sportsmanship will be emphasized at the meetings, and officials and coaches will each be informed of what the other group has been told so that they will have a mutual understanding of acceptable game procedures and behavior. Attendance at these meetings would be mandatory for all coaches who will be working in a particular sport with a team at any level of competition. It would be planned that a football-water polo meeting be held at the start of the school year, a basketball-soccer-wrestling meeting in November, and a spring sports meeting in January. The committee discussed this proposal, and moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the Council that these types of orientation meetings be conducted during the 1972-73 school year, and that attendance be made mandatory for all affected coaches from CIF, SS, member schools. This proposal will be presented to the CIF, SS, Council for approval at its meeting of May 6, 1972.

14. REPORT ON SUPERINTENDENTS' MEETING. Chairman Miletich presented the following summary report to the Executive Committee from the February 29, 1972, meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee appointed by the Council to study the recent superintendents' proposal:

Committee members present at the meeting were Dr. William Ullom, Superintendent, Laguna Beach Unified School District; Dr. Earl Denton, Superintendent, Lucia Mar Unified School District; Dr. Charles Terrell, Superintendent, Corona-Norco Unified School District; Dr. Walter Dingus, Superintendent, San Marino Unified School District; Mr. Steve Miletich, Vice-Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Dr. Richard Cordano, Principal, Arcadia High School; Mr. Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; Dr. Hanford Rants, Principal, Gahr High School; J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics, and Tom Morgan, Administrative Assistant, CIF, SS, Office.

Dr. Ullom presented opening comments to the committee, explaining that

his proposal, which was being made on behalf of the 12 superintendents of Orange County, was designed to have superintendents of member school districts included in the organizational and/or legislative structure of the CIF, SS, in order that they might be able to participate in the important policy decisions which affect their schools.

The committee members were informed that they had been directed by the CIF, SS, Council to study the organizational pattern of the CIF, SS, to determine whether or not there are recommendations which need to be made to the Council with regard to the inclusion of superintendents in matters of policy decision.

Following discussion, the committee concluded that, while improvement was certainly necessary in many areas of communication with superintendents, the regular involvement of all affected superintendents in the legislative structure of the CIF, SS, would not be practical because 1) of the large size of the organization which currently encompasses 340 senior high schools and approximately 130 superintendents, and 2) superintendents would not have the necessary time and interest to devote to attendance at regular meetings. The general consensus was that the most effective lines of communications for CIF, SS, matters for superintendents would be through their respective principals who are felt to be the most closely involved with the athletic programs and the operation of the CIF, SS.

The committee then discussed possible areas of improvement in attempting to more actively involve superintendents with the CIF, SS, and suggested the following proposals for recommendation to the Council:

1) Regular and consistent communication should be established by the CIF, SS, Office with all superintendents, to include the continued mailing of all Council and Executive Committee minutes and summary letters from the Commissioner explaining important legislation or policy matters being considered by the Council.

2) Leagues be directed to send copies of the minutes of all league meetings to the superintendents of member schools.

3) CIF, SS, by-laws should be updated to require that representatives to the Council be either principals or vice-principals, and not athletic directors or coaches, in order to assure superintendents that decision-making procedures will be as responsive as possible to administrative needs.

4) Create an additional position on the CIF, SS, Executive Committee specifically for a superintendent, in order to provide for representation from this level of school organization in the decision and policy-making processes. This would be an elective position determined in accordance with established procedures used for the election of other members of the Executive Committee. Because of the many commitments involved with superintendents' schedules, it was suggested that an alternate also be elected to assure attendance by one superintendents' representative at all meetings.

5) Encourage regional superintendents' organizations to solicit, when deemed necessary or appropriate, visitations by CIF, SS, representatives to explain and/or clarify issues affecting interscholastic athletics.

Following discussion of the report, the Executive Committee moved seconded, and passed to concur with the recommendations of the Ad Hoc Committee and to refer these proposals to the CIF, SS, Council for consideration at its meeting of May 6, 1972.

15. COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP. In accordance with recommendation No. 3 in paragraph 14 above, the Executive Committee discussed the advantages of amending the CIF, SS, By-Laws in order to require that league representatives to the Council be either principals, vice-principals, or from the superintendents' level. The only stipulation for membership at the present time is that the league representative may not be an active coach. The committee was in agreement that the legislative body of the CIF, SS, should be made as responsive as possible to administrative needs, and felt that this could best be achieved by having the representatives be from one of these three types of designated administrative capacities. It was then moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the Council that Section 2 of Article III (Council) of the Constitution be revised to conform with the requirements now mandatory for Executive Committee membership (Ref.: Section 3, Article VII), so that it would read as follows: "Each established league (Art. III, Sec. 3, D) shall

Alternates designated to attend Council meetings must also meet the above qualifications; no other representative (i.e., athletic director or coach) shall have voting privileges." This amendment will be presented to the Council for approval at its meeting of May 6, 1972.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

"Glendale has indicated that already their district has taken positive steps toward improving their facility from the suggestions made by the Assistance Team," Commissioner Ken Fagans remarked. "And other objectives in other areas of our section are being reached right now. We're very pleased with the response schools and districts have exhibited toward the work of our committeemen."

"The crowd management program is an active one. We must keep on top of these matters if we are to maintain our athletics at the level on which they are now conducted," Commissioner Fagans added. Schools and districts are encouraged to request a visit from the Assistance Teams.

Members are also encouraged to take advantage of the availability of cassette tape recordings of highlights from the Crowd Management "Clinic '71" held in September. The tapes provide an excellent supplement to the Crowd Management handbook distributed to all members last fall. There are two tapes, each an hour in length, with the price per set of the two tapes set at \$2.

Murphy Does The Expected: Nabs AA Crown Over El Dorado

Murphy's Nobles, with a bevy of returning starters, were picked by the "experts" from the start of the season to dominate the AA division. Murphy (Los Angeles) did, behind a tall, strong team led by all-CIF Terry Tate, 6-5½ junior, and sharpshooting Luther Philyaw at guard. They defeated Orange League titlist El Dorado 69-65 in the championship game getting, in the process, a fine game from Dwayne Jones, who was named afternoon session MVP for his efforts.

El Dorado (Placentia) came into the game with only three early season losses and a 19-game winning streak. But Murphy had too much size for the determined Golden Hawks, whose 6-5 junior Jeff Van Winkle pulled down half the ED total boards. Unfortunately for the Hawks, Murphy nearly doubled their team total.

ED began well grabbing an 18-14 first quarter lead, however, Murphy, with Jones getting 12 of his game-high 20 points in the first half, blew 'em out in period two with a 20-8 bulge. Murphy further increased the lead to 53-36 at the end of three quarters, and only a fourth quarter performance by Tony Madau made the score close.

Mike Redmond had 19 for Murphy and Tate 10. Madau led ED with 18 and Mike Farra had 14. Gary Burnett added 10.

All but Tate leave for coach LeRoy Porter's Murphy starting quint, while El Dorado retains Van Winkle, and starting guard Mike Moore.

Murphy's winning year was highlighted by a 77-61 win over AAAA champion Verbum Dei, a repayment for Verbum Dei's 68-59 triumph ear-

lier. Each loss was the other's only one during the season. Murphy also established a CIF, SS single game scoring record by thrashing Lennox 137-39 in Pioneer League play. Philyaw, named with Tate as co-player of the year in the division, was over 40 points three times.

It was the third time in four years an Orange League team has reached the finals, each a different school. Murphy, eliminated in the semis last season, is 50-8 over the past two years. (Continued on page 9)
