

Dr. Hansford Rants had a long and distinguished educational career and was a very popular and effective leader for the CIF-SS during the 1970's and 1980's. He was a mentor to former Commissioner Dean Crowley when they both served as high school administrators at Gahr High School. Shirley Frazier, former CIF-SS Director of Finance and Budget, said that Rants was one of the best school and CIF-SS officials she had the privilege working with.


Awarded Silver Star - World War II

A close neighbor of the CIF office, Gahr High School (on whose campus the CIF, SS offices are located) has supplied the new treasurer of the CIF council—Dr. Hanford F. Rants, 49-year-old principal of Gahr for the past three years.

Dr. Rants received his B.S. and B. of Ed. degrees from Washington St. University in 1949 and his master's the following year.

His Ed. D is from the University of Southern California and Dr. Rants holds four life credentials, with 22 years of teaching and administrative experience. While coaching in junior high (football and basketball) three years, he also taught math and science in the Wapato School district. Dr. Rants served a year as district attendance supervisor in an area with 2400 students spread over 56 square miles.

He moved to a vice-principalship for two years; and then served as a junior and senior high principal in the Downey School district for 14 years before joining the ABC District at Gahr.

Dr. Rants, rangy at 6-3, 200 pounds, is a physical fitness enthusiast, who can be seen running the track at Gahr whenever he gets the chance. He and his wife Shirley have three sons: Jon, 24, a Cal State Long Beach graduate now in the military at Ft. Carson, Colorado (in civilian life he is a teacher); Jay, 22, a graduate of Redlands University, an elementary education major and will be credentialed in January, 1973; and Jack, 20, a senior Ministry major at Redlands.

Dr. Rants has been active in CASSA and NASSP for 18 years, having previously served as CASSA district president and currently is president of Region 14 of the Association of California School Administrators. He has also worked on numerous Western Association of Schools and Colleges Evaluation teams.

Dr. Rants has served terms as president and vice-president of both the Coast and Suburban Leagues, and previously served two years on the important CIF, SS releaguing committee.

He has done work in Boy Scouts and Eagle Scouts and is active in his church.

During World War II, Dr. Rants was awarded the Soldier's Medal, a Bronze Star and a Silver Star during the Pacific campaign.

There could be no person with better qualifications to guide the Southern Section in this first school year of the 1980's. We welcome Dr. Hanford Rants.







DR. HANFORD RANTS 1923-2002

FORMER CIF-SS PRESIDENT PASSES AWAY

Dr. Hanford Rants, CIF-SS Council President from 1980 until his retirement one year later, passed away January 29, 2002 after a long battle with cancer. He was 78 years old.

Dr. Rants was born on May 16, 1923 in Ahtanum, Washington. Prior to earning bachelors and masters degrees in physical education from Washington State University and a Doctorate in Education from the University of Southern California, Dr. Rants served as a sergeant with the Army in the South Pacific during World War II, surviving four beach landings and earning Silver and Bronze Stars as well as a Purple Heart.

He began his teaching career in 1949 as a math and science instructor along with an assignment in coaching. He served as a public school administrator for nearly 30 years beginning at the junior high school level before moving on to Warren High School (seven years) as its principal. Dr. Rants then served nearly 12 years at Gahr High School before retiring from the public education profession in 1981. Upon his resignation from Gahr, Rants served as Principal at Brethren Christian High School

until that campus moved from Paramount to Cypress.

Dr. Rants served as Chairman of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) and was a member of that committee from 1973 until his retirement: he was also a State Executive Board Member and District President of the California Association of Secondary School Administrators (CASSA); President, Region 14 of the Association of California School Administrators (ACSA); Member of the High School Committee of the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP); league president, member and treasurer of the CIF-SS Executive Committee; and President of the CIF-SS Council from 1980 until September of 1981.

Rants was so beloved by his students at Gahr High School that, upon his retirement in 1981, nearly 2,200 students launched a drive against the ABC Unified School District to have the newly built stadium on the Gahr campus named after him.

Dr. Rants is survived by his wife of 57 years, Shirley; three sons (Jon, Jay and Jack); five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Board Decides in Close Vote to Name Stadium for Rants

A divided Board of Education voted Tuesday to name the ABC Unified School District's new stadium for Hanford Rants, who is resigning as principal of Gahr High School.

The 4-3 vote followed a long and emotional discussion by the board, which had asked for public participation in naming the stadium that is being built at Gahr High.


The board also began forming a committee to prepare the dedication of the stadium, due to be completed in May.

The vote to name the stadium for Rants seemed virtually assured two weeks ago when hundreds of Gahr students. teachers and parents demonstrated for the principal in a march to a Board of Education meeting where they presented a petition with about 800 signatures. Another 800 pro-Rants letters were sent to the board.

Two months earlier Rants, 56, announced to his faculty and staff that he would resign in June from the district that he called "a cold,

impersonal machine." In a blistering letter, he complained that his authority had been undermined by the board and administration.

Juan de Cordova, Homer Lewis and Wesley Backus voted against naming the stadium for Rants. In favor were board chairman Rodney Davis, Diane Xitco, Elizabeth Hutcheson and William Watt.


