COUNCIL OF INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION SOUTHERN SECTION

Second Meeting

Dec. 21, 1923.

The Council of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section met at the Y.M.C.A. in Los Angeles at 1:30 P.M. Dec. 21, 1923.

The minutes of Oct. 5, 1923, were read and approved.

The question of obtaining data for the "Four Point" system was discussed.

(1) It was moved by Blee and seconded by Smith that the present Four Point system for class teams be continued through-out the year, but classification of First Semester be used through-out the Basket Ball season.

Roll was called.

Yes-11, No-2.

Mr. Squires' then explained his plan for semi-finals in basket ball. (Plan sent out as part of Oct. 5th Minutes.)

(2) It was moved by Collins and seconded by O'Mara that the report of Manager Squire's relating to the basket ball semi-finals be adopted.

(2a) It was moved by Blee and seconded by Oliver, that the traveling expenses of teams coming to the tournament, be paid as heretofore, and the balance be divided as recommended by Manager.

The amendment and motion as amended, were carried.

(3) It was moved by Collins and seconded by Westcott that the C.I.F.S.S. follow the rules of basket ball as to eight minute quarters. Motion was carried.

(4) The matter of Officials for basket ball semi-finals and finals, was left in the hands of the Manager by rule of chair.

(5) Pasadena called the attention of the Council to irregularities in lists of San Diego. It was moved by Smith and seconded by Collins that as the Coast League has taken no action in regard to this matter, that the question be referred back to that league for action. Motion was carried.

(6) The question of San Diego's request by phone to play Phoenix, was taken up and it was the feeling of the Council, that here-after we would live up to the rule in reference to out of state games.

(7) The question of a team being given a bonus to play at a given town came up, and it was moved by Westcott and seconded by Collins and carried, that in every semi-final and final contest where the visiting team gets a definite guarantee of money, instead of a guarantee of expenses, the visiting team shall make returns of its expenses, and in case it has a balance left after payment of expenses, such school shall turn over 20% of balance to the C.I.F.S.

(8) It was agreed that the same regulations hold for track as were enforce last year, and that all details be left to the Manager Mr. Van Patton.

(9) It was agreed that Mr. Van Patton be authorized, to arrange place of preliminaries and track meet on April 26th.

(10) It was moved, seconded, and carried (Smith-Collins) that the four point exponent system, be not applied to the track or baseball.

(11) A request was made, that if possible a few events for 100 lb. men be included in the track meet.

It was moved by Green seconded by Omara that the chair appoint a committee consisting of two members of the Council, two Coaches and the track manager to consider the advisability of events for 100 lb. men. Carried.

(12) It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Owen that all private schools, which place in the San Fernando meet, be allowed to enter place men in the So. California track meet.

It being understood that the private schools, must abide by all the rules of the C. I. F. the same as public schools. Carried.

(13) It was agreed, that it was the duty of the home team to provide proper conditions for play.

It was agreed that the coach had no right to with-draw team from the field, that such action was in the hands of the Principal of the school.

(14) Chair ruled, that Fullerton should send back the 1917 baseball plaque to San Diego and Fullerton be given an order for a plaque for 1918 baseball.

(15) Manager Hall of Tennis made the following report:

(15) It was moved by Smith and seconded by Wadsworth, that managers report be accepted and the deficit ordered paid. Carried.

(16) It was moved by Smith and seconded by Wadsworth, that the entrance fee in tennis and the place of holding the tournament, be left with Mr. Hall with power to act. Carried.

(17) Mr. Oliver reported, correspondence which he had with Mr. Thacher, in reference to the Ojai Tennis Tournament. His position was sustained in view of the fact that our meet in no way conflicts with the meet held at Ojai. It was agreed that the Secretary write to Mr. Thacher and explain that we had no objection to the Ojai meet, but that we request that their meet be called an "Invitational Meet."

(18) Question-"Boy was in school a semester but received no grades."

Answer- One semester must be counted.

(19) Protest was received from El Centro.

It was moved by Westcott and seconded by Owen, that we uphold the decision of the referee as a matter of policy in supporting officials and that we return the protest fee. Carried.

(20) The Secretary called the attention of the Council to correspondence with Howard of Bishop. The question was tabled until next meeting.

(21) The Secretary called attention to the correspondence in case of Huntington Park vs Fresno. Chair ruled that the matter be referred to the State Council.

There being no further business the Council adjourned.

To the Members of the So. Council of the C. I. F. :

In connection with my annual football report, I wish to call your attention to the following facts in reference to the past football season:

During the months of October, November and December I appointed officials for 162 football games over a district extending from San Diego on the south to Taft and Santa Maria on the north. Besides this, there were about thirty games played in the Citrus, Imperial, Ventura, Santa Barbara and So. Leagues for which I did not appoint officials.

In order to secure officials for these 162 games, it was necessary to interview 514 men during the season. Of these, 122 declined to act for one reason or another and of these 392 appointments were accepted.

At the height of the season it was necessary for me to interview 98 men in order to secure 66 officials necessary for that week.

The work of the season required 52 long distance telephone calls from my office as well as the many calls that came in from the outside.

Not only were officials appointed for high school games but requests were received from several of the junior colleges and from some of the college freshmen teams. In general I feel that the season has been a very successful one and that the officiating has been up to standard. Next year it is hoped to develop a different system for grading officials which will insure a still better type of officiating.

As to the financial result of this season, the 20% of the C. I. F. less the expenses amounted to ~~\$1825.38~~ 1902.00 which is about \$500. larger than any previous year. 600



It was agreed that the Principals who are members of this body hold a meeting during the Principals' Convention and report back recommendations.

It was moved by Collins and seconded by Oliver and carried that:

A. We request all athletes to appear in clean track suits at the So. Cal. Meet.

B. That in case a man slows down to allow a team mate to tie with him in an event, that only one be given the first place medal.

My dear Mr. Green:

It has just come to my attention that there is a mistake on our last eligibility list. It is the case of a boy transferred to our school from Arizona in '21. Since that time he has been in and out of school frequently. I checked his record this morning and find that he has been in high school more than eight semesters. This means that we played him in the meet with San Bernardino and also in the A.A.U. Relay Carnival of last Saturday when he was ineligible. We are calling this matter to your attention promptly. We are very anxious to obey all the rules and are very willing to abide by any action that may be taken by the C.I.F.

(12) It was ordered that in all events in which ineligibles participate such be forfeited to the teams next below and all cups or medals won by their aid must go to the team next below.

(13) It was moved by Moore and seconded by Oliver and carried that a letter of commendation be sent to Lincoln High School congratulating them on the fine spirit of sportsmanship shown by them in regard to the ineligible men on the track team.

(14) It was moved by Oliver and seconded by Moore that Redlands forfeit only the event or events in which the ineligible boy competed in the meets.

(15) It was moved by Collins and seconded by Oliver that the good sportsmanship of the boys of Lincoln High School in voluntarily reporting two cases of ineligibility in Orange Relay Carnival Feb. 16 and the A.A.U. Relay Carnival Feb. 23 and voluntarily forfeiting points and awards won be commended most heartily and no further penalty be inflicted by the Council.

(16) San Diego was granted permission to play Phoenix Football next fall.

(17) Manager Squires made a partial Basket Ball Report.

(18) It was agreed that the Secretary have printed special blanks for class "B" and "C" teams which will show age, weight, height, and grade.

There being no further business the council adjourned.
