A meeting of the C. I. F. Southern Section was held in the Y. M. C. A. at 3:30 P. M. January 6, 1921.

Mr. Seth Van Patton being present, the Annual Track Meet was taken up.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Meet be held April 16 on the Field of Los Angeles High School. It was further understood that the discussion held December 16, relative to a complete team of 40 be made the action of the Section.

First place team all 4th place men up to 10

Second place team all 4th place men up to 10  
and so on until we had a team of 40.

It was agreed to ask high school men to act as officials so far as possible.

Mr. Jantzen brought up the case of Casey and filed the following sworn statement:

I, G. H. Jantzen, Principal of the Colton High School, depose and say that John Casey, the boy about whose eligibility some question was raised, is now in his ninth semester of attendance in this high school. During one of these semesters, however, he was not in attendance ten weeks, he did not take part in any form of athletics, and he did not make any school credits during that semester.

He is just past nineteen years of age and is taking four units of work now, of which he needs  $3\frac{1}{2}$  for graduation. Following is the exact record of this attendance during the semester which should not be reckoned in his attendance.

The President ruled that the boy had a right to play this semester.

Mr. Jantzen then stated that his team had won the Basketball schedule in their league and was ready to enter the semi-finals. He wished to know if Casey would be allowed to play in semi-final or finals, should these games run over into the next semester.

## Statement of Fact.

Throughout the school year 1921-1922 a certain boy in school "C" was reported as being born on 4/18/02. This year he is reported as being born on 4/18/03, and has been played since 4/18/23.

The explanation given is that the boy was born in Mexico; that the certificate of birth is not available or possibly not even obtainable; that in order that he might enter the United States Navy he gave his age as one year more than it actually is; that when he entered school "C" last year he gave the same date of birth as to the Navy officials, not thinking of how it would affect his standing now.

The further statement is made that an older brother secured his release from the Navy on showing that he had entered by falsely stating his age. A letter has been written to the Navy Department requesting information but has not yet been received.

Original eligibility lists hold until legal evidence to contrary is submitted.

The Representatives of the C. I. F.

Dear Friends:

We should each call a meeting of our league to discuss the questions which were referred to the several leagues by the C. I. F. at our last meeting. The questions were: First, What is a basketball game? If a game is called for a cause, such as rain, how much must have been played in order to be called a game? For example, School A and School B were playing a game of basketball on an outside court, A leading, when it became too dark to play. Should the game be called or should they go indoors to finish the game? These schools went indoors for the last five minutes and B won. Second question: On page 16 you will find, "All championship basketball games (are to be played on outdoor courts) except---." The question is, shall we omit the words in parentheses? Is not each league game at the beginning of the schedule a championship game?

These questions should be discussed by the several leagues and then a meeting of the C. I. F. called to settle the question.

I have just received a letter from Harvard Military Academy, wishing to arrange a schedule in basketball as a "free lance". I would recommend that at our next meeting we discuss and definitely settle the status of the private school. Personally I believe that the C. I. F. should not recognize private schools in any shape, manner, or form unless they have been invited by some league to enter the regular schedule of that league. If Harvard has a right to be a "free lance", then the University of Southern California High School, The Army and Navy School, Page Military Academy, Los Angeles Academy, Le Vern Academy and the Thatcher School and many others have the right to be called a "free lance". It seems to me that we might discuss this question in our leagues and come to our next meeting prepared to vote on this question.


