MAY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

The meeting of the C. I. F., Southern Section Council was called to order by Chairman Keith Gunn, of Victor Valley High School, at 9:40 A. M., May 19, 1951, in the library of Woodrow Wilson High School, Long Beach.

It was moved by Mr. Nelson and seconded by Mr. Appleby that Mr. Russell be elected for the school year 1951-52 at a salary to be set by the

Executive Commitee. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Davidson, seconded by Mr. McSwan, and carried that a secretary stenographer be employed for ten months at a salary to be set by the Executive Committee, with employment of seasonable help as needed.

Mr. Bergstrom gave an Executive Committee

report on the following recommendation:

Recommendation that By-Laws, Section VIII, Residence Requirements, paragraph (3) be amended as follows: delete the last sentence of (3) which reads "If a boy remains in school in District A after beginning of the next school year and then transfers, he loses the right to compete for a semester, or for a year is he is a letterman."

It was moved by Mr. Hamilton and seconded by Mr. Bowers that the recommendation be tabled until December 1951 meeting. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Clark and seconded by Mr. Bowers that St. Mary's High School of Phoenix, Arizona be admitted as an associate member of the C. I. F., Southern Section. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowers and seconded by Mr. Corbin that the Council not raise football officiating fees from \$12.00 to \$15.00, as requested by the San Diego County Football Officials Association. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowers and seconded by Mr. Bigger that Twin Pines High School be placed in the Arrowhead League, at request of the Arrowhead League. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Bonnet and seconded by Mr. McSwan that the Council adopt the Wrestling Coaches' recommendations as part of the By-Laws, Section XXV Wrestling, as follows:

"(4) The weight classifications shall be as provided in the NCAA wrestling Guide except that the Heavyweight Class shall be 178 to 215 pounds; and an additional Heavyweight Class shall be from 216 to 265 pounds. Boys weighing over 265 pounds shall not be permitted to wrestle."

It was moved by Mr. Clark, seconded by Mr. Douglas that action upon the recommendation be postponed until the December 1951 Council meeting.

It was moved by Mr. McSwan, seconded by Mr. Appleby, and carried that the following recommendation be tabled until December 1951 meeting: Adoption of a resolution violently opposed to coaches' affiliation with professional athletics so that a coach may influence high school athletes to join professional ranks. It was moved by Mr. Nelson and seconded by Mr. Bonnet that the C. I. F., So. Section charter a bus to take first three place winners, Class A, to State Track Meet at Berkeley, May 26 at a cost of approximately \$400. Carried.

Mr. Russell reported upon the financial situation stating that a credit balance of approximately \$1200.00 would be on hand at the end of the 1950-51 school year, based on anticipated expenditures for the rest of the year.

Moved by Mr. Bigger and seconded by Mr. Anderson that a roll call vote by league be called on the following recommendation: Playoffs in the following sports be set later than we now conduct them, by one week, so that Team Tennis starts the second Saturday in May; Baseball the third Saturday in May; and Class A Tennis the first week in June.

Carried by a vote of 15 to 6.

Moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Nelson that the recommendation of the San Diego Track Coaches Association that C. I. F. Track competition be changed from Saturdays to Fridays, on the same weekends as at present be placed on the agenda for the 1951 December meeting of th Council. Carried.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30. Members of the Council and guests attending accepted the cordial invitation of Mr. Harry Moore and Roland Davis to tour Woodrow Wilson High School's new gymnasium and plunge, one of the finest in the southland.

1951 STATE TRACK MEET

Southern California high school athletes once again dominated the State C. I. F. Track and Field Meet held May 26 at the University of California Edward's Field in Berkeley, but northern boys made their best showing in years. The C. I. F., Southern Section schools scored a total of 59 points to the Los Angeles City Section's total of 49, but Jefferson High School of Los Angeles won the team title with 16½ to edge out Fresno with 13. Hoover of Glendale lead the Southern Section schools with 9 points, followed by Glendale HS and Compton HS with 7 each.

Both the Los Angeles and Southern Sections were alloted three entries in the 13 events; a total of 16 entries comprised the field in each event. Based on the number of entries allotted, and the number of points scored in the entire meet, the Southern Section and the Los Angeles City Section should have scored 36½ points each if they were to hold their own. The 59 points our athletes scored attests to the calibre of competition in our Southern Section.

The C. I. F., Southern Section Office chartered a Greyhound 37 passenger cruiser to take the team to Berkeley and return, and 34 boys and coaches accepted the invitation extended. Helms Athletic Foundation graciously provided the breakfast for the group before it left from Helms Hall Friday morning, and the party got off on schedule promptly at 8:00 A. M. The only mishap on the trip occurred when the bus was stopped for about an hour near Turlock due to a flat tire. The 95 degree weather didn't add to the pleasantries of changing tires on a bus.

All of the boys making the trip conducted themselves like the true champions they are. The C. I. F. Office would be pleased to have this fine group together for another jaunt, if that were possible.

The 1952 State C. I. F. Track Meet will be held at a location yet to be selected in the southland, under the sponsorship of the C. I. F., Southern Section.

COMPETITION WITH NON-MEMBERS OF CIF IN NON-CONTACT SPORTS

The Commissioners Office has received several requests for an interpretation of the policy in regard to competition between our member schools and schools outside the jurisdiction of the C. I. F., Some of our member schools have desired competition in such activities as golf, tennis, or swimming, on a dual basis because of insufficient interest in these sports in schools in their immediate area. The Commissioner's Office referred this matter to the Executive Committee and the C. I. F., Souhern Section Council at their meetings on May 19th. The Council reaffirmed the ruling on page 26, paragraph 16, of the Blue Book which states that the Commissioner of Athletics has the authority to approve competition with schools not controlled by the C. I. F. The Council stated that this policy would be in effect only for competition in the so-called "non-contact" sports.

Accordingly in the future it will be possible for a high school swimming team to compete in a dual meet with a college freshman team, provided that there is not sufficient high school competition in the nearby area. Requests for approval of such competition should come to the Commissioner's attention in sufficient time to permit a review of the need.

C. I. F. ACTIVE IN FIGHT AGAINST LOWERING AGE LIMIT FOR AMATEUR BOXERS

The California Interscholastic Federation, and each of the eight section offices have been active this past month in a determined effort to defeat the proposed legislation that would have lowered the minimum age for registered amateur boxers in California from 18 to 16. The Assembly Boards and Commissions Committee refused to

pass such a bill proposed by Senator Nathan F. Coombs of Napa.. The Senate had already approved the bill.

The C. I. F. believes that if such legislation were passed, sixteen year old boys now in high school would become available for boxing contests and exhibition matches put on by those who have no true interest in the welfare of the boys. The C. I. F. believes that if organizations other than schools are allowed to take high school boys of 16 and 17 for these contests, they will inflate the ego of these boys and thus interfere with the boys' normal development in high school. Boxing is the only sport in which the objective is to do physical damage to the opponent. Mr. Verne Landreth of the State Department of Education recently informed us that while the C. I. F. had been successful in defeating this proposed legislation, there might be a possibility of a second proposal being presented to the Assembly Committee. High School Coaches, Directors of Athletics, and Administrators will want to write at least one, if not all, of the members of the Boards and commissions Committee of the Assembly, if such legislation is again proposed. RESULTS OF TEAM GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

The C. I. F., Southern Section Golf Championship was held Friday, May 4th, at the Recreation Park Golf Course in Long Beach. Mr. Rollin Davis of Woodrow Wilson High School served as manager of the event. Six boys competed as members of each school team, their aggregate scores representing the team's total. Each boy played two rounds of 18 holes in the tournament. Ninety-six boys competed in the event. Woodrow Wilson High School of Long Beach won the championship with a score of 919, averaging 761/2 strokes for 18 holes. Certainly the Woodrow Wilson High School team would hold its own in any calibre of competition in golf. Inglewood High School placed second with 951 strokes, Beverly Hills and San Diego Hoover tied for third with 980 strokes.

John Tate of Woodrow Wilson High School won the low medal championship for this event with scores of 70-74-144 total. Sherwyn Turbow, Beverly Hills High School, was second low medal with 71-76—147 total. The competition throughout was excellent. Seventeen of the 96 boys competing played both their rounds with scores in the 70's each round.

In the opinion of the Commissioner's Office golf is one activity which might well be given more attention is our high schools, for boys who develop an interest in this sport in their youth will find that the game offers opportunities for relaxation and social contacts throughout their life.

TRACK CHAMPIONSHIP DECIDED BY CLOSEST MARGIN IN HISTORY

The C. I. F., Southern Section Track Championship in Class A certainly will go down in the records as one of the closest scoring duels, for it was only after a review of the official motion pictures of the finish that the official championship could be awarded. Glendale High School, the 1950 champion; Herbert Hoover of Glendale; and Compton High School tied with 15 points each. San Diego High School placed fourth with 14½ points!

At the meet on Saturday, May 19, the trophy was actually awarded to San Diego High School for winning with 15½ points, but review of the finish pictures showed that San Diego had placed 5th in the A 440 yard run, instead of 4th as picked by the judges. The revised point scoring changed San Diego's total from 15½ to 14½, and dropped them from first place to fourth.

In the Class C team scoring, the competition was keen, and a review of the pictures brought about a change to elevate Pomona to 2nd place, ahead of Monrovia. Previously, Monrovia was adjudged 2nd and Pomona 3rd.

Practically all of the track coaches expressed approval of the plan for eliminations, and the conduct of the meets at 7 locations. The 1951 Track Committee, composed of Bruce Lawson of Keppel HS, Harry Bigger of Fillmore HS, Ed Laurenson of Muir HS, S. C. McIntosh of Puente HS, and Kinter Hamilton of Harvard School may now reap a harvest of satisfaction from the job they did last Fall, in planning the meets.

Track and Field Championships reach practically every school which is a member of the C. I. F.. Southern Section. Approximately 140 schools had competitors entered in the preliminary meets:

117 schools were still in competition at the semi-finals; and 82 schools had their colors in evidence at the Championship Meet at Wilson

Two new records were written into the books this year, and one record was tied. John Rushing of Kearny HS tied the 8.9 second mark in the

Class B 70 high hurdles. Roger Caldwell of Pomona HS ran a 1:25.4 Class C 660 to break the old mark held by Kirkland of Long Beach at 1:26.2, and set in 1944. Ernest Amador of Villanova Preparatory of Ojai broke the 18 year old record of Norris of Bell HS in the Class B 660, when Amador ran a brilliant 1:23.8 at Carpinteria May 5. Suitably engraved gold track shoes will be awarded to those boys breaking C. I. F. Southern Section records.
