

**PREP FOOTBALL ATTENDANCE  
HITS RECORD 4 MILLION MARK**

Prep football played by schools in the CIF, SS, was viewed by a record four million fans during 1969 according to figures compiled by Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans.

"Our survey of member schools shows that 4,095,000 fans witnessed the 2,800 varsity games played during 1969", said Fagans. "This is an increase over last season when our survey showed that 3,885,674 saw our high school teams in action."

Playoff attendance increased decidedly this year, as outstanding crowds flocked to see these championship games. Playoffs in the "AAAA" topped the attendance survey of the other five divisions. The championship Blair-Bishop Amat game in the Coliseum drew 28,169 and the title "AAA" game between South Pasadena and Bonita drew an overflow 15,000 fans at Mt. San Antonio College.

These impressive attendance figures are indicative of the fine support shown the interscholastic athletic program by students and parents alike. They are also a tribute to the outstanding caliber of the football program in the CIF, SS.

**RECORDS FALL IN SWIM RELAYS**

Corona del Mar's Sea Kings prepared for the upcoming swim season by annexing first place at the annual CIF, SS, Swim Relays held January 16th at Beverly Hills High School Swim-Gym.

Coach Cliff Hooper's Sea Kings had a total of 46 points after winning the six man 50-yard freestyle, the four-man 50-yard breaststroke and the four-man 100-yard freestyle. Garnering fourth in the four-man 50-yard medley gave them the points necessary to defeat runner-up Palos Verdes which had 40 points.

The "B" championships saw a tremendous team effort by a newcomer to the aquatics scene, Miraleste High School. It edged Mira Costa, 46-45. Sunny Hills dominated "C" ranks with 61 points.

Six new team records were established. In "A" classification, Corona del Mar's time in the four-man 100-yard freestyle was 3:22.6. Long Beach Wilson lowered the four-man 50-yard backstroke to 1:46.4.

"B" records were set by Miraleste in the four-man 50-yard medley, 1:45.9; Crescenta Valley, four-man 100-yard individual medley, 4:02.3; and Sunny Hills set a new record in the four-man 50-yard backstroke at

1:53. Crescenta also set a four-man 100-yard freestyle record of 3:20.3.

**SUCCESSFUL NEW MEXICO COACH HEADS  
SPEAKERS' LIST AT FOOTBALL CLINIC**

Lenard "Burr" Henderson, the most successful active high school coach in New Mexico, will be one of two featured speakers at the 12th annual Football Coaching Clinic slated for Cerritos College.

Clinic director Clare Van Hoorebeke of Anaheim hopes to have the second lecturer lined up soon, and he promises it will be a name well-known in the coaching profession.

The two-day affair is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. both Mar. 7 and 8.

While the workshop is open to all members of the Southern California High School Football Coaches Association, any prep, junior college or four-year college coach is invited to attend. Hoorebeke points out, however, that

the instructional format is geared to explore the problems, needs and ideas related to high school ranks.

Lecturers will fill both days, and a question-answer period is planned each night. A film session is slated Saturday evening so those in attendance will be able to view topics either covered or yet to be touched on.

Henderson became head coach at Artesia High in Artesia, N.M. in 1960. Since then his squads have compiled an 86-21-7 record. In his first season at the school, Henderson guided his club to the district co-championship. In 1964, Artesia won the state "AA" title. It has also claimed the crown for the past four campaigns, an era in which the books show a 46-3 record.

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EXECUTIVE COUNCIL  
MEETING MINUTES  
JANUARY 24, 1970

The January meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 9:25 A.M. at the Palm Springs School District board room on Saturday, January 24, 1970. The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, Vice Principal, Beverly Hills High School; Keith J. Lee, Principal, Yucca Valley High School; Keith Gunn, Principal, Victor Valley High School; Claud Hardesty, Principal, Santa Barbara High School; Msgr. Thomas Kiefer, Principal, Bishop Amat High School; Ferren Christensen, Principal, Westminster High School; James Faul, Principal, Workman High School; Alex Alexander, Assistant Superintendent, Desert Sands Unified School District; Art Hobson, Assistant Superintendent, Whittier Union High School District; Dr. Russ Reynolds, Principal, Big Bear High School; Commissioner of Athletics J. Kenneth Fagans, and Lou Joseph, Administrative Assistant, CIF office.

Guests in attendance were Dr. William Ullom, Superintendent, Laguna Beach Unified School District; Robert Reeves, Principal, Laguna Beach High School; Dr. Norman Browne, Board of Trustees, Laguna Beach School District, and Gary Norton, Athletic Director, Laguna Beach High School.

1. APPROVED MINUTES — It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of November 19, 1969, as published in the December, 1969, monthly bulletin.

2. COMPETITION WITH MEXICAN HIGH SCHOOL — A communication was received from the Cetys School of Mexicali, Mexico, reporting on the results of football games played with Imperial Valley schools during the 1969 season. Six games were played and in all situations good sportsmanship prevailed and the experience was beneficial to all concerned. The Cetys School is again interested in scheduling games with Imperial Valley schools during the 1970 season. After reviewing the proposed schedule, it was moved, seconded and carried to permit our member schools in the Imperial Valley to schedule football games during the 1970 season with the Cetys School of Mexico.

3. SCHEDULING PROBLEMS — Because of scheduling difficulties Coachella HS requested permission to play a game against Clark HS of Nevada on September 12. A game on this date would require that current regulations be amended to permit Coachella HS to begin football practice at an earlier date so they could complete their required number of pre-game practice sessions.

The situation was discussed and it was moved, seconded and carried that Coachella HS be permitted to schedule Clark HS on September 12, 1970. Permission was further granted for Coachella to count the five days allotted for physical conditioning as official practice sessions.

4. BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT REQUESTS — Glendale High School and Azusa High School each submitted requests to be permitted to co-sponsor, with junior colleges in their respective areas, a joint junior college-high school basketball tournament, to be held during the Christmas vacation period in 1970. The matter was thoroughly discussed and it was pointed out that the control of high school athletics must remain with our member schools. When we permit our schools to play preliminary games to the Los Angeles Stars or co-sponsor tournaments with junior colleges, we are inviting problems because of the difference in the philosophy of the various governing bodies concerned. It was further felt that outside organizations are interested in involving high schools in order to increase attendance at such events. It was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that these re-

quests be denied, and that Southern Section policy provide that joint sponsorship of athletic events be discouraged.

5. REQUEST FOR MEMBERSHIP  
a. Application for associate membership in the CIF, Southern Section, was received from Lincoln Continuation School of Riverside. Since neither the basketball coach, the athletic director nor the principal had taken the time to read our regulations governing the sport of basketball. It was then moved, seconded and carried that Elsinore High School be censured and placed on probation for one year from the date of the offense. It was further ruled that the Elsinore High School basketball team be denied entry into the 1970 basketball play-offs, even though they may qualify for such post-season competition.

b. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the application of Nelles School of Whittier for regular membership for the 1970-71 school year, as they meet the requirements of CIF rules and standards.

c. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the application of San Fernando Valley Christian School in 1970-71 for membership in the CIF, Southern Section. They are presently grades 9 through 11 with the 12th grade to be added next year.

6. DISCUS AS AN APPROVED EVENT — High schools in the Huntington Beach Union High School District are concerned with the present CIF, SS, policy which permits leagues to conduct the discuss event at their own discretion. School administrators from the district feel that the discuss event should either be mandatory in all competition, or banned entirely. The matter was discussed and it was pointed out that many schools did not have adequate facilities to conduct the discuss, while others had sufficient space for the conduct of this event. It was felt that our present rule governing the discuss was reasonable and it was therefore moved, seconded and carried to reaffirm Article XLVIII, Section 10, which provides that although the discuss throw will not be an event in CIF, Southern Section, championship meets, a league may, if it wishes, conduct the discuss throw as a regular event in competition within its own league.

7. VIOLATIONS —  
a. Elsinore High School violated existing CIF, SS, rules by scheduling and playing a basketball game on November 28, 1969, which was prior

to the official date of December 1st. The rule governing the first date on which a school may schedule a basketball game is clearly outlined in our Blue Book. It was evident that neither the basketball coach, the athletic director nor the principal had taken the time to read our regulations governing the sport of basketball. It was then moved, seconded and carried that Elsinore High School be censured and placed on probation for one year from the date of the offense. It was further ruled that the Elsinore High School basketball team be denied entry into the 1970 basketball play-offs, even though they may qualify for such post-season competition.

a. The coach and basketball team representing Verbum Dei High School displayed poor sportsmanship by voluntarily withdrawing from Inglewood's basketball tournament, after losing a close game to Aviation HS. They felt that because of what appeared to be prejudiced officiating in the Aviation game, they could not continue to play in the tournament, although they were scheduled to meet Morningside the following day. The withdrawal of a team from the field or from a tournament is considered to be a most serious breach of good sportsmanship. Such action is also a breach of an athletic contract, as outlined in Article XXV of our By-Laws.

A thorough discussion of the entire incident took place and in line with established CIF, SS, policy it was moved, seconded and carried that Verbum Dei HS be censured and placed on probation for a period of one year from the date of the offense. In addition, the Verbum Dei basketball team will be ineligible for the 1970 play-offs, even though they should qualify for participation.

Because of charges made by Verbum Dei that tournament managers exhibited abusive and unprofessional conduct in their attitude towards the Verbum Dei team, the Commissioner was directed to call a meeting of administrators from the two schools for the purpose of resolving the problem.

8. RELEAGUING PROBLEM — Administrators from the Laguna Beach High School district appeared before the committee to protest the placement of their school in the Crestview League for the 1970-71 school year. They presented evidence which showed that their school had the smallest enrollment in the Crestview League and they requested transfer to the Orange

League where schools were more equitably aligned as far as enrollment was concerned.

The committee reviewed the problem and studied the possibilities whereby the relegating situation involving Laguna Beach High School might be improved. It was finally moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Katella High School of the Orange League, and Laguna Beach High School of the Crestview League, exchange places as far as league assignments were concerned for the 1970-71 school year.

9. SWIM COACHES MEETING . . . For the purposes of evaluating the recent changes in the 1969-70 aquatics program, the Executive Committee directed the Commissioner to call a meeting of all swim coaches and interested administrators to meet with the Sports Regulation Committee at the conclusion of the swim championships to discuss and recommend any changes in the aquatic program for the 1970-71 school year.

10. CIF, SS, PUBLICIST — The Commissioner reported that our present policy of utilizing the services of a part-time publicist was working to the disadvantage of the CIF, SS. Our public relations and publicity have suffered considerably during the past six months. The Commissioner further reported that the P.C.A.A. is in the same situation and would be willing to co-employ a publicist who would devote one-fifth of his time to the P.C.A.A. and four-fifths to the CIF. The P.C.A.A. would be responsible for one-third of his annual salary, with the CIF to take care of Social Security.

It was felt that such an arrangement would be beneficial to both organizations and it was therefore moved, seconded and carried to authorize the Commissioner to enter into negotiations with the P.C.A.A. for the purpose of processing applications for this new position which would become effective in August, 1970.

11. ABUSE OF COURTESY CARDS — A communication was received from Upland High School regarding abuses of the CIF, Southern Section, courtesy card during a recent basketball tournament. The Commissioner stated that a number of other abuses occurred during the football season and he had issued a special memorandum to principals concerning the use of the CIF courtesy card. It was pointed out that the card is not a pass but a courtesy to the individual and is non-transferable. After considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council to continue the policy of issuing 3 courtesy cards to

principals at the beginning of the year and let them be transferrable for members of his staff. Each district superintendent will continue to receive one courtesy card which is non-transferable.

12. PROBLEMS CONNECTED WITH ASSIGNMENT OF OFFICIALS — A communication has been received from some schools stating that they would like a black official to be assigned to their games. Officials are assigned to contests in relation to their competence. It was moved, seconded and carried to reaffirm the CIF policy to assign the most competent official available to a game regardless of race, color or creed.

13. ELIGIBILITY CASES — It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule to permit the following boys to be eligible for interscholastic athletics: Geoffrey Carter, Victor Valley High School; Zack Minasian, Burroughs High School (Burbank); Henry Scott, Duarte High School (second semester); Ernest Henry, Paramount High School.

It was moved, seconded and carried to deny the request to waive the residence rule for Nick Speigle of Aviation High School.

It was moved, seconded and carried to deny permission for David Machado of Long Beach Wilson to participate in the Brazilian swim championships.

14. BOXING — Victor Valley High School requested waiver of the boxing regulation which made three of their students ineligible for one year for participating in a boxing exhibition where a collection was taken. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny this request.

15. FOOTBALL FINANCIAL REPORT — Although all of the financial reports from games played in the 1969 football play-offs have not yet reached the CIF, SS, office, the Commissioner reported that from all indications the 1969 play-offs will produce more revenue and were the most outstanding as far as competition was concerned, in the history of our organization.

16. WESTMINSTER HIGH SCHOOL REQUEST — Westminster High School requested a waiver of the starting date for basketball games for the 1970-71 school year to permit them to begin their basketball tournament on Monday, November 30, instead of Tuesday, December 1. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny this request and direct Westminster to look into other organizational ways of solving this problem.

**17. GIRLS ATHLETICS**—A communication was received from Ed Hendrix, President of the State CIF Federated Council, stating that in 1967 the CIF adopted By-Laws governing girls' athletic activities, and that these By-Laws stipulate that when girls' athletics are conducted they should be under the jurisdiction of the CIF. He indicated that reports have been received in the State office indicating that many high schools are conducting girls' interscholastic athletic activities which are not under the direct control of the CIF.

So that we would be in conformity with state rules, the Commissioner was directed to work with the chairman in establishing a standing Advisory Committee on girls' athletics. This committee should survey our member schools to determine the type and amount of girls' interscholastic athletics now taking place and to make recommendations for the control of such activities.

**18. LENGTH OF PRACTICE SESSION**—A request to study the physiological effect the length of practice sessions has on athletes has been received from the Garden Grove High School district. Since this is a matter which involves medical research, it was felt that the CAPHER organization could better handle this matter and directed the Commissioner to advise Garden Grove to contact CAPHER.

**19. CIF AWARD CERTIFICATES**—The Commissioner displayed the new CIF certificate which will be awarded to all boys who have participated in CIF playoffs. It was felt that only the winners and runnerup teams receive medals, trophies and other awards, and since many more boys participate in the over-all playoffs, some recognition of this participation should be given each boy.

**20. BASKETBALL GAMES**—Sunny Hills High School is requesting permission to schedule a high school team from Milwaukee, Oregon, in a game to be played at Sunny Hills in early December of 1970. In order that this game might be played, it would need the approval of the National Federation, the Oregon State High School Association and the CIF Federated Council. Because the game would not involve any travel on the part of Sunny Hills High School, it was moved, seconded and carried that the Southern Section recommend to the State Federated Council that permission be granted for the scheduling of this game.

**21. SAN GABRIEL MISSION HIGH SCHOOL**—Unofficial reports have reached the CIF, SS, office that San Gabriel Mission High School will become an all girls school as of September, 1970. This would mean that all boys with further athletic eligibility would find it necessary to transfer to another high school. Because this was a situation beyond the control of the students involved, it was felt that some provision should be made so that boys could transfer without loss of athletic eligibility. The Commissioner was directed to meet with officers of the Catholic Athletic Association in an effort to establish general criteria for students who will be transferring to public or private high schools in the San Gabriel area.

**22. RELEAGUING**—For many years releaguings has been conducted in accordance with Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution. There has been much criticism of this method and last fall official action was taken by our Council that current philosophy and policy regarding releaguings be studied, and changes made so that releaguings be considered on a Southern

## OFFICIALS' ASSOCIATION POLICES OWN RANKS TO UPGRADE PROFESSION

Probably no profession is as subject to continual outside scrutiny as that of an athletic official. His every call is under study by coaches, players and spectators.

Perhaps the biggest critic of officiating is the official himself. It is often a thankless trade. Apathetic and incompetent officials can do more to harm the field than any other single factor.

With such thoughts in mind, the Channel Coast Officials Association has made moves to upgrade the profession. It is the organization's intent to provide for more uniform and consistent officiation and at the same time assure cooperation and coordination among officials and coaches.

Using the philosophy that the association is more able to evaluate the competency, consistency and judgment of fellow officials, it attempts to police its own ranks. Coaches are encouraged, however, to return all rating forms provided by the commissioner's office. Constructive criticism is also welcomed.

A plan of action has been adopted, and it is felt that this information is worth passing on for informational purposes.

A rating committee is responsible for evaluating all officials. There are

Section basis, rather than on geographical areas.

The Committee discussed many proposed changes, and finally agreed that a recommendation presented by the Commissioner might best meet the needs of our member schools. Mr. Fagans was directed to prepare his recommendations for presentation to the Council at its meeting scheduled for January 31, 1970.

**23. CHAPARRAL LEAGUE**—Established policy was reaffirmed that schools within a given league must adhere to league rules and league commitments have priority over non-league activities. In the operation of a league, however, CIF, SS, rules and regulations may not be superseded unless special permission is granted by the Executive Committee for such action.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:45 P.M.

three classifications of officials: probationary, approved, certified. New, second and third year members are all on probation, but they may not remain in this category for more than three years.

Fourth and fifth year men recommended by the rating committee are rated as approved officials, and certified includes those with a minimum of five years experience. They, too, must be recommended by the committee.

Probationary and approved men officiate junior varsity, sophomore and freshman games, and only at the positions of umpire, head linesman and field judge. The referee, who is certified, is required to submit a written evaluation for each member of the crew. In addition, each probationary and approved official will be rated by a paid observer at least two times during the season.

All certified officials are observed and evaluated by a paid observer at least twice a season, and a written report is filed with the rating committee with a copy given to the rated official.

A special rating committee meeting is conducted at the end of the season to evaluate all ratings from coaches, referees, observers and the commissioner for all officials. Each official is then appraised of his status for the next season.

## ARIZONA OFFICIAL WINS

An item in the Arizona Interscholastic Association Executive Board meeting minutes recently dealt with an assault-and-battery case filed by an athletic official against an irate fan.

According to the Board meeting minutes, "the case has been resolved in favor of the official. The official received a financial settlement agreeable to him, and the defendant's loss was substantial, plus his own lawyer's fees."

The case, similar to many throughout the nation each year, serves to demonstrate that, in nearly all cases, courts uphold the actions of officials with regard to high school athletic contests, and not the actions of unruly fans or coaches who become displeased with the outcome of athletic contests and let their emotions overrule logic.

### PLAYOFF BASKETBALLS

Prior to the 1969 CIF, SS, basketball play-offs, there was a great deal of discussion regarding the type of ball to be used in play-off games—leather or rubber.

Since much of the vocal support seemed to favor the leather basketball, while the rubber basketball had been the official play-off ball in previous years, the CIF, SS, office conducted a survey of all 48 leagues to determine which ball was considered official by the majority of leagues.

The results of the survey were rather interesting. Only five leagues—the Bay, Coast, Foothill, Pioneer and Sky—said that the leather ball was their official league ball, while the remaining 43 all used the rubber ball.

As a result of the survey, the rubber basketball was designated as the official ball for use in the 1969 CIF, SS, play-offs, in order to remain consistent in all play-off games and conform to the policy in the majority of our leagues.

This survey is conducted every few years, in order to insure that the CIF, SS, play-offs are conducted in accord with the existing policies in most leagues.
