## RELEAGUING COMMITTEE MEETS

The releaguing committee appointed by the President of the Council, Mr. Ed Laurenson, met at the El Monte High School Thursday, November 17, at 2:00 P. M. Those present were:

Prior to the meeting the committee members had talked personally, or by phone to many Principals and Directors of Athletics. They came to the meeting with a good cross section of opinion from schools of the area they represented.

They had given careful consideration to the immediate needs of the schools so far as releaguing is concerned. They had also tried to anticipate future developments, and had tried to visualize the situation as it will be two, three, or five years from now.

It was very evident that they had taken seriously their assignment to the committee work.

The committee was well aware that all the schools of the C. I. F., Southern Section would not be happy about their league assignment. The committee was also well aware that one hundred per cent acceptance of its report was not to be expected.

The C. I. F., So. Section has always followed the policy of assigning every member school to a league unless there are circumstances that make it unwise or impossible. The committee assumed that it was expected to find a league berth for every school so far as practical and possible.

It was agreed that the twenty schools in San Diego County be asked to organize themselves into three leagues and report their action to the Council on December 10.

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The league setup given on Page 3 was agreed to unanimously as a recommendation to our Council for the school year 1950-1951.

# COURT RULES DIMERJIAN ELIGIBLE

The Dimerjian case at Muir College has been discussed in sports and school circles. We think this is the first time in So. Calif. that the courts have attempted to tell the schoolmen how to handle their program of athletics.

We believe that athletics in our high schools and colleges is quite as much an educational problem as algebra and English. We can hardly conceive of the courts stepping in and telling the schools how to control their algebra classes.

If the courts can direct as to our residence rules they can with equal propriety dictate the age limit and the scholastic standing of boys who compete.

Judge Thurmond Clark who handed down the decision is a former high school track star. He won the quarter mile for Los Angeles High School in the State Meet at Bakersfield in 1920. With his background of athletics he should know the problems faced by the schools in trying to keep our athletic program properly adjusted.

We believe it behooves the schools and the C. I. F. to follow this case carefully and be sure our interests are properly safeguarded.

# FOOTBALL A GREAT SHOW

The game of football has in the last fifteen or twenty years developed into a great show and entertainment. To a lot of our business and professional men as well as laborers and farmers the night football game has become a recreation period for the week.

When the school bands and marching units began making use of the intermission at half time to put on a show the football game became more popular. Parents of the band members, and of the girls in the marching units came to the game in even larger numbers. The football show became the event of the week in many towns. More money was taken in at the gate. Better equipment was bought for the boys. The show as a whole improved from year to year.

One of the controls that has proved very helpful for the past three of four years is the use of the handkerchief to signal violation of the rules of the game. We have heard some of our best officials say that they thought the use of the handkerchief in signaling a violation of the

rules was one of the finest aids to officiating that has been brought out in the past ten years.

We have no idea whose brain child the handkerchief act is. We are sure however that it has made football a better show. The spectator

We said a year ago that putting the boys on the chain and the one on the box in uniform would make the game more interesting to the fans. We have observed a game or two each week of the season which will soon close. We are certain that a distinctive uniform on the fellows handling the chain and box would help the patrons of the game to follow the progress of the contest more intelligently. We are so certain that a proper uniform on the fellows on the chain and the box will make the game a better show that we are going to offer an amendment to the C. I. F., So. Section making it mandatory that such a uniform be worn.

While putting the man with the box in uniform why not give him a box that can be read from any direction? There is such an apparatus on the market. Made of aluminum it is light weight and durable. The initial expense may seem large, but once gotten it is good for years.

We feel certain that uniforms for the men on the chain and box and the latest in the way of an aluminum box will have a worth while spectator appeal.

# THREE IMPORTANT FUNDAMENTALS

If the high school athlete and the high school coach knows that proper thought and proper planning has been given to arranging an athletic program they are pretty certain to train hard and give their all in the contest.

If the boys and the coaches know that field and equipment are sure to be in good shape they will train for the meet or the game, and make the event a worth while accomplishment.

If the official for the game or the event is well schooled the boy and the coach know it will be worth while to train hard as they will not be robbed of their win by poor officiating.

Good planning, good equipment, and good officiating has played a large part in keeping the high school athletes of Southern California up among the leaders.
