

Take Flynn, last year's CIF Player of the Year. Even while missing virtually three full games with a gimpy ankle, he has scored 20 touchdowns, 120 points. He's averaged- a whopping 16.1 yards on 77 carries for 1232 yards. Meadows has tallied 20 touchdowns, added 16 extra points for 190 points. This breaks the Central Group record of 160 set by Pomona's Marty Keough in 1951. You get an idea of how powerful and fast he must be when you read this stat: 20 of his

29 touchdowns have been made from at least 50 yards out!

Randy's yardage figures are phenomenal - gained 2016 yards in 126 carries for a neat

In total scoring they're almost as even as can be.
Downey has 428 points, Anabowies has 25 bonus, star-heim 423. Their defensive records are equally even. Anaheim yielding 101 and Downey 112. This phase would be much better but for the fact that subs play an unusually large part of the games.

deduction, for the defenses will be set to stop the break-away runs. We think the passing will not only connect, but also serve the purpose of opening up the running de-fense. fense.

An important point is that neither side can afford to overload in trying to stymie Meadows or Flynn. In Joe Avitia and Bill Mauerhan, Anaheim has backs who can inflict plenty of damage.

Conversely, Downey has Joe Sallinger and Brent Mc-Dowell to complement Meadows. Both are trackmen and run just a step behind Randy.

So we can see the score-board when the final gun sounds: Downey, 28; Ana-heim, 27.

# **Builder of Grid Champs**

There's nothing like success to whet the appetite of the legion of football fans anywhere in the country. That's one of the reasons why Anaheim's Head Football Coach Clare Van Hoorebeke is held in such high esteem throughout Southern California and particularly in the Mother Colony of Orange county. Since taking over at Anaheim High in 1950, Van has directed his teams to 34 Sunset League victories in 38 contests. In addition to this he has posted a 7-1-2 record in four CIF playoffs; this makes an overall record of 41 wins, three losses, and four ties in 48 games. Altogether he has posted a .896 percentage at Anaheim.

Born in Riverside, Van played all his high school athletics at Huntington Beach High. He attended Arizona State at Tempe for four years, successfully playing and learning the game of football. His first coaching assignment was frosh football and baseball at Arizona State. From there, he moved to the newly formed North Phoenix High.


Coach Van Hoorebeke left Phoenix in 1950, taking over the Mother Colony's grid fortunes in the fall of the '50 season; the rest is Southern California prep football history. Van has directed his teams to six straight Sunset League championships.

Since losing two games in 1950, his first year in getting things whipped into shape, his teams have won 24 straight games without a loss or a tie. The Vanmen have gone through the past 35 straight Sunset League games without a defeat. Undoubtedly, this is a CIF record for any major school in the large schools division.

Handing Van his only two setbacks were Newport Harbor 35-13 and Fullerton 19-12, both in 1950. Since then Anaheim has been tied twice: Huntington Beach 6-6 and Fullerton 13-13, both recorded in 1952. Consequently, the Fullerton Indians, arch rivals within the league, have fared better than the other league members.

Point-wise, here is how the Sunset League teams have fared in seven seasons against Van's

aggregations at Anaheim:
In 1950, playing five league games, Van's team ran up 113 to 73 points averaging 22.6 points per game, again in 1951 it was 113-20 for a 22.6 average, in 1952 the offensive dipped down to a 64-39 record averaging 12.8. Starting in 1953 his offensive began to jell and he tallied a 140-


39 record to average 28 points; in 1955 it was 168-34 for six games to average an even 28 points; and capping it off was 290-68 for the 1956 season for a 41.4 average for seven-game league schedule.



For three of the past four years the Vanmen have advanced to the CIF semi-finals and in 1954 lost out in the quarter-final tilt. In 1953 Anaheim drew a first-round bye, then defeated San Diego High 21-7, and tied San'a Monica 21-21, losing out on a one first-down decision. In 1954 the Vanmen took Covina 35-6, and were leading Glendale Hoover when a broken ankle sustained by Paul Grover upset the team and they lost 27-13. Last year the Colonists beat Mt. Carmel 39-14, Glendale 27-13, and tied San Diego 20-20 to again be eliminated via the first-down edict.

This year Anaheim has advanced to the finals for the first time with two practice games wins, seven league tilt victories, and three CIF playoff triumphs. Tonight comes the fourth step, the big one, that leads to the coveted championship following CIF playoff victories over Compton 32-7, San Diego 34-6, and Redlands 42-20 to run Van's undefeated win skein to 24 games



# Vikings to Feature Power



Leading the high-powered Downey offensive are five exceptionally fine backs, each capable of exploding for the long touchdown run at any given time. Left half Randy Meadows, 71, is the top scorer in Southern California and the chief threat to Mickey Flynn's repeating as the "Player of the Year."

Meadows, fullback Sallinger, and quarterback Trumbo were selected on the all-Coast League first team. McDowell and Russell were second team nominations. Downey's offensive has clicked to the tune of 423 points for 12 games averaging 35.25 points per game coming up to its big 13th test of this drawn-out season in tonight's finale.

Doped at the outset of the season as the two teams most likely to succeed and meet in the finals, Downey and Anaheim have come through as predicted. Both teams have emerged from 12 games undefeated and untied. Downey has rolled up 423, and Anaheim has amassed a total of 424. Downey has had 111 points scored against them, and the Colonists allowed 101.

It is generally conceded that comparative scores mean little or nothing, but the Vikings and the Colonists did have three common opponents, namely: Fullerton, Garden Grove, and Compton. In these games Downey ran up a 85-7 count, while the Colonists recorded a 97-14 tabulation.





# Flynn and Meadows Named CIF Co-Players for Season

# Board Unable to Separate Flashy Backs

There was no other alternative. Anaheim's Mickey Flynn and Randy Meadows of Downey, the two best breakaway runners to come along in the same year, are the CIF, Central Group, Co-Players of the Year.

The Helms Athletic Foundation's Board of Football, which made the selections, had one of the easiest times it has ever encountered in picking the ace of aces.

Not a single member of the board could come up with a reason, a statistic or even a theory that could establish that Flynn is better than Meadows, or vice versa. When the two undefeated teams played for the title they wound up in a 13-13 tie and each scored a long touchdown.

The two fabled halfbacks measured up as evenly as a flash and its shadow. Except that no one could say which was the shadow.

# Physically on Par

Physically they're almost twins. Meadows is a mite taller at 5 feet, 11 inches, with Flynn listed at 5 feet, 10 inches. Each weighs 165 pounds.

Statistically, Meadows' figures are bigger, but that's largely because he played in largely because he played in all of his team's 13 games. Anaheim also played 13 but Mickey had a bad ankle and was out of three games en-tirely and played briefly in

treety and played briefly in two others.

Randy would up with a total of 2128 yards gained on 136 carries, for a whopping 15.7 average. He scored 30 touchdowns and 16 extra points for a total of 196 points.

## 22 Touchdowns

Mickey compiled an averige of 14.6 yards per try on 94 carries and a total yardage gain of 1377. He scored 22 touchdowns for 132 points. Oddly, Flynn scored exactly 132 points last year in winning Player of the Year hon-ors all by himself.

There wasn't even the an-

gle that one player had more assistance from his team-mates. Both Anaheim and Downev placed four on the nree teams picked.

Joe Avitia, the lightest fullback ever chosen on the first eam-155 pounds-gave Anaheim its second man on the first team while Downey has Tackle Harley Widmar, a 185pounder, on the elite line-up.

Downey also placed two on the second team, Guard Dave Okura, 175, and Quarterback
