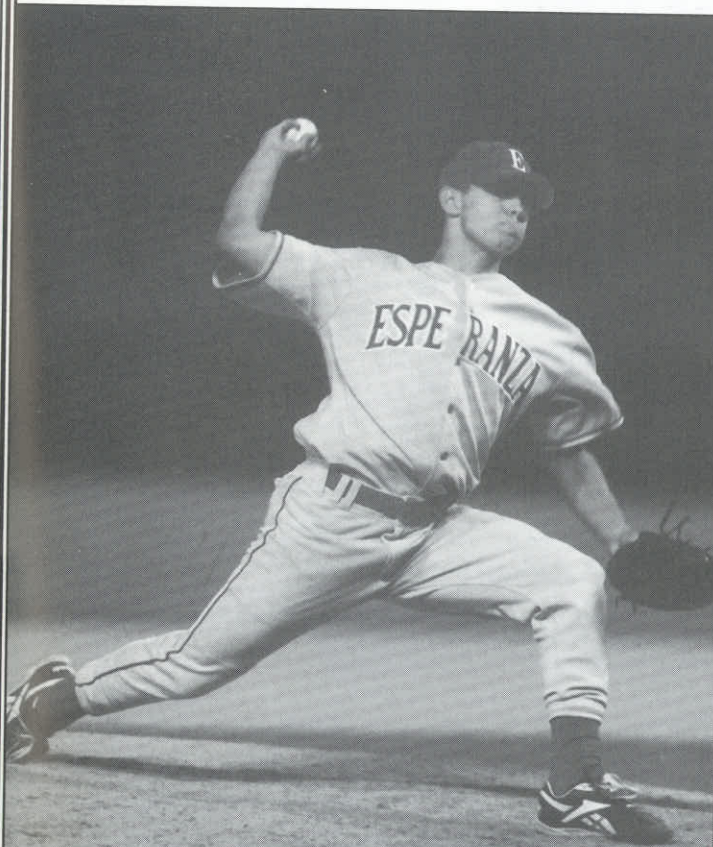

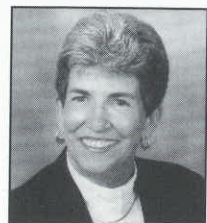

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Who's in Charge Anyway?

A few of you are old enough to remember the comic strip "Pogo". A famous line uttered by the character for whom the strip was named was, "We have met the enemy and it is us!" More than a few times during my years with the CIF-SS and as an administrator/supporter of high school athletics, those words have gone through my mind. It is easy to lose sight of the fact that the CIF-SS is "us". When we become angry or frustrated with a rule or action, we need to remember Pogo. We are the school level members of the organization ... that elect the representatives that attend the Council meetings ... that make the rules ... that govern high school athletics.

One of the things that has long impressed me about CIF is its governance structure which comes as close as is possible to truly representative democracy. The administrators and coaches who recognized the need for "governance by us" of high school athletics back during the early decades of this century were pretty darn smart. They knew that those trained, educated and able to oversee what would be best for the student-athletes of California were educators within the schools. From that vision and foresight evolved our present system of governance which provides a voice for every coach, athletic director and school administrator.

Each school is represented as a member of a league. Each league selects a representative to act on its behalf as a member of the Council. The Council is the legislative body of the Southern Section and exercises specific powers enumerated in the Constitution. All rules, regulations and penalties for violations of those rules and regulations are the responsibility of those representatives to the Council ... or, in other words ... "us". Therein lies the beauty of the organization. We can make, change, delete or amend any rule or regulation that we want to. The things we don't always like or that we complain about are not the result of some ambiguous, nameless group we

CIF-SS COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES April 28, 1998

The April meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by Tom Triggs, President, at 9:08 a.m. on Tuesday, April 28, 1998 at the Sequoia Club. All leagues were present with the exception of Academy, Agape and Desert Mountain.

1. MINUTES - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of March 24, 1998. Additionally, the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of April 15, 1998 were submitted as an informational item.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION - Doug Albrecht, parent, reviewed concerns regarding Blue Book Rule 310 (Association Rule). In addition, Tom Higgins, a Damien High School parent, discussed concerns regarding the Executive Committee Area Placement Proposal.

3. GOLD LIFE PASS PRESENTATION - Gary Talbert, chairperson of the Life Pass Committee, introduced those receiving Life Passes in recognition of their long standing service to the CIF-SS. Recipients were Sheila Burrud, John Muir High School; Bob Mc Guire, La Mirada High School and Bill Wood, Buena High School. Additionally, Hall of Fame Honoree was Jack Fernandez, wrestling coach, Mira Costa High School.

4. AREA PLACEMENT RECOMMENDATION - Tom Triggs, President, reviewed the Executive Committee Area Placement recommendation.

A. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT-ARTICLE 3
- AREA PLACEMENT - A motion to approve the proposal passed by a vote of 55 yes, 12 no and

2 abstentions.

B. PLACEMENT OF PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS - A motion to amend the proposal to vote on each school in the Orange County and Mt. Sac areas separately was approved by a vote of 32-28. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposal as amended. A motion to place Mater Dei High School in the Parochial Area was approved by a vote of 64-6. A motion to place Rosary High School in the Parochial Area was approved by a vote of 43-17. A motion to place Santa Margarita in the Parochial Area was approved by a vote of 44-16. A motion to place Damien in the Parochial Area was approved by a vote of 31-22. A motion to place St. Lucy's in the Parochial Area was approved by a majority vote of the Council. A motion to place Servite in the Parochial Area was approved by a majority vote of the Council.

5. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS - Dr. Scott McTaggart, presented the report of the Nominating Committee as it relates to the CIF-SS Executive Committee. Following a vote by the Council those elected were: President-Elect - Clark Stephens, Principal, Liberty Christian High School; Treasurer - Dr. Jack Clement, Principal, El Toro High School; Citrus Belt Area Representative - Dr. Tom Davis, Principal, Redlands East Valley High School; Foothill Area Representative - Tony Ortega, Principal, Arroyo High School; Small Schools Representative - Scott Sandie,

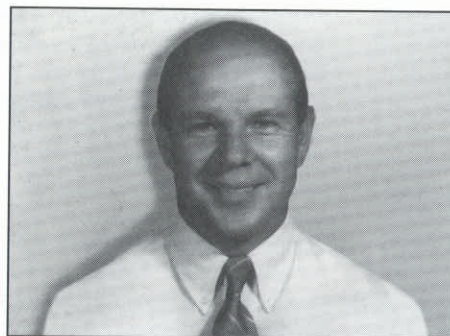
Dr. Davis and his wife Nancy live in Anaheim and have three grown

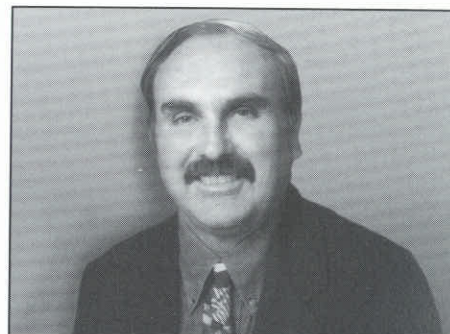
SCOTT SANDIE

GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP FOR ATHLETES AND OTHER HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

"Sportsmanship is that quality of honor that desires always to be courteous, fair, and respectful, and it is interpreted in the conduct of players, spectators, coaches, and school authorities." ---Fielding H. Yost

Should set a good example in the matter of sportsmanship and quickly condemn unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of other students or adults. To this end they should ---

- Remember that a student spectator represents his/her school the same as does the athlete.
- Recognize that the good name of the school is more valuable than any game won by unfair play.
- Respond with enthusiasm to the calls of the cheerleader for yells in support of the team, especially when it is losing.
- Learn the rules of the various athletic games so that either as spectators or critics they will be intelligent.
- Accept decisions of officials without question.
- Express disapproval of rough play or poor sportsmanship on the part of players representing the school.

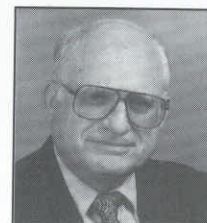

**Athletic
Directors'
Checklist!**

Now that we have started another new school year, here are a few things that Athletic Directors and Principals need to be aware of prior to students practicing and participating in athletic competition:

Physicals - Every student should have, on record, a recent physical exam qualifying them to practice for and compete in athletics.

Eligibility - A "red flag" must go-up for all new students to verify residential eligibility. Additionally, do all students have 20 units of 2.00 GPA per grading period?

Liability - Has your school met with parents to explain to them the potential risks of participating in interscholastic athletics?

Code of Ethics - Does your school have, on file, a signed "Coaches Code of Ethics" for each coach and his/her staff? Does your school also have a signed "Athletes Code of Ethics" for each student and parent?

Coaches Certificates - Are all coaches certified and in compliance with the California Educational Code?

These are but a few items to draw upon, but they represent the majority of what we get calls on, here at the office. Should you need any further assistance, please do not hesitate to call the CIF Southern Section office.

MINUTES OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING June 3, 1998

The June meeting of the CIF-SS Executive Committee was called to order by President Tom Triggs at 1:15 p.m. on Wednesday, June 3, 1998 at the CIF-SS Office. All members were present with the exception of Karen Craig, Dr. Liza Daniels, Fr. Robert Gallagher, Bob Nero and Dr. Richard Tucker.

1. MINUTES - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the April 15, 1998 CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting.

2. PUBLIC HEARING SESSION - Sr. Monica Collins, Principal, and Judy Hartranft, Athletic Director of St. Lucy's High School, discussed concerns regarding the Executive Committee's Area Placement Amendment to Article 3 of the CIF Southern Section Constitution and By-Laws and the placement of St. Lucy's High School in the Parochial Area.

3. REPORT ON CLOSED SESSION - No action taken.

4. HI-LO LEAGUE PLAYOFF ENTRY CONCERN - Dean Crowley, Commissioner, reviewed with the Committee the problems within the Hi-Lo League fielding enough teams to qualify for playoffs due to their geographic location. Following discussion, a motion to grant a two year exemption from

a duly constituted league structure for the Hi-Lo League when only three schools within the league fields teams in a sport was approved. In addition, the league will receive one entry into playoffs as a second or third place team and must travel in the first round.

5. AUDITOR (1998-99) - Tom Triggs, President, discussed the selection of an auditor for the 1998-99 year. Following discussion, a motion to maintain a three year cycle with auditing firms was approved.

6. NEW SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve membership of Academy of Academic Excellence (Apple Valley), Pilibos High School (Los Angeles) and Calvary Chapel Christian (Moreno Valley). Granite Hills and Henry J. Kaiser high schools' membership requests were tabled until the August 8, 1998 Executive Committee meeting.

7. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - Tom Triggs, President, reported on a new handbook for Executive Committee members. Clark Stephens, President-Elect, will be coordinating the project.

8. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE - Dean Crowley, reviewed the status of CIF-SS Office

technology, new phone system, school evaluations, office receptionist and playoff violations.

9. AREA REPRESENTATIVES REPORTS - Executive Committee Area Representatives reported on bond issues and the CIF/CADA Sportsmanship Conference scheduled for September 21, 1998.

10. MARKETING REPORT - Tom Triggs, announced ARCO *am/pm* will no longer be a State CIF titled sponsor. Dr. Harold Cebrun, Assistant Commissioner, reported on 24-Hour Fitness, a new CIF-SS corporate sponsor.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:55 p.m.

MARINA AND SANTA MARGARITA CLAIM TITLES IN THE SEVENTH ANNUAL CAVALCADE OF CHAMPIONS

The CIF Southern Section is please to announce the top ten girls and boys athletic programs in the Seventh Annual Cavalcade of Champions.

On the girls side, Marina took top honors scoring 18 points on the strength of championships in volleyball, basketball and water polo. The Vikings also claimed a runner-up finish in swimming. Also finishing with 18 points was Poly of Pasadena, but finished as runner-up after losing the tie-breaker (see below for details). Poly claimed championships in volleyball tennis and cross-country. The Panthers also reached the finals in track and field. Rounding out the top three was Wilson of Long Beach. The Bruins scored 13.5 points based on a championships in track and field and finals appearances in basketball, badminton and water polo.

Santa Margarita won the boys title for the third consecutive year. The Eagles scored a whopping 22.5 points, winning CIF-SS titles in football, basketball, soccer, and volleyball. Additionally, Santa Margarita's swimming and track and field team took third place in CIF-SS team action. Second place went to Poly of Long Beach with 18 points. The Jackrabbits won championships in football, cross-country and track and field team. Poly was also runner-up in basketball. The No. 3 spot went to Long Beach Wilson. The Bruins scored 13.5 points, winning a CIF-SS crown in water polo. The Bruins' golf and badminton teams finished second and its baseball and swimming teams reached the semifinals.

The CIF-SS developed this recognition program based upon comprehensive excellence in interscholastic competition. The purpose of this program is to enhance the

spirit of competition, sportsmanship, and goodwill among the student athletes and member schools.

The winners are determined by a point system that provides: five points for a divisional championship; three points for a divisional runner-up finish; two points for advancing to the semifinal round or a third place finish in a team place-finish sport (i.e. cross country, golf, swimming and diving, and track and field); and one point for a fourth place finish in a team place-finish sport. In cases where a tie occurs for 1st and 10th place, total team-sport playoff appearances will be used to determine the top ten schools.

"Congratulations to these fine schools for outstanding performances," says Dean Crowley, CIF-SS Commissioner of Athletics. "They are to be proud of the accomplishments of their entire athletic programs."

CROWLEY ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF NATIONAL OFFICIALS ORGANIZATION

CIF Southern Section Commissioner of Athletics, Dean Crowley, has been elected chair of the National Association of Sports Officials (N.A.S.O.). The announcement was made during the N.A.S.O. annual meeting conducted at the 17th National Convention of Sports Officials in Indianapolis on July 20, 1998. Crowley, 64, was originally elected to the N.A.S.O. Board of Directors in 1995.

"N.A.S.O. is an important organization meeting the needs of officials at every level," said Crowley. "I am excited to be afforded the an opportunity to be in a leadership position."

The Racine, Wisconsin-based N.A.S.O. is a voluntary membership, not-for-profit educational association, founded in 1980, working to improve the skills and conditions for sports officials of all levels. Membership is worldwide and includes officials in virtually every sport and at all levels from youth leagues to the professional ranks. The organization also produces the industry magazine, *Referee*.

Crowley's own officiating career includes several achievements. As a basketball official, Crowley worked five CIF Southern Section championship games, multiple community college championships and the 1981 NCAA Division III district playoffs.

In 1982 he received the distinguished Merit Award from the Southern Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Association for his service and commitment to the game.

Crowley's football officiating career started in 1968, working high school games. In the mid-1970s he began working in the Big West Conference (previously the Pacific Coast Athletic Association) and earned four bowl game assignments (1982 Aloha Bowl, 1986 Independence Bowl, 1988 Freedom Bowl, and the first-ever Las Vegas Bowl in 1992). Crowley retired from football officiating after the 1995 season.

GOLD LIFE PASS AWARDS WINNERS HONORED

SHELIA BURRUD

The California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section honored three longtime contributors to the cause of high school athletics and CIF-SS activities with the prestigious Gold Life Pass Awards at the April 28 Council Meeting in Buena Park.

The Gold Life Pass Award, emblematic of the highest service honor the organization can bestow upon an individual, celebrated it's 46th year this spring. The award was initiated in 1952, with the first presentation going to Seth Van Patten, generally regarded as the "Father of the CIF Southern Section" and its first Commissioner of Athletics (1930-50). Including the three recipients awarded this year, a total of 167 Life Pass Awards have been presented.

Biographical sketches of the 1998 honorees, Bill Wood, Shelia Burrud and Bob McGuire are as follows:

BILL WOOD

Bill Wood was the long time Athletic Director and coach from Buena High School. A former teacher and coach at Buena High School, Wood became part of the inaugural staff when Buena opened its doors in 1961. Wood taught and coached at the school for the next 38 years. He was the school's second varsity basketball coach (1971-81) where his teams posted an overall record of 151-106 while winning two Channel League championships. His teams put together a record of 8-4 in the playoffs and reached the section's 4A title game in 1976. Wood also coached JV basketball and was head golf coach at Buena for 28 years. He served as athletic director for 13 years. Wood was known as a no-nonsense, hands-on administrator who was also a strong supporter of the passage of Title IX.



tative from the Pacific League, a member of the athletic administrators committee, executive committee member and as a representative to the state federated council. She has also served as a finish line timer in track for many years.

BOB MCGUIRE

Bob McGuire has been very active in the area of track and field and cross-country since 1981. That was when he began serving on the Track & Field Advisory Committee and as one of the prelim meet managers. Prior to that, McGuire taught

and coached cross-country and track and field at La Mirada, William Neff and Twentynine Palms High Schools. In the early 1990's McGuire began assisting with the Cross-Country finals and continues to do so to this day. Since 1994, McGuire has been serving as meet manager for the Divisional Finals, the Masters Meet and the State Meet as well as the Division I prelims. McGuire continues to serve on both the Track and Field as well as the Cross-Country Advisory boards. He has also been instrumental in researching lost and unknown facts for the CIF-SS Records Book.

BILL CLARK NAMED TO EL DORADO HIGH SCHOOLS ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

Assistant Commissioner of Athletics, Bill Clark, has been selected as one of 16 inductees of the new El Dorado High School Athletics Hall of Fame to be enshrined during the weekend of September 25-26 on the campus of El Dorado High School.

Clark, an Assistant Commissioner with the CIF Southern Section since 1980, began working as a teacher at EDHS in 1969. He then became athletic director at El Dorado from 1973-80. During his tenure

with the Golden Hawks, the school captured CIF-SS titles in the sports of boys basketball, baseball, wrestling, boys swimming, and boys water polo.

"I think that this is a real honor and a privilege considering all of the illustrious alumni and staff this school has seen through the years," said Clark. "I am really proud of the fact that we were able to assemble a staff that worked well together and that emphasized kids participation in a variety of sports."

Clark's pride is well founded as during his tenure as athletic director, Golden Hawk athletics saw 47% of their student body taking part in athletics.

Twelve former athletes, two coaches and two support individuals will be enshrined during the festivities that begin with a school-wide assembly followed by a halftime presentation during El Dorado's football game vs. Valencia at Bradford Stadium on Friday, September 25. The honors will culminate at an awards dinner in the Joe Raya Gym on Saturday, September 26.

LONG BEACH POLY REPEATS RARE DOUBLE AT 1998 STATE CIF ARCO *am/pm* TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Long Beach Poly became the first school ever to pull off a sweep of the team titles in consecutive years at the State CIF ARCO *am/pm* Track and Field Championships, held on June 5 & 6 at Falcon Stadium on the campus of Cerritos College. Only Berkeley, in 1981, has had both their boys and girls teams take titles in the same year, but no team, until this year, had pulled-off that feat twice.

The Poly's girls team had to share their title with Moore League rival Wilson of Long Beach, whose 4x400m relay squad set a new national record (3:36:32).

On the girls side, the Southern Section enjoyed tremendous success claiming championships in eight events. Highlighting the action was, of course, Wilson's record-setting effort and Angela Williams' chase of Marion Jones' (Thousand Oaks) national mark in the 100m. Williams, from Chino, broke Jones' time, running a 11:10. William's came-up short of Jones' record in the 200m, but still won the title with a time of 23.02. Williams also took first in the long jump.

Another highlight was the double championship effort by Stephanie Brown of Arroyo Grande. Brown took home titles in the Shot Put (48' 10.75") and the Discus (181' 03.00"). The only other individual event

Poly's boys team took the team title due to the strong efforts of Darrell Rideaux and Kareem Kelly. Rideaux and Kelly were the Jackrabbits' lone individual event champions as they claimed titles in the 100m (10.43) and the 200m (20.76), respectively.

Event champions on the boys side included Mike Ryan of Beverly Hills in the 400m (47.62), Marcell Allmond of St. Paul in the 110m HH (13.83), Al Williams of Irvine in the 300m low hurdles, Darren Marble of Los Altos in the high jump (6-08) and Reedus Thurman of Serra in the Discus (202' 01.00). Team relay titles went to Poly in the 4x100m (40.45), and Dominguez repeated in the 4x400m (3:12.64).

- Express disapproval of any abusive remarks from the side lines.
- Recognize and applaud an exhibition of fine play or good sportsmanship on the part of the visiting team.
- Be considerate of the injured on the visiting team.
- Insist on the courteous treatment of the visiting team as it passes through the streets or visits the local school building, and extend the members every possible courtesy.
- Acquaint the adults of the community and the pupils with the ideals of sportsmanship that are acceptable to the high school.
- Impress upon the community its responsibility for the exercise of self-control and fair play at all athletic contests.
- Advocate that any spectator who continually evidences poor sportsmanship be requested not to attend future contests.
- Insist on fair, courteous, and truthful accounts of athletics contests in local and school papers.
- Be familiar with the state rules of eligibility and support their strict enforcement.
- Encourage the full discussion of fair play, sportsmanship, and school spirit through class work and auditorium programs in order to discover ways by which students and schools can develop and demonstrate good sportsmanship.

6. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE PROPOSAL - Dean Crowley, Commissioner, reviewed the following items from the Blue Book Committee:

A. Water Polo Tournament Proposal - A recommendation to add to Blue Book Rule 2905 the Statement, "A student may not participate in more than three tournaments during the season" was approved.

B. Private Football Camp Definition - A recommendation to add to Blue Book Rule 1922 the definition, "A private football camp is defined where there are students from three or more schools in attendance and the camp is not being run by a high school coach who has students in attendance" was approved.

C. Out of State Competition Rule - 702.1 - A recommendation to add to Blue Book Rule 702.1 the exemption "any team who, in the previous year has reached the championship round and is invited to return, may petition the Southern Section Commissioner for approval" was approved.

7. MOJAVE RIVER LEAGUE PROPOSAL TO DELETE RULE 310 (ASSOCIATION RULE) - Rob Martin, Mojave River League Representative, reviewed the proposal calling for the deletion of Blue book Rule 310 (Association Rule). Following discussion, a motion to approve the proposal was defeated.

8. CIF STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL MAY ACTION ITEMS - Margie Godfrey, presented the following agenda items for the May CIF State Federated Council meeting in order to give Southern Section delegates voting direction:

A. Revision of Open Enrollment By-Law 223 and 214 - vote to support.

B. Criteria for employment of coaches - vote to support.

C. Snowboarding as an event in skiing - vote to support.

D. Definition of bonafide change of residence - vote to support.

E. Post-season Northern California Tennis Regional Tournament - vote to support.

F. State CIF Executive Committee Elections - vote to send delegates uninstructed.

G. 1998-99 State CIF Budget Proposal - vote to support.

H. Membership of allied organization on the Federated Council - vote to support

I. Develop By-Law 805 (gifts, sponsorships or contributions to athletic programs) - vote to table.

9. CIF-SS 1998-99 BUDGET PROPOSAL - Clark Stephens, Treasurer reviewed the 1998-99 CIF-SS Budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the budget as presented.

10. DELETION OF RULE 711 - Donn Clickard, Boys' Athletic Director Representative, presented the Los Padres League proposal which calls for the deletion of CIF-SS Rule 711. Following discussion, a motion to support the proposal was defeated.

11. 1998-2002 PLAYOFF GROUPINGS - Dr. John Dahlem, Chairperson of the Playoff Groupings Committee, presented the final proposal of the Playoff Groupings for the 1998-2002 cycle. Following discussion, it was moved seconded and passed to approve the 1998-2002 Playoff Groupings.

12. PLAYOFF FORMAT - Tom Triggs, reviewed the 1996-98 experiment of regional based play-

offs. Following discussion, a motion to continue regional based playoffs was defeated.

13. TENNIS SCORING FORMAT - Dr. John Dahlem, Empire League Representative, presented a proposal which calls for a change in the current scoring format for boys' and girls' tennis championship competition. This will be an action item at the October 22, 1998 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

14. PLAYOFFS BY ENROLLMENT - Nancy Murray, Century League President, presented a proposal to conduct playoffs by enrollment in the sports of water polo, swimming, track & field, golf and badminton. In addition, the proposal would allow schools to petition to play one division lower than their enrollment category. This will be an action item at the October 22, 1998, meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

15. PLAYOFF MOVE-UP - Ray Moore, Athletic Director, Diamond Bar High School, presented a proposal which prohibits schools from moving up to a higher division in championships conducted by enrollment. This will be an action item at the October 22, 1998, meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

16. PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Tom Triggs, reviewed procedures for cross country playoffs and announced the retiring of Margaret Davis, Associate Commissioner of the State CIF.

17. COMMISSIONER'S REPORT - Dean Crowley reviewed Open Enrollment and planning for the CIF-SS three to five years Goals and Objectives.

18. TREASURER'S REPORT - Clark Stephens, reviewed the current status of the 1997-98 CIF-SS budget.

19. PASSING OF THE GAVEL - Tom Triggs, President, relinquished his duties to President-Elect Margie Godfrey for the 1998-2000 term as president of the CIF-SS Council.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m.

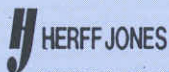
call "them". They are the result of "us" and we have the power to change anything we need to change.

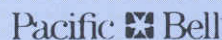

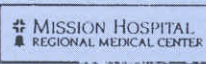
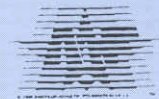
