## COUNCIL MEETING

The C. I. F. Southern Section Council met in the Library at Oxnard High School on Saturday, May 17, 1947. The meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. Arthur Badenoch at 10:00 A. M.

A quorum being present, the meeting proceeded as scheduled.

Mr. Weakley moved that the minutes of the February Council Meeting be approved as printed. Mr. Hamilton seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. D. McIntosh moved that the minutes of the Executive Committee Meetings be accepted as printed. Brother Edwin seconded the motion and it was carried.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

Mr. Van Patten gave the following financial report: Checking account balance as of May 15, 1947, 2101.57. \$20,000.00 invested in U. S. Government Bonds. \$2500.00 in Fidelity Federal Savings and Loan Association. Total assets \$24,601.57 as of May 17, 1947. Mr. Van Patten stated that during this school year nearly 45,000.00 has been handled by the C. I. F. Office, and recommended an audit of the C. I. F. Southern Section books as of July first of each year by a Certified Public Accountant.

Mr. D. McIntosh made a motion that the Commissioner's recommendation of having the books audited yearly by a C. P. A. be approved. Mr. Kinter Hamilton seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. B. L. Bergstrom moved that the financial report be accepted. Mr. Buxton seconded the motion and it was carried.

## ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR SCHOOL YEAR 1947-1948

Dr. Thompson moved that the Presidency of the Council go to Brother Edwin, as Representative of the Catholic League. Mr. Bergstrom seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Hamilton moved that D. H. McIntosh of the Citrus Belt League be elected Vice-President of the Council. Brother Edwin seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Bergstrom moved that S. Chester McIntosh be reelected Treasurer of the C. I. F. Southern Section. Mr. Weakley seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Hamilton moved that Seth F. Van Patten be retained as Commissioner of Athletics for the coming year. Brother Edwin seconded the motion and it was unanimously carried.

Dr. Thompson made a motion that any adjustments in salaries be left to the Executive Committee. Mr. Buxton seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Van Patten, as Commissioner of Athletics, and Mr. A. H. Badenoch, as President of the Council, were commended by Mr. Hamilton and Mr. Hayhurst for their untiring efforts and many accomplishments of the past year.

Dr. Thompson moved that S. Chester McIntosh be elected as Representative of the Southern Section to the State Council for the next two years. Mr. Bergstrom seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Weakley moved that the nominations be  
closed. Mr. Moore seconded the motion and it  
carried.

### SPRING FOOTBALL PRACTICE

Mr. Moore moved that the spring football  
motion tabled at the February Council Meeting  
be reopened. Mr. S. Chester McIntosh seconded  
the motion and it carried.

A roll call report was taken as to how each  
representative had been instructed by his league  
to vote. The Chairman ruled that the roll call  
report was the official vote of each league. The  
majority voted for (2) a limited type of prac-  
tice without protective equipment other than  
shoes. Mr. Bergstrom presented the fact that  
the larger schools might feel that they were  
outvoted by the smaller schools. Upon further  
survey of the question, it was found that such  
was not the case.

Mr. H. J. Moore moved that there be no  
time limit on football practice as long as it is  
done in accordance with the new rule of the  
C. I. F. Southern Section—in gym clothes with  
no protective equipment except shoes. Mr. S.  
Chester McIntosh seconded the motion and it  
carried unanimously.

### Oxnard Track Meet

Mr. Hamilton made a report on the Divi-  
sional Track Meets. Because of the weather con-  
ditions it was impossible to narrow the field to  
8 competitors in some events.

Mr. Bergstrom moved that in the C 50 yard  
race 2 heats be run and 4 men qualify from  
each heat for the finals. Mr. Laurenson sec-  
onded and it carried.

Mr. Bergstrom moved that in the C 660 yard  
race the slow men be placed by the referee be-

hind a faster man for the first lap. Brother Ed-  
win seconded the motion and it carried.

Mr. S. Chester McIntosh moved that in the  
C 100 yard race 2 heats be run and 4 men  
from each heat qualify for the finals. Mr. Berg-  
strom seconded the motion and it carried.

Dr. Thompson moved that the A 100 yard  
race stand as printed and if one of the qualified  
men did not appear, then the next eligible man  
could enter. Mr. Berlin seconded the motion  
and it carried.

Mr. Moore moved that in the A 220 yard  
race the first heat be run with the fastest eight  
men and the final with the remainder, with  
everyone competing against time. Mr. Lauren-  
son seconded the motion and it carried.

Mr. Laurenson moved that two heats be run  
in the 180 Low Hurdles with 4 from each heat  
qualifying for the finals. Brother Edwin sec-  
onded the motion and it carried.

Mr. Buxton moved that Dominguez from Kep-  
pel be allowed to compete in the A 880. There  
being no second, the motion was lost.

Several suggestions were made in regard to  
Track and Field Meets for 1948. Mr. D. H.  
McIntosh moved that the Chairman appoint a  
Committee to sit with the Regular Track Com-  
mittee and give some recommendations to the  
Council at the next meeting. Mr. S. Chester  
McIntosh seconded the motion and it was  
carried.

The following men were selected to meet  
with the Track Committee at a meeting next  
fall: Ernest Hartman, Compton; Victor Francey,  
Hoover, Glendale; Harry Sheue, Huntington  
Beach; Raleigh Holt, Hoover, San Diego; Dick  
Arnett, Inglewood; B. L. Bergstrom, El Monte;  
Ernest Fischer, Chaffey; and Frank Wykoff,  
Carpinteria.

### New Business

The Commissioner of Athletics requested that  
the Constitution and Rules of the C. I. F.  
Southern Section be re-edited and reprinted for  
September. There being no objection from the  
floor, the Chairman ruled that it be done.

There was a request from the Council that  
the State Track & Field Meet in 1948 be held  
on the 5th Saturday in May. Dr. Thompson  
moved that a recommendation be sent to the  
State Council at its next meeting on May 31  
in Visalia, that this request be granted. Mr.  
Buxton seconded the motion and it was carried.

A bid for the 1948 Track Finals was read  
from Compton College. The Chair ruled that  
the request should be placed on file and con-  
sidered with any future bids.

The Metropolitan League is now a nine-team  
league. Mr. Moore moved that their request to  
have the final football game on December 5  
be granted with the proviso that if the League  
wished to enter into the C. I. F. Play-off, it  
have its representative ready on time. Mr. Sie-  
mons seconded the motion and it was carried.

Dr. Thompson moved that if there is a suffi-

cient number of boys who wish bus transporta-  
tion to the State Track & Field Meet in Vi-  
salia on May 31, the Commission of Athletics  
make all necessary arrangements. Brother Edwin  
seconded the motion and it was carried.

Twenty-nine Palms High School has failed  
to pay their dues to the C. I. F. Southern Sec-  
tion for the school year 1946-1947. Mr. Laur-  
enson moved that their name be dropped from  
the role. Mr. Bergstrom seconded the motion  
and it was carried.

The meeting adjourned for lunch at 12:15  
P. M.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

The Executive Committee met in the C. I. F.  
Southern Section Office on Wednesday, June  
18 at 2:00 P. M. The following members were

#### Constitutional Changes

The Executive Committee reviewed the 1945  
Blue Book and the changes in our rules that  
have been made in the past two years. They  
directed the form in which these changes should  
appear in our 1947 Blue Book. This was in  
accordance with the ruling of our Council at  
its meeting on May 17, 1947.

The question of an opponent for the Foothill  
League was left for solution at a later date.  
The Ventura League winner or Santa Barbara  
High School were mentioned as possible candi-  
dates.

#### Minor League Play-off Series

The Commissioner of Athletics was directed  
to survey the possibilities of Minor League  
Play-offs and bring recommendations to the  
Executive Committee at its October Meeting.  
Any feasible plan submitted by Minor League  
Schools will be appreciated by the Commissioner  
of Athletics.

#### Santa Barbara's Football Schedule

The Santa Barbara High School submitted a  
schedule of six games which they asked to have  
designated as their league schedule. They asked  
the Executive Committee to determine the num-  
ber of the six games that Santa Barbara must  
win to get into the play-off series.

The Executive Committee directed that Santa  
Barbara submit its entire schedule with dates  
and places and then a ruling will be made.

### Budget for 1947-1948

The Commissioner of Athletics was directed  
to prepare a tentative budget for 1947-1948  
and submit it to the Executive Committee at  
its next meeting.

The salary for Virginia Smith, Secretary in  
the C. I. F. Office was set at \$225.00 per month  
for a ten month period.

The salary for Seth F. Van Patten, Commis-  
sioner of Athletics was set at \$5000.00 for the  
next school year, payable in monthly install-  
ments.

### Compensation Insurance

The Commissioner of Athletics was directed  
to conduct an insurance survey of all C. I. F.  
Southern Section liabilities.

### Dues for 1947-1948

The Executive Committee set the annual dues  
for 1947-1948 at 3c per A. D. A. for the year  
1946-1947. The minimum dues for any school  
was set at \$10.00. In computing A. D. A. for  
the payment of dues, the A. D. A. shall be  
doubled for boys schools.

### Class B Medal Change

Mr. Van Patten recommended that a medal  
of a new design be secured for our Class B  
activities. He was directed to submit designs  
for adoption at the next meeting.

### Adding Machine for C. I. F. Office

Mr. Van Patten reported that an adding ma-  
chine would be a valuable aid in making C. I. F.  
reports.

Mr. Konold expressed the opinion that a re-  
conditioned machine could be had for a rea-  
sonable figure. He was appointed a committee  
of one with power to act to get an adding ma-  
chine for the C. I. F. Southern Section Office  
at a cost not to exceed \$75.00.

### Swimming Coaches Recommendations

Mr. Van Patten reported on a meeting held  
by the swimming coaches on June 10. The re-  
port was approved as printed below:

### SWIMMING COACHES MEETING

A general meeting of the C.I.F. Southern  
Section swimming and water polo coaches was  
called at the C. I. F. Office Tuesday, June 10,  
at 3:30 P. M. The purpose of the meeting was  
to plan the program of interscholastic meets  
and games for the year 1947-1948.

Five coaches were present and took part in  
the deliberations. The coaches were: Mr. Heber  
Holloway, Whittier; Mr. Arthur Nunn, Fullerton;  
Mr. James Smith, Fullerton; Mr. U. E.  
Saari, El Segundo; and Mr. John H. Wilson,  
Santa Ana.

Mr. James Smith presided at the meeting and  
Mr. Van Patten acted as Secretary.

### Diving

Diving was the first subject to be discussed.  
The deliberations were informal. It was finally  
agreed to recommend to the Executive Commit-  
tee that at the preliminary meet the diving start  
at 12:00 noon and that not over six boys be  
qualified for Class A and six for Class B.



That in the final meet the diving occur as at present, just before the individual medley.

That all diving information be furnished when entries are filed with the manager of the meet.

That three diving judges be used at all C. I. F. meets.

#### Dual Meets

It was agreed to recommend that in dual meets each school be allowed to enter three men in each event and that the point score be 5, 3, and 1.

#### Final Meet

The coaches were unanimous in the opinion that the final meet should not be later than the second week in May. It was agreed to urge the L. A. City Section of the C. I. F. to stage its meet early enough that an intersectional meet may be held without the long wait that is necessary this year.

#### Educational Program

It is recommended that the Executive Committee of the C. I. F. Southern Section appropriate at least \$100.00 to carry on an educational program showing the necessities and the benefits of a strong swimming program in all of our high schools.

#### Intersectional Meet

It was agreed to ask that a committee of swimming coaches from the C. I. F. Southern Section and the C. I. F. L. A. City Section be appointed to program the intersectional meet next year if one is held.

#### Starting Swimming Meets

It is recommended that: the official start shall be the same as the National Interscholastic Rules except that the contestants will assume an erect position on the starting platform prior to the command "Take your marks."

#### Water Polo

There being such a small number of coaches present, it was decided to have a special water polo meeting during the last week in September. By that time it will be definitely know what schools are to have water polo teams for next year.
