The most important basketball tournament of the 1946 season was the Beverly Hills Tournament which served as a prelude to the CIF-SS Basketball Championship.

It was his steady stream of tip-in shots, plus his marvelous ball control under the baskets, that enabled the Saints to roll up a string of 26 consecutive triumphs, including the recent Beverly Hills tourney in which virtually all the top teams in the Southland were entered entered.

The guard slots are filled by Dayton Sayer, Whittier spark, and John Arndt, Loyola peewee. Sayer stands 6 feet 2 inches tall, while the Cub ace is a mere 5 feet 7 inches.

The Bay League championship and second place in the C.I.F. were two honors brought to Samohi by Coach George Tichenor's Varsity basketball team. The Big Blues won nine out of ten Bay League games, three out of four C.I.F. playoff games, and ten out of fifteen practice games for a total of twenty-one victories against seven losses.

The team composed of Gene Snyder at Center, Bruce Bearer and Jack Wight or John Vondette at forwards, Leamon Capps and Dick Parker at guards opened up the Bay League schedule by traveling to Inglewood to meet the Sentinals. They walked off the floor with a 32 to 22 victory. The Big Blues then bested the defending champions, the Redondo Seahawks, by a close 35 to 30 score. Beverly Hills handed the Vikes their only Bay League defeat by an embarrassing 33 to 17 score.

In the C.I.F. playoffs Samohi defeated Carpinteria 47 to 19 in the first round, Santa Barbara 29 to 21 in the quarter-finals, and El Monte 38 to 26 in the semi-finals, but dropped a close 30 to 25 decision to South Pasadena in the finals at Whittier College.

High point man for the year was Gene Snyder who was also chosen most valuable player as he bucketed 336 points. Bruce Bearer took the runner-up spot with 165 digits, while Captain Dick Parker was third with 121.
