It was the concensus of opinion that uniform fees should be set for the entire section. Mr. Harry Moore made a motion that when a double header basketball game is officiated, the fee be \$10.00 and a single game fee be \$8.00. The motion was modified in exceptional cases where unusual mileage is traveled that a 5c per mile for total mileage in excess of 50 miles be paid. Brother Edwin seconded the motion and it was carried.

Dr. Thompson moved that the baseball officials pay be \$10.00 per game. Mr. Hamilton seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Harry Hooer moved that in track where a fee is paid, the fee be set at \$10.00 for referee and starters. Mr. Davidson seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Mr. Burrell moved that each delegate come to the next meeting prepared to discuss his league's desire as to football officials fees. Brother Edwin seconded the motion, and it was carried.

### San Luis Obispo Junior High School

San Luis Obispo Junior High School had applied for admission into the C. I. F., Southern Section. Mr. Bowers moved that their application be accepted. Dr. Thompson seconded the motion and it was carried.

They will free lance and may play against any C. I. F. school. The only limitation being that in football unless the boys are over 15 they may not compete against Varsity teams.

### Black Foxe

Black Foxe Military Institute has been associated with the Preparatory League as a playing guest of the League. Mr. Hamilton requested that Black Foxe be admitted to the C. I. F., Southern Section and assigned to the Prep League on the condition that the Los Angeles City Section of the C. I. F. does not object to Black Foxe withdrawing from it.

Mr. Buxton moved that Black Foxe be admitted to the C. I. F., S. S. upon their formal request. Mr. Burrell seconded the motion and it was carried.

### Entries in Divisional Track Meets

Each league is allowed 3 entries in the Divisional Track Meet. Heretofore Santa Barbara has been allowed two entries in each event. The Council as a whole felt that the Santa Barbara boys should qualify themselves at some League Meet. Dr. Thompson made a motion that Santa Barbara qualify for the Divisional Meet at the Coast League Track Meet if it is agreeable to the Coast League. Mr. Hamilton seconded the motion. The motion was carried. If the Coast League cannot invite them, the Track Committee is to see that they qualify in a comparable meet.

### Class A Low Hurdle Race

Mr. Harry Moore reported that the State at its Council Meeting on December 7, decided to conform with the National Interscholastic Regulations in the low hurdle race. This consists of an 8 hurdle race 180 yards long with 20 yards between each hurdle, the hurdle being 30 inches high. Mr. Donald McIntosh moved that the C. I. F., S. S. conform with the State and National Regulations and standardize the race to the above mentioned distances. Mr. Bowers seconded the motion. The motion and second were then withdrawn and Mr. D. McIntosh made a new motion that the hurdle question be tabled until the February Meeting. Mr. Bowers seconded this motion and it unanimously carried. Mr. Badenoch instructed the League Representatives to come to the February Meeting prepared to settle the low hurdle discussion. (Note: The second motion was overlooked in the preparing of the December 16 Weekly News Release.)

### Oxnard's Bid

Mr. Berlin extended a bid from the Oxnard High School for the Southern California Track and Field Meet to be held on May 17, 1947, at Oxnard Field. A letter from Mr. Donovan Main, Principal of Fillmore, was read recommending it as an ideal track and field for the Meet. Mr. Hamilton and Mr. Van Patten both reported on the excellent conditions at Oxnard. Mr. Thompson moved that the Southern California Track and Field Meet be held at Oxnard on May 17, 1947. Mr. Bowers seconded the motion and a roll call vote was taken. Bay

League voted yes; Catholic League, yes; Citrus Belt League, no; Coast League, yes; Desert-Inyo League, absent; Foothill League, absent; Imperial Valley League, absent; Metropolitan League, absent; Ojai-Simi League, yes; Orange League, yes; Pacific League, no; Pasadena Jr. High School League, absent; Preparatory League, yes; Riverside League, no; San Luis Obispo League, yes; Southern League, absent; Sunset League, no; Tri-County League, yes; Ventura League, yes. The vote being 9 to 4 the motion was carried.

### State Meet

An announcement was made that the California State Track and Field Meet be held at Visalia on the 31st of May, 1947.

### Basketball Timing

Mr. Ed J. Laurenson made a motion that the check timer in basketball should be a faculty member. If the visiting team does not supply a faculty check-timer, then the home team faculty timer is entirely responsible for the timing. Brother Edwin seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

### Baseball Bench

Recommendations concerning the location and safety of the players benches in baseball were tabled until the February meeting pending investigation by the League Representatives as to the situation. The recommendations were that the benches should be 40 feet from home plate and 30 feet from either base unless they are protected.

### Pasadena Games

Mr. Laurenson reported that the Pasadena Games will be held on May 31st. Mr. Moore moved that the first three men qualified to compete in the State Meet at Visalia cannot compete in the Pasadena Games. Mr. Burrell seconded the motion and it was carried.

### State Council Meeting

Mr. Harry Moore made a report on the State Council Meeting. The Insurance Fund now has 64,797.59. There are 305 High Schools in the State covered. 24,774 athletes covered, and 42,236 pupil protection. The State Council is absolutely opposed to any All-Star games. However any school may request one post season game with a school from an adjacent section. In all set intersectional games the net proceeds are to be divided 5 ways. One-fifth to each competing school, one-fifth to each section involved, and one-fifth to the State.

### Request for Sanctions

Brother Edwin requested permission for Cathedral to play a basketball game while on a trip during the Vacation. There being no complications involved, the Commissioner was instructed to approve the request.

Father Nagle of Mount Carmel asked a sanction for an All-State Catholic Basketball Tournament. Mr. D. McIntosh moved that the policy maintained in the past be upheld. Mr. Thompson seconded the motion and it was carried. Therefore no all-State events may be held.

### Releaguing

Mr. Sid Davidson stated that some of the schools in the Sunset League wished to releague. Mr. Alton E. Scott, Principal of Orange High School pointed out the enrollment range. Mr. Bill Cole, Director of Athletics, and Mr. Robert Farrar, Principal of Santa Ana, reported that because of traveling and transportation the present organization is advantageous to all the schools.

Mr. Frank Chase moved that the matter be put on the agenda for the February Meeting of the Council. Mr. Davidson seconded the motion and it was carried.

### All-Boys Schools

Mr. Donald H. McIntosh brought up the subject of the All-boys schools. It was the consensus of opinion that in figuring the A.D.A. in payment of dues, etc., the enrollment of such schools should be doubled. Also in athletic events where the schools are entered by their enrollment, some such plan should be followed.

### Tri-Valley League

Mr. J. E. Bowers announced that the Ojai-Simi League has adopted a new name and will hereafter be known as the TRI-VALLEY League.

### Minor Football Play-Off Schedule

Mr. Bronson Buxton suggested that a Minor League play-off schedule be set up at the same time the Major League play-off schedules are set up. No action was taken, but the subject will be taken up at the next Executive Committee meeting.

On motion the meeting was adjourned.

He had weight (185 pounds), speed, power, cunning, football instinct, in fact everything any great football player ever had.

The C. I. F., Southern Section is proud of its great son. We will follow Glen's future career with intense interest.

## THE 1946 FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF

The C. I. F., S. S. 1946 football play-off games are now history. Laguna Beach won the Central Minor League series. El Centro won in the play-off among the Minor leagues in Imperial and San Diego Counties.

Alhambra was picked as the team to beat in the Major group. She lived up to the hopes of her supporters. Pollard, Loyola and Company made things so uncertain in the finale game that we are sure that Coach Hobbs of Alhambra was ready to call it quits and win by one point when the final gun sounded.

Every one of the eight schools that entered the Major Group play-off had a great team. We congratulate them all. Fine cooperation was given the C. I. F. Office in arranging the details for all games.

As this is written some of the finances are still to be figured. The C. I. F., Southern Section's share in the proceeds will be about \$15,000.00.

We view these figures with satisfaction when we think back to the 1942 season when we had no play-off due to the war cloud that hung over us. On September 1, 1942, our entire bank account was \$321.08. Our present worth is about \$23,000. The disposition of our surplus will be a matter for the Council's consideration and decision at the February Meeting.

## LOS ANGELES CITY AND THE C. I. F., SOUTHERN SECTION

The State Council at its meeting on December 7 cleared the field so that it is possible for any two adjoining sections to have intersectional contests if they so desire.

There have been several meetings during the present school year between the C. I. F., Southern Section leaders and the representatives of the C. I. F., Los Angeles City Schools Section looking to intersectional competition.

We are sure there is a sincere desire on the part of these leaders to establish conditions which will bring about intersectional competition.

The Los Angeles City Schools are planning to send their winners to the State Meet in Visalia on May 31. This will give our boys and the City boys a chance to show their prowess. We will be happy to see the City Schools back in the State Meet.

A three game baseball series between the champions of the two sections would please the boys. A series of championship matches in tennis between the Los Angeles City Schools and the C. I. F., Southern Section Schools would please Mr. Perry Jones, Secretary of the Southern California Tennis Association. An intersectional swimming meet and golf tournament at not impossible.

We believe competition between these two large sections of the C. I. F. will result in some of the finest records in the whole United States.

## CROSSCOUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP

Thirty-two schools took part in the cross-country championship races on December 14 and December 18.

On December 14, the schools were divided into six groups according to enrollment. The team winners on this first day were: La Jolla, Point Loma, Jordan, Compton, Hoover (S.D.), and San Diego.

On December 18, the above six winning teams and all boys who had placed 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5 were entered in a single race. Charles Kohl of Compton won the race in 9 minutes 2.4 seconds which was a new record for the course. The Herbert Hoover High School of San Diego won the team championship. The other teams finished in the following order: Point Loma, 2nd; La Jolla, 3rd; Compton, 4th; and Jordan, 5th. San Diego withdrew from the final race.
