

RITCHERSON DEFENDS CROSS COUNTRY TITLE; MIRA COSTA WINS "AAA" TEAM HONORS



SALESIAN'S FRED RITCHERSON ... Repeats Cross Country Win

Salesian's Fred Ritcherson, leading from start to finish, successfully detended his individual CIF, SS, cross country crown, and Mira Costa took up honors in the "AAA" division, to highlight the 1968 CIF, SS, Cross Country Championships at Long Beach State College.

Ritcherson, running in the "AA" division, outdistanced the rest of the seld by more than 50 yards to win his use in 9:31.0, top time of the day and new Cal State, Long Beach, course second over the 2.0-mile hill course.

Mira Costa, despite not having a sunner among the top five finishers in the "AAA" classification, scored 77 counts to walk off with top team honom. Crescenta Valley was second, with the top five.

Ruben Chappins of Excelsior, deinding CIF, SS, two-mile track chamon, won the "AAA" race in 9:38, folwed by Tom Keefer of Anaheim in

In the "AA" team race, Upland faced two men in the top five and that on to score 63 points to win honors over El Modena, which stored 77 points.

Angus Gordon of Upland was third, the teammate Robert Sos in fifth. Second-place "AA" finisher was Ron Gomez of Duarte, and John Gregario of Ganesha rounded out the top five in fourth place.

On the "A" level, Rio Mesa, St. Bernard and Crespi made the team race an exciting one as Rio Mesa and St. Bernard tied for first with 96 points and Crespi barely missed a three-way tie with 104 points.

Chuck Smead of Santa Paula won top individual honors in 9:45, followed by Garry Maddox of Workman in 9:52.

California Coaches Honor Commissioner Ken Fagans

Saluting his years of service in Southland athletics as a player, coach, official and Commissioner of Athletics of the CIF, SS, the California Coaches Association presented Commissioner Ken Fagans with its Hall of Fame Award at its all-sports clinic November 30 at the Disneyland Hotel.

Lawrence E. Houston, Administrator of Physical and Health Education for the Los Angeles Unified School District, presented the award to Fagans and Estel Johnson, longtime Jefferson High School (Los Angeles) track coach.

Criteria for the awards, which were the first presented by the CCA to Southern California coaches, included a minimum 25 years of service in athletics, outstanding contributions to coaching and/or California athletics, a dedication to the athletes in the sport coached, and adherence to the CCA Code of Ethics.

In making the award, Houston cited Fagans' outstanding coaching career at Compton High School, where he compiled a CIF, SS, record of 53 consecutive basketball victories from 1950 to 1953. Houston also praised Fagans for his more than a decade of service to the CIF, Southern Section, and for his outstanding leadership as its Commissioner.

The awards were presented at the CCA afternoon session on November 30 to highlight the first day of a two-day all-sports clinic, which featured top-notch coaches from high school, junior college and college ranks.

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

Too Many Rules Violations Reaching CIF, SS, Office

At the beginning of each school year, when supplies are delivered to member schools from the CIF, SS, coaches and administrators are admonished to read the current Blue Book thoroughly, in order to become familiar with any rule changes or new regulations governing the athletic program.

However, we continue to get reports of rule infractions by member schools, and these reports are all too frequent.

In an effort to eliminate some of these infractions, we prepared an examination on the CIF, SS, Blue Book and provided copies of the test to all member schools.

In the letter which accompanied the tests, we asked each principal to administer these tests, in either open or closed-book form, to those members of their staff who were involved in the administration of the athletic program.

We had hoped that this would eliminate many of the infractions of "minor" rules governing practice or eligibility. However, we are still getting reports of violations.

Although these violations may be considered "minor" by many, Article XIX, Section 1, of the Blue Book makes no discrimination as regards penalties for violations.

Basketball Coaches Looking For Merit Award Honorees

The Southern California Basketball Coaches Asociation is looking for qualified honorees for its coaches' Merit Award, which is traditionally presented at the CIF, SS Basketball Championships in March.

Ed Weisehan of Lutheran HS, chairman of the Merit Award committee, is soliciting the aid of CIF, SS, principals and administrative personnel in finding former basketball coaches who meet criteria for the award.

Persons to be considered for the award must (1) be retired from coaching the sport of basketball, (2) have served approximately 15 years as a coach, and (3) have coached, for the most part, in Southern California.

Weisehan noted that persons nominated for the award need not particularly be a former high school coach, but could be a former junior college or college cage coach.

Nominations for the SCIBCA Merit Award should be made in the form of a letter and should be forwarded to Weisehan at Lutheran High School, 2941 West 70th Street, Los Angeles 90043.

According to Article XIX, "any school knowingly or unknowingly violating the rule may be suspended from membership in the CIF, Southern Section."

Ignorance of rules is no excuse for violations. Each school receives an adequate number of Blue Books, and additional books may be obtained from the CIF, SS, office. In addition, if the new Blue Book test is administered properly, coaches at least become aware of many of the regulations in the Blue Book which are most-often violated.

Any athletic program, in order to be successful, must have rules and regulations, and these rules must be strictly adhered to. Coaches should read and understand all sections of the Blue Book, not just those dealing with their particular sport.

If these violations are to be eliminated, each coach, athletic director and principal, and anyone else who is in contact with the administration of the athletic program, must know the Blue Book. In that way, if a question regarding rules arises, there will be several people on hand to answer the question, and answer it accurately.

DUTIES OF A HOST

The impression your visitors will get of your school depends upon you, the student body.

As the student body of the home school, you have very definite responsibilities as a host. You must constant ly strive to perform these duties.

- 1. Make your guests, including the visiting team and officials, feel at home and wish to return.
- 2. Conduct yourselves in such a manner that your visitors will not feel as though they have been treated unfairly or dealt with in an unsportsmanlike way.
- 3. Remember that your team plays at least half its games away from home. You must extend every courtesy to your visitors that you want your team to receive when it is away.
- 4. The officials assigned to your games are of high standing in their community and give of their time to help the game of basketball grow. Yes, it is true they receive a fee for their services, but people of their character will not subject themselves to ill treatment for the sake of a fee. Respect their opinion and judgment and realize they have a difficult job to perform.
- 5. Your visiting opponents have been well coached and have practiced hard. Their efforts will reflect their coaching and practice and their success in not luck nor a gift of the official. Their skills should be appreciated and applauded. Recognize their ability and give credit where credit is due.
- 6. Booing is a sign of a poor sport Direct your energy to encouragement of your team rather than boo your opponents and officials.

All too often, administrators funish inaccurate information regarding eligibility or practice regulations, supply because they have not read to Blue Book thoroughly, and are operating from bits of information gleaner from past experience.

If administrators are in doubt about a particular section of the Blue Book they should call the CIF, SS, offer before a problem arises.

We hope that added precautions the part of all athletic administration personnel will eliminate the unfortunate reports we have been receiving.

The November meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman steve Miletich at 1:45 p.m. on Friday, November 22, at the CIF, SS, office.

- 1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of September 21, 1968, as published in the October Monthly Bulletin.
- 2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the following schools be admitted to membership in the CIF, SS; Edison HS of Huntington Beach and St. Michael's Prep of Orange as regular members, and Hoover Jr. HS of Lakewood as an associate member, effective mediately.
- FOOTBALL ASSIGNING POL-CIES-The Commissioner brought to be attention of the committee a probm which existed during the recentlyancluded football season involving shools which assigned their own ofscals for games with schools from the Angeles City Section of the CIF. He noted that the problem arose besuse of confusion surrounding assignment policies as delineated in the Blue sok. After some discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to recamend to the Council that it be made andatory that CIF Area Commisoners assign all varsity football ames, practice and league, played by tember schools.
- JUNIOR HIGH FOOTBALL AYING TIME—The problem of length of quarters in junior high the door football games was discussed the committee. It was noted that the was nothing in the current Blue which set down a specific time for junior high football games, that problems had arisen because different policies by different junior high leagues. After some discussions

sion, it was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that the By-Laws be amended to establish a 10-minute maximum playing time per quarter for ninth-grade junior high school football games.

- 5. ARROYO GRANDE HS AP-PEAL-The Commissioner read a letter from Arroyo Grande HS, in which the school explained that a problem with eligibility of ninth-grade students had arisen since the ninth grade was on a separate campus, under a separate principal, but was still considered part of the senior high school. After some discussion of the case, in which it was noted that the State Federated Council had ruled that students under a separate principal on a separate campus would not be eligible at the senior high school, it was moved, seconded and carried to deny Arroyo Grande's request for a waiver of Blue Book rules to allow its ninth graders to participate on its athletic teams.
- 6. NIGHT CONTESTS IN COMP-TON-A protest was received by the committee from Santa Ana HS, relative to its football game with Compton HS on September 27 at Ramsaur Stadium in Compton. The protest concerned acts of unsportsmanlike conduct and attacks on Santa Ana buses by persons not identified with Compton HS. The Commissioner reported that due to this and similar cases of unruly conduct in the Compton community, the Superintendent and Board of Trustees of the Compton High School District had adopted a policy affecting the three district high schools that there would be no further night athletic contests for the balance of the school year. The committee expressed the hope that this action would help eliminate further protests of this na-
- 7. PALO VERDE HS PROBLEM— The Commissioner reported that Palo Verde Valley HS, of Blythe, had written to report that, due to the loss of a tax override election and because of financial difficulty within the school district, it is suspending all interscholastic athletic activity indefinitely, beginning in September, 1969. This creates a problem for the remaining three schools in the Imperial Valley League, and the case was referred to Alex Alexander, releaguing committee representative for the area, and he was directed to work with the remaining schools in the league to ease the scheduling problem created by the action by Palo Verde Valley HS.

- 8. CAA WORKING RELATIONS—It was reported to the committee that the Catholic Athletic Association, in an attempt to more-rapidly deal with problems concerning parochial schools in the Southern Section, had appointed Brother Ward of the Archdiocese office in Los Angeles as Administrative Secretary of the CAA. The committee went on record as commending the CAA for its assistance in the past, and for this action which is certain to further the outstanding athletic program in parochial schools in the Southern Section.
- 9. ELIGIBILITY CASES-In accordance with Article XI, and its applicable sections in the current Blue Book, the residence rule was waived to grant immediate eligibility to Rick Fueher at Garden Grove HS, Randy Burdette at Rancho Alamitos HS, Jerry Morrison at Trona HS, Gary Mc-Connell at Rubidoux HS, Jack Winkler at Crescenta Valley HS, John Barnes at Simi Valley HS, Michael Lopez at Claremont HS, Jesse Swafford at Oxnard HS, Thomas Smith at Fillmore HS, Steven Redmond at La Habra HS, Nathan Garner at Mira Costa HS, Natividad Ramirez at La Puente Wilson HS, and Donald Brown at Kern Valley HS.

In accordance with Article X, Section 5, of the Blue Book, the previous semester rule was waived to grant immediate eligibility to William Marshall at Bolsa Grande HS.

In accordance with Article IX, Section 2, of the Blue Book, immediate eligibility was granted to Richard Davis and Shawn Smith of Harvard School.

After reviewing the facts of the case, it was moved, seconded and carried to deny a waiver of the residence rule in the case of Danny Attias at Beverly Hills HS, and to deny a waiver of the previous semester rule in the case of Walter Briggs, Jr., at Beverly Hills HS.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:45 p.m.
