COUNCIL MEETING

The first meeting of the Council of the C. I. F., Southern Section, for this school year will be held at the El Monte High School on Saturday, February 3, at 9:30 A. M.

As there are six members of the present Council who are serving for the first time as Representatives of their Leagues a few points of information to Council Members follow.

Necessary travelling expenses of League Representatives are paid from the C. I. F., Southern Section Treasury.

A luncheon will be served by the El Monte High School and paid for by the C. I. F. for Council Members and Committee Members who are at the meeting to make reports.

The Council Members when changes in our Constitution and Rulings are made represent Southern California as a whole. When a question has been referred back to the Leagues for consideration the precedent has been established of League Representatives voting as instructed by their League.

The meetings of the Council are always open to all high school men who are interested in the work of the C. I. F. Principals and coaches are always accorded the courtesy of discussing matters before the Council, though only League Representatives may vote.

IMPORTANT QUESTIONS TO COME BEFORE THE COUNCIL

Football—Shall we continue to follow the Interscholastic Football Rules next year? Control of the final play-off game.

Track—Shall we continue to use the 42 inch hurdles in our Southern California Championship Meet?

Shall we continue the five Divisional Meets as held last season? If so, where shall they be held? Where shall the Southern California Final Meet be held?

Releaguing—Releaguing for 1940-41 must be completed at this meeting of the Council, otherwise the Council must continue to meet each succeeding Saturday until the matter is completed.

Sports Finals—Where shall the finals in tennis, swimming, and golf be held? Shall we have a badminton tournament?

Athletic Protection Fund—Report on the setup and recommendations to our representatives on the Board of Control.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

Four Invitational Class A basketball tournaments were held for C. I. F., Southern Section, High Schools during the month of December. December 7, 8, and 9 Bonita High School had a tournament at the La Verne College Gymnasium. December 14, 15, and 16 Huntington Beach held its annual tournament in its own gymnasium. December 18, 19, and 20 Santa Paula held a tournament for the schools of the northern counties of the C. I. F., Southern Section, and on December 27, 28, and 29 Chino High School held its second annual tournament.

These four tournaments were distributed as to dates and geography so as to give a large number of teams an opportunity to take part in tournament play.

The winners of the four tournaments were:

At Bonita-South Pasadena,

At Huntington Beach-San Diego Sr.

At Santa Paula—Fillmore,

At Chino-Long Beach Poly.

The tournaments held at Santa Paula and Chino came during the Christmas vacation and this gave rise to the question of housing for the boys on teams from distant schools. At both Santa Paula and Chino about ninety boys were given lodging and breakfast in the homes of the citizens of the two towns. This arrangement was doubtless good training for the boys, as well as arousing the interest of the citizens in the tournament.

There are several worthwhile features of these tournaments that it seems to us justify their being held. They provide fine pre-league-season training for the teams taking part. They give players a chance to see other teams in competition. They give coaches and officials a chance to cultivate acquaintances and exchange views on questions relating to the game. While the competition was keen and the rivalry spirited there was an evidence of less strain than is often present in hotly contested league games.

In addition to the four Class A tournaments noted above the Anaheim High School and the Montebello High School each staged an invitational Class B tournament the first week in December.

FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF GAMES

Football play-offs under the new five group arrangements were completed by December 16. No play-off games were arranged in the northern or southern groups of leagues. In the Northern Group, San Luis Obispo and Carpinteria, winners in their leagues, did not care to enter play-off games which left Ventura, winner in its league, with no opponent. In the Southern Group, Point Loma and Vista, winners in their leagues, did not care to continue which left Calexico, winner in its league, with no opponent.

Hemet won from Barstow in the Eastern Group.

Colton, Covina and Pacific Military entered the play-off in one Central Group, and Covina won the final game.

In the other Central Group, Alhambra, Chaffey, Inglewood, San Diego, and Santa Barbara were entered.

The final game in this group was played between Alhambra and Santa Barbara in the Los Angeles Coliseum on December 16 before a crowd of nearly 21,000. The game was won by Alhambra by a score of 26 to 18.

Both coaches expressed themselves as entirely satisfied with the work of the officials. Only three penalties were inflicted during the game, two on Santa Barbara for too many times out, and one on Alhambra for interference with the receiver of a forward pass. This indicates the exceptionally clean, high class type of play put on by the two teams.

The comments in the press following the game, and that by individuals who attend all Coliseum football games justifies one in making the rather sweeping statement that this final C. I. F. football game was the most interesting game from the spectator standpoint of any played in the

Coliseum during the season.

The total gate receipts were \$9,677.20. This is the biggest gate ever received at any C. I. F., Southern Section, play-off game.



COACH SCHUTTE OF SANTA BARBARA ATTENDS CHICAGO MEETING

Coach Clarence Schutte of the Santa Barbara High School is to attend the meeting of the National Interscholastic Football Rules Committee which is to be held in Chicago Janualy 5 and 6. The Santa Barbara High School sends Mr. Schutte to this meeting in recognition of the outstanding work he has done in coaching its football teams.

Mr. Schutte will report to the Council on February 3 on the work of the meeting as well as giving his reaction to the work of the National Group in its relation to high school sports.

Mr. H. J. Moore, State President of the C. I. F., approved Mr. Schutte as a representative from the C. I. F., Southern Section, to the Chicago Meeting.

HIGH HURDLES, HOW HIGH?

The State Council of the C. I. F. has decreed that the high hurdles for the State Meet shall be 39 inches. A year ago the Council of the C. I. F., Southern Section, voted to use the 42 inch hurdles in our championship meet. This rule is still in force and unless changed by the Council February 3 we will run 42 inch hurdles in the Southern California Meet this year.

Last year's results seem to indicate that some boys can run either 39 inch or 42 inch hurdles with equal facility. Johnson of Fillmore High School last year placed fourth in the Southern Calfornia Meet at the Coliseum over the 42 inch hurdles. A week later on the same track in the State Meet he tied for first over the 39 inch hurdles. This does not prove anything. It is, however, an interesting bit of information.

We have always believed that there is a type of boy who can excell in the high (42 inch) hurdle only. If the 39 inch hurdle is used the boy referred to above is left out. We believe the use of both the 39 inch and the 42 inch hurdle in our Southern California meet would prove feasible if no boy were to be allowed to compete at both heights.

SWIMMING MEET SANCTIONED FOR C. I. F. COMPETITION

On March 15 and 16 the Compton High School and Junior College will sponsor a Junior Southern Pacific Association A. A. U. Swimming Championship. This meet has been approved by the C. I. F. Office for competition by our member schools.

INVITATIONAL TRACK MEETS

The four well established, invitational, track and field features have been set for this year on the following dates:

The Southern Counties Invitational Meet at Huntington Beach—March 16.

The Long Beach Relays-March 16.

The Russell Cup Meet at Carpinteria, April 6. The Chaffey Invitational Meet, April 13.

While the Huntington Beach Meet and the Long Beach Relays come on the same date it was found last year that there was very little conflict of interest.

The Russell Cup Meet this year will be the 27th successive year that this meet has been held. The first Russell Cup Meet was held in 1914,

the year the C. I. F. was organized.

We believe this year will be the Fourteenth Annual Chaffey Invitational Meet. We do not have a record at hand to indicate how many years the Southern Counties Meet has been held by the Huntington Beach High School.

This is the twelfth season for the Long Beach

Relays.

We believe the fine competition to be had at these invitational track meets has helped very materially in establishing the enviable record we have in track and field athletics in Southern California.

The Laguna High School, through Maurice Guyer, its coach, has asked a sanction for an eight school invitational meet this year. If a suitable date can be arranged a sanction will be issued for this event.

CROSSCOUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP

The C. I. F., Southern Section, Crosscountry Championship was run over the U.C.L.A. course on December 16.

There were three races, one for schools of less than 1000 enrollment, one for schools of 1000 to 2000 enrollment, and one for schools of unlimited enrollment.

The 1000 class schools finished in the following order—

1st—Redlands

2nd-Paso Robles

3rd—Colton

4th—Downey

5th—Grossmont

6th—Jordan.

In the 1000 to 2000 class the finish was as follows—

1st-Montebello

2nd—Compton

3rd—Riverside

4th—Beverly Hills.

The teams in the unlimited class finished in the following order—

1st-Long Beach Poly

2nd-Herbert Hoover (SD)

3rd—Inglewood.

The distance was approximately one and three fourth miles. The best time of the day was made by Webb and Mendoza of Redlands who finished in a tie at 8 minutes and 23 seconds.

BAY LEAGUE RELAY CARNIVAL

The Bay League is planning a Relay Carnival to be held at Inglewood High School Friday, April 12. Inglewood has a lighted field and expects to make the meet a night affair.

The Bay League started this activity a year ago. We will endeavor to give the program in detail in the March Bulletin as we are sure the meet will be of interest to schools in other leagues.
