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## Verbum Dei Wins Fifth Straight Basketball Title

### THIRD IN AAAA FOR EAGLES; BROWN HONORED

Amazing Verbum Dei has done it again.

For the fifth consecutive time, and the third in the major AAAA division, the Eagle basketball team has become CIF, SS championships. The small (300 boys) Catholic school in Los Angeles was led to the title for the third straight year by 6-9, 210-pound center Lewis Brown.

Brown scored 131 points in five playoff games and used his offensive maneuverability and defense intimidation as necessary against all-comers. George McQuarn's team lost to Palos Verdes and Morningside in December tournament play, then reeled off 23 consecutive wins.

Verbum Dei, winning the AA title in 1969, the AAA crown in '70 and the last three 4A diadems, has collected 24 straight playoff game victories.

It didn't figure to be as easy for the Eagles this year, the fine supporting cast to Brown had left, first Ray Lewis, a superstar in himself when Brown garnered his first of three straight all-championships tournament MVP awards as a soph, then Dwight Slaughter and Rickie Hawthorne.

But the Eagles had a knack for shooting outside (Michael Pyles, Eddie Williams, soph Roy Hamilton) and a certain poise under pressure, credited to McQuarn's coaching technique.

The opponent for this year's L.A. Sports Arena finale, was another perennially successful school, Pasadena. George Terzian, coaching a Bulldog team to the title for the ninth time in the last 10 seasons, lost by 10 to the Eagles in '72. This time it was 60-45. Brown had 20 rebounds and 14 hard-earned points in combatting Pasadena's double-team defense. Freed to shoot outside, Pyles popped in 18. They didn't shoot well (37 per cent from the field), but Pasadena was even worse (31) and VD doubled the 'Dogs on the boards.

George Tucker, the classy Pasadena guard who was held scoreless in the championship a year ago was the leader of his team this time with 18 points. Dan Davis had 16. The low

## DEFENSE-MINDED WEST KICKERS TRIUMPH

West Torrance edged Claremont 1-0, in the exciting final game of the 1972-73 Soccer season before a large crowd in the championship game played at the South Torrance High School Stadium, Friday evening, March 9.

The crowd estimated about 3,500 was treated to a fast paced game, featuring the two all-time leading CIF scorers, Raphael Chavez of Claremont and West's Peter Frederiksen. Chavez entered the game with a season total of 28 and career mark of 45 goals. Frederiksen was right behind with 25 and 40 respectively. The marks are for league and playoff contests. When it was all over, Frederiksen was one goal closer.

In the four rounds of playoffs, West scored one goal in each game. The Warriors downed Kennedy 1-0, then Dominguez by the same score. Against Santa Barbara, the game ended in a 1-1 tie, but West advanced because of having more corner kicks. Frederiksen, a junior, scored his team's goal in each of the last three games. All but two of the West starters are juniors or freshmen. West should be awesome next season, as they lose only forward Jimmy Lillie and goalie Terry Peltz.

Claremont reached the finals by downing Cathedral, 4-1; defending

CIF champion San Gabriel, 2-1; and Valley Christian, 4-1. The championship game promised to be the classic encounter between a wide open offensive team and a grudgingly sound defense. Claremont had shattered the old CIF scoring record by scoring 75 goals in 13 league and playoff games. West had allowed only 12 goals in the same number of games, seven of them being shutouts.

The opening moments were dominated by West as they controlled the mid-field and mounted numerous threats. The tempo suddenly changed when Claremont placed a ball that missed the West goal by inches. It was an even match during the rest of the first quarter until with 51 seconds left Frederiksen passed to Kurt Stierle waiting at the 18 yard line. Stierle merely first timed it back to the breaking Frederiksen and in one beautiful example of the "give and go" he placed it behind goalie Bruce Kinnee just as fullback Ron Thomas tackled him.

West continued to dominate second quarter play, led by the defensive play of Kinnee, Thomas and Jim Martinez. Claremont turned things around in the third quarter. Utilizing a basic 4-2-4 system, the Wolfpack took con-

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#### Commissioner's Corner

### THE RULE OR THE BOY

Recently a working mother called me on the telephone and reviewed the eligibility situation of her son. The father was continuing to work at the same place he had been employed for many years. Their home in that community had been established for many years. The mother had taken a job in another town. The son, moving back and forth, soon was in trouble scholastically and the school administration had declared him ineligible for failure to do passing work in his subjects. When I informed the mother her son would have to attend a semester, doing passing work, before his eligibility could be restored, she remarked, "Certainly, Mr. Hendrickson, you are not going to put the rule above the boy." That same thought has been expressed to me many times in many variations; namely, the boy comes first, the rule second.

The word "No" has become a very unacceptable expression in today's society. The moment a person is told "No," when requesting special consideration, he immediately wants to find the next person in command, and the process is repeated, generally going all the way to the top echelon. With each refusal or "No" answer, the inquirer becomes more vexed, the rule appears more ridiculous, and the boy's cause seems more plausible.

Those who work with rules to govern competitive sports realize fully the importance of adhering to those rules when the game is played. Whenever you start to "deduct" something from the rules, as adopted, it isn't long until "deduct" takes it all, and you have no rules. Have you observed how often

The March meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 31, 1973, at Ben Brown's Motel in South Laguna. The following members were present: Chairman Miletich, Vice-Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Alex Alexander, Principal, Desert Sands High School; Tony Balsamo, Principal, Apple Valley High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; Richard Cordano, Principal, Arcadia High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Ted Gossard, Principal, Aviation High School; Lowell Jackson, Superintendent, Centinela Valley High School District; Keith Lee, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Rev. Alexander Manville, Principal, Bishop Diego High School; Hanford Rants, Principal, Gahr High School; J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics, and Thomas E. Byrnes, Administrative Assistant, CIF, Southern Section, Office. Guests included Mr. Gene Popko, President, and Mr. Mike Cook, Secretary, of the Southern California High School Volleyball Association; and Mr. Roger Bryant, President of the CIF Soccer Coaches' Association.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES.** It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting on January 12, 1973, as published in the February, 1973, Monthly Bulletin.

2. **APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP.** It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the applications for regular membership in the CIF, Southern Section, for the following schools, effective for the 1973-74 school year:

3. **EVALUATION OF BASEBALL SCHEDULE OF MARANATHA HIGH SCHOOL.** The Committee reviewed the schedule of Maranatha High School for possible entry into the CIF, SS, baseball playoffs. It was moved, seconded, and passed that Maranatha High School must win seven of the last 10 games stipulated in their 1973 baseball schedule in order to qualify for the Class A playoffs.

4. **CULTURAL EXCHANGE WRESTLING PROGRAM.** The Commissioner presented a letter from the Southern California Wrestling Coaches' and Officials' Association re-

questing approval to take part in a cultural wrestling program exchange in Japan during August, with underclassmen from this Section. The Association stated that the itinerary would include attending wrestling technique clinics and work-outs, but that no competition as a team or organized pre-arranged matches or tournaments would be engaged in during this trip. Included in the travel party would be 12 students, two high school wrestling coaches, a manager, and a group leader. After careful consideration it was moved, seconded, and passed to instruct the Commissioner to recommend this petition for approval to the State CIF Office.

5. **FOOTBALL REGULATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT.** Mr. Steve Miletich, Chairman of the Football Regulations Committee, presented the following report:

Historically, during recent years many schools have indicated a strong desire to bring about more uniformity in regards to the regulations governing CIF, SS, sports. Additionally, there has been concern over the special regulations which have been applied to football. With this background the committee approached the whole question of football regulations with the desire to promote as great a degree of equality among the sports as possible. Mr. Miletich discussed with the Executive Committee the Football Regulations Committee's proposal which would bring football physical education practice, summer and spring training rules more into line with the other athletic programs of the CIF, SS. Further discussion brought out the problems facing local administrators who are finding difficulty administering and interpreting two sets of regulations, one for football and another for the other sports. There was general agreement by the Executive Committee on the necessity for moving ahead on this item. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to accept the report of the Football Regulations Committee and recommend its adoption to the Council at the May meeting.

6. **EDUCATIONAL ATHLETIC PROGRAMS, INC.** Dr. Richard Cordano and the Commissioner outlined to the Committee the activities of an organization named "Educational Athletic Programs, Inc." Key items of this organization's programs include:

a. Employment of Southern Section football coaches in the instruction of athletes.

b. Each session being of two-week duration, at a cost of \$12.50 per boy.

## ARMSTRONG RETURNS, PALM SPRINGS TRIUMPHS

The most dramatic contest of the four-game set played at the Los Angeles Sports Arena for the divisional basketball championships was Palm Springs' 58-57 win over top-seeded La Canada in AA.

But the game had more drama than the ordinary one-point thriller, for Coach Bill Armstrong. Armstrong, coaching in the Southern Section since 1945, scored his 574th victory in that final game against only 115 losses.

It was his sixth CIF title, the first five coming during a highly successful 14-year stint at Compton. Also while there, Armstrong teams reeled off 66 wins in a row during 1967-70, for a Sectional and state record.

Now in two years at Palm Springs, his Indians are 43-9, including a 26-1 slate this past season, on the way to a San Andreas League title.

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trol of the center of the field. Raphael Chavez, playing one of the link positions, was all over the field on defense, supporting the attack, breaking through for shots.

In the fourth quarter, West regained some of its original mid-field control. Still the game was marked by the display of skills and hard tackles, with Frederiksen's goal standing up.

In presenting the CIF Championship and Runnerup trophies, CIF Executive Committee member Ted Gossard summed up the game, in noting that there were actually two champions on the field, alluding to the close, hard fought game.

The championship game was preceded by the traditional third place game. Santa Barbara, downed Valley Christian, 6-0. In reaching the game, Santa Barbara had run up fifteen straight wins. They lost to West in the semi-finals and after defeating Valley, ended the year with an 18-1 record. Coach Manuel Garcia has formed a finely tuned, well-skilled outfit that should continue to be a soccer power. Most of his players are underclassmen.

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c. The organization handling all insurance, finances, employee agreements, equipment, and other administration concerned with this activity.

d. The organization assuming all liability for this program.

The Committee reviewed the presentation and wished it noted that, under present rules, the high school football staff could not engage in this program if high school players from their same school would be associated with the program. Additionally, however, the Committee wanted to again note that the Football Regulations Committee's report would be presented at the May Council meeting and would further clarify the entire football situation.

**7. VOLLEYBALL PROGRESS REPORT.** Mr. Gene Popko, President, and Mr. Mike Cook, Secretary, of the Southern California High School Volleyball Association, presented a progress report on volleyball in the CIF, Southern Section. Although not an adopted sport, volleyball has received the cooperation and support of the CIF, SS, Office as per the direction of the Executive Committee (see Executive Committee minutes of April 21, 1972, Item 9). In his remarks Mr. Popko enumerated the following items:

There are 48 teams organized into five leagues for the 1972 school year and the 1973 proposal calls for 62 schools in 12 leagues. Also mentioned was the fact that 141 other Southern Section schools have expressed an interest in starting volleyball programs. Additionally, Mr. Popko brought out that the cost of volleyball was relatively inexpensive, the quantity of officials adequate, and the public interest high. A concern of the Committee included the possible conflict with girls' programs, but it was felt that schools still had the option to include or not include boys' volleyball as their local situation dictates.

It was moved, seconded, and passed to instruct the Commissioner to meet with representatives from the Volleyball Association to draw up proposed By-Laws for this sport to be considered by the CIF, SS, Council at its May meeting.

**8. MULTIPLE CAMPUS APPEAL, NORTHERN LEAGUE.** The Commissioner presented an appeal on behalf of the Northern League to allow San Luis Obispo to include 9th graders from its two junior high schools to compete on San Luis Obispo High School athletic teams. The Northern League includes five 4-year schools and San Luis Obispo, a 3-year

institution. The League feels it would alleviate scheduling problems at the Frosh-Soph level if this proposal were granted. In the ensuing discussion it was brought out that each year the CIF, SS, has a number of similar situations and that the present rules provide that both the Section and the State Federated Council must approve these on an annual basis. The Committee felt that before approving the aforementioned application it would prefer to resolve the larger question by allowing local administration of sections on these matters. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the State Federated Council that each section be given authority to set its own standards and approve multi-campus situations. Additionally, the Commissioner brought to the attention of the Committee the fact that San Luis Obispo had already, in violation of Article VII, Section 1 of the CIF, SS, Blue Book (Eligibility Rules), permitted junior high school students to compete at the high school in swimming this season. The Committee expressed deep concern over this violation of Southern Section and State rules, and it was moved, seconded, and passed to censure San Luis Obispo and to advise them that they must forfeit all swimming meets engaged in by these athletes at the level at which they competed.

**9. NEWPORT DISTRICT, HAWAIIAN TENNIS TRIP.** In accordance with Article XVI, Section 1, of the CIF, SS, Blue Book, (Outside Team Competition), Newport-Mesa Unified School District requested permission from the Executive Committee for its four district schools to travel to the Hawaiian Islands for competition in tennis between May 5 and 12 of this year. State CIF, By-Laws, Article 7, Section 264, requires that "application must be filed with the State CIF six months prior to the event." In addition, it was noted that items of this nature are to be initiated by the host school and State, who secure permission from the National Federation, who in turn seeks clearance from the State of the visiting school. Notwithstanding the above guidelines, it was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the application of the Newport-Mesa Unified School District and to petition the State CIF and National Federation to waive this procedure.

**10. ANAHEIM DISTRICT CARNIVAL.** A letter was received from Mr. Don Leibhart, Coordinator for Athletics of the Anaheim High School Union District, in which permission was requested to sponsor a basketball carnival to provide for a scholarship in honor of the late Don McKim, former principal of Magnolia

High School. Additionally it was indicated that only seniors would participate, and all proceeds would be forwarded to the scholarship fund. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve this activity.

**11. BIG BEAR PLAN.** Mr. Ferren Christensen presented to the Committee a progress report on the year-round school program, and most particularly Big Bear High School. In the report it was indicated that, in this State, 16 districts are involved in year-round schools, but as of this date no high schools are involved. A number of high schools have considered the possibility of the year-round school, but only Big Bear and Coalinga High Schools are beginning to implement plans for next year. At Big Bear High School, tentative plans call for four 12-week quarters with students being opted out of one quarter. Since the tentative plan also calls for students who are at times not in school as full-time students to have continuing eligibility, the Committee expressed a desire to see a more detailed proposal on this new format. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed that the Executive Committee recommend approval, in principle, of the Big Bear plan subject to review at a special Executive Committee meeting to be held May 4. Mr. Christensen was asked to provide further background information at that time.

**12. COACHING BOX RULE.** The Garden Grove League proposed to delete Article XXXX, (Baseball Rules), Section 10, sentence 2, which prohibits an adult coach from coaching from the first and third base boxes in CIF, SS, games. The Committee carefully considered this proposal, but expressed concern over removing the coach from the supervision of his bench and placing him in a more direct adversary role in regard to high school players. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to deny the Garden Grove League proposal to delete this rule.

**13. CHANGE IN CIF SWIM RELAY DATES AND FINALS SCORING FORMAT.** The Commissioner expressed the concern on the part of some schools in regard to the dates of the 1974 swim relays qualifying meets. Many districts are holding final exams during this week and expressed reluctance over athletes competing and traveling at this time. The Committee directed the CIF, SS, Office to consider the rescheduling of the preliminaries of this activity. Tentative plans call for changing from two preliminaries to one preliminary, to be held on Saturday, January 19, 1974. Additionally, it was brought to the attention of the Committee that the scoring sys-

## MURPHY ADDS AAA CAGE CHAMPIONSHIP

The long-awaited confrontation between Murphy and Katella for the AAA basketball championship resulted in a 51-45 victory for the Nobles, as they doubled Katella's rebounding total and "won it on defense," as coach Leroy Porter commented in a post-game interview.

Murphy, which won the AA title last year and was elevated to AAA this season wound up with a 26-4 record. Terry Tate, named Player of the Year by the Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation for the second straight year proved his versatility in the championship game, scoring 10, getting seven rebounds and bringing the ball upcourt on numerous occasions.

Sophomore Flintie Williams led Murphy with 12 and junior Ollie Matson had 10. With these two leading returnees, Murphy would appear to be on the way toward a successful basketball reputation, such as that acquired by Verbum Dei over the past five seasons.

Katella, which lost only one one-point game in 31 outings prior to the finals, couldn't shoot well enough to stay with Murphy. Twice Katella moved to within one point of Murphy, but a burst by the Nobles kept the Knights at bay.

Mike Dunn popped in 17 points for the losers and Jeff Welshans 12, but their usually effective inside game was good for only a sub-50 per cent shooting night.

Katella and Murphy had been seeded one-two in the AAA playoffs, and between them had faced only one

league champion team all the way through the bracket, such were the upsets, other than those top two teams. In fact, in the semis, Murphy and Katella faced non-champs from each other's respective league (St. Bernard and El Modena; the Vanguard, surprise finalists a year ago, made it in as a third-place team and advanced to the semis, beating third-seeded Garey.)

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scoring contest was never really in doubt as Verbum Dei outscored Pasadena in every quarter.

In the playoffs, each team beat two league champs. VD had perhaps its toughest game in the quarters against Centennial, but no team came closer than six to either team in post-season competition.

Attendance was 7,935.

Over the past five years, Verbum Dei has been 141-9. Each of the five years they've landed the division Player of the Year honors from the Citizens Savings (nee Helms) Athletic Foundation (Lewis twice, Brown twice and Keith Batiste the first year).

About the only dynasty they haven't disturbed was Compton's 66 straight game string in 1967-70. Verbum Dei, while compiling a fantastic record, has yet to record an unbeaten season.

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tem as adopted in Article XXXXVII, Section 16, (Swim Playoffs), Item A, Part 7, was based on the premise that only six swimmers per class would compete in the finals in any one event, and therefore seven through 12 places would be awarded on the basis of times in the preliminaries. With the adoption of new classification system, we now have a consolation final which should be scored as defined in Rule 7, Section 4, Article I of the NCAA Swimming and Diving Rules Guide. It was moved, seconded, and passed to delete Part 7 from Article XXXXVII, Section 16 (Swim Playoffs), Item A, of the CIF, SS, Blue Book.

14. **ATHLETIC DIRECTOR ON THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.** Chairman Steve Miletich presented the proposal of representation in the person of an Athletic Director on the CIF, SS, Executive Committee. Mr. Miletich outlined the concern of the State Legislature on broadening the base of representation on CIF athletic bodies, and the fact that some other CIF Sections have already instituted this item. It was generally agreed by the Committee that there was merit in considering this idea, and therefore it was moved, seconded, and passed to instruct the Commissioner to explore the possibility and the implications of this item and initiate contact with the appropriate professional parties.

15. **AMATEUR RULE IN TENNIS.** The Commissioner outlined the background of the changing circumstances surrounding the amateur rule in the sport of tennis. This included the recent history of the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association and relaxation of some of their rules, such as allowing amateurs to compete against professionals. It was in this framework that the Executive Committee reviewed the problem of outside competition in tennis for CIF, SS, athletes. Additionally, it should be noted that the CIF, SS, regulation is more restrictive than the State regulation on this item. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to delete as a violation paragraph B from Article XVII, Section 1, of the CIF, SS, Blue Book, "Competing in any athletic contest where any player or contestant of either team received compensation, either directly or indirectly, for his participation in the contest."

16. **SOCCER PROPOSALS.** Mr. Roger Bryant, President of the CIF, Soccer Association, presented the following proposed changes in the regulations governing soccer in the CIF, SS:

- That Article XXXXVI (Soccer Regulations), Sections 4 and 6, be

modified to reduce the number of scrimmages from three to one and increase the number of games from 14 to 18.

- That the Southern Section waive Rule 7, Section 1, of the National Federation Soccer Rules and permit two equal halves of 30 minutes each. (NOTE: Federation rules allow the State Association this alternative).

- In CIF, SS, playoff competition, excluding the championship game, if the regulation game ends in a tie, teams play two extra periods of five minutes each. Teams will change ends to begin each overtime period. At the end of these two overtime periods, if the score is still tied, continue with a maximum of four "sudden death" overtimes. If a tie still exists, each team will select five different shooters to take penalty shots at the goal selected by the referee. The teams will alternate shooters, and the goalkeeper may be any team member of the opponents. Continue until a winner is determined. The highest total out of five attempts determines the winner.

After discussion and review of all three proposals, it was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the CIF Soccer Association proposals. (NOTE: The Committee expressed concern as to injuries in the sport of soccer, and suggested that this item be researched by the CIF, Soccer Association.)

17. **PROTEST—INVITATIONAL TRACK MEET.** The Commissioner expressed the concern on the part of some schools over the opening ceremonies conducted at Duarte High School during the recent Black Student Union Track Invitational March 3, 1973. At this activity the black national anthem and pledge of allegiance were conducted in lieu of the United States national anthem and pledge of allegiance. The Committee expressed concern over this format being used without the prior knowledge of the participating schools. Therefore, the Committee directed the Commissioner to instruct Duarte High School to notify participating schools in advance of these scheduled pre-game activities when applying for this sanctioned event next year.

18. **ELIGIBILITY CASES.** After careful consideration of each case, it was moved, seconded, and passed to accept the report of the Eligibility Committee and to waive the Residence Rule in order to permit the following students to be immediately eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics: Jeff Allen, Santa Ynez High School; Henry Lewis, Imperial High School; Mark Rodwell, St. Francis High School

In addition, it was moved, seconded, and passed to accept the Eligibility Committee report and to DENY a request to waive the Residence Rule for the following student:

Marvin Adams,

Lakewood High School

Additionally, the Executive Committee moved, seconded, and passed to DENY a request to waive the Previous Semester Rule for the following student:

Craig Weber, Upland High School

19. **SAN CLEMENTE HIGH SCHOOL REQUEST FOR LEAGUE CHANGE.** A request was received from San Clemente High School to be considered for a change to the Orange League for the 1973-74 school year. San Clemente High School has projected 613 boys in grades 10 through 12 for the 1973-74 school year. This would make San Clemente the smallest school in the Crestview League by several hundred male students. If placed in the Orange League, it would be about average in enrollment for that league. It was moved, seconded, and passed to instruct the Commissioner to contact the leagues and schools involved to gain further input on this matter in order to make a recommendation to the CIF, SS, Council.

20. **EDISON HIGH SCHOOL TRACK PETITION.** A request was received from Edison High School to permit Dennis Wilson to compete in the 6-mile run in an open qualifying meet during April, in order to qualify for the June 22-23 national AAU junior championships in Gainesville, Florida. After evaluating the student and his performances, the Committee felt that this athlete did not possess the credentials to compete with greater success than some other CIF, SS, athletes. Additionally, this athlete had an opportunity to meet the qualifying standards in a meet held in December. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to deny a waiver of the Outside Individual Competition Rule in this case.

21. **MONROVIA CASE.** Chairman Miletich reported on the current status of the Monrovia case. Some additional developments since the January Executive Committee and Council meetings have included:

- Informal meetings with the Court and representatives from Monrovia High School;
- Consultation with the CIF legal adviser, Mr. Jacobsohn;
- A growing awareness and support among school and lay groups for the CIF, SS, position.

Additionally it was brought to the attention of the Executive Committee that costs for legal fees were not only

exceeding projections, but were difficult to project for the future. Therefore, it was moved, seconded, and passed to recommend that a plan be developed whereby the total cost for the litigation be pro-rated among our member schools and this amount be added to the annual dues in October. The Executive Committee commended its officers for their leadership in this case and reaffirmed their continuing support.

22. **DISCUS THROWERS COMPETING IN ALL-COMERS MEETS.** The Commissioner brought to the attention of the Committee the problem of Southern Section discus throwers finding competition in order to improve their skills and for some to prepare for State competition. Realizing the current limited opportunities for competition in this area, since many leagues in the Southern Section do not conduct the discus as a regular event, it was moved, seconded, and passed to instruct the Commissioner to approve three all-comers meets for competition in the discus to be hosted by CIF, SS, schools.

23. **COUNCIL MEETINGS ON SCHOOL DAYS.** A proposal was considered to hold a Council meeting on a school day for the purpose of including a short orientation program for league representatives. After discussing the advantages of such an orientation to the CIF, SS, especially for new members, it was moved, seconded, and passed to recommend to the Council consideration of holding the September Council meeting on the last Thursday in September.

24. **REVIEW OF OFFICE PERSONNEL BENEFITS AND RETIREMENT.** The Commissioner brought to the attention of the Committee the problem of CIF, SS, personnel and their dilemma of serving schools as employees of the CIF, SS, yet not being eligible under our present State system for the usual benefits of regular school employees. The Committee expressed a concern in this matter and it was moved, seconded, and passed to appoint Dr. Richard Cordano and Dr. Lowell Jackson as a committee of two to research and report back possible alternatives at the next Executive Committee meeting.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m.

## AQUINAS TOPS BISHOP IN 'A' DIVISION

Aquinas High, overcoming the loss of CIF "A" division Player of the Year Chuck Gulo for six late-season games with a hand injury, trounced Bishop 65-50 to win the divisional championship.

The Falcons were the top-seeded team in the "Southern" half of the bracket (geographical distances in this division are by far the greatest in the SS).

No team got closer to the Arrowhead League champs than 10 points until the semis, when Brethren forced the issue to overtime, before Aquinas won 50-48.

The Broncos, champs of the Desert-Inyo League, also had a two-point game in the semis, upending Bishop Diego 49-47. BD had whipped league foe and top-seeded Carpinteria in the quarters.

Bishop managed only 33 per cent from the field for the game, but stayed close (27-26 at half) until reserve guard Mark Maiefski arrived on the scene in the third quarter. Maiefski, a 5-9 junior, hit nine straight points to put the game away.

It was the first championship game victory in three tries for the Catholic school from San Bernardino and the first basketball championship for that city in history. The Falcon coach Matt Hoar, is an Aquinas alumnus.

Gulo, who was still slowed by a battle with the flu, managed 14 points. Maiefski led the balanced scoring with

16, and center Del Oros and guard Bob Romeo were also in double figures.

Bishop, which matched Aquinas good size well, was paced by Tom Reid and Mike Blume with 13 each and all-CIF Gerald Hitchcock with 10 points and 15 rebounds. Aquinas finished at 23-9, Bishop at 20-6.

the person who asks you to modify the rule to accommodate his son or daughter finds himself in the predicament of asking for such consideration because he failed to observe, with responsibility, rules by which he should have been governed?

Sports, at the secondary level, are America's greatest hope, because the rules by which they are governed are based on fairness. Every participant must have the same consideration, every participant must pay the same penalty for a violation, every score must receive the same reward while playing the game.

When people get into the old argument of which came first, the chicken or the egg, the discussion is endless, but not so with the question of rules and boys. The rule must always come first, because that is the justification for having activities for young men and women. When rules come first, then it becomes necessary, frequently, to say "No" to requests. It's not that we are negative in our thinking or lacking in sympathy toward offenders of the rule. It's simply a case of necessity in order to conduct the sport.

We must hasten to add that rules must be reviewed frequently and evaluated as to their effectiveness and fairness. Whenever the rules favor the offense or the defense, then modifications are in order. Whenever safety hazards are present, changes in equipment or methods of play must be adopted. Whenever eligibility rules discriminate against worthy candidates for sports, they need to be updated.
