MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING OF FEBRUARY 5, 1949

RIFLE TEAM COMPETITION

It was moved by Mr. Holt and seconded by Mr. Konold that a committee of two from the Executive Committee be appointed to confer with a committee of five from the Rifle Coaches to formulate plans for bringing the rifle team competition under the administration of the C. I. F. Southern Section. Carried unanimously. The President appointed Mr. Holt and Mr. Konold to the committee.

SANCTIONED EVENTS

Mr. Van Patten called attention to the conditions surrounding sanctioned events. The number of meets, tournaments etc. has grown to such an extent that they will soon dominate our program of athletics. They often come in conflict with league activities. It was suggested that a more formal procedure be followed in granting sanctions and that an official report be required from all sanctioned events.

Moved by Mr. Bergstrom and seconded by Mr. Johnson that a committee of two from the Executive Committee and the Commissioner of Athletics prepare forms to be used and rules to be followed. Carried unanimously. The President appointed Mr. Bergstrom and Mr. Johnson.

LARGE AND SMALL SCHOOL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The track coaches at their meeting on January 14, 1948 had voted a recommendation to the Council that the question of a championship meet for our small schools be set up separate from our regular championship in track.

The question was debated at length. It was pointed out that we now have a large and small school championship in football. It was also emphasized that track is an individual championship as well as a team championship. It was recalled that often the champion in an event

comes from a small school, as Hooper of Antelope Valley in the mile back in the early Thirties.

Mr. Konold made a motion that the President select a committee of six from the Council to study the problem of separate meets and championships for large and small schools. Mr. Bergstrom seconded the motion and it carried.

LIFE PASSES

In accordance with instructions Mr. Van Patten reported that Life Passes of solid metal (Richlow Brass) which will not tarnish could be had in lots of 25 for about \$3.00 each. A quantity of 50 plates will cost about \$2.25 each. He also recommended that a committee of five to serve until replaced be charged with the responsibility of making nominations of individuals to receive C. I. F., Southern Section Life Passes.

For the guidance of the committee in making nominations and the Council in voting the C. I. F., Southern Section Life Passes, the following rules should be observed:

(a) A majority of the Council be required to grant a Life Pass.

(b) Nominations of candidates for a Life Pass or granting of a Life Pass can take place only at a regular meeting of the Council. The nominations must be made at one meeting of the Council and be voted on at the next regular meeting of the Council.

(c) The nomination committee shall be five in number and be regular members of the Council appointed to serve until replaced.

(d) Exceptional services for the C. I. F., Southern Section, long service on the Executive Committee or Council, volunteer services as an official or a committee member shall be considered when nominations or elections to C. I. F., Southern Section Life Pass privileges are made.

CERTIFICATION OF APPRECIATION

Mr. Konold gave a report on the Certificate of Appreciation. Mr. Johnson moved that because it will be extremely valuable in the C. I. F., Southern Section public relations program Mr. Konold be given full charge of this project. Mr. Bergstrom seconded the motion and it carried.

SWIMMING COACHES MEETING

Mr. Bergstrom moved that the following minutes of the Swimming Coaches Meeting be approved. Mr. Holt seconded the motion and it carried.

220 YARD FREE STYLE

The first change considered was the 220 yard free style event. This has been changed to 200 yards. After a considerable discussion Mr. Walter Smith moved and Mr. Saari seconded to recommend that we change to 200 yards in our Class A and Class B free style event. Carried unanimously.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

The individual medley was changed to conform to the length of pools.

The C. I. F., Southern Section track coaches at a meeting on January 14, 1948 recommended to our Council the following actions:

(b) A recommendation that the discus be made an exhibition event in the State Meet in 1949.

(c) A recommendation that in the 1949 State Meet the 440 yard race be run in two heats with the first five runners in each heat being timed. (The best men should be seeded in one race.)

(d) That Clinics for track starters be organized among our available starters.

(e) That Class C boys may not compete in both the 100 yard and the 180 yard races.

ELIGIBILITY CASES

A Mount Carmel Boy has had but two years of athletic competition although he is now a nine semester man, because of a change of schools. The Executive Committee took no formal action. It was pointed out to the Mount Carmel Director of Athletics and the coach that the Executive Committee had no authority to change our rules.

A letter from the Redlands High School coach regarding the eligibility of two boys seemed to hinge on the boys place of legal residence. Mr. Nelson, President of our Council was asked to check on the facts and leave the question to the Citrus Belt League for decision.

SAN LUIS OBISPO LEAGUE SCHOOL

A member of the San Luis Obispo League was accused of not observing C. I. F. rules in its competition. The League was directed to investigate and report findings to the Executive Committee.

SANTA BARBARA TENNIS SCHEDULE

Santa Barbara High School submitted the following five game schedule and requested a ruling as to how they might be qualified for the team tennis play-offs:

1. March 19—Mark Keppel
2. March 26 or 29—Burbank
3. April 5—Santa Paula
4. April 21 or 28—Beverly Hills
5. May 3—Ventura.

Mr. Bergstrom made a motion that the schedule be accepted as a league schedule and that Santa Barbara could not lose any contest if they are to qualify for the play-off. Mr. Johnson seconded the motion and it carried.

BLUE BOOK

Mr. Van Vatten reported that the supply of 1947 Blue Books is exhausted. The type for the 1947 Blue Book is still standing.

The Committee directed the Commissioner to have 200 copies printed at once and during the 1949 summer vacation to prepare a new edition of the Blue Book.

The Executive Committee Meeting adjourned at 10:30 A. M. to meet with the C. I. F., Southern Section Council.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT to the Council by Mr. Hamilton:

(a) 440 Yards in State Meet. Mr. Moore moved that the Executive Committee's recommendation as to the running of the 440 yard race in the State Meet be presented to the State Council at its next meeting. Mr. Bonnet seconded the motion. Carried.

(b) Large and Small School Championships. This question was discussed at length. Moved by Mr. Hamilton and seconded by Mr. Holt that the President appoint a committee of six (three from large schools and three from small schools) to study the question and report to the Council. Carried. The President appointed the following men to this Committee: Mr. McDonald, of Hoover Glendale, Chairman Mr. Davidson, Newport Harbor Mr. Hamilton, Harvard School Mr. Bonnet, California Jr. Republic Mr. Vaniman, Citrus High School Mr. Scharer, Alhambra.

(c) Class C 100 yard and 180 yard races. Moved by Mr. Badenoch and seconded by Mr. Vaniman that Class C boys may not run both in the 100 yards and in the 180 yards in the same C.I.F., Southern Section meet. Carried.

(d) Discus Throw. Moved by Mr. Scharer and seconded by Mr. Steed that the Executive Committee's recommendation that there be no discus throw in the C.I.F., Southern Section meet this year be upheld. Carried.

(e) Moved by Mr. Steed and seconded by Mr. Badenoch that the Order of track events recommended by the track coaches and the Executive Committee be approved. Carried.

ONE LEAGUE ONLY

Barstow High School has during the past year been a member of the Tri-State League and the Desert-Inyo League. Moved by Mr. Gunn and seconded by Mr. Hopkins that a school may not belong to more than one league.

A roll call vote was taken. The motion carried 13 to 5.

HAWAIIAN ISLANDS COMPETITION

Mr. Moore, the State President, asked for an expression of opinion as to whether C.I.F., Southern Sections schools would favor competition with the high schools of Hawaii.

Moved by Mr. Holt, seconded by Mr. Brumwell that the schools of the C.I.F., Southern Section do not favor such competition. Carried.

RELEAGUING

Moved by Mr. Bowers, seconded by Mr. McDonald that the league arrangement as printed in the January 1949 Bulletin be approved. Carried unanimously.

SAINT BERNARDINE'S SCHOOL

Father Farrell, Director of Athletics, requested that Saint Bernardine's School which has always been a Free Lance school be placed in some league. He suggested the Riverside County League.

Mr. Steed moved that Saint Bernardine's be

placed in the Riverside County League. Mr. Brumwell pointed out that the Riverside County League now has eight members and that another school would make the league unwieldy. The motion was lost for want of a second.

Mr. Clark moved and Mr. Bigger seconded the motion that Saint Bernardine's be put in the Catholic League.

Father Farrell stated that because of the difference in size Saint Bernardine's would prefer to free lance rather than be in the Catholic League. The motion was lost.

Moved by Mr. Scharer, seconded by Mr. Bonnet that Saint Bernardine's remain a Free Lance school for another year. Carried.

RELEAGUING FOR 1950-1951.

Mr. Laurenson moved that the releguing for 1950-1951 be completed by June 1949. He urged that this was necessary so that football schedules could be properly worked out. The motion was lost for want of a second.

It was moved by Mr. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Gunn that a special Committee on releguing for 1950-1951 be appointed and asked to make a full report by December 1949. Carried.

Mr. Davidson asked that the number of schools assigned to a league be made a part of the Committee's work.

AMERICAN LEGION BASEBALL

Mr. Larry French of the American Legion Baseball Management appeared before the Council and urged fuller cooperation between the Legion and the C.I.F. in carrying forward the baseball program during the summer months.

He asked that boys who are playing high school baseball after May 1 be allowed to work out with the Legion teams in order that the Legion coaches may begin to size up the material they are likely to have. No games by organized teams would be played. The work out would consist only of such early season activities as fielding, batting, pitching, etc.

These work outs are to occur on Saturday and Sunday only.

Mr. Harry J. Moore assured Mr. French that the plan he suggested had been in effect in Long Beach for years. Mr. Moore stated that he thought C.I.F. authorities throughout the State would work with the American Legion along the lines suggested.

HIDE-OUT PLAY IN FOOTBALL

Mr. Laurenson in reporting on the hide-out play in football stated that the hide-out is now

legal but may be penalized as unsportsmanlike in certain situations. He recommended that the play be ruled illegal and that the C.I.F., Southern Section and the C.I.F. Los Angeles City Section Joint Football Rules Committee work out a statement as to what constitutes a hide-out play.

PAY FOR OFFICIALS

The pay for officiating team games was discussed at length. The big leagues apparently were of the opinion that the officials in team games could well be paid a higher fee. The small schools where the money returns are necessarily small cannot pay higher fees than is now customary.

Mr. Badenoch moved and Mr. Flamson seconded that the present maximum fees be retained and that each league be allowed to set an amount that each league be allowed to set an amount that will be paid for transportation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowers, seconded by Mr. Brumwell that the possible change in fees for officials become effective in September 1949. Carried.

FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF LOCATIONS

Moved by Mr. Scharer that in case of two competing schools in any play-off game cannot agree upon the field of play that the Executive Committee designate the field of play. Carried.

MINOR GROUP FOOTBALL PLAY-OFFS

Moved by Mr. Gunn, seconded by Mr. Steed that the Commissioner of Athletics make every possible effort to work out all the details of Minor Group Football Play-Offs by the start of the league football season. Carried.

STATE TRACK FINALS

Moved by Mr. Badenoch and seconded by Mr. Hamilton that our State Council be notified that in the State Meet the C.I.F., Southern Section prefers to have the first lap of all races of 440 yards or more run in lanes. Carried.

UMPIRES ASSOCIATION

Mr. Nelson gave a brief report in regard to the Southland Umpires Association. This organization has its headquarters in Ontario. It was moved by Mr. Badenoch and seconded by Mr. Bonnet that the C.I.F., S.S. give the Association official recognition and use their men when it is practical to do so. Carried.

COURTESY CARDS

Mr. Davidson moved that all C.I.F., Principals or District Superintendents be given C.I.F., Southern Section Courtesy Cards which at the present are given to Council Members only. Mr. McDonald seconded the motion and it carried.

At this point the clock showed 3:15 P. M. Many of the Representatives had to leave for home. The question of track meet details was yet to be worked out.

Moved by Mr. Badenoch, seconded by Mr. Gunn that the Executive Committee be asked to stay with power to act and finish track meet details.

ADJOURNMENT

At 3:20 the Council adjourned and the Executive Committee took over. The Executive Committee approved the details given below for the places for the track meets, and the places where the different leagues will compete.
