June 2, 1920

A meeting of the Southern California Interscholastic Federation was held at the Y.M.C.A., Los Angeles, California at 3.00 P.M., June 2, 1920, with the following representatives present:-

Minutes of May 12, 1920, were read and approved.

Minutes of April 10, 1920 were corrected to the effect that the tennis cups awarded shall become the property of the school rather than of the individuals.

The report of Louis Foley as manager of Basketball for 1920 was read and approved. A check for \$75.03 was received. A vote of thanks was awarded Mr. Foley for splendid management.

The Southern Section of the Calif. Int. Federation congratulates the Western Olympic Committee and its manager, Mr. Robert Weaver in securing the tryouts of the Olympic Games and pledges its enthusiastic support, urging all high schools to support and secure the support of their respective communities in this coming event to be held June 26 at Pasadena, California.

The council desires to call attention to the fact that most of the 15 to 20 athletes who will represent the West are the products of Southern California High Schools. Tickets may be obtained of Glenn Whittle of Los Angeles High School and any school may secure credit for reserved tickets by purchasing through B.H.Dyas Co., Los Angeles, Calif.

Upon motion the entry fees for the tennis tournament are to be refunded and the treasurer is ordered to pay the bill for the tennis balls.

The treasurer is instructed to pay to the treasurer of the Western Olympic Committee the sum of \$100.00 to apply to the expenses incurred in sending athletes to the Olympic Games in Belgium.

For allowing players to participate on teams other than their own school teams Gardena and Redondo are suspended from baseball for the year 1921 and any players who played under an assumed name shall be referred to the A.A.U. for action.

The Sec'y is instructed to draw an order upon the treasurer for expenses of members of the council for the year 1920-21.

San Diego City to be allowed in the Semi-finals in any sport provided she wins three out of five games in practice with High Schools classified above and all of the five games played strictly in accordance with C.I.F. rules and play champion of Orange League before Semi-finals.

Los Angeles, California,

At the request of several Leagues a special meeting of the Southern Section of the California Interscholastic Federation was called on September 5 at 2 P. M. Mr. Irving Hague, Vice-President, presided and E. W. Oliver was asked to act as temporary secretary.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the section reconsider its former action in regard to the assignment of teams in the various leagues.

After full and free discussion it was moved, seconded, and unanimously carried that the Leagues remain the same as the season 1919-1920, with the following exceptions:

- (a) Pomona to be a part of the Citrus League.
- (b) Whittier to be in no League if arrangements are not made for Whittier to be in the Orange County League.
- (c) Long Beach to be in no League.

Note:—San Diego, Long Beach, and Whittier are in no League for the present season.

The Tennis Manager was authorized to secure medals for the individual winners of the 1920 season—medals to be similar to the first place medals of the Track Meet.

The meeting was adjourned.
