Fifth Meeting

Dec. 10, 1921.

The Council of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation met in called meeting at the Y.M.C.A. Dec. 10, 1921 at 10 A.M.

Mr. Fonda was elected President Pro-tem.

The resignation of Mr. C. F. Martin of Pasadena High School as Basketball Manager was read.

(1) It was moved by H. J. Moore and seconded by Homer Martin that the resignation be accepted with regret. The motion was carried.

The Chair then called for nominations and H. J. Moore placed in nomination S. J. Evans of Hollywood High School.

(2) It was moved by Mr. Monroe and seconded by Mr. Martin that the nominations close. Carried.

(3) It was moved by Mr. Monroe and seconded by Mr. Fisher that the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot of the Council for Mr. Evans. Carried.

The ballot was so cast.

I. Mr. Squires of Huntington Park asked for a ruling on the following question—Can a man who had played on the unlimited team during the league season, play on the #130 team in the semi-finals and finals provided the semi-final and unlimited games are not played during the same week?

The Chair ruled that the man could so play.

II. Mr. Overon of the Basketball Officials Association came as a delegate from that association with the question- What is a Basketball Game? Suppose a game has started and the game must be called on account of rain, which team wins the game?

In football and baseball we have a limit. The team that is in the lead ten minutes after sunset wins in football and in baseball if five innings have been played.

How much of a game of basketball game must have been played for a "called game" to be considered a game?

(4) It was moved, seconded and carried that this question be referred to the leagues for action.

Question:-If a game must be called for "cause" how much must have been played in order to call it a game played and won?

III. Question was asked who was to appoint the officials for basketball league games?

Answer-This is left to each league but it was recommended by the Chair that each league call upon the Basketball Manager for officials.

IV. It was asked if paragraph 6 on page 12 under duties of Basketball Manager could not be changed.

(All championship basketball games are to be played on outdoor courts except by mutual agreement of both teams)

(5) After a very general discussion it was moved, seconded and carried that this matter be referred to the several leagues for consideration.

At this point word was received that Mr. Evans could not act as Basketball Manager.

(6) It was moved, seconded and carried that R. E. Squires of Huntington Park High School be elected Basketball Manager. The motion carried unanimously.

V. The Secretary reported that he had received a letter from a principal as follows:-referring to the minutes of Nov. 12, paragraph 5, page 3, we have a boy who will complete his eight semesters of high school attendance in Feb. 1922 and at the present time is on our basketball squad. Am I to understand that the (new) rule will make him eligible to complete his basketball until the end of the present season near the end of March?

Secretary's Answer:- If your boy ends eight semesters in February he cannot play after that date. Our rule was made to allow one-year people to finish their basketball as Seniors during the last semester.

The rule refers to four seasons and not to eight semesters. Your boy cannot play in March.

The Chair ruled that the Secretary's answer was correct.

VI. Secretary reported a letter, which had not been answered, asking this question:- We missed our engagement to ; referee was on hand and forfeited the game-who is to pay referi in this case?

Ruling- This is a matter for the league to act ur
In some leagues the school at "fault" pays the official.

Protest-from Coronado was then taken up-" the decision of the leagues was that referee's final decision was correct according to rules but decisions could not be revoked after leaving the field of play".

(7) It was moved by H. J. Moore and seconded by G. M. Green that any referee is acting within his rights when he reverses his decision regarding an explicit rule of the game and if the score is effected, the score may be declared changed. Motion carried.

The Coronado protest was then referred back to the Southern League and the Secretary instructed to return the ten dollars.

The Secretary was instructed to inform the several leagues that each league must inform the Council through the Manager that the league intends to enter the semi-finals before the schedule is drawn up or such league will not be allowed in after the schedule starts.

The minutes of the fourth meeting were approved as printed.

There being no further business, the Council adjourned.

The check for the percentage received by the Assistance League has already been forwarded to the American Red Cross, and gratefully acknowledged.

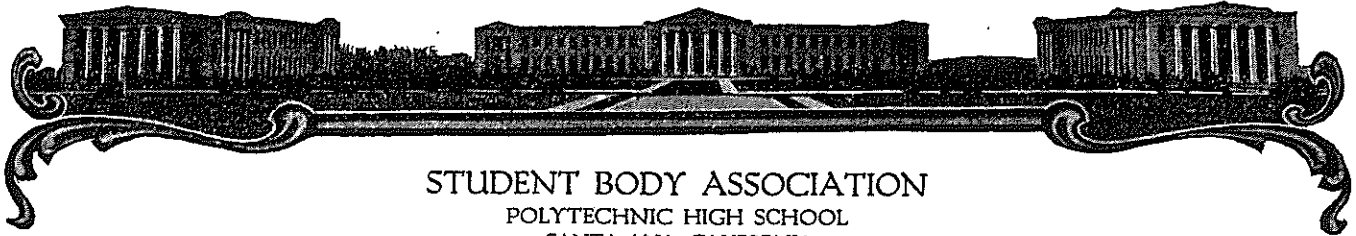
