Mr. Badenoch was asked to explain his plan, which is as follows:

This would change our teams somewhat and would prevent Class B being a team of "light" heavyweights.

A It was moved by Green and seconded by Owen that Mr. Badenoch's "Three Point System" be referred back to the various Leagues for discussion and recommendation. The motion was withdrawn when Oliver submitted a substitute.

B Moved by Oliver and seconded by Moore that the question be discussed for twenty minutes. Carried.

C At the end of twenty minutes it was moved by Owen and seconded by Collins that the Four Point System be retained.

D It was moved by Monroe and seconded by Blee that the whole matter of the Point System be tabled until the next meeting. Carried.

The business discussed was:

THE PROTEST OF VENICE

The Venice principal, E. W. Clark, protested Fred Appleton, Kenneth Davis, Charles Garland, Bill Mainland, Jack Packard, Edward Rathbone, and Dave Stewart, members of the Glendale champion class "C" team as not being in the proper class. This protest was made before the game.

Protest was made on the grounds that the four point record submitted at the game did not agree with a four point record submitted by the Coach in a Pre-season practice game:

A Chair ruled that the four point data submitted to the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S., by the Principal of a High School, over the signature of the Principal, was the official list and would take precedence over a list signed by a Coach in a Pre-season game. Chair was sustained.

B It was moved by Fisher and seconded by Owen that the protest of Venice in regard to the Venice vs. Glendale class "C" football game be denied.

III—THE TRI-COUNTY VS. COLTON

The Tri-County League had directed its representative to request the C. I. F., S. S., to revert to the leaguings as made at the annual meeting in May, 1925, by a vote of seven to one. This request was made by McCall Aldrich of Chino. The question was very generally discussed by representatives of all the Tri-County schools.

A It was moved by Monroe and seconded by Barnes that the Tri-County League remain for the remainder of the year as now constituted.

* Collins voted No because he thought that our action in October unconstitutional. Malcom voted No for the same reason and thought Colton should "free lance" for the rest of the year. Motion carried—YES 14, NO 3.

IV—H. J. MOORE'S METHOD OF ELIMINATION OF FOOTBALL TIES

In case a game ends with the score tie, there shall be a two-minute rest period. The ball shall then be put in play at the center of the field. The captains shall toss for possession of the ball. The team losing the toss shall have the ball for the first play. The teams shall then have alternate turns at carrying the ball.

The ball shall be in play for twenty plays, plus any penalty plays that may be awarded. Each team shall take the ball at the point where there opponents were downed, except in case of penalties as hereafter specified.

If a ball is fumbled and recovered by the opponents, the opponents shall have two successive plays from the point where the ball was recovered.

If a forward pass is intercepted, the team intercepting the ball may run with the ball and then choose one play from the point the ball was downed or two plays from the spot of the previous down.

All other penalties shall be as prescribed by the rules, with these exceptions, (a) when the penalty for a play is the loss of a down, the opponents shall take the ball for the next two plays. (b) when the penalty is the loss of the ball, the opponents shall have two successive plays.

The offended side shall have the option in regard to penalties as provided by the rules.

In case a drop or place kick is missed after the ball is put in play from inside the 20-yard line, the ball shall go to the opponents on the 20-yard line. If the ball was put in play outside the 20-yard line, the ball goes to the opponents at this point.

No punting plays are allowed. If any points are scored by either team, the ball is returned to the center of the field and the play is resumed, except in the case of a safety, after which the play is resumed on the 30-yard line.

In case neither team scores at the end of the twenty alternate plays and penalty plays, the team who has worked the ball into their opponents territory beyond the center of the field shall be awarded two points.

If the ball should be dead at the center of the field after the required number of plays, two more plays shall be allowed.

A Referred to Leagues for discussion.

V—THE COLISEUM

Principal Milliken reported that the renting of the Coliseum for the State Championship game with Bakersfield had led to a misunderstanding and that he requested that a committee be appointed to investigate.

A It was moved by Malcom and seconded by Fisher that a committee consisting of Mr. Oliver, Mr. Moore, Mr. Van Patten and Mr. Green be appointed to interview the Coliseum officials with reference to establishing uniform rates in the rental of the Coliseum for high school interscholastic contests. Carried.

III—RESIGNATION OF TRACK MANAGER SETH VAN PATTEN

It was moved by Barnes and seconded by Fisher that Mr. Van Patten's resignation be accepted with deep regret and that Mr. James C. Reinhard be appointed Track Manager with permission to select such assistants as he may choose. Carried.
It was moved by Fisher and seconded by everyone that Mr. Oliver and the secretary be a committee empowered and instructed to inscribe upon the minutes Resolutions of Appreciation to Mr. Van Patten for his years of service to California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, and that said committee procure a suitable gift inscribed with our thanks which shall be a life pass to all athletic contests held under the authority of the C. I. F., S. S. Carried unanimously.

A. A. U.
It was moved by Green and seconded by Westcott that Mr. Foley, Mr. Reinhard, and Mr. Moore, be our delegates to the A. A. U.
Secretary called attention to the fact that at the May meeting a motion made by Moore and seconded by Hague was carried that the High Schools of the C. I. F. withdraw from the A. A. U. competition because of the early season.

It was moved by Green and seconded by Blee that our committee be instructed to inform the A. A. U. Board that we will enter the Relay Competition, provided it be put one month later than usual. Carried.

FOOTBALL REPORT
Mr. Moore said that he could not make a report until Santa Maria and Covina handed in reports.

BASEBALL REPORT
Mr. Badenoch reported that he could not make a report until the Downey-Alhambra game was reported.
It was moved by Malcom and seconded by Oliver that Alhambra be given ten days to make a final report to the Baseball Manager, and if no report is forthcoming at the end of that time, Alhambra be suspended from all athletic contests, if Manager finds facts as represented. Carried.

It was moved by Westcott and seconded by Moore that in each semi-final and final game there shall be a faculty member from each school in charge of the finances of the game. Carried.

III—SAN DIEGO VS. PHOENIX

San Diego High School was granted permission to play the Phoenix High School during the Football season of 1926, provided San Diego filed with the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S., a duly signed list of players used in the game.

III—EXPENSE OF VISITING TEAM

It was moved by Barnes and seconded by Westcott that visiting teams shall limit expenses to two dollars per night for room and seventy-five cents per meal, Maximum \$4.50 per day. Carried.

XIV—PLACE OF SEMI-FINALS IN BASKETBALL

The Manager and Secretary were instructed to select the place of play for the semi-final and final basketball games.

XV—QUARTERS

It was unanimously agreed that in BASKETBALL

A and B teams shall play 8 minute quarters.

C and D teams shall play 6 minute quarters.

FOOTBALL

A and B teams shall play 12 minute quarters.

C and D teams shall play 10 minute quarters.

XVI—INSTRUCTIONS FROM LEAGUES

Roll was called on question of one man competing in one of the following, 440, half and mile.

Result—7 YES; 4 NO; 9 ABSENT.

XVII—CLASSIFICATION

It was unanimously agreed that hereafter when a boy reaches the maximum points for one classification he must pass to the next classification the following semester. (Basketball is a first semester sport.)

XVIII—EXCHANGE OF LISTS

It was unanimously agreed that all teams playing league, or semi-final and final games must exchange eligibility lists before the game starts on sheets furnished by the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S.

XIX—FILE WITH SECRETARY

It was unanimously agreed that all teams entering semi-final or final games in any contest or sport must file with the Secretary of the C. I. F., S. S., a duplicate copy of the eligibility sheet submitted to the other team. Said duplicate copy to be mailed three days before the contest.

XX—BIRTHDAY

It was unanimously agreed that the birthday date given by a 9B boy shall remain the official date during his four years of high school, and his age cannot be advanced or reduced except by legal evidence in the form of a birth certificate or a certified copy of said birth certificate.

XXI—TEAM IN SEMI-FINALS

It was agreed that if a League champion after the first round of the semi-finals, is found ineligible because of incorrect addition of exponents then that League shall not have the right to substitute another team.

There being no further business the Council adjourned.
