The council of the Southern Section of the C. I. F. met in called meeting at the Y.M.C.A. Building February 25, 1921 at 3:30 P.M.

Protests

Ray Wilhite of Azusa went to Oxnard, stayed eight weeks played for Oxnard returned for rest of semester to Azusa and played for Azusa all without a change of residence of his parents. He further boasted that he knew that he was breaking a rule of the C.I.F. and was "putting it over on the schools"

It was moved, seconded and carried that Ray Wilhite be suspended for one year from date Feb. 20, 1921.

Jim Hall changed to Long Beach High and has now changed back to Azusa.

It was moved, seconded and carried that in as much as he is changing schools without a change of residence he cannot play for Azusa this semester.

A letter was read from J. M. Perry of San Diego requesting that a boy who enlisted and has just been discharged, be allowed to take part in school contests this semester. The chair ruled that this boy would have to be in school one semester before he could play.

During the discussion of the above cases, the fact was brought out that a great many boys and teachers had a mistaken idea about the one semester ineligibility. These people have the idea that if a boy is ineligible the first day of a semester, he may play at the end of ten weeks. It is to be distinctly understood that he is ineligible for all of the semester.

The chair ruled that he would not be allowed to play beyond this semester and that one semester did not end until the next semester started.

Mr. Jantzen then requested that his school be put in some other league. It was suggested that Colton apply for admission to the Citrus League.

After a general discussion, it was moved by Mr. Green and seconded by Mr. Fisher that Long Beach High School be reinstated to full relationship in the C. I. F. except the football schedule next fall.

Upon roll call, all voted yes except Mr. McIntosh, who felt that he had not been instructed by his league to reinstate Long Beach.

It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously that any school under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. Southern Section must finish the League Schedule and any school entitled to enter semi-finals or finals must complete its schedule until eliminated and any school which refuses to complete the schedule, shall at once disband its team for that sport for the season or be suspended from the C. I. F. Southern Section for one year. This rule to apply to all schools and teams under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. Southern Section.

It was moved, seconded, and carried unanimously that no school under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. Southern Section, shall compete with schools outside the State of California without receiving the consent of the Council.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that no school under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. Southern Section shall play ineligible men at any time even in practice games whether such games are with schools under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. or not; any school violating this rule shall be suspended from participation in such sport for the succeeding season. This resolution to be referred to the several Leagues for ratification.

Mr. Moore reported that his work as football manager was delayed by the fact that the schools were not prompt in making reports of semi-final games. It was agreed that the secretary should write to San Diego and inform them that if the report was not made to Mr. Moore within two weeks, San Diego High School would be suspended.

It was agreed that Long Beach, San Diego, Santa Monica, and Whittier should present but one of their number for semi-finals in baseball and basketball.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

George M. Green, Secretary.

Mr. Green, President of the Bay League, made the following statement: "San Pedro protested Redondo on the grounds that one boy had been in Redondo for ten semesters and had played during the past semester. That a committee had been appointed to investigate, but no meeting had been held to receive the report. That the Principal of Redondo had admitted to Mr. Green that the boy was a ten semester man and his record had not been questioned or investigated, the Principal having taken the boy's word."

It was moved, seconded, and carried that if the above statements were true as to fact, that Redondo be suspended for the rest of the school year 1920-21.

Mr. Green reported that at the last meeting of the Bay League the league voted to petition to have Redondo and Gardena re-instated for Baseball. (This motion had been passed before the protest of San Pedro had been made.)

The Chair ruled that the suspension would stand unless the two schools could show the council very good reasons why they should be re-instated.

It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. Downing of Alhambra, Basketball Manager, call for entries in a schedule to be made by him for teams of 130 and teams of 110 pound men.

Only one team from each league to be allowed in these schedules.

Each team to be "weighed in" the first game of the semi-finals and weights handed in to the Manager by the referee.

It was agreed the price to be paid to officials in these semi-finals to be \$7.50 and expenses. Admission to be 25¢ minimum.

The question then came up in reference to a boy who had signed a contract to play professional Baseball but who had not played and who had not received any money. It was agreed that he was still an amateur.

It was moved, seconded and carried that we appropriate \$30.00 per man toward the expenses of the Southern California Track team that will represent us at the State Meet.

It was agreed to pay mileage to each boy who took part in the "Meet" April 16, 1921, who had to travel over 50 miles. The amount to be fixed at a meeting to be held on that date.

Mr. H. J. Moore was appointed a committee of one to present a plan for the managing of Athletics and to report at the meeting of April 16, 1921.

Mr. Hughes Motion

No student within the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. S. S. who has changed schools within the limits of the section is eligible to compete with the new school until after a residence of one semester. It is to be understood that this does not apply to students coming from outside the jurisdiction of this section of the C. I. F.

This motion had been referred to the several Leagues.

The representative of Valley, Central, Citrus, and Orange reported that the schools of these leagues felt that the Council had better deal with the few cases rather than place a penalty on the pupil who had to move.

Mr. Green asked what would be done to the Long Beach Football boys if rumor be true that they were going to transfer in a body the last ten weeks of this semester to Wilmington? While no vote was taken, it was the general opinion that this would not be allowed and that it would be better to deal with this case through the Council rather than pass a drastic general rule as called for in the motion.

The Chair ruled Mr. Hughes's motion lost.

That no school under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. Southern Section shall play ineligible men at any time even in practice games whether such games are played with schools under the jurisdiction of the C. I. F. or not; and any school violating this rule shall be suspended from participation in such sport for the succeeding season.

The chair declared Mr. Malcolm's motion carried.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the City League be allowed to play "Flu Semester" men in the games of the City League Schedule.

The President reported that the University of Southern California High School wished to be placed in a league.

The Secretary was instructed to inform them that they would have to apply to some league for admission. Private schools were not placed in leagues.

The Chair appointed G. M. Green, C. B. Moore, and H. J. Moore a committee to compile and print a new edition of the Constitution and Rulings of the C. I. F.

It was agreed to ask the Principals and Coaches to file with the Secretary, any suggestion which they wished to make which would make the new edition of greater value.

It was agreed that we should ask the Principals to impress upon the individual pupil the necessity of the pupil trying to help enforce the rules. The rules are for the purpose of keeping High School athletics uniform and clean and the Council exists for that purpose.

There being no further business, the Council adjourned.

C. I. F. RULINGS FROM THE MINUTES

March 16, 1921

Man not allowed on two weight teams in same week.

An institutional team (college or prep combined) may play out of league season.

May 21, 1921

Managers paid as follows:

President authorized to appoint a representative at any time to attend any game or meet, and to report conduct of any individual or team at the expense of C. I. F.-S. S.

June 13, 1921

Hereafter five places in S. C. track meet.

October 15, 1921

In order to be re-instated a suspended school must abide by the rules of the C. I. F.-S. C. during suspension.

Schools playing games with schools outside of the C. I. F. must file eligibility list with the Secretary.

October 29, 1921

Pupils in Grammar Schools annexed by supervisors to High School "A" who were attending High School "B" may stay in "B" and be eligible but would also be eligible if they entered "A".

If pupil is marked "4" by teacher, the teacher must make it clear that the grade was "passing" but withheld for change to higher rating.

November 12, 1921

One semester does not end until the next semester begins.

Request to play with schools outside of California must be made in writing by the Principal of a school and consent granted only by a majority vote of the whole Council in meeting assembled.

Sports conducted so that part of schedule is in each semester shall count as one season of that sport.

League cannot make rule contrary to rules of the C. I. F. but may make rule more drastic.

Boy ineligible first day of semester is ineligible whole semester. Some Principals, coaches and pupils seem to think that ten weeks attendance removes ineligibility.

December 10, 1921

Man may play on unlimited and 130 lb. teams in semi-finals provided he is not played on both teams the same week.

Referee is acting within his rights when he reverses his decision regarding an explicit rule of the game and if the score is affected the score may be declared changed.

League must inform Manager that the league intends to enter the semi-finals before the schedule is drawn up. No school will be allowed to enter after the schedule starts.

January 21, 1922

Basketball game must run full time, unless shortened by mutual agreement before game starts, to be called a game.

If the two teams cannot agree basketball manager shall have semi-finals and finals played on a court about 35'x 70' with clear space of three feet and overhead clearance of at least 20'.

If one school demands two officials in semi-finals or final games, two must be supplied.

In S. C. Track one boy to enter only three events and relay.

Free-lance schools must win all games in approved schedule of five games in order to enter semi-finals.

No school may charge traveling expenses in excess of the railroad or stage fare except by mutual consent of the two schools.

March 11, 1922

Imperial Valley League granted permission to play Yuma if she lives up to C. I. F. rules.

April 22, 1922

If school coach, coaches from first or third base box, the game is forfeited.

No team shall be allowed in semi-finals or finals weight contests unless it has won approved or league schedule of at least three games.

First round of baseball semi-finals fourth Saturday in May.

One boy be allowed to enter but two of these three events $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{1}{2}$ and mile races in one track meet.

Pupils in separate Junior High Schools cannot represent Senior High Schools.

All boys to be weighed in during the first two weeks of school of each semester.

May 5, 1922

State Council

Each section limited to four men in each event in State Track Meet.

There will be no State Championship in Baseball hereafter.

Order of Events in Swimming

50 yard, 220 yard, 100 yard breast fancy diving, 100 yard free, 50 yard back, 440 yard free, plunge, relay.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CLASSIFICATION OF HIGH SCHOOL BOYS

ACCORDING TO THE "FOUR POINT" RATING TABLE.

1. The weight to be taken without clothing.
2. The height to be taken without shoes.
3. The age to be recorded in years and months.
4. The grade to be recorded as 9, 10, 11, and 12.
5. For the weight, height, age and grade as determined above, find from the table the proper exponents.
6. Add the exponents. (See example immediately below table).
7. When the sum of the exponents is 64 or over, the boy is rated as "Class A" and may not compete on a "Class B", "Class C", or "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, or 63, the boy is rated as "Class B" and may not compete on a "Class C" or a "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, or 56, the boy is rated as "Class C" and may not compete on a "Class D" team. When the sum of the exponents is less than 50, the boy is rated as "Class D".
