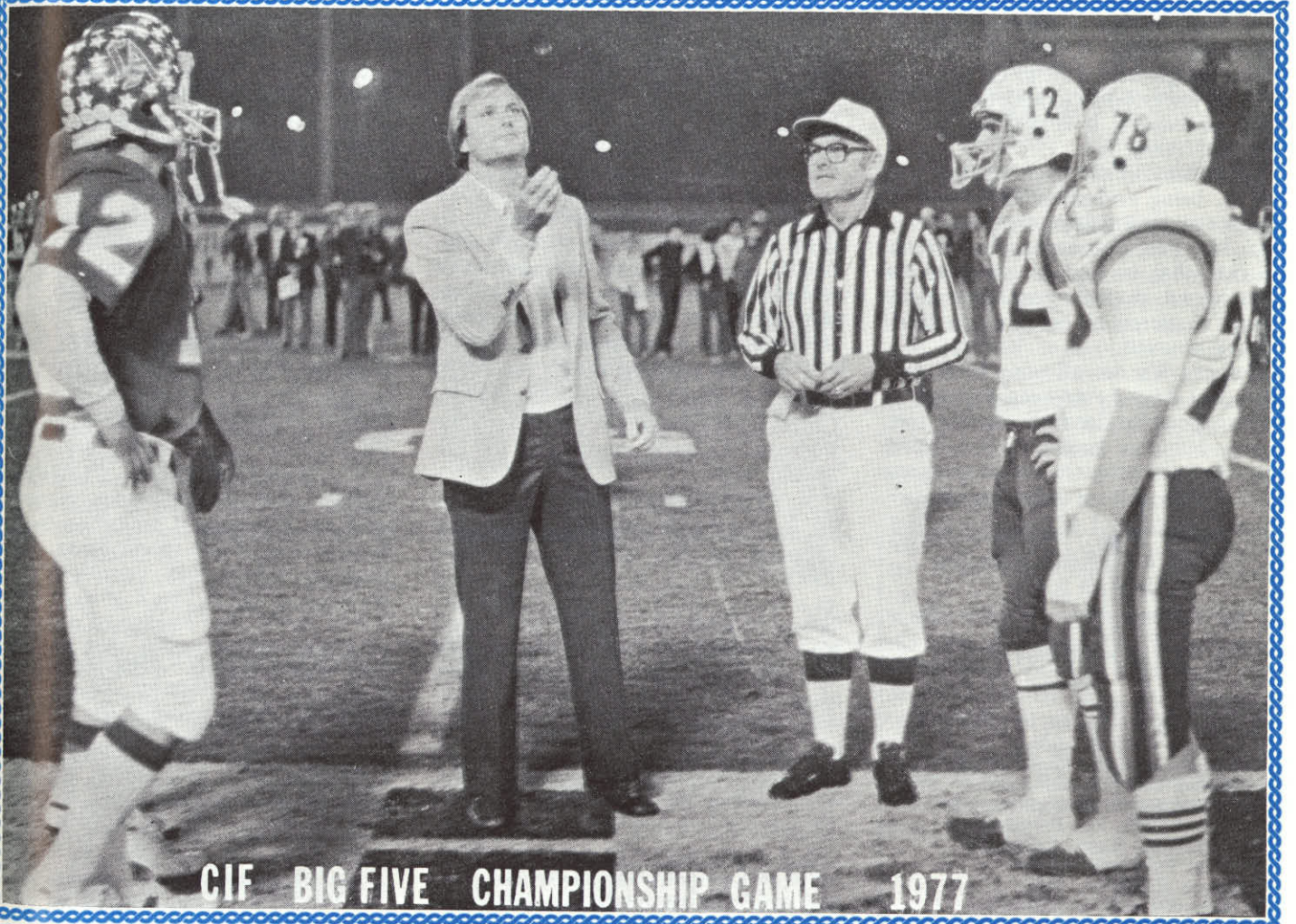


***Pat Haden Returns To

MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING December 15, 1977

The Executive Committee Meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called to order by Chairman, Dr. Lou Joseph at 9:05 a.m., Thursday, December 15, 1977 at the Saddleback Inn, Norwalk. All members were present with exceptions of Dr. Lowell Jackson and Dr. Dick Cordano.

1. BOYS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR REPORT: Mr. Clyde Francisco, representative to the Executive Committee, presented a brief report in the area of Boys' sports and those concerns expressed by some member schools in the area of byes for playoffs and the televising of World Series baseball games on Friday evening during the football season.

2. PLAYOFF REPORT: Commissioner Thomas E. Byrnes presented a capsule review on the just concluded fall playoffs in Boys' and Girls' sports. An increase in attendance and participation in all sports was noted, plus a stadium availability problem in football for the second round. It was further moved, seconded and passed to commend the entire CIF Office staff for its contributions and organization to a most successful playoffs.

3. PLAYOFF QUESTION: Discussion was held relative to the administering of post-season playoffs in all sports and a question was raised as to what point playoffs are or are not conducted dependent upon the number of schools fielding teams. The question was referred to the Playoff Committee for input and recommendation.

4. STATE REPORT: Mr. Tony Balsamo, Dr. Lou Joseph and Mr. Ferren Christensen, representatives to the State Federated Council, reported on the following items:

A. STATE RULE 1300: It was moved, seconded and passed to support the proposal that if a school has only one football team, it could be designated as a junior varsity, provided it does not compete against other varsity teams and provided it has received league and CIF approval as a junior varsity team.

B. STATE RULE 206A: It was moved, seconded and passed to support a proposal amending State Rule 206A by changing the word competition to attendance so that it would read, "passing in 12 quarter or 20 semester periods of work during the regular school grading period immediately preceeding that of competition or the change of semesters of ATTENDANCE during the period of the student's absence."

C. STATE RULE 303: It was moved, seconded and passed to support the proposal for amending State Rule 303 by deleting the requirement that application to field unified multi-campus teams be filed prior to January 15th so that it would read, "application to field unified teams under any of the above situations must be filed annually with the State CIF Office prior to the ensuing school year."

D. STATE RULES 802 AND 803: It was moved, seconded and passed to support the proposal for amending State Rules 802 and 803, changing the \$10.00 award limit to \$20.00 and the \$25.00 award limit to \$50.00.

5. ALL-STAR BASEBALL REQUEST: Mr. Ray Plutko, administrative assistant, provided background information relative to the starting date for All-Star baseball contests as specified in the State Constitution. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support an amendment to change the starting date from June 16th to the date following the last scheduled State sponsored activity.

6. GIRLS' BASKETBALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE: Ms. Margaret Davis, administrative assistant, provided background information relative to the use of alternate courts for playoffs. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed that the Girls' post-season basketball playoffs be played at alternate sites, starting with the semi-final round, effective the 1978 season.

7. BADMINTON REPORT: Informational item by way of the Girls' Badminton Advisory Committee was made relative to the growing interest in making the sport coed at some future date.

8. UNATTACHED COMPETITION: The Commissioner reviewed with the Executive Committee the interpretation of the recent State ruling allowing unattached competition in specified sports during a student's season of sport. The essence of unattached interpretation means that no entry fees, transportation, uniforms, or representation is to be provided by the school or an outside group.

9. RE-LEAGUING COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN: It was moved, seconded and passed to amend Article III, Section E4 of the CIF-SS Blue Book to read, "that the chairman of the Re-Leaguings Committee be appointed by the President of the Council so as to conform with all other committee appointments."

10. GIRLS' ASSIGNMENT AND RATING CARDS: Mr. Bruce Keuning presented a request by the Olympic League that officials' rating cards be utilized for Girls' as well as Boys' in the Los Angeles assignment area. Further discussion followed relative to all areas with the item referred to the CIF-SS Office for further input and study.

11. VENDORS AT CHAMPIONSHIP EVENTS: Mr. Dean Crowley, administrative assistant, presented background material relative to the use of vendors by member schools at playoff and championship contests. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed that schools have the right to sell vendor items if they are managing that CIF playoff event. It was further moved, seconded and passed that the CIF-Office will make decisions on the selling of vendor items for all events it manages.

12. HOLTVILLE PROBLEM: Mr. G. O. Beaman, principal at Holtville High School and Mr. Morris Perry, principal at Needles High School appeared before the Executive Committee for presentations on the question of Girls' leaguings for the 1978-79 school year, relative to the Chaparral and Desert Valleys leagues. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to offer continued support of the re-leaguings concept that Boys' and Girls' teams be aligned in the same league for competition.

13. P. E. QUESTION: It was moved, seconded and passed to amend Article XXXV of the CIF-SS Blue Book so that it would read, "a student may receive athletic instruction in CIF-SS approved sport during one regular scheduled physical education period for that particular sport." (The interpretation would be that students may be enrolled in more than one regular scheduled physical education class of different sports, but the policy will continue that only one physical education class may be utilized for grading eligibility purposes.)

14. INDOOR TRACK MEETS: It was moved, seconded and passed to support the concept that no indoor track and field meets receive CIF-SS sanction unless they fall during the specified allowable dates for that particular season of sport. (The basis of the ruling is that the new State unattached competition rule would allow those students desiring to participate to do so as individual entrants.)

15. EISENHOWER TRACK INVITATIONAL: It was moved, seconded

and passed to recommend to the State CIF Office the sanctioning of the Eisenhower Track and Field Invitational for April 1, 1978 and that the events be conducted in meters, provided they conform to the comparable events as set down in the National Federation Track and Field Rules.

16. PLAYOFF AND SPORT CALENDAR: The Commissioner reviewed with the Executive Committee the CIF-SS Office would be developing the yearly playoff calendar approximately February 1, 1978 in that the Office must wait for the vote on the Season of Sport Proposal at the January Council meeting.

17. MONEY RAISING EVENTS: Discussion relative to the aspect of Jog-A-Thons, Free-Throw-A-Thons, etc. was reviewed by the Executive Committee with the items referred to the Council for further input and discussion.

18. GIRLS' ATHLETIC DIRECTOR REPORT: Mrs. Barbara Wilson, representative to the Executive Committee, presented a brief update in the area of Girls' sports covering successful volleyball and tennis playoffs, increased growth in cross country, input on the Season of Sport Proposal and the concern of softball being held in the winter, the increase in the number of basketball tournaments for Girls' and the continuing problem of locating qualified officials in field hockey.

19. CHRIS TUCKER APPEAL: Mr. William Poidevin, principal at El Segundo High School; Mr. T. Tucker and son Chris Tucker; Mr. Banderas, dean of students at El Segundo High School; Mr. Ragsdale, attorney; Mrs. Tucker, grandmother; Mr. Darrell Haugh, athletic director at El Segundo High School; and Mr. Donaldson, basketball coach at El Segundo High School; appeared before the Executive Committee for a hardship appeal relative to Article XI, Section 11A of the CIF-SS Blue Book. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support the appeal.

20. ROBERT BARBEAU APPEAL: Mr. Edward Barbeau; son Robert Barbeau; and Mr. D. Wendell Reid, grandfather, appeared before the Executive Committee for an appeal relative to Article XI, Section 11A of the CIF-SS Blue Book. Following discussion it was moved, seconded and passed to sustain the decision of the Commissioner.

21. POLICE SERVICES: The Commissioner reviewed with the Executive Committee a memorandum from the State Department of Education relative to the obligation of police departments

providing services for public meetings such as athletic contests. Following discussion, the item was referred to the State Legislative Committee.

22. PREP LEAGUE REVIEW: Mr. Bruce Keuning, representative of the Private and Parochial Schools on the Re-Leaguings Committee, presented background material relative to Rio Hondo Prep and a request by the Prep League that the junior varsity teams from Rio Hondo Prep be placed on a free lance status for the 1978-79 school year due to a difference in age and maturity as brought about by its unique educational enrollment system. Following discussion, the item was considered to be a league matter and referred back to the Prep League.

23. CENTRAL HIGH REQUEST: It was moved, seconded and passed to support the request of Central High School to play its first scheduled football game of the 1978 season on the first allowable scrimmage date with Yuma, Ariz. so as to complete its obligation of a two-year contract.

24. NEW MEMBERSHIPS: It was moved, seconded and passed to grant full regular memberships to the following high schools: Our Lady of Loretto (Los Angeles), St. Andrew's (Pasadena), Alverno (Sierra Madre), Holy Family (Glendale), Flintridge Sacred Heart Academy (Flintridge and John F. Kennedy Jr. High School (Barstow), effective this date.

25. MARINA/MILLIKAN PROBLEM: An appeal was presented by Mr. Charles Weaver, principal of Marina High School, regarding an alleged incident whereby an athlete from Marina was attacked, resulting in a serious injury, by a player from Millikan during a recent basketball game between the two schools. It was the contention of Marina High School that disciplinary action as a result of this attack was insufficient. After careful consideration and review by the Executive Committee of all the facts concerning this matter, it was the opinion of the Committee to recommend to Millikan High School that the athlete responsible for the attack be excluded from further competition on the basketball team until the injured party would have an opportunity to again compete.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:10 p.m.

THIRD CONSECUTIVE TITLE FOR SANTA FE

CORONA DEL MAR, SANTA FE, SOUTH PASADENA, BISHOP DIEGO CROWNED 1977 VOLLEYBALL CHAMPIONS

Santa Fe High School, under Coach Molly Kavanagh, walked off with their third straight 3A Volleyball Championship, held at Huntington Beach High School, defeating a strong Los Altos squad in the finals 13-15, 15-4, 15-12.

Santa Fe, with the best won-lost record for any team in the CIF-Southern Section in any sport, has not lost a league contest since 1967.

The 4A crown was captured by last year's runnerup Corona del Mar.

Coach Kathy Bulmer's SeaKings, power house of the South Coast League, defeated Newport Harbor in the finals 15-7, 15-10 to lay claim to the title.

A Rio Hondo League champion was again victorious in the 2A division. In 1976 La Canada brought home the coveted crown, while this year's Kingpin is South Pasadena.

The Tigers coached by Jim Cherniss held off Cajon in the exciting championship match 15-7, 13-15, 15-12.

Number one seed Bishop Diego won the 1A title defeating Twentynine Palms 15-2, 15-5.

This was the second championship for coach Linda Dawson and her Cardinals as they won the 2A title in 1975.

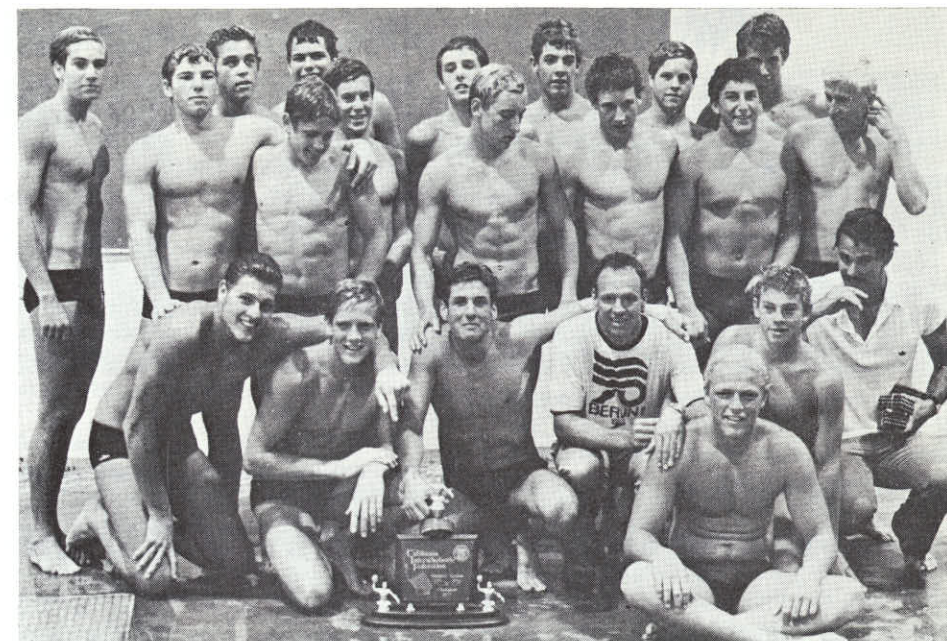

NEWPORT HARBOR AND INDIO GAIN SOUTHERN SECTION WATER POLO TITLES

Newport Harbor and Indio High School reign as CIF-Southern Section Water Polo Champions for the 1977 season.

The coveted 4A crown went to Newport Harbor High School. Under Coach Bill Barnett the Tars finished the season with a 23-2 record. In capturing the title Newport played one of their best games of the season in defeating number one tournament seed Mira Costa 7-6.

In reaching the finals the Tars had victories over Troy, Los Altos and Long Beach Poly.

Coach John Lowell's Indio Rajahs, champions of the Ivy League, won their first CIF-SS 3A water polo crown by defeating a strong El Dorado team 12-10 in the finals.

Indio overcame some very tough opposition as they defeated Brea, Rolling Hills and Villa Park in reaching the final game.

Congratulations to Newport Harbor and Indio, their coaches, and players on an outstanding season.

NEW FORMAT A SUCCESS AS CIF-SOUTHERN SECTION CROWNS NINE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS

Nine conference football champions were crowned by the CIF-Southern Section as the all new playoff format for football came to a successful close.

Hats off to Los Altos (Big Five), Damien (Southeastern), Villa Park (Southern), Millikan (Coastal), Antelope Valley (Northwestern), Temple City (Eastern), Notre Dame Riverside (Desert-Mountain), Norwalk (Central), Rio Hondo Prep (Eightman) CIF-Southern Section Conference Football Champions for 1977. . .

BIG FIVE CONFERENCE

Los Altos defeated St. Paul 22-15 for the championship of the Big Five Conference before 21,633 fans at Anaheim Stadium.

Coach Dwayne DeSpain's Conquerors won the 3A title in 1972 and 4A championships in '73 and '76. St. Paul had to settle for the runnerup spot for the second time in the last three seasons.

After being down 15-7 at half time, quarterback John Hill brought his team back in the second half, throwing for one touchdown, setting up another and finally scoring himself before passing for a two point conversion.

Los Altos wound up with just 79 yards rushing, 34 of them by Matt Aney, who carried 15 times, while St. Paul had 161 yards on the ground, 121 of them by Rick Valenzuela. In the air, Hill's 148 yards outdid St. Paul's 114 yards, 109 of them by Tim Cowan, who hit 7 of 13 before leaving the game in the final quarter.

Chuck Willig of St. Paul established a single season interception record of 15 when he picked off one of Hill's aeriels in the third quarter.

Los Altos finished the season 12-1; St. Paul 11-2.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

Quarterback Dan Marconi directed Damien High School to a 12-0 win over Ganesha in the finals played at Anaheim Stadium.

It was Damien's 11th straight win and the second over San Antonio League rival Ganesha this season.

Marconi completed 11 of 21 for 152 yards, including a 25 yard touchdown pass to John Rayburn.

Much of Marconi's success should be given to the Spartan offensive line, which gave Marconi ample throwing time and consistently opened holes for fullback Steve Campbell.

Damien, which lost in the 3A quarter-finals the last two years, finished the season 12-1.

SOUTHERN CONFERENCE

In the second game of an Anaheim Stadium doubleheader, played before 15,785 fans, Villa Park defeated Los Alamitos 21-6.

Villa Park quarterback Steve Brown paved the way as he threw one touchdown pass in the first quarter and scored two others on short plunges in the third quarter.

The Spartans had earlier lost 3A championship games to South Pasadena in 1975 and Temple City in 1976. Coach Ted Mullen's seniors have lost only six games in the past three years — two of them CIF-SS title games.

The Century League runner-up ended up with a 10-3 record — forfeiting its first two victories because of an ineligible player.

COASTAL CONFERENCE

Millikan the Moore League runner-up built a 19-6 halftime lead and went on to defeat Arcadia 34-14 before over 6,000 fans at Veterans Stadium in Long Beach.

Kim Nikoietich, who had 70 yards on 13 carries, scored Millikan's first two TD's on 19 and 7 yard runs.

Tyrone Mitchell, averaging 5.8 yards per carry this season, scored the third touchdown on a 78 yard run to give the Rams a 19-0 lead in the second quarter.

Mitchell scored again on a 33 yard pass from Al Hawkins. Mitchell finished the game with 92 yards on 10 carries. Hawkins completed 4 of 5 passes for 84 yards and ran 14 times for 77 yards.

Freddie Moore scored Millikan's final touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 43 yard run.

Millikan finished the season with a 9-3-1 record.

NORTHWESTERN CONFERENCE

Antelope Valley finished the season as the only undefeated, untied team in the CIF-Southern Section by defeating Lompoc 35-24 in the championship game played at Antelope Valley College, before 6,000 fans.

Lee D'errico scored touchdowns on runs of 42 and 58 yards to lead the Antelopes to their 13th victory of the season.

Mike Tolliver, who rushed for 191 yards scored on a 69 yard run in the third quarter.

Over the last two years, Antelope Valley, the 1976 2A champion, have compiled a 26-0-1 record.

EASTERN CONFERENCE

Temple City won its sixth CIF-SS football championship in eight years with a 21-7 win over Lynwood before

8,000 fans at Cerritos College.

The Rams who won last year's 3A crown and took 2A championships from 1970 through 1973, were led by running back Don Roberts and quarterback Bill Kirkpatrick.

Roberts, who had rushed for 1552 yards on 197 carries and had scored 21 touchdowns going into the title game, scored two touchdowns on 71 and 10 yard pass plays from Kirkpatrick. Kirkpatrick scored the other touchdown on a 15 yard run.

Temple City finished the season with a 10-3 record.

DESERT-MOUNTAIN CONFERENCE

Chuck Brown scored two touchdowns on a five yard run in the third quarter and a 7 yard pass from Rich Lanzi in the fourth quarter to lead Notre Dame of Riverside to a 27-7 win over Paso Robles in the title game played at Ramona High School.

It was the second football title for Notre Dame which won the Small School Championship in 1971.

NAIRS HELP FOCUS SAFETY PROGRAM

The spinal cord injury is a rarity yet persists in high school and college athletics, according to **Kenneth S. Clarke** who is Dean of the College of Applied Life Studies at the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana and who helped organize and administer the National Athletic Injury/Illness Reporting System (NAIRS) which surveyed spinal cord injuries to students in schools and colleges during 1973-75.

Dr. Clarke, who reports on the NAIRS spinal cord injury survey in the October, 1977, issue of the **Journal of Safety Research**, warns about making over-broad generalizations and identifying trends in data gathered over just three calendar years; but he does point out that permanent spinal cord injuries increased in football on the high school level during the years of the survey; from 10 in 1973, to 11 in 1974, to 15 in 1975 among the 41% national sample of interscholastic football programs.

Rules changes since the 1975 football season, including the prohibition of using the head as the principal point of contact in blocking and tackling, may have already reversed the trend on the high school level, however.

Tackling was identified as the predominant activity of players receiving permanent spinal cord injuries, with players of the defensive secondary being the most vulnerable to this injury. Again, rule changes may have altered this pattern for the 1976 and current seasons.

In gymnastics, trampoline was found to create the predominance of permanent spinal cord injuries. According to Dr. Clarke: "The prevalence of on-apparatus trauma indicates the necessity of competent teaching to protect the participant from premature attempts to execute advanced maneuvers, as well as having a spotter for off-apparatus landings."

Wrestling was the third leading source of permanent sports related spinal cord injuries, but there was an insignificant number to make detailed analysis.

Sports participation accounts for only a small proportion (4% to 7%) of all permanent spinal cord injuries, according to the National Spinal Cord Injury Research Center. Nevertheless, Dr. Clarke believes that the persistence of such injuries in school-college athletics deserves the attention of athletic administrators, and he believes NAIRS has a role in studying the incidence of injuries and identifying the problem areas to administrators.

Three-fourths of the permanent spinal cord injuries reported were to participants in varsity or sub-varsity competitive programs. Nevertheless, Dr. Clarke has as much concern for the 23% of cases in non-competitive programs (e.g. physical education classes) because they can be approached only by evaluation and action at the institution level. The competitive programs, on the other hand, can be modified when necessary by national rules and state regulations, as well as local actions.

More than 6,000 high schools participated in the three year NAIRS survey. Forms were distributed to more than 15,000 schools by the National Federation of State High School Associations. In addition, the National Junior College Athletic Association, the National Collegiate Athletic Association, and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics cooperated in distributing forms to two-year and four-year colleges.

The NAIRS system permits continuous surveillance of health and safety concerns in sports. According to Dr. Clarke, "It is not enough to isolate a problem; one must identify a pattern to isolate potential solutions to the problem and then test those solutions."

time enable you to better enjoy whatever contest you are viewing.

High school athletics were not developed as a sounding board for your immaturity, not developed as a vehicle on which you may "let off steam", rid yourself of "frustrations", etc. This is fine in professional sports, as you are paying a premium price to vent your emotions on athletes that are paid a premium salary to put up with your antics.

However, your token payment to an interscholastic contest entitles you to one thing — the privilege of watching the more talented students of two schools exhibit what they have learned in the athletic classroom.

For the athletic field, court or diamond is merely an extension of the classroom, and if it were any different there would be little reason for interscholastic athletics to survive.

You would not think of entering a Math, History or English classroom, flask on hip, and berate, often curse and physically abuse the teacher. Yet, all too frequently you think nothing of

harrassing players and coaches in their classroom, the athletic classroom.

High school administrators have always given you the benefit of the doubt, Mr. Fan, sometimes because you were a player's parent, or an influential citizen. However, you should be on notice that administrators can no longer tolerate your childish, immature behavior, whether you are a recent graduate, a parent or a resident of the community in which the school is located.

If, indeed, you are sincerely interested in the continuation of interscholastic athletics, then keep a few basic points in mind.

1. There is no such thing as a "right" to participate in interscholastic athletics. Math, History, English, Physical Education and certain other subjects are mandated the proper authorities, and each student has a "right" to be properly exposed to them. Not so with interscholastic athletics — they are a "privilege" — and the player or spectator who takes advantage of this "privilege" is expected to conduct himself or herself in a way so that the "privilege" is not rescinded.

2. Your team does not belong to the community. It belongs to the school, and that school has voluntarily agreed to abide by a certain set of rules, so that all athletes may compete under the same standards. If these rules offend any special interest groups or individuals to the point where they cannot conduct themselves in a rational manner, then, by all means, these persons should direct all their energies toward some other level of athletics, but not high school level.

3. Accept the fact that all high school athletes make mistakes. They are not perfect, and never will be. There is compensation though, for these same mistakes make high school athletics exciting and unpredictable.

4. Remember that your coach is also a teacher. He is a teacher first, and coach second, and any time you join the misguided souls in trying to reverse this order, your program is in the first stages of collapse. Remember, no coach, player or administrator wants to see a program fail. In most cases, failure can be attributed to the unrelenting, merciless pressure of you, the fan, who played little or no part in the building of the program. Small wonder that the high school coaching field has the highest turnover of any coaching level.

5. Make an attempt to learn the rules of the game and then leave the officials alone. Unending time and effort is spent in the training of these officials so that a contest may proceed smoothly. Historically, the spectator who con-
