

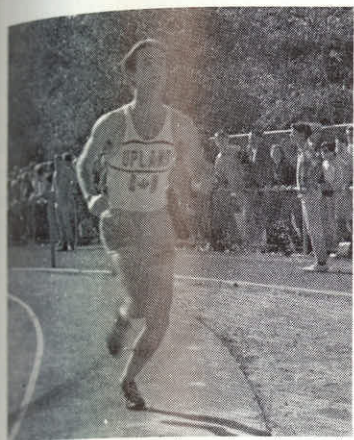

## CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONS CROWNED

Mira Costa, 1968 CIF, SS, Three-A cross country champion, retained its title last month, and San Marino made shambles of One-A ranks as it easily captured its fourth crown since 1964. Lompoc nipped determined El Modena for the Two-A championship over the two-mile Cal State Long Beach course.

Mira Costa scored 41 points in retaining its title, but it was hard pressed by Upland, which took second place with 49. Third went to South Tor-

rance, 69, and 129 by Westminster took fourth. Arroyo managed fifth at 151.

Angus Gordon paved the way individually as he scampered over the demanding Forty Niner course in 9:28.6. Poly's Jim Chaffin captured runner-up at 9:30, with Ron Johnson of West Torrance and 'Costa's Bruce Johnson waging a spirited battle for third and fourth. They finished at 9:34 and 9:35, respectively. Don Diston, Westminster,

was fifth in 9:41.

San Marino placed five runners in the top 13, but St. Bernard's Chris Hoffman netted first place individually with a 9:40 effort. The Titans were credited with 25 points, one of the lowest championship scores in CIF, SS, history, and the Vikings were a distant 114 behind. La Canada tallied 122 points for third, and Crespi was awarded fourth at 125. Aviation's 138 points were enough for fifth.

Trailing Hoffman was Bishop Montgomery's Louis Patterson, 9:45, and San Marino's Dick Mapel, Todd Yorke and Jim Lochhead were third through fifth. Their clockings were 9:46, 9:49 and 9:51, in that order.

Lompoc scored an upset in Two-A circles. The Braves posted 71 points to shave El Modena, which registered 77, for the crown. Palos Verdes kept the heat on the Vanguardians and finished one point back at 78. San Clemente magged fourth, 88, and fifth went to Salesian, 99.

El Modena's Dave White took personal honors by negotiating the course in 9:33.1. Mark Hildenbrand of Lompoc was next, 9:40, and third went to Mike Wooley, also of the Vanguardians, 9:44. Bryan MacPherson of Palos Verdes and Lompoc's Tom Williams grasped fourth and fifth in 9:49 and 9:51, respectively.

## BASEBALL COACHING CLINIC SET JANUARY 31 FOR L. B. C. C.

Speakers representing the Los Angeles Dodgers will join college coaches on the program of the Ninth Annual Baseball Coaches' Clinic. The workshop is sponsored by the Long Beach Unified School District.

The popular clinic, which last year attracted 347 guests despite rainy weather, is to be held Jan. 31 at Long Beach City College in the Men's Gymnasium. It runs all day.

Not only are all baseball coaches invited to the free affair, but varsity age players are also encouraged to attend. Paul Deese, who guided his 1968 Chapman College squad to the N.C.A.A. college division baseball

championship, and Ben Hines, La Verne head coach, are slated to speak. Hines' Leopards finished second in the college level nationals last season.

Dodger trainer Bill Buhler, a regular at the clinic, will again be on hand to assist with training problems. Buhler is recognized as a leading authority on training procedures.

Over 20 sporting goods firms have expressed intentions of installing displays at the clinic.

Coaches come from as far north as San Francisco, and visitors from Arizona and Nevada are not uncommon. Local amateur baseball coaches are also welcome.

## MINUTES OF CIF, SS, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING NOVEMBER 19, 1969

The November meeting of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich, at 1:30 P.M. on Wednesday, November 19, at the CIF, Southern Section office. The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, Vice Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Keith J. Lee, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Keith Gunn, Principal, Victor Valley High School; Claud Hardesty, Principal, Santa Barbara High School; Msgr. Thomas Kiefer, Principal, Bishop Amat High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Alex Alexander, Assistant Superintendent, Desert Sands Unified; Dr. Russ Reynolds, Principal, Big Bear High School; Commissioner of Athletics J. Kenneth Fagans, and Lou Joseph, Administrative Assistant. Hank Balke, Assistant Principal, Colton High School and Ivy League Representative, was a guest.

**1. APPROVED MINUTES**—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings of September 18 and September 27 as published in the October, 1969 bulletin.

### 2. RELEAGUING—

a. Correspondence was received from Santa Ynez Principal, Mr. Manuel Silva, protesting the actions of the Southern Section Council in placing Santa Ynez High School in the San Luis League for the 1970-71 school year. Since the matter of relegating is closed for the 1970-71 school year, it was moved, seconded and carried that the Executive Committee has no authority to act on this request but that it would be referred to the Council at its next meeting for consideration.

b. Communication from Mr. Art North, Assistant Superintendent, Santa Barbara High School District, indicated his district felt that the placing of San Marcos and Dos Pueblos in the Santa Barbara County League had caused additional financial expense to the district. San Marcos and Dos Pueblos then applied for admission to the Channel League but were not accepted. It was moved, seconded and carried that action on this request was not in the realm of the Executive Committee authority and would be referred to the Southern Section Council for consideration at its next meeting.

**3. RELEAGUING FORMAT FOR 1971-72**—Acting under the Southern Section Council's mandate to study and develop a new relegating format, it was decided that a joint meeting in February of the Releaguings Committee and Executive Committee be held to determine guidelines that should be followed for relegating purposes.

**4. GIRL'S SWIMMING MEET**—There has been an increasing amount of interest in Girls' Athletics. In order to determine the sentiments of Principals, the Executive Committee directed the Commissioner to prepare a survey. Commissioner Fagans reported on the girls' swimming survey. The following were the results:

- (1) Do you believe there should be a girls' interscholastic athletic program?  
Yes—114 No—31
- (2) Does your school have any type of girls' interscholastic athletic program?  
Yes—110 No—35
- (3) Are girls in your school now competing in sports programs outside of school jurisdiction?  
Yes—68 No—74
- (4) Would you support a girls' championship swim meet under the jurisdiction of the CIF, Southern Section?  
Yes—64 No—65

It was moved, seconded and carried to establish a committee to discuss and determine rules, sites, and dates to hold a girls' swimming meet in May or June 1970. It was suggested that women physical education instructors be invited to be on the committee to assist in formulating plans.

**5. PLAY-OFF COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS**—Due to the number of questions and problems which have arisen during play-offs, a special play-off committee was appointed to study the problems involved and make recommendations to the Executive Committee. The Committee was composed of: Reverend Alexander Manville, Principal, Bishop Garcia Diego High School; Dr. Paul Berger, Principal, Fountain Valley High School; Milt Sager, Principal, Long Beach Wilson High School; Carl Fischer, Principal, Mira Costa High School; Charles Clustka, Harvard

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## JUSTIFICATION FOR SPORTS

Note: This article was written by Arnold Kaech, Director, Swiss School of Sport and Gymnastic, Maastricht.

Why do we try, so often and so hard, to find a justification for sport?

Sports as a means for improving health? As if the agonized strain of the runner at the tape, the skier's mad rush past crags and trees, or the battered face of the boxer, had anything to do with health?

Sports as a means of forming character and will-power? As if character could not be trained better in the "ordinary course of life", or will-power tested more searchingly by something less absurd than setting up a record!

Sport as a means for bringing the nations closer together? As if the brotherhood of athletes were anything but a pure illusion, seen side by side with the howling jingoism of the onlookers, and the jaundiced reports of journalists, for whom any winner is a national hero!

Why should we run after a justification for sport? Why insist on making it utilitarian, and give it an end outside itself? Because, doubtless, we live in a time that claims "that every undertaking must be useful, and every man must let himself be used"; and because we can neither imagine nor accept the idea of sport as self-sufficient, owning no particular aim, and finding its true

## Walt Dye From Libya

Walt Dye, capable and efficient Commissioner of Officials for the Desert Area prior to being summoned to an overseas assignment, is serving his final year in Libya.

He reports that he is manager of two golf courses, one being regulation 18 holes, the other nine. Dye is also officiating football, and only one of his five fellow officials is experienced. He is therefore conducting classes two evenings a week on the fundamentals of the profession.

According to Dye, Libya is one of the few countries that has a Minister of Sports, and presently the nation is competing on an international level in football (soccer), basketball, cycling and golf.

sense and justification precisely in its detachment from material things.

We can be glad that sport is good for health; that sport can mold character; and that through sport, this or that individual has formed lasting bonds of friendship in defiance of frontiers and oceans. But if there were no more to it than joy in the rhythm of the runner's gait, the jumper's illusion of freedom from earthly ties, the helter-skelter down the ski-slopes, the sudden cool of a dive, or the passionate, total self-absorption in contest—if sport were nothing but aimless, useless play—we should still have no

choice but to defend it.

While we are engaged in sport we move in the blessed realm of childhood; while we are engaged in sport the dreams of youth are still alive within us. We give freely of ourselves because we ask nothing in return; we are disinterested because we do not ask if our acts are useful. When we engage in sport we are at play; and it is only at play that man is truly man, so Schiller has told us.

To many this play seems an activity of the body merely. They see the body in movement, the vigor of a

## MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE MEETING

High School; J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner CIF, Southern Section, and Lou Joseph, Administrative Assistant, CIF, Southern Section. Their recommendations to the Executive Committee were as follows:

a. **Type of Basketball to be used in play-offs**—The type of ball used in the basketball play-offs would be the type used by the majority of the leagues in that particular play-off grouping.

b. **Scheduling of First Round Play-off Games**: The criteria used in the past for scheduling first round play-off games has been: a) Seed the strongest teams, usually 8 teams; b) schools from the same league are placed in opposite ends of the draw; and c) geographical location.

The committee felt the criteria used in the past was sound and recommended no change. It was mentioned in basketball play-offs that teams playing Tuesday night games should not be made to travel unnecessary distances since it is a school night. In both Football and Basketball play-offs, cross town traffic should be eliminated where possible. It was moved, seconded and carried to reaffirm the above policy in scheduling first round play-off games.

c. **Neutral Facility**: A neutral gymnasium be defined as any site in which a team does not conduct regular practice nor play its regular home season games. A team may schedule more than one play-off game in the same gymnasium and the facility would still be considered a "neutral gymnasium".

d. **Increase in the number of Golf Matches and members on Golf Team**: It was suggested that the Ivy League Golf coaches go through league channels and have the league present to the Southern Section Council a recommendation to increase the number of golf matches during the season and any suggested changes in format of the number of boys to be on a team.

e. **Large and Small School Team Divisions**: It was moved, seconded and carried that there should be two or more play-off divisions in team golf championships. The format to be worked out after a study made by the Commissioner.

f. **Individual Golf Championship**: It was reaffirmed that all golfers must qualify annually for the CIF, Southern Section individual championship even though a school may have the defending CIF, Southern Section champion.

g. **SAN LUIS ATHLETIC LEAGUE REQUEST**: The San Luis

Athletic League has requested that their small school team champion be allowed to enter "A" play-offs in basketball. The committee reaffirmed that the San Luis Athletic League is properly placed for the 1970-71 school year and the situation will be reviewed again next year by the play-off committee.

h. **TIE BREAKER FOR CHAMPIONSHIP FOOTBALL PLAY-OFFS**: The California system to break ties in play-off games except the championship game has been used the past two years with great success and has met with approval of the football coaches. Discussion as to whether this system should also be used for ties in championship games in all divisions. The commissioner pointed out the frustrated feelings that were predominate by everyone concerned at the St. Paul-El Rancho championship game last year. Players, coaches, and fans were disappointed that a champion was not declared. They all wanted to continue the game—the players had to share awards and a time element delayed getting all the awards to the respective schools.

Considerable discussion took place on this matter and it was moved, seconded and carried that the 1969 football play-offs use the California System to break ties in all play-off games including the championship.

i. **REVIEW OF ALLOWANCES FOR MEALS, LODGING AND TRAVEL IN PLAY-OFF CONTESTS**: The San Luis League has recommended to the CIF, Southern Section that it review the present policy on allowances for meals, lodging and travel in play-off contests. With rising costs in all these areas, it was felt the present prices were not adequate. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the following increases be made:

Breakfast	from \$1.00 to \$1.50
Lunch	from \$1.50 to \$2.00
Dinner	from \$3.00 to \$4.00
Snack	remains at \$1.00

The allowance for lodging would be \$4.00 per person when an overnight stay is authorized.

j. **AVAILABILITY OF SCHOOL FACILITIES**: Acting on a recommendation from Dr. Paul Berger, Principal, Fountain Valley High School, it was hoped that all school districts would accept the philosophy of making their facilities available at cost to all member schools of the CIF, Southern Section. It is suggested that all member schools would offer their facilities and make known the use of their facilities. Commissioner Fagans will develop a philosophy statement and present it to the Southern Section Council for adoption and recommendation.

## 6. VIOLATION OF CIF SOUTHERN SECTION RULES:

a. The Commissioner reported to the Executive Committee on illegal football scrimmages held by Webb and Chaffey High Schools. It was moved, seconded and carried to reprimand both schools and place them on probation for the remainder of the school year.

b. Arcadia High School reported it had played an under-age boy on their varsity football team and forfeited the games he played in; they also stated they had opened their stadium at night to permit boys to practice soccer prior to the official opening date of the sport. It was moved, seconded and carried to place Arcadia High School on probation for the current school year and DENY them entry into the 1970 CIF, Southern Section, Soccer play-offs.

c. It has also been brought to the attention of the Executive Committee that the exchanging of eligibility lists prior to athletic contests in schools is being grossly neglected by the schools. This section of the by-laws has to be enforced. It was moved, seconded and carried to place on the Southern Section Council agenda at the next council meeting instructions to League representatives to refer to the leagues the importance of this responsibility.

7. **ELIGIBILITY OF JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES** — It was moved, seconded, and carried to refer back to the leagues Article XI, Section 3, the eligibility of junior high school graduates—should this rule be retained, changed, or eliminated? The rule as established a few years ago has not accomplished its purpose and has created more hardships. The Executive Committee instructed the Commissioner to draw up a proposal for the council to consider.

8. **DIVING**—The Commissioner commented that there has been a lack of competition for students who participate in diving. There are very few diving invitationals and many schools with swimming teams do not have diving; therefore the sport of diving is dying. He suggested that we allow divers to compete as unattached individuals during the season in outside meets. This would be a change in the state by-laws and would have to be submitted to them. It was moved, seconded and carried that we petition the State Federated Council to modify the rule on diving to permit divers to compete as unattached individuals during the season.

9. **CLASSIFICATION** — Problems have been developed in our classification system because some leagues have

frosch-soph teams in place of B and C classification teams. It was moved, seconded and carried to have the Commissioner survey the leagues, to find out how many are using this system. He is to evaluate the merits of both systems and prepare a recommendation for the Committee to discuss.

**10. CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY REQUEST** — Christ's Ambassadors is planning on taking 250 southland teenagers to Mexico during the Christmas holidays on a religious mission. They were concerned regarding the eligibility of high school basketball players if they participated in basketball games while in Mexico. Since this is a mission for good neighbor relations and involves a religious organization, it was moved, seconded and carried to permit high school boys accompanying the group to participate in impromptu games while in Mexico, without loss of eligibility.

**11. KOFA HIGH SCHOOL**—A communication from the Superintendent of the Yuma Union High School District was read, which inquired into the possibility of Kofa High School obtaining regular membership in the CIF, Southern Section. After a discussion of the matter it was the opinion of the members present, that Kofa High School could be admitted if they were properly released from the A.I.A. and if the new Imperial Valley league wished to accept them as a regular member.

**12. TRI-D LEAGUE**—Tri-D League would like to play 8 minute quarters in their junior high school basketball games. This would be in violation of Article XL, Section 13, Page 60 of the Blue Book. It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY this request.

**13. CROSS COUNTRY**—Bay League requested a waiver of Article XLI, Section 8 to permit their league to enter three teams in the Southern Section Cross Country Preliminaries. It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY the Bay League 3 entries into the Southern Section cross country meet as each league is entitled to only 2 teams.

**14. INDOOR TRACK MEET**—The Centinela Valley school district would like the CIF, Southern Section, to co-sponsor with them, an indoor track meet on Saturday, February 28, 1970 at the Long Beach Arena. It was moved, seconded and carried to commend the Centinela Valley District for their interest in the track program but

that the CIF, Southern Section, cannot grant financial aid. It was suggested that leagues in that area combine and assist in the conduct of this experimental indoor meet. If held, it would not count against the number of track meets allowed for the outdoor season.

**15. STATE TRACK MEET RULES**—The state CIF is considering changing two track regulations governing participation in the State Track and Field meet. The first change would involve the substitution of the 300 yard intermediate hurdle race for the present 180 yard low hurdle event. The second change would permit a boy to enter any four events in the state track meet instead of the restriction that is now in force. The Commissioner was directed to notify all league representatives concerning these proposed changes, so a decision could be reached at the next Council meeting as to the Southern Section's position on these proposed changes.

**16. BIG BEAR HIGH SCHOOL**—Dr. Russ Reynolds, Principal of Big Bear High School, appeared before the committee to explain his reasons for removing the Big Bear High School's football team from the field prior to the conclusion of a scheduled game with Notre Dame. Dr. Reynolds stated he was concerned with members of his already small football team becoming injured, and that he felt the game officials were not protecting the Big Bear team. Dr. Reynolds regretted his actions and stated he believed in the code of sportsmanship advocated by the CIF, Southern Section, and would see that such an instance would not be repeated. It was pointed out that in future games, when a score is lopsided, or a team's roster is hard hit by injuries, by mutual agreement, the clock may run without stopping during the 2nd half or the quarters may be shortened. It was moved, seconded and carried to censure Dr. Reynolds for his actions and place Big Bear on probation for the rest of the current school year.

**17. ELIGIBILITY CASES** — It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule to permit the following boys to be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics effective, November 19, 1969: Tom Neff, Anaheim High School (Aquatics sports only); Isidro Monge, Brawley High School; Wayne Cohan, Dos Pueblos High School; Bruce Snyder, Hueneme High School; Joe Brooks, Lompoc High School; Robert Andrews, Montclair High School; Allie Stevens, North (Riverside) High School; Mike Finger, Norwalk High School; Jeff Lashbrook, Savanna High School; Don Young,

Torrance High School; Len Begman, Valencia High School; Mark Lane, Western High School (Aquatics sports only); and Robert Salisbury, Workman High School.

It was moved, seconded and carried to DENY the request to waive residence or scholastic rule for the following boys: Jack Krevy, Beverly Hills High School; Anthony Davis, Fontana High School; Ronnie Bennett, Norte Vista High School and Fred Mintie, Servite High School. Alfredo Machado, Wilson High School, Long Beach, will become eligible the 2nd semester.

The Executive Committee was then shown a preview of the new documentary film, "THE CIF SOUTHERN SECTION". There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee the meeting was adjourned at 6 o'clock.

stroke, the swing of the gymnast's arms and legs, but they do not see what goes on inside. They do not see all—it is as if a man should look at a picture and see nothing but lines and colors, or at a statue, and think only of the material of which it is made, or read a score and never hear the music.

The body, and the feats it performs, are ends to them; whereas in true sport the performance is not an end in itself—nor the body either—but the means of expression.

Moving over the ground, thrusting through the wave, gliding over the snowy slopes, or wrestling with the rock-face—these are expressions of the joy of life itself, expressions of the well-being won from living close to nature. The body is but the means of expressions, the instrument the soul required to enable it to measure the territory which has been granted to man, and occupy it to the limit.

Only thus can we explain why "they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize," only thus understand how records can go on forever being broken, at the cost of suffering, of sacrifice, and even of the total dedication of life itself. Sport is the faithful image of the struggle of humanity towards perfection; in sport, soul and body together strive to accomplish the age-old aspiration of mankind—"faster, harder, higher."

There lies "the point" of sport, in whole importance, its true meaning. It needs no other justification.
