



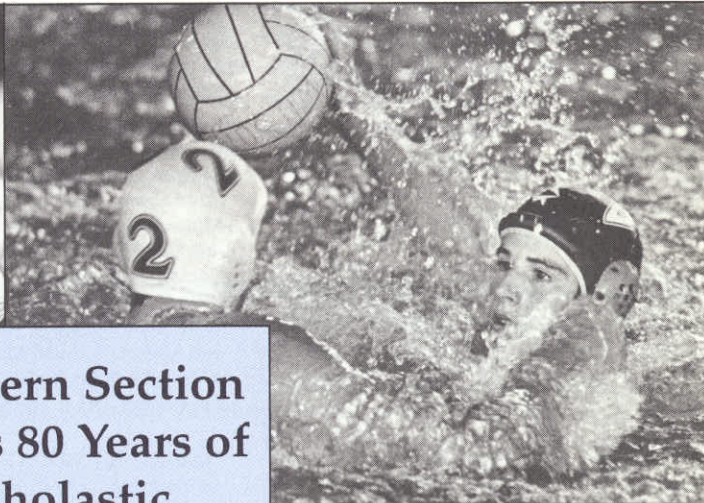
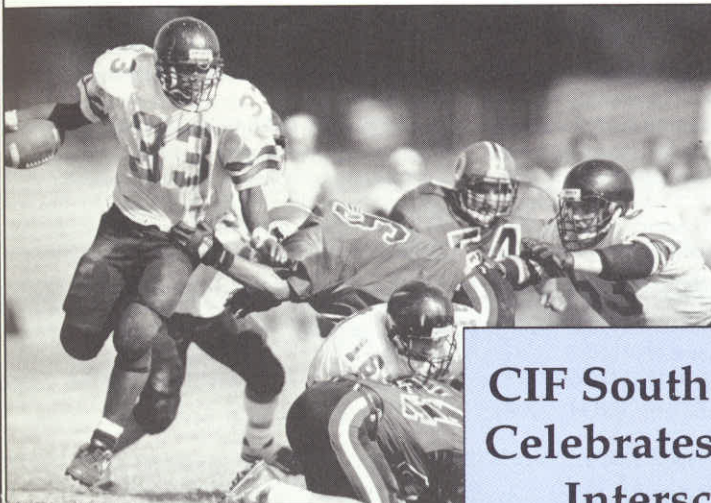

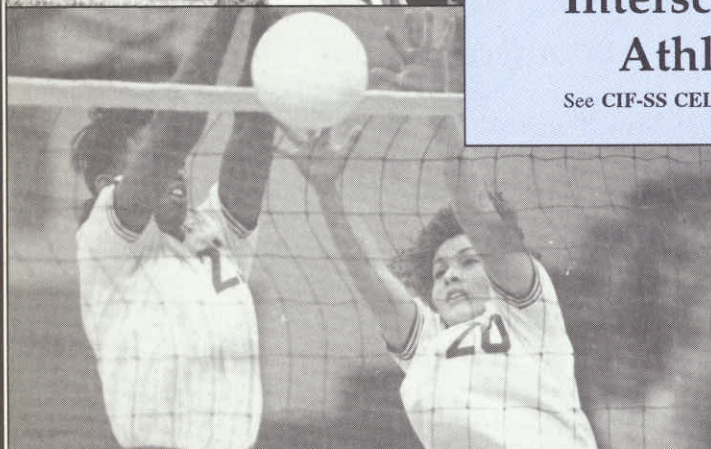

ETHICS AND INTEGRITY

The beginning of a new school year is much like the beginning of a new life. We start out refreshed, with renewed commitment, with recharged energy and with the best of intentions. We open the classroom door or call the first practice with a clean slate.

Before we get started, I urge everyone involved in interscholastic athletics to take a reflective moment of serious thought. Consider the very essence of our daily efforts. What is the rationale for conducting extracurricular activities such as interscholastic athletics? What is our mission? Are we effective in our methods? Are we reaching our students with a positive message? What is the foundation of our purpose?

Whether you are reading this from the position of a principal, athletic director, coach, official, trainer, member of the media, parent or spectator, the message is the same. We stand together for sportsmanship, ethics and integrity, not only for the contest in which we are presently involved, but as a permanent way of life.

The mission statement from the National Federation concerning the case for sportsmanship, ethics and integrity follows: "The ideals of good sportsmanship and integrity permeate our culture. The values of good citizenship and high behavioral standards apply equally to all activity disciplines. In perception and practice, good sportsmanship shall be defined as those qualities of behavior which are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. Good sportsmanship is viewed by the National Federation as a concrete measure of understanding and commitment to fair play, ethical behavior and integrity."

Wouldn't it be wonderful, that if before every contest, those involved had these ideals foremost in their minds? For the survival of our entire interscholastic athletic program, we must make a renewed and active commitment to the acceptance of this philosophy.

Why? Because as we've said so many times before, school-based activities such as

CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES APRIL 30, 1992

The April meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by Dr. Tom Jacobson at 9:05 a.m. on Thursday, April 30, at the Sequoia Athletic Club in Buena Park. All leagues were present with the exception of the Bay, Camino Real, Coast Valley, Condor, Hi-Lo, Horizon, Metro, Moore, San Andreas, Santa Fe and Westside.

1. **MINUTES** -- It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of March 26 as distributed to the Council, and the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of April 9, 1992, as distributed.

2. **AAF REPORT** -- Commissioner Stan Thomas reviewed background information and progress of the AAF coaching education program in soccer and track and field.

3. **GOLD LIFE PASS/HALL OF FAME COMMITTEE REPORT** -- Those receiving life passes were introduced in recognition of their long-standing service to the CIF-SS. Recipients were: Warren Winchester, Bell Gardens HS; Mike Shanahan, Buena HS; Don Montgomery, Monrovia Unified School District; Jim Ryan, Football HS; Sam Harvey, Glendale HS; Gene Knott, Ramona HS; Tom Hamilton, Pasadena HS; Jack Fox, Canyon (A) HS. Additionally, the Hall of Fame honorees were: John Patrick, Alhambra HS and Maynard Horst, Mark Keppel HS.

4. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL REPORT** -- Dr. Robert Packer and Dr. Gary Smidderks pre-

sented the following agenda items for the May State Federated CIF meeting, thus requiring action by the CIF-SS Council in order to give voting delegates direction:

(2) Implementation of State marketing plan-Vote to send delegates uninstructed

logos on all promotional materials, public address announcements and on-site display booths.

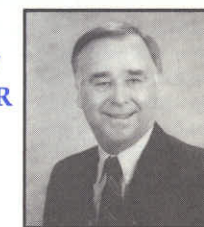

CIF - SS CELEBRATES 80TH ANNIVERSARY

The California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section celebrates its 80th anniversary during the 1992-93 school year, marking yet another milestone in the organization's long and successful history. The progress witnessed in interscholastic athletics over the life of the organization has been no less profound than comparing a horse and buggy to the space shuttle, yet the CIF-SS's message has always been the same: to protect, promote and serve the cause of school-based athletic programs, as an important component of the total educational process.

From its humble beginnings, the CIF-SS ranks today as the nation's seventh largest high school athletic association, serving over 480 member schools and an estimated 550,000 students. Its geographic expanse is bordered by Calexico in the South, Paso Robles along the coast and as far north as Lee Vining in the Eastern Sierra. The CIF-SS remains a non-profit service organization, governed democratically by its volunteer members as one of the most respected and vibrant organizations of its type nationally.

More closely defined, its purpose is to direct, formulate and administer the interscholastic athletic program of member schools, in an effort to make the

maximum growth contribution to the physical, emotional, social and moral aspects of participants.

The CIF-SS was first conceived in an October 1912 meeting at the old YMCA in Boyle Heights. It officially began operations in April of 1913, with the successful management of the Southern California High School Track and Field Championships.

The driving force behind the establishment of an administrative clearinghouse for interscholastic athletics locally was Mr. Seth Fields Van Patten. Van Patten, who came to California as a new member of the Escondido High School faculty in 1900, had a long-time love affair with athletic competition and a genuine concern for the welfare of youngsters he taught and coached.

When Van Patten moved to South Pasadena High in 1907, he found that school-based athletic programs were still quite informal and loose-knit. Administrators took no part in the management or conduct of contests being played between teams claiming to represent their schools, providing for a great many disputes and tremendous unrest.

Playing rules were often compromised or totally unavailable. Officiating was unorganized, inconsistent or nonexistent. Youngsters would participate

on teams representing different schools day in and day out. Coaches would actually substitute themselves into a contest at a critical point. Eligibility rules were unheard of. Safety was forsaken. High school sports suffered from a total lack of control and had a notorious reputation.

Yet, the spirit of competition remained high on campuses throughout the area. By 1910, when Van Patten moved to Los Angeles High, several attempts to organize interscholastic athletic competition had been tried and had failed. Following a negative experience with the Southern California Track and Field Championships as conducted by the YMCA in 1912, Van Patten was elected president of the Los Angeles County League. In a particularly stormy league meeting, a motion was made by Compton High Principal W. R. Moberly for the league president to file a number of complaints with the YMCA regarding the event. Van Patten bluntly refused the motion, and stated categorically: "If the league representatives didn't have enough guts to run the meet properly themselves, they did not deserve a championship meet!"

Moberly asked to make a substitute motion. He moved that the high school leagues of the area run their own meet that spring, with Mr. Van Patten designated as manager.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING June 19, 1992

The June meeting of the CIF-SS Executive Committee was called to order by President Dr. Tom Jacobson at 1:10 p.m. on Friday, June 19, 1992 at the Cerritos Sheraton Hotel. All members were present with the exception of Debra Bradley, Don Hagen, Maureen Sanders, Edna Herring, Bill McKinley, Cynthia Grennan and Andy Patterson.

1. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE -- Dr. Tom Jacobson reviewed with the Committee the August Executive Committee meeting which will be the first meeting of the new school year, at which time new Executive Committee members (Dr. Ron Franklin, Superintendent, Redlands Unified; Donna Gunstream, Girls A.D. Representative, El Monte HS; and Paul Breit, Principal, Garey HS and Foothill League Representative) will take their seats on the Executive Committee. Dr. Jacobson commended outgoing Executive Committee members Cynthia Grennan and Sheri Ross for their service to the organization.

Dr. Jacobson commented on issues facing the Section and education as a whole, those being developing better guidelines of communication with superintendents and school boards, governance, marketing and fundraising, and concerns relative to the financial crisis facing California schools.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE -- Commissioner Stan Thomas and Administrator Bill Clark discussed numerous baseball incidents from the past season with the Committee. It was recommended that the office send follow-up letters with reference to incidents, to superintendents and school board presidents, as well as to the league presidents. Additionally, the office is to develop guidelines relative to supervision, umpire protection, and expected standards of conduct on the part of school personnel. The staff is to return to the August meeting with recommendations that could be forwarded to the Council for action. These recommendations could include mandatory in-service, red card rule as now exists in soccer, etc.

The Commissioner discussed with the Committee concerns relative to competition prior to the close of school in June. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to allow schools to participate in summer activities on the first Monday occurring two weeks after the last Southern Section or State competition. The first date of allowable competition with principal's permission in 1993 would be June 21 for those schools still in session.

Other items reviewed with the Committee were the L.A. City vs. Southern Section football game to be televised live on KCOP on December 18, 1992; the October 22 Athletic Administrators Symposium; upcoming team doctors' workshop; and the format for Executive Committee meetings. In order to open good lines of communication, Commissioner Thomas announced that the office would be attending at least one league meeting for all leagues in the Section, beginning with the 1992-93 school year.

3. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' REPRESENTATIVE UPDATE -- Sheri Ross again expressed concerns with reference to the State education budget and the impact upon athletic programs statewide. She also reviewed sex equity issues which will be before the State Legislature this summer.

4. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTORS' REPRESENTATIVE UPDATE -- Rich Ramirez announced that the Citrus Belt A.D. Association honored outstanding athletes in their area as well as principals and superintendents for their contribution to interscholastic athletics. He also noted that the desert area schools are facing severe budget cuts.

5. SUPERINTENDENTS' UPDATE -- Dr. Jim Fleming announced that the Orange County superintendents were meeting on June 23 to discuss developments regarding the Orange County section proposal.

6. TREASURER'S REPORT -- Dr. Ken Gunn updated the Committee with reference to the playoffs and the current working budget.

7. STATE REPORT -- Dr. Robert Packer reviewed with the Committee items passed at the May State CIF meeting held in Burlingame:

(a) By-laws Modification:

1405 - Approved; 303 - Approved;

Article 2, section 25 - Approved

(b) C-Bed Enrollments (top three grades) - Approved

(c) Post-playoff contests - Approved

(d) Employment of Elissa K. Maas - Approved

(e) CIF Marketing Plan - Items 1 thru 5 - Approved

(f) Bidding package for External Marketing Agent - Approved

(g) Proposed 1992-93 budget - Approved

(h) Multi-campus (Madera HS) - Approved

(i) Strategic Planning Committee to include Orange County Proposal as part of process - Approved

8. CIF-SS OFFICE SITE -- Commissioner Stan Thomas presented an update and reviewed the proposed movement of the CIF-SS offices due to recent decisions by the ABC School Board. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to permit the Commissioner to negotiate for a new site within defined limitations and upon review of the Administrative Committee, who will make the final decision, unless the financial terms exceed the approved limitation, in which instance the matter will be brought back to the full Executive Committee. It should be noted, the Commissioner's office will review the progress of the negotiations and the proposed relocation to the member schools in the next Administrative Update, and a full report will be given to the Council in September.

9. INGLEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL HEARING -- Frank Cano updated the Committee on an eligibility hearing involving Inglewood High School and the conditions for the probationary status of the Inglewood High School football program and the implementation of procedures by the administration regarding student eligibility.

10. BASKETBALL PLAYOFF FORMAT -- Associate Commissioner Dean Crowley reviewed the playoff format with the Committee. It was suggested that the office send a survey in the fall to ascertain the general feeling of our constituents with reference to the current basketball format. The survey would include superintendents, principals, athletic directors and basketball coaches.

11. AT-LARGE REPRESENTATIVE -- Edna Herring was unanimously reappointed to fill the position of At-Large Representative, with her term expiring in 1994.

12. SOCCER RULE EXPERIMENTATION - Administrator Karen Hellyer reviewed with the Committee a proposal to conduct a one-year experiment that would eliminate the offside rule completely during all games to be played during the 1992-93 South Torrance Holiday Soccer Tournament. It should be noted that this rule experimentation does have the approval of the National Federation. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the soccer experimentation.

13. NEW MEMBERSHIP -- It was moved, seconded and passed to approve membership for Malibu High School and Life Christian High School (Downey).

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:20 p.m.

eligibility checks a critical part of athletic administration.

With this in mind, let's take a closer look at Rule # 213.

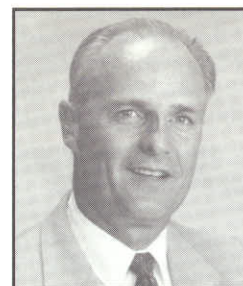
QUESTION: What is the status of a student who transfers from school A to school B and now assumes a "new" legal guardian?

ANSWER: The student is ineligible in school B in that he/she has not made a permanent change of residence with the individuals they were residing with the previous year while attending school A. (Rule 213 would apply.)

Under no condition is a student automatically eligible when a new legal guardian is appointed. In all cases of guardianship, any consideration for eligibility must be approved by the CIF-SS office under State and Southern Section Rule 213.

It should also be pointed out that parents and, at times, school officials, are confused between the terms legal guardianship and letters of guardianship or custody. In most instances, the latter two are easily obtained and are generally considered for a temporary period of time. Thus, there is a need for an administrative review by the CIF-SS Office in all cases dealing with a change of guardianship.

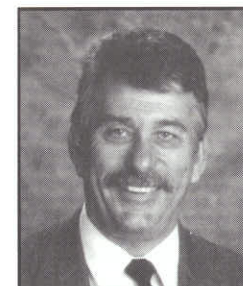

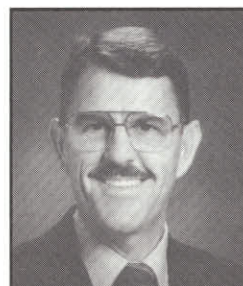

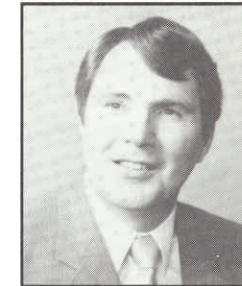

RELEAGUING RESULTS IN RECORD NUMBER OF CIF-SS LEAGUES

Final tallies for the 1992-94 CIF Southern Section relegating cycle places the number of official member high schools at 472 and member leagues at an all-time high of 70. CIF/REEBOK BOWL READY FOR KICKOFF THIS SEASON

The 1992 football season will feature a historic event that area prep grid fans have long awaited: a showdown match between the major division champions of the CIF Los Angeles City and Southern Sections. The dream will become reality on Friday, December 18, in the first-ever "CIF/Reebok Bowl," pitting the L.A. City 4-A Division champ and the Southern Section Division I titlist at a site to be announced.

Titling for the contest was derived from a sponsorship program spanning the years 1987-1993, in which Reebok will have contributed over \$2.7 million to interscholastic athletics statewide. Proceeds from the contest will be used to offset the cost of membership dues throughout both sections, as well as the entire state.

Beginning on February 9, 1934 --the day when a special commissioner's committee recommended to the CIF-SS Council that schools of the Los Angeles Unified District should split to form their own governing body--the natural rivalry has been brewing. Since the fall of 1935, no longer was one school's varsity football team able to claim itself the best of all over the greater Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino Counties metropolitan area.

After the two sectional championship games each December, the major-division Los Angeles City and Southern Section champions would pick up their awards and begin to wonder, "what if...?" When the coaches, players and fans realized the "what ifs" could never take place, the claims and counter-claims would always begin to fly. Following the 1992 season, there won't be any more questions or claims, because the teams will finally be able to decide the issue where it was meant to be decided --on the gridiron itself.

KCOP-TV TO TELECAST CIF/REEBOK BOWL LIVE

The first CIF/Reebok Bowl, a football contest between the CIF Los Angeles City and Southern Section major-division champions, scheduled for December 18, 1992, will be telecast live in prime-time and exclusively by the "Very Independent" KCOP, Channel 13 in Southern California.

KCOP, known for locally produced live and special programming, has signed a five-year agreement with the California Interscholastic Federation for exclusive rights to cover the series.

"We are thrilled to be a part of what will hopefully become one of the premiere local sports events of the year," said Rick Feldman, Vice President and Station Manager at KCOP. "Each year, Southern California produces some of America's most exceptional high school football talent, and it will be a pleasure to provide a prime-time showcase for these athletes."

KCOP, the television home of the Los Angeles Clippers of the National Basketball Association, has won numerous awards for its annual productions of the Los Angeles Marathon, Live at the Hollywood Bowl, the Doo Dah Parade and the Best of L.A.

"KCOP's commitment is not only to this one game," added Feldman. "We expect to highlight high school athletes on a consistent basis on Newscenter 13 at 10 p.m. beginning this fall."

It is believed next December's telecast will be the first-ever live showing of a CIF Los Angeles City or Southern Section post-season athletic contest.

"The CIF and its member schools are fortunate to have the interest and advocacy of KCOP television," notes CIF State Commissioner Tom Byrnes. "The station's willingness to provide this vehicle for recognition of the local interscholastic athletic program is a major contribution to our community."

"The CIF Southern Section is pleased to take part in this historic event," notes Stan Thomas, Commissioner of Athletics. "We expect this unique contest to be the showcase of Southern California prep football. I believe it will serve as a tremendous vehicle in providing great interest, exposure and financial support to our entire interscholastic program."

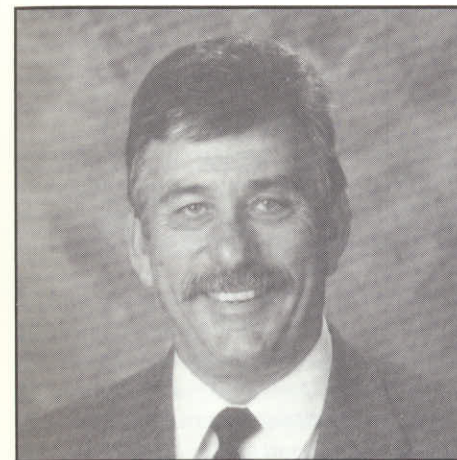
The level of football excellence among L.A. City and Southern Section member schools is second to none on a nationwide basis. All-time greats such as Heisman Trophy winners Glenn Davis, John Huarte, Mike Garrett and Charles White began their careers at area high schools, as did past and present NFL stars Frankie Albert, Hugh McIlhenny, Jon Arnett, Marlin McKeever, Jack Snow, Gene Washington, Brig Owens, Pat Haden, Issac Curtis, Randy Cross, John Elway, Warren Moon, Anthony Munoz, Ronnie Lott, Greg Townsend, Randall Cunningham and Mark Carrier. The list could certainly go on and on.

In fact, of the past 77 California "State Teams of the Year" (dating to the CIF's first season in 1914, as published by Cal-Hi Sports Magazine), 45 are members of one of the two sections. Most recently are five of the last six: Mater Dei (13-1, 1991); Fontana (14-0, 1989); Carson (12-1, 1988); Fontana (14-0, 1987); and El Toro (14-0, 1986).

The landmark '92 season for both sections officially gets underway the weekend of September 10-12 and concludes on November 14. Each of the organizations will conduct 16 team, single-elimination, post-season tournaments, with sectional championships scheduled for December 11. The long-awaited game between the emerging champions will follow the succeeding Friday.

School (Pomona) Principal Paul Breit, Redlands Unified School District Superintendent Dr. Ronald E. Franklin and El Monte High School Athletic Director Donna Gunstream assume their positions as elected by the the CIF-SS Council last spring.

Mr. Breit will serve as the Mt. San Antonio Area Representative, replacing Walnut High School Principal Dr. Ken Gunn, who will assume the duties of President-Elect of the Council this fall. Dr. Gunn, who has served as the Mt. San Antonio Area Representative since the 1988-89 school year, has served in the dual role of CIF-SS Treasurer and Area Representative for the past two years. Dr. Franklin replaces Anaheim Union High School District Superintendent Cynthia Grennan as the Superintendent's Representative to the Committee, while Ms. Gunstream replaces El Toro High School Athletic Director Sheri Ross as the Girls' Athletic Director's Representative.

The CIF-SS Executive Committee is composed of members elected by and responsible to specific leagues by area designation, in addition to a boys' and girls' athletic director's representative and a superintendent's representative. The Committee serves as the administrative body of the CIF Southern Section and is charged with the responsibility of enforcing all rules and regulations approved by the CIF-SS Council.

Paul Breit, who has served as Principal of Garey High School since 1986, has enjoyed a long and successful career in teaching, coaching and school administration.

A graduate of Cal Poly Pomona, Breit joined the Pomona Catholic Boys High School (now Damien High School) faculty in 1964 as a biology and physical education instructor. In 1965, he moved to Chino High as a math teacher and in 1968 accepted a similar position at Edgewood High in West Covina (since closed).

Breit entered into administration as Dean of Students at Edgewood in 1977, became Assistant Principal and was elevated to Principal in 1979. Between 1981-86, he served as Principal at Willowood Intermediate School in West Covina and in 1986 was appointed to his present position at Garey.

While at Edgewood, Breit served as defensive coordinator for the varsity football team and directed the varsity wrestlers to

eight league championships and a sparkling 111-11-2 record. He served on the CIF-SS Wrestling Advisory Committee from 1970 through 1976 and managed the CIF State Wrestling Championships at Cal Poly Pomona in 1976.

Breit was a three-sport (football, basketball, track) athlete as a student at Paramount High School. He completed his master's degree at Azusa Pacific University and is currently working on his doctorate in education at La Verne University.

Dr. Ron Franklin began his career in education in 1956 after graduating from Whittier College. He started teaching in the Rivera School District (later unified with the Rancho School District to become the El Rancho Unified School District). In 25 years of service for the city of Pico Rivera, Franklin had a variety of job responsibilities, including his last five as District Superintendent.

In 1979, Franklin moved to the Novato Unified School District (Marin County), where he served as District Superintendent for eight years. In addition to his responsibilities with the district, he served the cause of interscholastic athletics as a member of the CIF North Coast Section Board of Managers.

Franklin accepted his current post at the Redlands Unified School District in 1987.

Donna Gunstream has spent her entire professional career at El Monte High School, where she has served in a number of capacities.

A 1968 graduate of Cal State Los Angeles, Gunstream joined the El Monte High faculty as a physical education instructor in 1969. During her tenure, she has coached "B" and varsity softball, varsity volleyball, varsity track and field and varsity badminton.

In 1977, she was elevated to the position of P.E. Department Chairman and Girls' Athletic Director. She served as Girls' Athletic Coordinator of the Mission Valley League from 1982-84 and as CIF-SS League Representative from 1985-92.

Gunstream's additional extracurricular activities have included coordination of the school's 1991 dance production "Reflections of Us," service as spirit leader advisor for four years, and member of the varsity football film crew for three years. Throughout her 17 years at El Monte High School, she

beneficial to parents, school administrators, counselors and coaches.

The N4A, founded in 1975, is an elaborate professional association of academic advisors for athletes whose stated purpose is: to cultivate and improve the opportunities for academic success for student-athletes in universities and colleges, by providing informed, competent and holistic advising; to enhance communication between the academic and athletic communities while serving as liaison between those communities; and to continue to elevate the status of professional academic advisement of athletes.

Any person whose purpose is to assist student-athletes in the pursuit of educational

goals and who holds a position at an educational institution may become a member of the N4A. The N4A has a keen interest in working with high school academic advisors, counselors and administrators, to provide the most up-to-date information and assistance in preparation of the college-bound student-athlete.

The 3C4A is a spin-off group, based upon the same ideals and purposes of the parent organization, but specifically geared to assist students bound for member schools of the California Community College System.

MARION JONES AND STAIS BOSEMAN NAMED MOST OUTSTANDING SOUTHLAND HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES

Underclass representatives of CIF Southern Section member schools, Marion Jones of Thousand Oaks and Stais Boseman of Inglewood Morningside, were hailed as the Most Outstanding Southland High School Athletes for the 1991-92 school year by the All-Southern California Board of Athletics, organized by the Amateur Athletic Foundation of Los Angeles.

The award is the highest acclaim a prep athlete can receive in the nine counties which comprise the area of the CIF Los Angeles City and Southern Sections. Jones, already a three-time state sprint champion, became the third female in the 17-year history of the award to be honored in back-to-back years, preceded by Cheryl Miller of Riverside Poly (basketball) and Janet Evans of Placentia El Dorado (swimming). Boseman has the opportunity to become the first repeat winner in the 22nd year of the

boys award, as both athletes return for their senior years this fall.

MARION JONES

An outstanding track and basketball athlete at Oxnard Rio Mesa High School last year, Jones transferred to Thousand Oaks this past school year and didn't slow down even a heartbeat.

Unmatched nationally in the 100, 200, and 400-meters over the past two seasons, she is also a two-time All-Southern Section selection in basketball. She helped lead Thousand Oaks to its second straight CIF-SS Division I-A title. As a sophomore at Rio Mesa, Jones averaged 24.5 ppg and 10.8 rebounds and was Channel League MVP. She averaged 15 ppg and 10 rebounds this season, even though she missed 15 games due to a broken wrist.

Jones became the first sprinter to win six titles in the California State Track and Field Meet in June. She has tied Natalie Kaaiwahia

of Fullerton and Wendy Brown of Woodside for most individual State titles at six, with the opportunity to win at least two more next year.

This past season, Jones set a national prep record in the 100-meters with a time of 11.14. She also set a national mark in the 200-meters, with a clocking of 22.67. She also had the season's fastest time in the nation in the 400 at 54.44.

STAIS BOSEMAN

A splendid two-sport star at Morningside High School, Boseman was named CIF Southern Section Division VIII Player of the Year in Football and Division III Player of the Year in basketball.

As a quarterback and defensive back in football, Boseman led the Monarchs to the Division VIII championship, defeating Temecula Valley 27-20. He was named as a

SYNOPSIS OF 1992-93 BLUE BOOK CHANGES

The following is designed for the benefit and convenience of athletic administrators and coaches in an effort to provide a capsule summary of the changes in the State CIF/Southern Section Constitution and By-Laws. These changes have been enacted by the State CIF Federated Council and/or the Southern Section Council throughout the course of the 1991-92 school term.

STATE REVISIONS

BY-LAW #204: Scholastic Eligibility - Reorganization now combines By-Law #204 (Initial Scholastic Eligibility), #205 (Continuing Scholastic Eligibility), and #206(A) (Requirements for Waiver). All requirements and provisions for waiver with reference to scholastic eligibility are now written under new Rule. **ADMINISTRATORS SHOULD NOTE THAT TRANSFER RULE, DUE TO THE DELETION OF BY-LAWS #205 AND #206, CHANGES BY-LAW NUMBERS FROM LAST YEAR - NAMELY #214 (TRANSFER ELIGIBILITY) AND #215 (HARDSHIP WAIVERS) WHICH WILL NOW BECOME #213 AND #214.**

BY-LAW #211(c): Updates list of State CIF approved foreign exchange programs.

BY-LAW #215: Continuing Eligibility - Clarifies provisions of transfers for those students living with guardians. Also defines terms of eligibility for those students expelled.

BY-LAW #220: Continuation School Eligibility - By-Law rewritten for clarification. New wording clarifies provisions of transfer and scholastic requirements for purpose of eligibility.

BY-LAW #303: School Team Representation - Requires that a new application to field unified team under the provisions of By-Law #303 must be filed for approval with the State CIF Executive Committee. (Multi-Campus)

BY-LAW #309: Travel-School Absence - By-Law deleted.

BY-LAW #510: Undue Influence - Further clarifies acts of undue influence.

BY-LAW #1400: Age Requirement-Football - By-Law rewritten for clarification. Note that a student under 15 years of age may participate in an interscholastic non-varsity football contest, but the student may not participate in an interscholastic contest against the varsity team of another school.

BY-LAW #1405: Number of Contests - A high school football team (all levels) shall not play more than two games in any eight (8) day period. A continued game under National Federation football rules shall not be considered in this limitation.

SOUTHERN SECTION REVISIONS

SPORTS CALENDAR: Winter R & R - The winter R & R period will begin on Monday, February 15, 1993 and conclude on Friday, February 19, 1993. Note the fall and spring R & R period will still run from Monday thru Saturday.

BY-LAW #32.5: Four Year Releaguings - Beginning with the 1994 cycle, the releaguings cycle will be for FOUR YEARS, 1994-98. It should be noted that the playoff grouping process will also follow for the same four year cycle.

BY-LAW #32.5: Releaguings Procedures - Provides that new schools may participate in the area releaguings process provided a simple majority of the principals in the specific area approve.

BY-LAW #70.51: Executive Committee Representation - The State Superintendent Representative and the Southern Section At-Large Representative to the Executive Committee are excluded from the provisions set forth in this Rule.

BY-LAW #306: Eighth (8th) Grade Physicals - New interpretation will allow eighth (8th) graders to take part in the regularly scheduled spring physicals conducted by the school in their respective attendance area prior to graduation.

BY-LAW #526: Tobacco Products Prohibited - New By-Law prohibiting all tobacco products at Southern Section events. This would include all those involved in the contest including players, coaches and officials.

BY-LAW #1109.4: Appeals - Provides that retired executive members may be selected to sit on hearing panels.

OUTSIDE COMPETITION: The 40% rule which allowed for a limited number of participants from a member school on an outside team during the school year has been deleted. Football (#1525.1), Basketball (#1814.1), Softball (#1914.1), Water Polo (#2012.1), Volleyball (#2213.1), and Baseball (#2413.1).

SUMMER DEAD PERIOD: A summer dead period adopted for all sports beginning in 1992. Dates for 1993 - August 2 thru August 23. It should be noted that the optional period for Cross Country and Water Polo will be from June 28, 1993 thru July 18, 1993.

CIF SPORTS PARTICIPATION SURVEY SHOWS OVERALL GROWTH STATEWIDE

The total number of students participating in CIF sports statewide is up, while the number of high school varsity teams is on a decline, according to the 1991-92 State CIF Sports Participation Survey, which was sent to member schools of the Federation in February. A total of 1,037 schools reported data from a membership base of 1,333 (92 percent responded).

The data compiled was compared with the 1972-73 and 1985-86 school years in determining trends in California high school athletics. Among the findings, overall boys' participation has increased by 17,011 (6 percent) since 1985-86, while girls' participation expanded by 21,284 (15 percent over the same time frame).

The total high school student population has shown a 7 percent growth since 1985-86, with boys' growth up 9 percent and girls', 5 percent. The total student enrollment in CIF membership schools was 1,083,483 in 1985-86 and 1,157,380 in 1991-92.

"It's great to see so many students participating in California high school athletics. The benefits of competing in athletics cannot be understated," said State CIF Associate Commissioner of Athletics Margaret Davis. "Many studies have supported the fact that students involved in athletics get higher

grades, are more likely to stay in school and are more likely to be successful upon graduation.

"It's especially gratifying to see the steady growth in girls' participation," Davis said. "We need to continue efforts to insure females are provided with sport participation opportunities in California high schools."

With a 49 percent increase in participation, volleyball is the fastest growing sport for boys, while soccer, with a 34 percent increase, has shown the most growth for girls since 1985-86. Golf, tennis, soccer and eight-man football are also among the growing sports for boys. Besides soccer, the sports experiencing the biggest surge for girls are swimming, track and field, tennis and volleyball.

In terms of numbers, soccer and track have shown the biggest increase for girls with 4,199 more participating in soccer than in 1985-86, and 4,131 more participating in track. Football, with an increase of 4,832, is the largest for boys, while volleyball, up by 2,811, is second.

Football also remains the most popular sport for boys with 74,041 participating at all levels. Volleyball is again the number one sport, in terms of participation, for girls, with 24,758 competing.

While participation numbers have spiraled upward, the number of varsity teams offered by schools is on a decline as 160 fewer programs are offered for boys than in 1985-86 and 169 less are offered for girls. The number of high schools has remained stable (from 1,127 in 1985-86 to 1,133 in 1991-92).

"Budget cuts have taken a toll on many programs," Davis concedes. "We obviously hope this is one trend that will be reversed."

The survey also asked athletic directors to list the most critical issues facing interscholastic athletics. Financial concerns were easily the number one issue targeted by athletic directors, while coaching concerns were the second most listed response. Other major concerns included sportsmanship, liability, facilities and officials.

The survey also showed a large disparity between the number of male coaches at California high schools (20,848) compared to the number of female coaches (4,782) - a ratio of nearly 5-1. According to the survey, 25,652 coaches are employed in California high schools, of which 13,249 are off-campus coaches.

"The lack of qualified female coaches is of particular concern to us. More efforts need to be made in this area," Davis said.

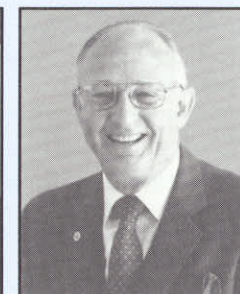

FAGANS, FLYNN AND HILL RECEIVE HERITAGE AWARD

Kenny Fagans, CIF Southern Section Commissioner from 1954-1975; Mickey Flynn, record setting runningback from Anaheim High School; and Dick Hill, Orange County's all-time winningest high school coach, are three men who can be recognized as "pioneers" of the game.

For that reason, the Orange County Sports Association (OCSA), in conjunction with the Disneyland Pigskin Classic, honored the three with the Football Heritage Award on August 25 at the Kiwanis Kick-off Luncheon. They were also recognized during halftime ceremonies of the Disneyland Pigskin Classic III, featuring Stanford and Texas A & M.

"The Football Heritage Award was conceived with the notion of honoring individuals for their contribution to football, be it at the high school, college, or professional level," stated OCSA Executive Director Don Anderson said.

"We feel that Kenny Fagans, Mickey Flynn and Dick Hill are deserving recipients for their contribution to Orange County football. They had a hand in popularizing it as we know it today."

Fagans, who was CIF-SS Commissioner for 21 years, is recognized for bringing the CIF-SS of age during his stewardship. His management and foresight developed a practically unknown entity into an organization of strength and respect.

With Fagans at the helm, the CIF Southern Section expanded its membership from 218 schools to 458. He also initiated the first interscholastic athletic program for girls in 1971, while also reorganizing the process for training and assigning officials.

Maybe one of Fagans' biggest accomplishments was a brand new procedure for seeding and pairing championship playoff tournaments.

Fagans implemented this new program in 1955, seeding and pairing teams following the completed season, rather than seeding teams (or leagues) before the season, as in previous years.

In 1956, Fagans' new playoff structure paid huge dividends, as undefeated Anaheim High (12-0) with running sensation

Playing in his final game on the high school level, Flynn held just about every mark in the Orange County record books for a runningback.

His final high school numbers are staggering: 36 games; 264 carries; 3,681 yards; 13.9 yards per carry; and 55 touchdowns on the ground. Amazingly enough, Flynn had 20 touchdown runs called back because of penalty.

Flynn's career yardage total is still fifth on the all-time yardage list in Orange County, while his 55 touchdowns rank 7th on the CIF list. His career yards per carry record still stands in Orange County. All this in just three seasons on the varsity level, while Anaheim would accumulate a 33-1-2 record during that span.

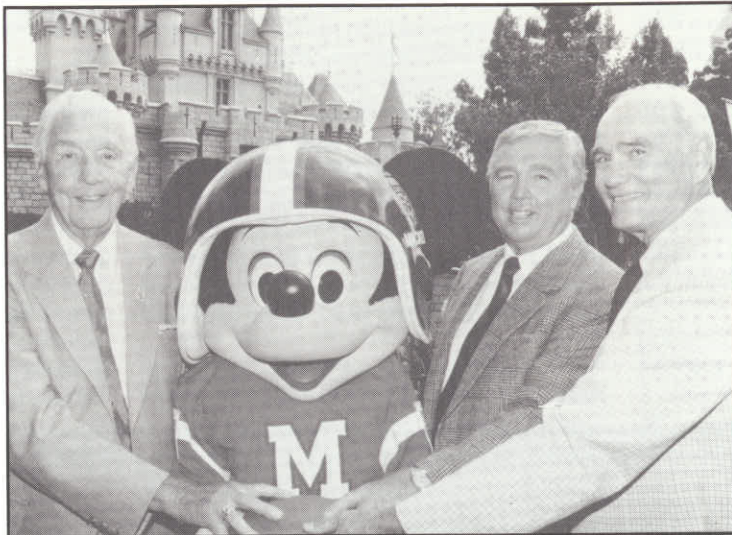
Across the field, on the opposing sideline, Dick Hill was preparing his Downey squad for the task ahead. It would be the first of many "big" games in a long coaching career.

After leading Santa Ana Valley High to a 147-63-3 mark during two coaching sessions (1959-66, 1970-79), he moved

his coaching talents to rival Santa Ana High, where he coached for eight seasons (1984-91) and racked up a 44-19 mark.

Hill retired from the head coaching ranks after the 1991 season, although he will continue coaching as an assistant at Foothill High School in Tustin. In 30 seasons of coaching, Hill's career record is incredible: 218-85-5, four CIF Championships, and 14 league titles.

Three outstanding and historic careers... it is ironic that all three are linked by one very special game, one that is remembered as the high school game of the century. Maybe that's why the score of that 1956 CIF Championship game is so special, because nobody was deemed a loser... Anaheim, 13, and Downey, 13.

"There must have been 20,000 people outside the gates just before kick-off, so I asked both coaches (Clare Van Hoorebeke and Hill) if we could hold the starting time until 8:30. They were not happy about it, but they agreed and we got all those people in. We announced the crowd at 41,383, but I'm thinking there were over 50,000 in the house. It was a sight to behold," Fagans recalled.

While Fagans was busy with a stampede outside, Mickey Flynn and Dick Hill were busy inside getting ready for the biggest game of their lives.

CIF-SS ATHLETES MAKE THEIR MARK AT STATE TRACK MEET

Teams and individual athletes representing Southern Section member schools won one of two team titles and 16 of 31 individual events at the 74th running of the CIF/Reebok State Track and Field Championships, held at Cerritos College last June.

In the girls team competition, Long Beach Poly scored 39 points to defeat runner-up Inglewood Morningside for a one-two Southern Section finish. Additional Southern Section teams finishing in the girls top 10 were Thousand Oaks (5th, 21), Lompoc (6th, 20) and Fillmore (8th tie, 16). In the boys final team results, Bakersfield High of the Central Section, with 25 points, edged Morningside (2nd, 24) and Hawthorne (3rd, 22) for the championship. Among the boys teams finishing in the top 10 were Downey Pius X (5th tie, 18) and Pasadena John Muir (9th, 16).

Two Southern Section athletes emerged with doubles in the girls individual competition, as sprint-sensation Marion Jones of Thousand Oaks captured the 100 meters in a national-record time of 11.14 and the 200 meters in a new state-meet record of 22.83. For Jones, the titles marked an unprec-

edented third-straight in each event. Twila Sims of Lompoc won both the 100 and 300-meter low hurdles in respective times of 13.83 and 42.75. Additional event winners included Shelley Taylor of Edison (1,600 meters, 4:48.52) and Kristy Kierluff of Esperanza (High Jump, 5-10). Southern Section schools took both relays as well - Morningside, with the 400 meter in 46.34 and Long Beach Poly, with the 1,600 meter in 3:45.91.

In the boys events, Gentry Bradley of Pius X won the 200 meters (20.97); Angel Martinez of San Gabriel won the 3,200 meters (8:56.34); Charlie Davidson of Saddleback won the 110-meter high hurdles (13.94); Demond Smith of Hawthorne won the 300-meter intermediate hurdles (37.34); Eugene Dreher of Antelope Valley won the long jump (24-1 1/2); and Tony Parrish of Marina won the triple jump (49-1). Morningside captured both the 400 and the 1,600 meter relay events with respective times of 42.04 and 3:15.37.

For a fee of \$100.00, California high schools can register to protect themselves from this sort of situation in the future and enable their schools to realize financial gain from the sale of any merchandise which reflects school trademarks. Fees, along with a logo (for reproduction use) should be sent to the State CIF Office, which in turn will register the trademark with the State Department.

IMPORTANT BLUE BOOK CHANGES

By action of the CIF State Federated Council, changes have been made in the designation of CIF-SS Blue Book Rules regarding transfer eligibility and hardship waivers thereof.

Due to a reorganization of State Rule No. 204, which now combines former By-laws No. 204 (Initial Scholastic Eligibility), 205 (Continuing Scholastic Eligibility) and 206-A (Requirements for Waiver), all requirements and provisions for waiver with reference to scholastic eligibility are contained within the new Rule No. 204.

Due to the deletion of By-laws 205 and 206, CIF TRANSFER RULES will change number designations from those used in previous years. Blue Book Rules No. 214 (Transfer Eligibility) and 215 (Hardship Waiver) now become Rules No. 213 and 214, respectively.

NEWS BRIEF COLUMN

NATIONAL FEDERATION DIRECTOR RETIRES

Brice B. Durbin, executive director of the National Federation of State High School Associations the past 15 years, has announced his retirement effective January 31, 1993.

Durbin, who will be 65 in August, announced his plans to retire to the membership at the conclusion of the National Federation's 73rd Annual Meeting on July 1 in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Durbin joined the National Federation, which is the national service and administrative organization for high school athletics and non-athletic activity programs, in September 1976 as executive director designate and assumed the director's role the following year from Clifford B. Fagan. Durbin is the third executive director of the National Federation, following H.V. Porter (1940-58) and Fagan (1958-77).

The National Federation has enjoyed unprecedented growth under Durbin's leadership, highlighted by the creation of professional organizations for high school coaches and officials with a current membership of 180,000; the National High School Sports Hall of Fame; professional organizations for speech and music directors, as well as cheerleading sponsors and equipment center for officials; TARGET, the chemical-health program to help students cope with tobacco, alcohol and other drugs; and a nationwide athletic insurance program, including coverage for lifetime catastrophic injuries.

CHICKERING NAMED AS NEW NATIONAL FEDERATION PRESIDENT

Douglas E. Chickering, executive director of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association, has been named president of the National Federation of State High School Associations for 1992-93.

In addition, Nelson Hartman, executive director of the Kansas State High School Activities Association, will serve as vice-president of the National Federation in 1992-93.

Chickering and Hartman were elected as National Federation officers for the coming year by the National Federation Executive Committee at its recent meeting in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Chickering, who has represented Section 4 on the National Federation Executive Committee the past two years, has been executive director of the Wisconsin Association since January 1986.

ciate Commissioner Dean Crowley reviewed the recommendations of the Blue Book Committee for inclusion in the 1992-93 CIF-SS Blue Book. The following recommendations were presented:

(a) **TOBACCO PRODUCTS** -- Inclusion as part of Rule 526, a statement regarding prohibition of tobacco products at all CIF-SS athletic contests. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve this proposal.

(b) **INJURED ATHLETES** -- It is the recommendation of the Committee that the CIF-SS develop guidelines in dealing with injured athletes. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve this recommendation.

(c) **8TH GRADE PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS** -- This proposal provides that secondary schools may now provide physical exams prior to the close of school in June, for incoming eighth graders, provided school principals develop a plan to administer the physicals which will exclude all coaches from this activity. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve this proposal.

(d) **RELEAGUING PROCEDURES** -- A recommendation to add to the releguing procedures a Q & A that new schools (not yet open) be allowed a vote in the releguing process. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve.

(e) **BLUE BOOK MODIFICATION** -- A proposal that the by-laws dealing with sports be rearranged in alphabetical order by season of sport. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve this proposal. It should be noted that this is a State by-law and this proposal must be forwarded to the State Federated Council for action.

(f) **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - ARTICLE 7, RULE 70.5** -- An exception to this rule be allowed for State Superintendent representative and the At-large representative. Following discussion, it was

moved, seconded and passed to approve this proposal.

7. **CIF-SS 1992-93 BUDGET** -- Dr. Ken Gunn, treasurer, presented the proposed 1992-93 budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the budget as presented.

8. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS** -- Dr. Scott McTaggart presented the report of the Nominating Committee as it relates to the Executive Committee. Following a vote by the Council, those elected were:

President-elect, Dr. Ken Gunn, Principal, Walnut HS;
Treasurer, Tom Triggs, Principal, La Habra HS;
Superintendent Representative, Dr. Ron Franklin, Redlands Unified School District;
Girls A.D. Representative, Donna Gunstream, El Monte HS;
Foothill Area Representative, Frank Cano, Principal, Alhambra HS;
Mt. San Antonio Area Representative, Paul Breit, Principal, Garey HS;
Orange County Area Representative, Tom Triggs, Principal, La Habra HS.

9. **RELEAGUING CYCLE PROPOSAL** -- Dr. Tom Jacobson reviewed a proposal that would establish a four-year releguing cycle which would begin after the next two-year cycle, beginning 1994 through 1998. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal. It should be noted that the playoff grouping process will follow the same four-year cycle as releguing.

10. **1992-94 PLAYOFF GROUPINGS** -- Dr. William Brand, Chairperson of the Playoff Groupings Committee, presented the final proposals of the playoff groupings for the 1992-94 cycle. A motion to approve the girls' volleyball groupings by enrollment was defeated. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the

playoff groupings.

11. **SPRING SEASON OF SPORT REQUEST** -- Mr. Mickey McNamee, representing the Rio Hondo League, reviewed a proposal that the R & R week between the winter and spring sports be defined as Monday/Friday only. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal.

12. **PRESIDENT'S UPDATE** -- Dr. Tom Jacobson, president, thanked members of the Council for their support during this past year and extended words of commendation to Dr. Robert Packer, outgoing State CIF President. He also commended Executive Committee members Cynthia Grennan and Sheri Ross, whose terms of office expire at the conclusion of this school year.

13. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE** -- Commissioner Stan Thomas reviewed with the council the Shake Hands for Sportsmanship program, and Administrator Bill Clark discussed with the Council geographical playoff concerns.

14. **TREASURER'S REPORT** -- Treasurer Ken Gunn reviewed with the Council the 1992 working budget and an update of the final winter basketball playoff activities.

15. **PASSING OF THE GAVEL** -- Dr. Tom Jacobson relinquished his duties to the incoming president, Dr. Gary Smidderks, for the 1992-94 term of the CIF-SS Council.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:25 p.m.

The motion passed. The action was referred to the other Southern California leagues and met with unanimous approval. Administrators of the schools agreed to voluntary involvement, and formed a *federation* based on cooperation. The Southern California Track and Field Championships of 1913, held at the old Los Angeles YMCA Field, was a resounding success.

A month later, the CIF Southern California Interscholastic Athletic Council was born. In 1914, when organization for interscholastic athletics went statewide, the organization became known as the CIF Southern Section. Van Patten, designated as the group's "managing secretary," went on to become its first Commissioner of Athletics in 1930. Under his leadership, the member schools became partners in a unified effort to bring standards to equality, control and respectability to interscholastic athletics in our area of the state.

Each of the ensuing CIF-SS Commissioners -- Bill Russell (1950-54), J. Kenneth Fagans (1954-75), Thomas E. Byrnes (1975-80), Ray Plutko (1980-86) and Stan Thomas (1986-

present) -- devoted themselves and their staffs to the high ideals on which the federation was founded. Each has left a personal imprint on the organization's history.

Throughout the 20th century, the CIF-SS has paralleled the American experience. Time and again, it has risen to meet the challenge, experiencing tremendous growth while suffering considerable hardship. It has survived world wars, the Great Depression, severe political unrest and countless tests of authority. It has adjusted to unprecedented developments in the technologies of travel and communication and accepted new and unforeseen ideological changes initiated by its constituency.

To accomplish its foundational purpose, the CIF-SS has provided a commonality between school administrators, coaches, officials' associations, the media and numerous additional entities, to form a successful working relationship and better serve its community of member schools and participants.

When thinking about CIF-SS, most people will conjure an image of the office located

athletics are an important component of the total educational process in our schools. They provide an arena for participants to grow, to excel, to understand and to value the concepts of sportsmanship and teamwork. 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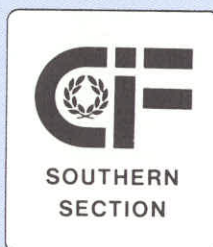
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
