



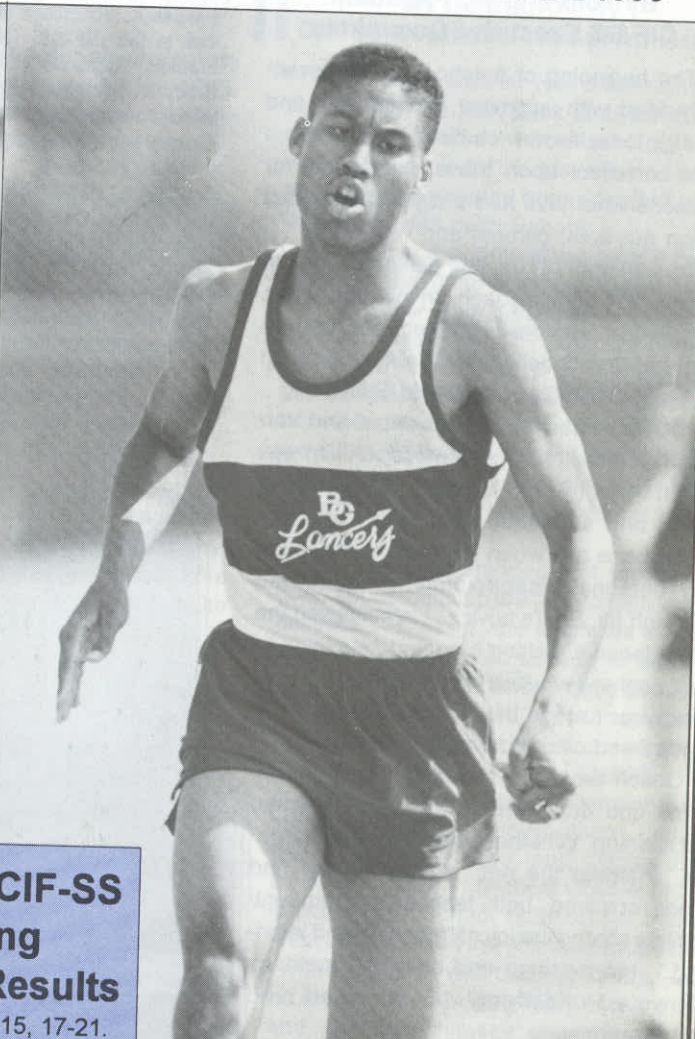
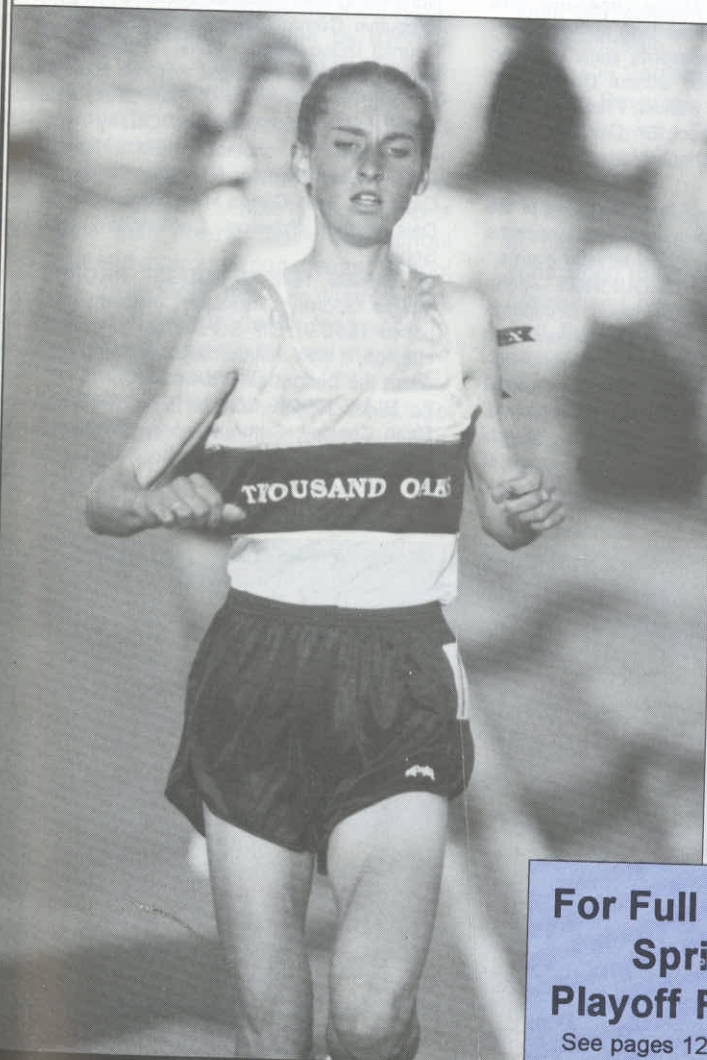

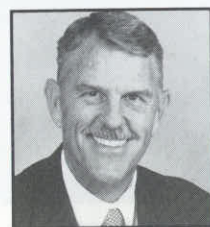

The beginning of a school year is invariably filled with optimism, excitement, and energy to tackle new challenges. It is also a time to reflect upon those experiences or persons who have had a significant impact upon our lives, careers and well-being.

During half-time at the 1995 CIF Southern Section Basketball Finals at the Pond in Anaheim, I stood tall and applauded

CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES April 25, 1996

The April meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by Dr. Ken Gunn, President at 9:05 a.m. on Thursday, April 25, 1996 at the Sequoia Athletic club. All leagues were present with the exception of Arrowhead, Central Coast, Desert Mountain, South Coast and Sunrise.

1. MINUTES -- It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of March 7, 1996.

2. GOLD LIFE PASS PRESENTATION -- Dr. Tracy Brennan, Chairperson of the Life Pass Committee introduced those receiving Life Passes in recognition of their long standing service to the CIF-SS. Recipients were Dr. Ron Franklin, Redlands Unified School District; Bill Brady, Los Amigos High School; Fred Petersen, West Torrance High School, Dr. Dennis Evans, Corona del Mar High School; Marie Upton, Cypress High School.

3. PUBLIC HEARING -- A representative of the Los Alamitos Cable company reviewed concerns regarding televising high school athletic events.

4. FOOTBALL PLAYOFF GROUPINGS -- John Dahlem, Chairperson of the Playoff Groupings Committee, presented the final recommendation of the 1996-98 Football Playoff Groupings. Following discussion, a motion to hear the Sunkist and Mt. Baldy Leagues appeals was approved. An appeal by Rick Dissinger, Sunkist League Representative, with reference to placement of the Mojave River League in Division VII was heard. Additionally, Bill Bertrand, Principal of

Montclair High School appealed the placement of the Mt. Baldy League in Division IV. Speaking in opposition to the appeals and in favor of the Playoff Groupings Committee recommendation was Tony Ortega, Mission Valley League Representative. Following discussion a motion to deny the Sunkist and Mt. Baldy Leagues proposals was passed. A motion to approve the 1996-98 Football Playoff Groupings was approved.

5. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS -- Dr. Scott McTaggart presented the report of the Nominating Committee as it relates to the CIF-SS Executive Committee. Following a vote by the Council those elected were: President-Elect - Margie Godfrey, Principal, Millikan High School; Mt. San Antonio Area - Paul Breit, Principal, Garey High School; Orange County Area - Dr. Jack Clement, Principal, El Toro High School; Girls' Athletic Director Representative - Sharen Caperton, Brea Olinda High School; Treasurer - Dale Mitchell, Principal, Centennial/Corona High School.

6. CIF-SS 1996-97 BUDGET PROPOSAL -- Margie Godfrey, Treasurer, presented the proposed 1996-97 CIF-SS Budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the budget as presented.

7. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE PROPOSAL -- Dean Crowley, Commissioner, reviewed the following items from the Blue Book Committee:

WEST COAST SPORTS MEDICINE FOUND. & HANSEN BEVERAGE CO. JOIN THE CIF-SS TEAM

The CIF Southern Section welcomes West Coast Sports Medicine Foundation as a sponsor for the 1996-97 school year. The agreement will make them the "Official Sports Medicine Provider of the CIF-SS."

The West Coast Sports Medicine Foundation was created in 1994 by Keith S. Feder, M.D.. The purpose of the foundation is to study, promote, review and improve sports medicine care, as well as conduct athletic medicine research in Southern California. Many high school student athletes are unable to access sports medicine care due to family and school financial and insurance constraints. School districts throughout the L.A. metropolitan area do not provide health insurance to student athletes leaving the vast majority to rely on ineffective Medi-Cal or HMO coverage. A disproportionately high percentage of minority youth are without insurance and left without the ability to acquire necessary medical services.

The West Coast Sports Medicine Foundation came together with Daniel Freeman Hospitals to create and implement the "Training to Win" program. The program began in 1994 and serves 19 high schools and 8,000 student athletes. It provides athletic trainers, sports accident insurance and medical attention to South Bay, Central and West Los Angeles students.

Addressing the new sponsorship arrangement, CIF Southern Section Commissioner Dean Crowley said, "We're pleased to have West Coast Sports Medicine Foundation as our newest sponsor. Their dedication to our youth is certainly commendable."

The CIF Southern Section also welcomes Hansen Beverage Company for the 1996-97 school year. The agreement will make them "Supplier of Soft Drinks for the CIF-SS."

**SPORTSMANSHIP
IS ALIVE
AND WELL!**

As we begin another year of interscholastic athletics, we look back at 1995-96 and many see it as a year where a football team was removed from the playoffs and a national scandal erupted from a football game at Beverly Hills High School.

These two incidents alone paint a horrid picture of the future of interscholastic athletics. However, sportsmanship is more than alive and well in the CIF Southern Section. Every year, it still amazes us that the number of self-reported infractions called into our office. Knowing that the consequences are often embarrassing and painful, those calls still come in. This speaks highly of the integrity of our coaches and school administrators.

Last year, I mentioned that the lack of good sportsmanship is a peril to high school athletics. However, the examples of good sportsmanship are so exciting to see that we can't help but be encouraged about the direction of the CIF and high school sports.

In a symbol of what athletics is all about, one incident comes to mind. It is the CIF/SCGA Golf Tournament in Temecula, and the top golfers from the Southern, Los Angeles City, San Diego, and Central Sections are in action. Michael Chavez of San Marcos High School finishes the tournament one stroke off the championship score. What's amazing was that Mr. Chavez, earlier in his round inadvertently broke a rule and penalized himself one stroke - the margin of his second place finish. No one in Chavez's foursome saw him break that rule, yet he would rather finish second rather than win a championship knowing he had won while violating the rules of the sport of golf. Michael Chavez is what athletics is all about, it is the desire to win, but not to win at all costs.

When a principal calls the Southern Section office to report that a rule had been broken and that sanctions are necessary, it sends our kids the message that sportsmanship, ethics, and playing within the rules are essential for sports to continue being

SHAREN CAPERTON

Sharen Caperton has been the Girls' Athletic Director at Brea Olinda High School since 1977. She has been a physical education teacher at Brea since 1974. Caperton has also coached the sports of track and field, basketball, field hockey, badminton, volleyball, and softball during her fine career. Among Caperton's accomplishments are being named Brea Olinda's Coach of the Year four times (1982, 1983, 1990, and 1991), Orange League Softball Coach of the Year in 1991 and 1993, and State Athletic Director of the Year in 1987. She was also a Camp Coach for the National Softball Coaches Association in 1994-95.

Caperton has served on the CIF Southern Section's Softball Committee since 1987 and on the Athletic Administrators Committee since 1994.

A graduate of Cal State Fullerton in Physical Education, Caperton currently resides in Brea.

DR. HAROLD CEBRUN

After working as a Systems Analyst for two years, Dr. Harold Cebrun moved into the field of public education. Since that time he has put in 28 years of distinguished service in education. Currently the Superintendent of the Compton Unified School District, Cebrun has served as a teacher, coach, Activities Director, Athletic Director, Counselor, Assistant Principal, Principal, Director of Student Services, Assistant Superintendent, and Area Superintendent with five different school districts.

Cebrun has received numerous awards, including being named Man of the Year by the Christian Youth Foundation in 1994, and being presented the Distinguished Service and Leadership Award by the Christian Athletic Association from 1985 to 1995 and the Distinguished Service Award by the Compton Athletic Foundation this past May.

Having served on several CIF Southern Section committees, Cebrun is still a member of the Superintendent's Committee.

An All-State athlete in baseball and basketball at Yates High School in Houston, Texas, Cebrun earned his Bachelor's Degree from the University of Nebraska, and his Master's and Doctorate

from Azusa Pacific University and Pacific University, respectively. Cebrun currently lives in Laguna Hills with his wife, Sharon Kay.

BARBRA JOHNSON

Barbra Johnson has been the Vice Principal at Highland High School since 1993. However, her career in education began in 1974 as a General Education Teacher for the Los Angeles Job Corps. Along the way, Johnson has been a Special Education Teacher for Jordan (L.A.), North Hollywood, Palmdale, and Desert Winds High Schools. In 1991, she got her first taste of the administrative side as the Coordinator of Special Education for the Antelope Valley Union School District.

Johnson's personal achievements include being a 1987 Teacher of the Year finalist with the Los Angeles Unified School District, being a member of the Los Angeles Board of Education's Special Education Commission from 1984 to 1987, and receiving the PTSA Honorary Service Award at Highland High School this past year.

Aside from being a Vice Principal at Highland, Johnson also serves as Activities Director. She is currently a member of the CIF Southern Section's Activities Director's Committee.

A resident of Palmdale, Johnson received her Bachelor's degree from Cal State Northridge and her Master's from the University of San Francisco.

ARCO am/pm INTRODUCES ITS "ADOPT-A-HIGH-SCHOOL" CAMPAIGN

CIF Title Sponsor ARCO and its am/pm franchisees will launch a major local store marketing campaign designed to help neighborhood high schools support their athletic programs. The campaign, designed specifically for CIF schools, is called the CIF ARCO am/pm "Adopt-A-High School" program. The program provides am/pm retailers with an assortment of local store marketing materials and fund-raising programs that can be executed in co-operation with the one or two high schools in their area.

ARCO am/pm is in the second year of sponsorship commitment to the CIF. Last

year ARCO established its sponsorship by supporting the CIF at a statewide level. This year the focus will be on marketing activities at the local level. "Adopt-A-High School" will create strong relationships between neighborhood am/pm retailers and high schools located right around the corner," said Bob Seagren, CIF Marketing Director. "ARCO has done an incredible job with their support of the CIF. Fund-raising kits are being created for individual high schools to be utilized by the school or booster clubs to benefit their sports programming. It's encouraging to see that they have a strong local marketing strategy to help leverage

their sponsorship."

The campaign kicks-off with a special personal invitation and gift-kit from am/pm retailers to key officials at their local high schools. The kit is a sample of a special CIF ARCO am/pm high school sports fund-raising kit holding a 20 oz. coffee mug, a 44 oz. sports bottle, and other value added merchandise that the schools can sell to generate revenue for their programs. Each gift-kit also includes a "Local Hero Card." The card invites school officials to visit their local am/pm and acknowledges them as

SYNOPSIS OF CHANGES TO 1996-97 BLUE BOOK

The following is designed for the benefit and convenience of athletic administrators and coaches in an effort to provide a capsule summary of the changes in the State CIF and Southern Section Constitution and Bylaws. These changes have been enacted by the State CIF Federated Council and the Southern Section Council throughout the course of the 1995-96 school term.

STATE REVISIONS

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 200 (F): New language regarding professional tryouts.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 205: The addition of C and D regarding conditions for waiver of semester rule.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 212: The creation of Bylaw 212 to be Foreign Exchange Student policy inclusively. The approved program list was also updated.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAWS 213-231: All numbers were increased by one after the change to Bylaw 212.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 214: The word "caregiver" was added to language wherever parent(s) and/or guardian(s) appeared in all of Article.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 223(B): Addition of #5-#8 regarding open enrollment procedures.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 230: Became "Falsification of Information" with new language added.

ARTICLE 3 -- BYLAW 303: Renamed "Unified Teams." Wherever the term "State Federated Council" appeared it was replaced with "State Executive Committee." Also, the addition of D regarding necessary small schools.

ARTICLE 5 -- BYLAW 502: Restructuring of Bylaw and the addition of B regarding combined teams.

ARTICLE 30 -- BYLAW 3002: Addition of C and D with new language regarding weigh-ins.

SOUTHERN SECTION REVISIONS

SOUTHERN SECTION CONSTITUTION ARTICLE 3, SECTION 30, SPECIAL NOTE: Rewritten to include assistant principal, vice principal and athletic director rather than authorized school administrators.

SOUTHERN SECTION CONSTITUTION ARTICLE 3, SECTION 32, RELEAGUING PROCEDURES: The addition of Question and Answer regarding midcycle league changes.

SOUTHERN SECTION CONSTITUTION ARTICLE 7, SECTION 70.2: The addition of the At-Large Representative, School Board Representative and Activities Director Representative to regular Executive Committee Members.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 214.8: The addition of #5 regarding previous participation and eligibility under open enrollment.

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 217: The addition of 217.1 "Expulsion - Return to Previous School/Transfer to New School".

ARTICLE 2 -- BYLAW 223: The addition of 223.1 regarding previous participation and eligibility under open enrollment.

ARTICLE 5 -- BYLAW 510: The addition of Question and Answer regarding 8th grade participation in spring tryouts.

ARTICLE 12 -- BYLAW 1212: Mileage changed from \$.28 to \$.32 per mile.

ARTICLE 12 -- BYLAW 1221(H): New language to clarify handling of financial matters.

ALL SPORTS SECTIONS: All dates upgraded to coincide with current sports calendar. Also, under "Player Conduct", the replacement of "for fighting" with "for any reason" and the removal of the "Definition of Fighting".

ARTICLE 16 -- BYLAW 1620: The addition of a special note regarding players with 5 personal fouls and conduct.

ARTICLE 19 -- BYLAW 1900: The addition of a special note regarding a special State waiver of the 14 year old rule for football.

ARTICLE 21 -- BYLAW 2116.1: Notation regarding playoffs in gymnastics.

ARTICLE 29 -- ENTIRE ARTICLE: New language in various sections regarding girls water polo.

ARTICLE 31 -- BYLAW 3100: The addition of new language changing 3100.1 and creating 3100.2 regarding regionalized playoffs.

ARTICLE 31 -- BYLAW 3102: The addition of a special note regarding regionalized sports.

ARTICLE 31 -- BYLAW 3103: The addition of A regarding host schools in regionalized sports.

ARTICLE 31 -- BYLAW 3114.2: The addition of a special note regarding football.

RULE REVIEW



RESIDENTIAL ELIGIBILITY

As we begin another school year, athletic eligibility continues to be an important issue. It is the principal's responsibility to determine eligibility and constantly monitor the eligibility of his or her athletes. In our increasingly mobile society, this task is becoming more difficult each year.

It is important to remember that CIF-SS Rule 500.2 specifically states that any athletic contest in which an ineligible player has participated in, whether intentionally or not, must be forfeited. Checking a student's eligibility now may prevent problems later in the season.

When checking residential eligibility, principals need to know that for the most part, unless a student makes a bona fide change of address from one public school's attendance area to yours, that student is ineligible with paperwork required for eligibility. The eligibility cards supplied in the school packet are to be used for all transfer students (other than the incoming ninth-graders) coming into your school. These cards will help determine eligibility or what form to submit to the CIF-SS office.

The most commonly used forms to assist in the eligibility of students who changed schools without a bona fide change of address are as follows:

Transfer Eligibility (Blue Book Rule 214)- this form is supplied in the packets and must be signed off by the school(s) of attendance the previous year, current school, the parents, and the student. This form will get the student eligible, but will prevent the student participating at the varsity level in the sports he or she competed in during the previous year.

Open Enrollment (Blue Book Rule 214.8 & 223)- this is for those students who are returning to the public school of their residence or transferring to a school which is accepting the student under that district's open enrollment policy. This transfer must be non-athletic and non-disciplinary, and must take place during the summer up to the first fifteen days of the new school year. The student is allowed one

SOUTHERN SECTION TO HONOR SCHOOLS FOR ATHLETIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The CIF Southern Section will recognize the top ten girls and boys athletic programs for the 1995-96 school year in the Fifth Annual Cavalcade of Champions. The Southern Section is currently exploring the most appropriate way to acknowledge these fine programs.

On the girls side, Buena took top honors, scoring 13 points on the strength of championships in basketball and swimming and diving. Peninsula was second for the second straight year as the Panthers won championships in basketball and tennis. The boys segment was won by Santa Margarita, which scored 21 points. The Eagles won titles in basketball, golf, and track and field. Second place went to Peninsula. The Pan-

ther boys won crowns in cross country and soccer.

The CIF-SS developed this recognition program based upon comprehensive excellence in interscholastic athletic competition. The purpose of this program is to enhance the spirit of competition, sportsmanship, and goodwill among the student athletes and member schools.

Awards are presented to the top-10 member schools (for both boys and girls athletic programs) for overall excellence in team sports throughout the school year. The winners are chosen upon playoff competition conducted during the previous year.

Winners are determined by a point system that provides: five points for a divisional

championship; three points for a divisional runner-up finish; two points for advancing to the semifinal round or a third place finish in a team place-finish sport (i.e. cross country, golf, swimming/diving, and track and field); and one point for a fourth place finish in a team place-finish sport. In cases where ties occur for the 10th place, total team-sport playoff appearances will be used to determine the top 10 schools. Each of the schools will be presented with an attractive banner for permanent display on campus.

"This type of program is at the heart of what our organization stands for. It is an exciting way to recognize such outstanding performances," says Dean Crowley, CIF-SS Commissioner of Athletics.

GOLD LIFE PASS AWARDS WINNERS HONORED

The California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section honored five longtime contributors to the cause of high school athletics and CIF-SS activities with the prestigious Gold Life Pass Awards at the April 25 Council Meeting in Buena Park.

The Gold Life Pass Award, emblematic of the highest service honor the organization can bestow upon an individual, celebrated its 44th year this spring. The award was initiated in 1952, with the first presentation going to Seth Van Patten, generally regarded as the "Father of the CIF Southern Section" and its first Commissioner of Athletics (1930-50). Including the five recipients awarded this year, a total of 153 Life Pass Awards have been presented.

Biographical sketches of the 1996 honorees, Bill Brady, Dr. Dennis Evans, Dr. Ronald Franklin, Fred Petersen, and Marie Upton follow:

BILL BRADY

Bill Brady is a 24-year member of the Golf Advisory Committee. He has been a member of that committee since its inception and is the committee's lone original member. His contributions to the Committee have helped make the CIF Golf Championships a first class event. After 35 years of teaching at Avenal, Covina, West Covina, Carpinteria, Pacifica, and Los Amigos, Brady retired in 1986. During his educational career, he initiated the golf program at then newly-opened Los Amigos and won three league titles in 8 years. His third season at Los Amigos produced a CIF Southern Section Individual Champion and a fifth place finisher. Aside from coaching golf, Brady also coached football, basketball, and track. The Montebello High School and Whittier College graduate also officiated football and basketball for 25 years. Brady, a World War II Navy veteran, now lives in Banning.

DENNIS EVANS

Dennis Evans is a former Principal for Corona del Mar High School and Newport Harbor High School. Evans' involvement with the CIF Southern Section spans three decades. He was the league President for the Century League in 1975 and the Sea View League in 1986 and 1988. Evans also served as League Representative

for over 16 years and under four different CIF-SS Commissioners (Fagans, Byrnes, Plutko, and Thomas). He chaired the Orange County Releaguings Committee from 1979-82 and was also a member of the Southern Section's Releaguings Committee.

RONALD FRANKLIN

Ronald Franklin is a former Executive Committee member and a former Superintendent of the Redlands Unified School District. Currently a professor at U.C. Riverside, Franklin started in the field of education in 1956, as a teacher in the El Rancho Unified School District. After working his way up to Superintendent of that district, he went on to become the Superintendent at the Novato Unified School District in Marin County and then at Redlands U.S.D. He has

accumulated numerous honors including the 1996 Distinguished Service Award and the 1994 Educator of the Year Award from the Redlands Chapter of Phi Kappa Delta, the 1994 Golden Oak Award from the California State PTA, and the 1986 Educator of the Year in Marin County. Aside from his affiliation with the CIF-SS, Franklin also belongs to the Association of California School Administrators and the American Association of School Administrators. Franklin is a graduate of Whittier College, Pepperdine

University, and Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

FRED PETERSEN

Fred Petersen is a former Athletic Director at West Torrance High School and a former member of the CIF Southern Section Council. He was a football coach for 19 years and compiled an incredible 143-50-3 record in those years. His teams won 7 league championships and a Southern Section championship in 1982. Petersen was named South Bay Coach of the Year twice by the Daily Breeze and twice by the Los Angeles Times. As a track and field coach, Petersen racked up 15 league championships in 28 years and was named 1982 CIF State Track Coach of the Year. An Athletic

MUIR'S BROWNFIELD INDUCTED INTO CALIFORNIA COACHES HALL OF FAME

For the first time in recent history, a coach from Southern California will be President of the California Coaches Association. Jim Brownfield, the extremely popular and equally successful retired coach from Muir High School was recently named to that post.

Just minutes before taking the reigns of the California Coaches Association, Brownfield was also inducted to the organizations' Hall of Fame during a ceremony at the Airport Hilton Hotel in Irvine. A ceremony that was attended by four of Brownfield's more successful students, including NFL Alumni Richard Bell and Dave Buchanan. Brownfield becomes the first coach from the Pasadena area to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

A quick look at Brownfield's credentials and one can understand why. As a collegiate and prep coach (which includes a 17 year stint at Muir), Brownfield collected 50 championships in 5 different sports, he has been named 'Coach of the Year' on 22 occasions, including 3 at the national level. His football teams at Loyola University (NCFA) won National Championships in 1969 and 1971 and he was an Assistant Coach on USC's 1972 National Championship football team.

At Muir alone, Brownfield's numbers are staggering. At one point, he had a string of 104 consecutive victories involving three sports. He won back-to-back CIF-SS Football Championships in

open enrollment transfer during his or her high school career. And as stated before, the transfer must meet the open enrollment guidelines of the new school's district. When approved, this form grants unrestricted eligibility.

Hardship (New Blue Book Rule 215) -- this type of transfer involves no bona fide change of address, but includes the occurrence of unforeseeable, unavoidable, and uncorrectable acts, conditions, or events that create a non-athletic burden on the student and/or his or her family. This form has also been placed in your packet. Once completed in full, the form must be filed with the Commissioner for his review. This process normally takes three-five days once the form is received by the CIF-SS office. Depending on the circumstances of the hardship, this form allows for differing degrees of eligibility.

Lastly, please recognize that this is merely an overview and there are other residential eligibility issues to consider. Please do not hesitate to call Dean, Karen or myself to assist in the process.

Information) -- A recommendation to add to the Southern Section Blue Book Bylaw 231 Which penalizes athletes for failure of student or parent to provide complete and accurate information regarding eligibility was approved.

B) Player Conduct Rule Language (All Sport Sections) -- A recommendation to delete the words "for fighting" in the current player conduct rule language in all sport sections of the bylaws replacing with the term "for any reason" was approved.

C) CIF Southern Section Bylaw 3114.2 (Number of Team Entries into Playoffs) -- A recommendation to add the following language as part of Bylaw 3114.2: In the sport of football only, if there are no .500 teams available in the draw, the next best record will be considered was approved.

D) Transfer Eligibility (Article 2, Section 213.8, #2 and 222B, #2) -- A recommendation to amend the working in Article 2, Section 213.8, #2 and 222B, #2 which would restrict a student athlete that transfers at the start of the school year and after having participated in an athletic contest at the previous school was approved.

E) Southern Section Council Membership (Blue Book Bylaw 31) -- The Committee recommended the deletion of "or other authorized school administrators and/or their designees" and replaced with "and Assistant principals or vice principals only". Following discussion a motion to amend the recommendation to include athletic directors was passed. A motion to approve the recommendation as amended was approved.

8. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP PROPOSED CHANGE (ARTICLE 7, SECTION 70.2) -- Dr. Ken Gunn, President, reviewed a proposal to amend Article 7, Section 70.2 to include a school board member and an activities director representative. Following discussion, a motion to approve was passed.

9. OFFICIAL FEES COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION -- Susana Arce, Chairperson of the Officials' Fees Committee, reviewed recommendations of the Officials' Fees Committee for a three year agreement (1996-1999) with the adjustments in wrestling, soccer, track & field and volleyball be made the first year, the second year a \$1.00 across the board increase and the third year a \$1.00 across the board increase, and a rule dealing (1221A) with the better working conditions for officials. The proposal was defeated by a vote of 44-21.

10. STATE CIF PROPOSALS -- Tom Triggs, presented the following agenda items for the May State Federated Council meeting which requires action by the CIF-SS Council in order to give voting delegates direction:
