A quorum being present, the meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. Winston Nelson.

Mr. Badenoch moved that the minutes of the May 22, 1948 Council Meeting and the Executive Committee meetings of: June 21, 1948; September 20, 1948; and November 12, 1948 be accepted as printed in the June, August, September, November and December Bulletins. Mr. Bonnet seconded the motion and it carried.

## 1949 STARTING DATE FOR FOOTBALL PRACTICE

Mr. Laurenson moved that the starting date for football practice for the next year be September

5, 1949 for all C. I. F., Southern Section schools. Mr. Brumwell seconded the motion and it carried.

## SAINT AUGUSTINE

The Saint Augustine High School in San Diego is going to play a free lance basketball schedule this year because of the great distance between her and the rest of the schools of the Catholic League. Saint Augustine requested that the Council approve the basketball schedule and consider the possibilities of the school entering into the basketball play-off in the event of a successful season. As there can only be one champion from the Catholic League, Mr. Badenoch moved that the matter be referred back to the League. Mr. Gunn seconded the motion and it carried.

## "HIDE-OUT PLAY"

Mr. Badenoch moved that Mr. Laurenson be instructed to submit a definition of the "hide-out play" in time to be put on the agenda of the February Meeting. The Council will vote upon it at the next meeting. Mr. Holt seconded the motion and it carried.

## TRACK EVENTS' ORDER

Mr. Badenoch moved that a meeting of track coaches be held and that their recommendations be publicized in the Bulletin. The Council shall come to the meeting in February ready for the discussion and vote. Mr. Brumwell seconded the motion and it carried.

## OFFICIALS' PAY

In one of the play-off games the officials were paid the fee plus some expense money. Mr. Holt moved that the amount paid the officials be approved. Mr. Badenoch seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Laurenson moved that the maximum rate for a single basketball game be \$10.00. Mr. Konold seconded the motion and it carried.

Mr. Konold made a motion that the officials' fees for the year 1949-1950 be referred to the leagues for discussion, with the Council members ready to vote at the next meeting. Mr. Austin seconded the motion and it carried.

hill League. Mr. Steed seconded the motion  
and it carried.

The President instructed to League Representa-  
tives to come to the February Meeting of the  
Council prepared to vote on the LEAGUE OR-  
GANIZATION FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR  
1949-1950 which is tentatively set as printed on  
the back page.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:10 P. M.
