Minutes of meeting of the Council held December 17, 1931, n Room 436 University Club, 614 South Hope Street, Los Angeles.

Twenty members of the Council, the speaker of the day Mr. Gwynn Wilson, Associate Manager of the Xth Olympiad Committee, and 21 visitors sat down to lunch at 12:15 P.M. Following the function Mr. Wilson gave a very entertaining and instructive address on the 1932 Olympic Games.

At the close of the address it was moved by Mr. Oliver and seconded by several Council members that we ask Mr. Wilson to furnish the C.I.F.S.S. Office with a summary of the address that copies may be put in the hands of every high school principal in Southern California.

An Amateur and a Professional in Golf Defined

The definition of an amateur and a professional in golf shall be that which appears in the 1931 edition of the Rules of

Golf of the Southern California Golf Association, pages 77 to 80, except that a high school golfer may carry clubs for hire until he is twenty-one years of age without losing his amateur standing in high school golf or any other high school sport.

High school golfers are warned that the Southern California Golf Association will rule them professionals in golf if they carry clubs for hire after they reach the age of eighteen vears.

High school golfers who compete in tournaments where money prizes are offered must before competing file a declaration in writing with the C.I.F.S.S. office and tournament officials indicating whether they are competing as an amateur or as a professional. Frilure to do se will be deemed cause for disbarment from further high school golf matches.

There being no discussion the President ordered the report printed as presented.

Moved by Mr. Coverdale, seconded by Mr. Wheedon, that C.I.F.S.S. medals be awarded the five first place boys in each of the two classes and that a regulation C.I.F.S.S. Placq e be awarded the school winning in each of the two classes.

19. A request was received from the St. Augustine School for Boys of San Diego for membership in the C.I.F.S.S. and for admission to the Southern League if possible.

Moved by Mr. Alman, seconded by Mr. Coverdale, that 31. Augustine be admitted to membership in the C.I.F.S.S. and that the question of admission to the Southern League be left to Mr. Quicksall and his league.

CARRIED

20. Mr. Moore, State President of the C.I.F.S.S., spoke at length regarding the meeting of the Federaced Council of the L.F. held in Los Angeles November 28, 1931, and especially Il regard to a report of a Committee of Superintendents on Interscholastic Relations. (See enclosed copies of Minutes of Federated Council Meeting and Committee of Superintendents.)

He called attention to the fact that most of the recommendations of the Superintendents' Committee are already being darried out by the C.I.F.S.S. He emphasized that the recom-mendation (see No. 16 of Superintendent's Report) "The thief of the Department of Health and Physical Education in California should be a member of the governing body which determines all interscholastic relationship," has been in effect gince the foundation of the C.I.F.

Moved by Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, that Mr. Moore be appointed a delegate from the C.I.F. to attend the next meeting of the Superintendents' Convention to familiarize the Superintendents of the state with the work of the C.I.F. It was included in the metion that it be arranged if possible for Mr. Moore to appear before one of the general sessions of the Superintendents so that his message may reach the largest number possible.

CARRIED

21. Mr. Moore suggested the advisability of the C.I.F.S.S. suing an annual report with a reprint of the Constitution up to date.

Moved by Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Wood, to refer the question to the Executive Committee for report at the next meeting of the Council.

Report of Committee on Interscholastic Relations

Been Commence

Riverside, California October 8, 1931

Your Committee on Interscholastic Lelations has had two meetings at this Contradion, at one of which several interested individuals were called mis conference. Your Chairman has worked closely with the Unaliman of the High School Principals' Association. The recommendations which we are making have the unanamous approval of your Committee, and they are also in agreement with the policies of the High School Princibals' Association.

Your Committee recommends that the following general policies be approved by the superintendents' Association and sent to the Mig. School Principals' Association for their consideration and action:

- 1. All interschetastic championship games, in so far as possible, should be limited to local leagues.
- 2. There should be a revision of the organization of local leagues, considering size of schools, and limiting the number of schools in the league so as to reduce the number of games.
- 3. With the exception of San Diego, Bakersfield, Eureka and possibly a few other places, long distance travel by athletic teams, involving staying overalght, should be eliminated.
- 4. American football should not be played in grades below the tenth.
- (5) The discus and javelin throws as athletic activities in the schools of the state should be abundened.
- 6. Spring and summer football practice by all schools should be eliminated.
- 1-7. The use of the terms "major" and "miner" sports should be eliminated and the proper emphasis placed on all sports according to their educative values to those who participate.
- 8. More emphasis should be placed upon the sports that follow through into after senool years, such a volleyball, handball, golf, tennis, and swimming.
- 9. Athletic awards of intrinsic value should be eliminated and school letters should be substituted for all students who meet the minimum requirements in mental, social, and physical
- 16. The reduction to absolute minimum of ticket selling within the school for athletic contests should be effected.
- 11. Emphasis on interscholastic athletics should be decreased and emphasis on intra-mural athletics increased.
- 12. Students should be required to pass a physical eramination by a licensed physician before they are permitted to participate in athletic competition.
- 13. The use of unpaid adult and student officials in all games with the exception of league games in football, basketball, and baseball should prevail. For these games, adult offiicals should be appointed by the school authorities and the officiating done in so far as possible by school people. The compensation for efficials should be standardized by the local leagues.
- 14. The superintendents and city and county supervisors of physical education should have a definite responsibility, along with the high school principals, in determining interscholastic relationships.
- 15. The high school principals of the state in cooperation with the superintendents and city and county supervisors of physical education should use the foundation laid by the C.I.F. in developing a large group of local lectues and in increasing the personnel of the governing body.
- 16. The Chief of the Department of Health and Physical Education in California should be a member of the governing body which determines all interscholastic relationships.

shoes 2½ lbs.—Official shoe.

stakes are 40 ft. apart for official game.

pitchers box extends only 3 ft. in front of stake.

No contestant shall make any remark or utter any sound within hearing of the opponent, or make any movement that might interfere with opponent. Penalty is that both is shoes are declared foul.

so shoe shall be examined until all are pitched.

If the beginning of a game the winner of a toss has choice of first pitch or follow. In successive games the loser of preceding game pitches first.

foul shoes shall be removed at request of opponent.

n shoes are counted in their final position.

league game consists of 21 points.

shoes shall be within 6 inches of stake to score.

closest shoe scored 1 point.

kinger scores 3 points.

nequals count as ties, and no point is scored.

in the case of a tie, the contestant who pitches the last pentitled to first pitch.

in the case of protests, etc., the referee, or sponsor, or the committee has final jurisdiction.

Invitational Tennis Tournaments

During the month of April, 1932, two invitational tennis araments will be held. One for Class C boys will be held at Harvard School and one for Class B boys at the El Monte ion High School.

Detailed announcements regarding exact dates, entry has, etc., will be sent out about a month prior to the dates the tournaments.

It is hoped that a large number of Class C and Class B will take up the game of tennis and be prepared to enter tournaments.

Adopted for the Preliminary Track Meet for May 7, 1932

1. That we divide the leagues of Southern California into groups and hold five preliminary meets on May 7 to lify for the finals on May 14.

2. That the five groups be as follows:

GROUP I

Bay League Coast League Orange League Preparatory League

GROUP II

City League Marine League San Fernando League Western League GROUP III

Citrus League Foothill League Riverside County League San Gabriel Valley League Tri-County League

GROUP IV

Desert League Inyo County League San Luis Obispo League Ventura Major League Ventura Minor League

GROUP V

Imperial League San Diego City League Southern League

3. That all lergues be entitled to send four boys for each event in the preliminaries except in Groups III and IV. In Group III the Riverside County League, the San Gabriel Valley League and the Tri-County League be limited to three each. In Group IV the Desert League and Inyo County League be limited to two each.

4. That in Groups I, II and III we qualify for the finals four boys for each event or twelve in all. In Groups IV and V qualify two for each event, or four. This will give sixteen boys for each event in the finals, which is the same number that we have had in each event in the State Meet for years past.

5. That the rule governing mileage to athletes apply to the five preliminary meets and to the final meet and that the finances be controlled by the C.I.F.S.S.
