

# MINUTES OF 1924-25 ANNUAL MEETING SECOND MEETING, DECEMBER 18, 1924

The Council of the Southern Section of the California Inter-scholastic Federation met in room 508 of the Y. M. C. A., Los Angeles, at 1:30 P. M., December 18, 1924.  
President James A. Westcott in the chair asked for a roll call.

Kinder Hamilton, Coach Walker and Principal Henderson, were also present.

The minutes of October 4, 1924, were approved as printed.  
1 It was moved, seconded and carried that Rule 25, page 10, be made to read "Pupils in Junior High Schools cannot represent a Senior High School in any contest."

Rule 36 on page 11 was amended by omitting the word "except."

Rule 37 on page 11 was amended by changing "or" to "and" and by adding the words: "The second game shall be forfeited if rule is violated."

2 It was moved by Smith and seconded by Barnes that we substitute the following rule in place of Rule 37: "No pupil who represents his school on an unlimited team may later during the season of that sport represent his school on a class team." After a very general discussion the matter was tabled.

3 It was moved by Blee and seconded by Moore that a week is the time from Sunday to Sunday. Motion was carried.

4 Rule 9 on page 13 was changed to read as follows: "Each school playing other than class A teams must file with the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S., the four point data, on blanks supplied by the Secretary, of all pupils participating in athletics below Class A, and this report must be made each semester before the first league game in each sport. Schools not filling exponents as above will not be scheduled in any semi-final game."

5 Rule 7 on page 16 was accepted by motion of Monroe and Malcom.

6 On motion of Moore and Collins, the following was added to Rule 7: "To decide who shall be the home team with choice of grounds in subsequent rounds, the team having had the fewer number of home games or choice of grounds shall be the home team. Where both teams have had an equal number of home games, the toss of a coin shall decide the home team. In case of a tie game the game shall be replayed and the team which did not have choice in the first game shall have the choice in the second game. Tie games will be played off in time for the winner to compete in the next round of the semifinals at the option of the manager."

The Secretary then made a report on the San Diego correspondence.

7 It was moved by Monroe and seconded by Malcom that a letter be written to the Principal of the San Diego High School stating that because of continued violation of the rules of the C. I. F., and delays in making reports in the future the C. I. F., and its managers will deal only with faculty representative. It was also agreed that the President request the Principal of San Diego High School to meet with us at our next meeting at the expense of the Council.

The Secretary was then requested to proceed with the printing of the Constitution and Rulings as shown in the corrected proof.

Reports of the Swimming Manager, Track Manager, and Baseball Manager were then read and ordered printed as part of the minutes.

Dear Mr. Green:

If possible I wish you would give me a ruling on the following case:

A boy moved to the Imperial Valley from Arizona. His folks moved with him. He went to one of the Valley schools all last year and played baseball. This fall he went back to Arizona to school though his folks still lived here. On October 20 he entered the same school in the Imperial Valley again and played football.

Is he eligible to play?

I do not want an official ruling but just your opinion.

The Secretary had ruled that the boy was ineligible because he had changed schools without a change of residence of his parents. The Council reversed the decision of the Secretary on the grounds that this was the special case where the boy had left our jurisdiction by moving into another state.

It was agreed that we should adjourn to meet at the call of the President some time in February.

The recommendations of the Track Committee which are printed in full were then taken up.

It was moved, seconded, and carried, that No. 3, the 50-yard race be not approved; that No. 6, the metric measures be not approved; that No. 7, the 9th grade meet, be referred back and that a committee consisting of Blee, Oliver, Moore, Routt, and Green, meet with the committee with full power to act, that all other recommendations be accepted.

Report of Track Committee.

Minutes of meeting of C. I. F. Track Committees, November 7, 1924, at Mr. Davis' office.

All discussions were informal and all recommendations were unanimously agreed upon.

Agreed to recommend to the C. I. F. as follows:

- 1 That two shot-put rings be provided in all big meets.
- 2 Two pole vault pits recommended.
- 3 The 50-yard race be added to big meet.
- 4 Officials to leave field when work finished.
- 5 Metric measures be introduced.
- 6 "Class C Meet" on a day other than big meet and at another place.
- 7 A 9th Grade Meet to be held one week after state meet.

(a) Events to be:

- 50-meter race
- 100-meter race
- 200-meter race
- 300-meter race
- 600-meter race
- 1000-meter race
- High hurdles 7 flights
- Low hurdles 7 flights
- 12-lb. Shot
- Discus (regulation)
- High jump
- Pole vault
- 4-man 400-meter relay
- Broad jump

(b) To compete in 9th grade meet boy must have entered the 9th grade during the present school year.

(c) Boy only allowed one track and one field event in addition to the relay.

8 Mr. Monroe of Owensmouth requested to furnish each member with a statement of the San Fernando League plan of "Every Student in Competition."

9 Adjourned to meet in Mr. Davis' office, Friday, December 5, 1924, at 2:45 P. M.

## C. I. F. EXTENDED CONTEST OPEN TO ALL SCHOOLS OF ALL LEAGUES

Because so few of our students have opportunity for physical activity containing the spirit of contest, and because of the splendid results obtained through the incentive of rivalry in some sections where a large number or all of the students take part, as in the San Fernando League, your committee is of the opinion that the C. I. F. should give encouragement to this movement in all the leagues, since the real purpose of the C. I. F., is to direct the physical activities of the schools that the largest number of students possible may be benefitted.

To this end we propose that a beginning be made this year, with the purpose of extending the system another year if the plan meets with general favor. Activities for the girls could be included as in the San Fernando League, and it seems that the C. I. F. could give consideration to the girls' development since it could so easily be recognized in a scheme of this sort.

For this year we recommend just one contest to be held on the grounds of each school, and that the records of ten percent of the boys enrolled in the school shall be submitted in competition, but the records making up the ten percent must be those of boys eligible according to C. I. F. rules.

The following events compose the contest:

- 1 100-yard Shuttle relay
- 2 Shot-put, 8-pound shot
- 3 High Jump
- 4 Broad Jump
- 5 120-yard Low hurdles

#### RULES OF THE CONTEST

1 The contest must be held at each school some time during the month of April before the Southern California Meet. The contest may be held during regular gym periods, but each school must designate a specific time for the contest of each group of boys, and the best record, according to the rules, at this time shall be recorded as the official record of each boy contesting.

2 Each school shall send to the Secretary of its League not later than May 8, a list of the names of the contestants on blanks furnished by the C. I. F. Said blanks are to contain the usual eligibility requirements and in addition, the necessary columns for recording the records shall be certified by the principals as usual.

3 Not later than May 15, the Secretary of each League shall send to the Secretary of the C. I. F., and to each school of his own League, a summary of the record of all schools of the League. For the purpose of conformity, a common form shall be provided by the C. I. F. for summary records.

4 The Secretary of the C. I. F. shall make up a similar report of each League, and send it to the schools in the usual manner.

#### METHOD OF CONDUCTING THE CONTEST

1 Members of the faculty or qualified persons outside of the school shall be selected to assist the directors of physical education in taking all measurements and conducting the contest.

2 The best record out of three trials shall be the record of the contestant in the high jump, broad jump and shot put.

3 The 120-yard low hurdle race shall consist of five flights 20 yards between hurdles. One or two may run at a time according to the school.

4 The shuttle relay race shall be conducted in the usual way, but the timing in all races shall be done by experienced persons satisfactory to League officials.

Each League may at its discretion appoint qualified persons to take the time of the low hurdle and shuttle relay races in all the schools of the League. In this case a schedule should be prepared fixing the time of holding the contest in each school.

5 The records of all students participating in any event are to be added and the sum divided by the number participating. The division should be carried to three places.

6 The school having the highest record in an event shall receive five points, the next four and so on down to one point.

7 The school receiving the highest total number of points for all events shall be declared the winner.

#### TROPHIES

A large perpetual trophy, a permanent plaque, is recommended for the school having the best record, trophy to be awarded each year with appropriate ceremonies.

For the school making the best record in each event, a small plaque is recommended.

#### REPORT OF SWIMMING MANAGER

To the Council of C. I. F., S. S.

Your manager of Water Polo and Swimming submits the report of the season of 1923-24.

Venice High School won the Water Polo Championship defeating all other members of the League. Los Angeles High School was second losing one game to Venice. Long Beach and Hollywood were tied for third losing two games each to Los Angeles and Venice and cancelling their own game.

Your manager is making an effort to get water polo into several schools that have recently built swimming tanks.

Venice High School won the 1924 Swimming and Diving Championships conducted in the plunge of the University of California in Los Angeles on Friday and Saturday, May 16 and

17, with a score of 45 1-2 points; San Diego placed second with 19 1-2 points; Hollywood third with 18 and Pasadena High School fourth with 14. The Manager wishes to call attention to the officials who acted without pay in this meet, particularly thanking Mr. Al Dowden for his excellent work as referee and starter. Copies of the accompanying program and score sheet are being sent to the National A. A. U. Officials and copies have already been given to the editor of the Spalding Swimming Guide so that we may get national recognition for the excellent work of our Southern California boy swimmers.

Your manager is doing all in his power to induce the various Leagues to hold League Championship Meets in order to qualify boys for entry into the Southern California Meet and thus eliminate in a measure the strain upon high class competition that ensues from having to swim so many heats.
