

MEETING OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION

February 24, 1917.

The postponed meeting (from Feb. 17) of the S. I. F. Southern Section was held at the Olive Street High School, Saturday, February 24, 1917, with the following members present:

The minutes of the meeting held December 20th were read and approved.

Upon motion of the Manager of the Football Season the Football Trophy for the Football Championship of Southern California was awarded to San Diego for the current year.

A motion carried providing that a plaque (the cost of which is not to exceed \$5.00) be awarded the school winning the Southern California Championship in each of the five events, Football, Basketball, Track, Tennis, and Baseball, said plaque to become the permanent property of the respective schools.

The Treasurer of the Council was authorized and it became his duty to provide the plaques for the winners of the above stated championships.

A motion was passed authorizing the Treasurer to advance \$15.00 to Seth F. VarPatten as preliminary expenses to be used by him as Manager of Track.

The Manager's Report for the Football Season 1916 was read and accepted. The report showed a total of \$499.60 collected as 20% of the net receipts of the semi-final and final games, and the same has been turned over to the Treasurer.

The Manager presented a bill of \$62.94 which was allowed to cover the postage, telephone, clerical help, and expenses incident to the appointment of officials for the games, and for payment of inspectors and their expenses in checking the gate of the games leading to the championship.

A motion was passed authorizing the Manager of each series of games leading to the championship conducted under the management of this council, to assume the business management of the gate receipts and the tickets.

The President appointed the following as a committee to report at the next meeting a plan for the business management of the games leading to a championship:

A bill of \$2.95 presented by E. H. McMath, former president, was allowed to cover telephone fees while he was in office.

The Secretary presented a blank form to be used in cases of reinstatement, which was approved, and two thousand copies were ordered printed. These copies are to be mailed with instructions for their use, to all high schools of Southern California.

W. L. Richer, as Manager of Water Polo, submitted a report showing that Long Beach High School had won the Championship.

The Secretary was instructed to write Dr. Gowan of Covina High School asking information as to schools which do not understand the rules of eligibility and also asking that he appear before the Council at its next meeting to show cause why Covina High School teams should not be suspended from further participation in interscholastic athletics.

Seth F. VanPatten, Manager of Track for 1917, was directed to take charge of the athletes who will enter the State Meet to be held in Berkeley the latter part of April. It will be his duty to attend to their entries and accompany them to the Meet, his expenses to be paid by this Council.

Upon motion H.J. Moore of Inglewood was appointed Manager for the Baseball Season of 1917.

The Council adjourned to meet March 23, 4 P. M. at the Los Angeles High School.

MANAGER'S REPORT

FOOTBALL SEASON, SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA, 1916.

To California Interscholastic Federation, S. S.,
Gentlemen:-

As manager of the Football Season for Southern California Interscholastic Federation, I desire to submit the following report.

The season was particularly brilliant from several standpoints and bids well for future years. The clean sportsmanship of the schools and players competing, the judicious and capable official handling of the games and the general interest and enthusiasm of the public at large have fixed the American Game as the official sport of the autumn season.

I desire particularly to commend the men who have acted in the capacity of officials during the season. These men have, out of goodness of heart, made many personal sacrifices in order to make appointments which were not particularly convenient or desirable. Should opportunity be given me next season to serve on this Council, I hope to make some recommendation concerning the compensation of the officials.

The very pleasing financial report, which is appended, is due primarily to the method of pairing the schools in the preliminary and semi-final games. No drawing was found necessary after the schools had been called together as they mutually agreed to their competitors and the place for their respective games. Had it been necessary to conduct a drawing and the Manager found it necessary to appoint a neutral place for the game, the receipts would not have approximated to the amount which was realized.

The financial summary is as follows, being 20% of the net receipts of the semi-final and final games:--
