PREMIER SHOWING FOR CIF-SS FOOTBALL COACHES

"POINT OF CONTACT . . . "

this new film, which will be released by the National Federation over the next few days, will be part of a premier showing for all football coaches in the Southern Section on May 5th.

The premier showing will be staged in the gymnasium of Gahr High School — adjacent to the CIF-SS Office—and will be held in conjunction with the Los Angeles City Section as an informational affair. The showing is set for a 7:30 p.m. debut.

The film describes the controversial and now illegal blocking and tackling techniques for high school football and is a production of the National Federation Office in Elgin, Ill.

Rule changes by the National Alliance Football Committee have made butt-blocking and face-tackling as personal fouls and a 15-yard penalty infraction, effective the 1976 prep football season.

In butt-blocking and face-tackling, the face mask or frontal area or top of the helmet is driven directly into the opponent as the primary point of contact. This method was the one most commonly taught to the coaches who learned their teaching techniques a few years back and makes viewing of the film a must by the entire staff of each member school.

The National Alliance Committee formulates rules for high school competition in 47 states, as well as for competition between colleges which are members of the NAIA.

The production of the film took place in Tucson, Ariz., with members of the Amphitheater High School team — the 1975 Arizona State champion — enacting the scenes and correct techniques.

The CIF-SS Office will also have three copies of the film on hand for use by member schools over the summer months.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE FOR ATHLETIC DIRECTORS SELECTS SAN DIEGO SITE

That comes this December when the National Conference of High School Directors of Athletics stages its annual affair in San Diego.

If you're after the dates, reserve December 12-15 now when this stellar attraction is held at the Town and Country Hotel.

Nationally known speakers, numerous workshops, a comprehensive exhibit area and the Medalist Management Seminar will all be part of the program.

Athletic directors are urged to make budget requests at this time. The conference activity fee, which includes a tour, banquet and luncheon, is \$25. Room rates at the Town and Country will be set at \$22-24 for single and \$26-28 for double.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER



'ONCE' IS ONE TOO MANY!

Recently we received a letter from an official of Southern Section baseball games — he was quitting in midseason.

The reason for his decision? The growing complexity of the game was mentioned, but the primary motivation behind his reluctant but final action was the attitude of some high school coaches. Their actions on the field towards both players and officials were such that this man no longer wished to be associated with the sport as an official.

Such a letter might be understood from a rookie who determined in his first year that interscholastic officiating was not his bag. If the letter had been written by someone who, through evaluations by coaches, had been identified as a mediocre official, it might also be understandable.

However, this decision was made by a **veteran** official of many years who is presently ranked in the top 10 per cent of all officials. He said, "If I can't give 100 per cent anymore, then it would be better for me to close up shop." And so we lose another good man.

Admittedly, such an action is rare, but if it happens only once a year, it's too often. How many more fine officials drop out, due to their treatment from some coaches? How many more are thinking about it?

Good officiating is fundamental criterion for any successful athletic program. We, in the Southern Section, share a common responsibility for creating a positive environment not only for athletes, coaches and spectators, but for officials as well. These men and women should be treated with respect. Their position does not entitle any coach to treat them differently. To do so is a step towards the undermining of their authority and its consequential effects upon the game and the athletes involved.

Coaches are teachers and leaders. As teachers they instruct their athletes in the knowledge and performance of the sport involved. As leaders, they

MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING February 21, 1976

The February Executive Committee Meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman Dr. Richard Cordano at 8:30 a.m., Saturday, February 21, 1976 at Arcadia High School.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the Executive Committee minutes of November 8, 1975 as published in the December, 1975 issue of the "Monthly Bulletin" and the minutes of the February 4, 1976 meeting as reviewed by the Commissioner.

2. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE: Mr. Clare Van Hoorebeke, representative of the Executive Committee for Boys' Athletic Directors, gave a brief report from the area organizations. Tournament rules and maximum number of contests were areas of greatest concern.

3. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' UPDATE: Mrs. Barbara Wilson, representative to the Executive Committee for Girls' Athletic Directors, gave a report covering the 1975-76 Girls' field hockey season and officiating problems, CIF-SS Girls' Sports Advisory Committees, and an update on the sports in progress. Copies of reports given to the CIF State Girls Advisory Committee were reviewed and a recommendation was made to distribute these reports to CIF-SS Girls' Athletic Directors.

4. TREASURER'S REPORT: Dr. Hanford Rants, treasurer, presented an updated report to the Executive Committee on the 1975-76 budget as adopted at the September meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council.

5. ALUMNI COMMITTEE: Mr. Lou Joseph, Vice-President of the Council, reported on final preparations for the Alumni Night, planned for March 13, 1976 to honor past members of the CIF-SS Executive Committee.

6. BAY AREA REPORT: Mr. Steve Miletich, member of the Executive Committee, reported on the leaguing policy of the 22 schools which comprise the South Bay Athletic Association. For the past two years, leaguing within this Association has been accomplished on the basis of strength of sport for both Boys' and Girls' athletics. It was moved, seconded and passed to commend Mr. Ted Gossard, Principal of Aviation High for his report outlining the formation of the South Bay Athletic Association.

7. CIF-SCGA GOLF CHAMPION-SHIPS: It was moved, seconded and passed to give Southern Section approval for one year to enter a CIF-SCGA golf championship for student teams from Northern and Southern California.

8. **MEMBERSHIP:** It was moved, seconded and passed to grant regular membership for Mid-Cities High School.

9. **STIERLE-FREDERIKSEN:** It was moved, seconded and passed to delay final action on this case.

10. SANTA FE LEAGUE: It was moved, seconded and passed to support the action of the Santa Fe League regarding actions taken by the league with problems involving residency.

11. **PAST PRESIDENTS:** It was moved, seconded and passed to direct the Commissioner to prepare a constitutional provision which would enable the past president of the Executive Committee to serve as an ex-officio member of the Council following completion of his term of office.

12. FINANCIAL REGULATIONS FOR PLAYOFFS: The Commissioner reviewed several concerns regarding financial regulations for CIF-SS playoffs and was directed to develop a report on this item for presentation at the next scheduled Executive Committee meeting.

13. VALLEY CHRISTIAN ACADEMY REQUEST: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the request of Valley Christian Academy to compete against several non-member schools for the 1975-76 school year.

14. AFS DOMESTIC EXCHANGE: The Commissioner presented a request on the part of Rubidoux High School to grant eligibility for a domestic foreign exchange student. The Committee expressed concern regarding the advisability of extending such coverage to other foreign students as provided in Article XI, Section 1C of the Blue Book. It was moved, seconded and passed to deny the request.

15. BASKETBALL REQUEST: A request from Saddleback High School, requesting permission to play three basketball games during the 1976 Christmas recess in Hawaii was reviewed by the Committee. The Committee found that the school had complied with all provisions for such travel as outlined in Article XV, Section 1 of the Blue Book. Therefore, it was moved, seconded and passed to recommend approval of this request to the State Federated Council.

16. ADDITIONAL PRESS HELP: The Commissioner outlined the problems regarding the volume of material being processed by the CIF-SS Office in the public relations area due to the increased demands of Girls' Athletics. It was moved, seconded and passed to authorize the Commissioner to employ part-time help in order to meet the needs of the Section.

17. MULTI-CAMPUS REQUEST: It was moved, seconded and passed to defer the Santa Monica H.S. multicampus request pending a decision by the State Federated Council on present legislation before that body.

18. VOLLEYBALL REQUESTS: Requests from Santa Monica and Laguna Beach H.S. requesting permission to participate in international volleyball competition during the 1976 recess were reviewed. Additionally, communication was received from the Catholic Athletic Association asking for a review of a previous denial of Louisville High School's request to participate in the same activity. Information from the State CIF Office on this matter was presented, indicating that a minimum of six months lead time was necessary to process such requests. Therefore, it was moved, seconded and passed to deny the requests from Santa Monica H.S. and Laguna H.S. and sustain the previous decision regarding Louisville H.S.

19. SOUTHERN SECTION AUTO-MOBILE. Mr. Lou Joseph presented a proposal to the Executive Committee to replace the CIF Southern Section automobile. It was moved, seconded and passed to authorize the Commissioner to negotiate and purchase this item.

20. COLISEUM CONCERNS: The Commissioner reported on several concerns related to the future use of the Coliseum for football playoffs, the most important of which being the inability of the Coliseum management to guarantee use of this facility should inclement weather be encountered. The Committee reiterated its previous position that the Commissioner should make whatever arrangements he deems necessary in order to secure a proper site for this activity.

21. GOLF COURSE PROBLEM:

Mr. Lou Joseph outlined problems in securing facilities for student golf teams. Several alternatives were discussed with no action taken.

22. TRANSFER CLARIFICA-TION: A request was received from the Downey School District asking for clarification regarding athletic eligibility for students who might transfer between high schools as a result of open enrollment policy. It was the position of the Committee that Article XI, Section 5 of the Blue Book permitting students to transfer from one school to another because of Board action in changing school attendance areas, was not appropriate in this case and would jeopardize the eligibility of such students. The Committee further recommended that the Downey District consider these types of transfers before its students enter the ninth grade.

23. **DRILL TEAM CREDIT:** The Commissioner reviewed the subject of physical education credit for Drill Team participation. The item was referred to the Blue Book Committee for further study.

24. CALIFORNIA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF: A request was presented from the California School for the Deaf asking permission to allow practice at the school this summer for the Deaf World Games planned for Dallas, Texas. It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the request and direct the Commissioner to work with and seek assistance from the State Office on this matter.

25. **VILLANOVA PREP:** The Commissioner advised the Committee

regarding the request of Villanova Prep to drop membership for its Boys' program under CIF-SS rules and to continue its Girls' program in the Tri-Valley League under CIF-SS rules. The Commissioner was directed to review this request with Villanova Prep and seek clarification.

26. ORANGE COUNTY SECTION REPORT: Dr. Larry Lucas, Ms. Sherril Bottjer and Mr. Gary Lindell reported on the results of an Orange County survey concerning a proposed Orange County Section of the CIF. In the report there were several items which the Committee felt needed reviewing. It was moved, seconded and passed to form a committee chaired by Mr. Ferren Christensen to review the items listed in the Orange County Report. Mr. Christensen's Committee was directed to report back to the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

27. TITLE IX IMPLICATIONS: Mr. John Klumb, Chief Bureau of Health, Physical Education, Athletics and Recreation for the State Department of Education, reviewed new state legislation, in addition to Title IX Regulations, with regards to future implications for the CIF-SS. He emphasized the importance of removing from CIF-SS By-Laws those items which might impede local school districts in their efforts to comply with new regulations.

28. GIRLS' TENNIS PLAYOFF FORMAT: It was moved, seconded and passed to change the Girls' tennis (Continued on Page Twelve)

The March Council Meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman Dr. Richard Cordano at 9:03 a.m. Thursday, March 18, 1976 at the Saddleback Inn, Norwalk. All leagues were represented, with the exceptions of the Academy, Liberty and Los Padres.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of January 15, 1976 as published and corrected in the February issue of the "Monthly Bulletin"; the Executive Committee meeting of February 4, 1976 as published in the February issue of the "Monthly Bulletin"; and the Executive Committee meeting of February 21, 1976 as mailed to the Council.

WANTED: TRACK COACHES SEEKING FREE PUBLICITY

Each year the CIF Southern Section Office publishes a comprehensive track and field program for the Masters Meet.

An important segment of the program is a number of individual action pictures of athletes performing in the meet, both Boys and Girls.

MESSAGE SHOULD BE MORE THAN JUST WORDS

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the seventh in a series of feature articles dealing with the care and prevention of athletic injuries).

How many times has a youth been given athletic equipment as the season begins without a word of advice about the equipment or those early season factors that often influence injury or illness?

SEGMENT OF WORKLOAD FOR SOUTHERN SECTION

Although the CIF Southern Section Council meets but four times this year, a major segment of the on-going work is conducted by a number of committees and each seeks your input—whether you be an administrator, athletic director or coach.

Too often no instruction is given in the need for conditioning, adequate nutrition, heat acclimation and foot care to avoid injury and affliction.

Presumably, the team physician or athletic trainer should be responsible for such education. Yet, in many schools, the coach is the only individual with direct supervision of athletes. Since the coach occupies a very influential position, his message could be significant in teaching the athlete sound behavior related to sports participation.

How does one teach the athlete safe behavior principles that will be incorporated into his/her behavioral pattern?

The helmet illustrates the nature of the communication problems. If the athlete uses the helmet to spear an opponent, he is inviting serious head or neck injury. This action also inflicts unnecessary injury on the opponent. Warning the player against spearing is not enough. Time should be set aside during the opening of the season to illustrate what spearing is, how it can hyperflex or hyperextend the neck and cause severe injury. Correct blocking and tackling techniques should then be illustrated.

Effective behavioral change calls for communication not only by word but through illustration. The coach must consistently educate and insist upon healthy and safe practices in his/her sport. Nor does positive behavior instruction warrant scare tactics. They are rarely effective and the youth will not respect the supervisor for resorting to such an immature course of action.

An important principle of behavior change indicates that it is most effected when the values and attitudes of the athlete are taken into account. Recommending actions according to one's own value system will undoubt-

edly fail. Recommendations should make sense in the athlete's framework of values, emotions, self-concept and priorities.

In other words, one must relate to the athlete as a person. Disseminating information once to a group rarely elicits positive behavior change, especially when such a presentation is unaccompanied by illustrative techniques to clearly define concepts and allows for no interaction. It is much more effective if the supervisor individualizes the approach as much as possible, is objective in discussing issues and avoids lecturing.

In summary, just knowing the correct behavior does not mean it will be practiced. For example, many adults

This Committee is charged with the responsibility of investigating the possibility of more active participation by the Southern Section in the care and prevention of athletic injuries. Additionally, this Committee is currently coordinating its efforts with a similar Committee at the State level.

The Jackrabbits had been ranked as the No. 1 club virtually the entire campaign and then proceeded to stamp those credentials with a convincing 68-50 win over Buena in the finale. That win netted the 'Rabbits a 30-1 won-lost mark on the year and accounted for the school's 10th CIF title since the playoffs inaugurated back in 1915.

Lynwood was at the opposite end of the spectrum, however, the Knights savoring their first-ever CIF-SS cage crown and logging the feat by coming from behind in the final 17 seconds for a 71-70 win over Palm Springs. Lynwood finished at 29-3 for the season.

STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL SPORTS BUSY AGENDA

Although most athletic administrators are well abreast of the volume of work conducted by the CIF Southern Section Council, there is a similar body which acts as a legislative unit at the State level.

Known as the State Federated Council, this group meets three times each school year, with representation coming from the 10 sections throughout the State.

Next meeting of the Federated Council is set for June, to be held in conjunction with the State Track and Field meet. Listed below is a capsule summary of the major proposals to be included on the agenda at that time.

It's hopeful this will provide you with an overall view of the State and the base from which our Southern Section Rules and Regulations are formulated.

COMBINED TEAMS — Proposal that would allow Sections to establish rules permitting schools to field combined teams where a sport is not offered in a particular school.

SWIMMING DISTANCES - Proposal to permit Sections to include shorter events for Girls in addition to the swimming events listed in the National Federation Rules for the 1976-77 and 1977-78 seasons.

- 7. PLAYOFF COMMITTEE: Mr. Vic Sherriett, chairman of the Playoff Classification Committee, reported on his group's proposal for establishing a base criteria to the grouping process. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support the concept of placement in playoff divisions being based on both average enrollment and success within a playoff grouping, particularly if it appears that a given school or league might perpetuate dominance.
- 8. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE: Mr. Clyde Francisco, chairman of the CIF-SS Blue Book Committee gave a progress report of his group and solicited suggestions for areas of revision from the Council.
- 9. EMPIRE RELEAGUING PRO-POSAL: Mr. Jack Fox of the Empire League outlined a proposal on voting by area for releaguing items. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to submit the Empire League proposal to the Releaguing Committee for further study and possible adoption in its next report to the Council.
- 10. TENTH FOOTBALL GAME OPTION: Mr. Ron Barney outlined a Marmonte League proposal that would make it optional for member schools to schedule a 10th football game or a scrimmage/carnival, effective the 1977 season. Following discussion a motion to provide the option of a 10th football game or scrimmage/ carnival was defeated.

11. HUNTINGTON VALLEY CHRISTIAN APPEAL: Mr. Willard May, principal of Huntington Valley Christian H.S., and Mrs. Albert Fimlaid appeared before the Council to appeal a decision on behalf of son Al Fimlaid on a residency ruling. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded

and passed to sustain the Eligibility Committee action.

12. MODIFICATION OF STATE RULE 200: Mr. Ferren Christensen, representative to the CIF State Federated Council, reported on a proposal for modification of State Rule 200. The proposal would permit Girls to tryout for Boys' teams, only if the school did not field a Girl's team in that same sport. Leagues are asked to discuss this item and be prepared to vote at the May Council meeting.

13. GIRLS' ATHLETICS: Mrs. Barbara Wilson, representative for Girls' Athletic Directors, expressed concern of some league coordinators not responding to deadlines and the carrying out of duties so delegated by the CIF-SS Office.

14. CONSTITUTION REVISION: Mr. Steve Miletich of the Executive Committee outlined a proposed constitution revision of the CIF-SS covering the area of the out-going president of the Council. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed that the past president of the Council shall serve in the capacity as an exofficio member of the Executive Committee and state representative during the term of the president in office.

15. TRACK PROPOSAL: Mr. Jack Rankin outlined a Rio Hondo League proposal calling for the scoring of the triple jump event in dual and team championship competition, effective the 1977 season. Leagues are asked to study the proposal and be prepared to vote at the May Council meeting.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 1:27 p.m.

In the absence of such understanding, the athlete will tend to do only what is convenient and may ignore important health and safety measures. And in one sense this action is understandable since he/she has not been apprised adequately of the reasons for such preventive measures.

NEW FORMAT OUTLINED FOR DIVERS TO ENTER CIF-SS PRELIM MEET

Divers on Boys' teams in 1977 will be able to qualify for the CIF Southern Section prelims in the same manner as swimmers — thanks to a change in format approved by the CIF-SS Office

The recommendation is an out. growth of the Swimming and Diving Advisory Committee.

Under the new format, a point total for 11 dives (5 required and 6 optional) will be set, which the diver can meet during the regular season — thus qualifying for the CIF-SS prelims.

This standard score could be achieved in any CIF-SS sanctioned invitational or league meet. However, such qualification will not be available in dual or AAU meets.

Just as swimmers must have their qualifying times verified on entry cards and forwarded to the CIF-SS Office prior to the deadline, so now must the divers.

It should be noted that under the new format, league diving champions will no longer be guaranteed a spot in the diving prelims. Every diver on Southern Section Boys' teams must have met the qualifying score, including league champions in order to qualify for the prelims.

Also, the new format will eliminate the necessity for petitions as no diver will be entered who has not met the qualifying score for either 4A or 3A competition. These point totals will be published at a later date.

Under the old system, the only guarantee a diver had for entry into the Southern Section Boys' diving prelims was to win his/her league championship. The only date a diver could so qualify was the last day of the regular season — the league finals.

On the other hand, swimmers have had the opportunity to qualify for the swimming prelims during the regular season by meeting a previously established time standard.

This procedural change will now permit all quality divers (no matter how many) from a particular league to qualify for the CIF-SS diving prelims in advance of their league finals and without petitioning, while at the same time, insuring that only quality divers within the Southern Section will reach the prelims

Coaches are reminded that this format will be in effect for the 1976-77 season.



MASTER SANCTIONED LIST HAS JUNE 15 DEADLINE FOR MEMBER SCHOOLS

Don't forget the date, June 15, 1976 . . .

. . it's your deadline!

This is the date by which schools must submit their sanctioned event applications for the 1976-77 year if the events are to be listed on the Master Sanctioned Event List.

Sanctioned Event List.

Applications submitted to the CIF Southern Section Office after June 15 will be processed, but will not appear on our Master List distributed to all member schools at the beginning of the fall semester.

Coaches and athletic directors are advised to check their athletic schedules for events that will need State CIF and/or Southern Section sanctioning.

Guidelines are as follows:

1 — Sanctioning required by Southern Section if event involves (a) more than one league **AND** (b) four or more schools.

2 — Sanctioning also required by State CIF if event involves schools from outside Southern Section.

3 — Sanctioning also required by National Federation if event involves schools from outside California.

4 — Applications must be received at least 60 days in advance of event.

5—Sanctioned events may not begin earlier than 3 p.m. on a school day, without special Executive Committee action.

6—All organizations, management, administration, information and finances are to be handled by the host school rather than any other school or outside agency.

WHAT'S HAPPENIN' IN THE OTHER 49 STATES

Item: Talk about State Tournaments . . .

Comment: The State of Minnesota came up with a first in terms of crowning a new champion as that association conducted its first-ever State Ski Tournament for Girls. There were 53 schools in the finals, with the slalom and cross country events comprising the card. Just for the record though, Minnesota has a strong tradition in the sport, having just concluded its 45th annual State championship for Boys.

Item: Quote of the year!

Comment: "If school decisions can't be solved in the usual way, they eventually wind up on the bench. We (judges) are no more prepared to make educational decisions than the next fellow. So we listen to the evidence, and to the 'experts' brought in by both sides, and then we decide. Sometimes we decide wrong, but the point is — we decide . . . Unless local boards courageously stand by their guns and make those decisions when they come due, we're going to continue to see judges making educational decisions, educational law. That's not good . . ." Quote by Sherman Finesilver, 10th Circuit Court Federal District Judge.

Item: Softball pitching rules adopted.

Comment: The Wisconsin State High School Association adopted two rules for the 1976 Girls' softball season (a) a girl must take one day of rest after pitching more than 11 innings in one day or over two or more consecutive days, (b) a girl shall not pitch more than 22 innings in a calendar week. Pitching to just one batter (in fact, one pitch) constitutes a full inning of work.

Item: Summer jobs . . .

Comment: If you're a coach in the State of Kansas, you may have to be careful as to where you work during the summer months. The KSHSAA summer camp rule provides that no football, basketball or wrestling coach may be present as an observer, lecturer, participant, staff member or in any other capacity at any summer football, basketball or wrestling camp where any player he will be coaching the succeeding year is in attendance.

Item: Soccer style shoes.

Comment: Soccer style shoes will be mandatory for all football players in the Wisconsin State High School Association effective the 1980 season. The decision is based on an athletic injury report that reveals ankle and knee injuries are fewer and less severe with the soccer style shoe as opposed to the conventional shoe.

Item: Pay at the door.

Comment: Often times, the list of participants for a state tournament can become lengthy, but the State of Washington doesn't seem to have a problem. One pass is given to each player, one to the coach, one to the student manager, one to an administrator from the school and everyone else pays at the door—from the cheerleaders on down.

Item: Speaking about softball pitchers . . .

Comment: Marge Romanowski of Helix H.S. in San Diego had quite a tour of duty on the mound in that Section's softball playoffs — hurling 40 consecutive scoreless innings. However, they added in this manner: She went 17 in a 0-0 tie when a game was called because of darkness; came back the next day and went 12 innings more before her team won, 1-0; she then went 12 more in the finals before being relieved. Just for the record, she was replaced by her sister in the 13th and Helix lost, 2-1.

Item: Harmful to your health.

Comment: In Tennessee, broadcasts advertising alcoholic beverages, tobacco or patent medicines will not be granted rights to any prep game.
