TEAM TENNIS TITLE TO BEVERLY HILLS

The beautiful sterling silver loving cup donated by the Southern California Tennis Patrons Association, emblematic of the CIF Southern Section Team Tennis Championship, will be on display in the Beverly Hills High School trophy case until May 1955, since the Vikings won their fourth title in this sport on June 9 by edging out South Pasadena HS 141/2 to 131/2.

In CIF team tennis, eight boys (four singles players and two doubles teams) make up the team. No boy may compete in both singles and doubles. Each singles participant plays one set with each of his four opponents; and each doubles team plays two sets with each of its two opponent teams. Each set won in singles scores one point, and each doubles set won score one and one-half points. In the event of a tie in scoring, the total number of games won by each school in the dual match would determine the winner.

CIF SWIMMING TITLES WON BY BEVERLY HILLS, HARVARD, AND WHITTIER

All three class 1953 CIF swimming champions were dethroned in the 1954 Championship Swimming Meet held May 14 at Beverly Hills High School, when the host school won the Class C title, Harvard School narrowly won the B championship, and Whittier walked away with the Class A plaque.

All of the events were thrilling to watch as competition was especially close. The judges of the finish were hard put to determine the places in the 50 yard events when all six boys hit the finish line in one wave. Four old records were broken, and with the addition of the Class B Individual Medley event, a total of five new marks went into the official record books.

Entries into the preliminaries were limited to six from each league, and from a free lance qualifying meet held at El Segundo HS. At the two prelim meets, six boys were qualified to enter the semi finals at Beverly Hills, where two heats of six swimmers were held. The six fastest boys by time qualified for the finals. Diving prelims were held separate from the swimming, so that the events could have the attention they deserve.

Coach Urho Saari managed the El Segundo HS prelim meet, and Buzz Thayer managed the other prelim at Long Beach Polytechnic HS on May 7, both held in the evening so as to avoid interference with classes. The semi-finals and finals were held at Beverly Hills HS under the skillful direction of John Marrow.

With excellent pitching and a fine defensive team Loyola High School defeated Burroughs of Burbank 4 to 1 in the 1st round game, Lynwood 1 to 0 in the quarter finals, and Inglewood 5 to 2 in the Semi-finals. Fullerton High School won its way into the championship game by defeating a strong Chaffey team 3 to 2 in 14 in-

nings, upsetting a highly favored San Diego High School nine 6 to 4 in 11 innings, and then trouncing Rosemead 13 to 4 in the Semi-finals. Although Loyola won the toss of the coin for the right to name the diamond on which the game was to be played, Loyola High School agreed to play the championship game at Ameridge Park in Fullerton. Over a thousand spectators were in attendance as Loyola turned back Fullerton 3 to 2 in a well-played game. Fullerton got off to a 1 to 0 lead in the 1st inning. Loyola came back in the top of the 4th to tie the game 1 to 1 only to have Fullerton score again in the bottom half of the same inning to take a 2 to 1 lead. Bellflowed high School drew a bye in the 1st round and defeated Trona 12 to 4 in the semi-finals.

In the Southern group championship game played before 1373 paid admissions at Stark Field in El Centro Saturday night, June 5th, Chula Vista swamped Central High School 16 to 6. Chula Vista's hard hitting attack disposed of the Free Lance champion, Pacific High School of San Bernardino, on May 25, 8 to 3. In the semi-final round Chula Vista blasted 21 hits to defeat Laguna Beach 20 to 2. El Centro won its way into the championship game by turning back Hemet 6 to 3 and Citrus 7 to 4. The crowd attending the Chula Vista - El Centro game was one of the largest in baseball playoff history, with games played, in recent years, at Santa Barbara and Santa Maria exceeding the 1373 attendance mark.

JACKIE DOUGLAS WINS THIRD STRAIGHT CIF SINGLES CROWN; CRANSTON-WILSON ARE DOUBLES TITLISTS

For the first time in the history of the CIF, Southern Section, the Class A singles championship has been won three years in a row, with Jon A. "Jackie" Douglas of Santa Monica High School breaking the records by defeating Gregory Grant of South Pasadena HS in the finals played Monday, June 7, at the Los Angeles Tennis Club. Douglas won the singles crown in 1953 by turning back Myron Franks, 6-8; 6-1; 8-6; and in 1952 he beat Joe Blatchford, 4-6, 6-4; 6-4.

It is interesting to note that Douglas lost the first set in each of these three championship matches, and he lost the first set to Grant 3-6; but came back strong in the second and third sets to win 6-1 and 6-0.

Jim Wilson and John Cranston of South Pasadena HS won the Class A doubles title by defeating Mike Franks and Albert Prager of Beverly Hills HS 7-5; 3-6; 6-3, in a well played match. Wilson had teamed with Gregory Grant in 1953 to win the doubles crown.

Play was held at the Long Beach City College battery of courts, with Mr. Walter Sheek assisting as tournament manager, on Saturday, June 5. Finals in both divisions were held on Monday, June 7, at the Los Angeles Tennis Club. Entries are limited to the top two singles players and two top doubles teams from each league.

1954 TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS PROVIDE **OUTSTANDING COMPETITION**

Four new C.I.F., Southern Section track and field records were written into the books during the 1954 preliminary, semi-final, and final meets held May 15, 18, and 22 in activity that was marked by unusually strong competition in several events.

Bob Avant of Hart High School of Newhall set a new Class C high jump record by getting over the bar at 5' 111/4" at the preliminary meet held at Santa Barbara HS on May 15, to erase the record held by Steve Groat of Whittier HS since 1936. Another record was made at this same meet by a second Hart boy, Tom Herrington, who valuted 12' 4" to eclipse the mark set by Robert McArthur of Glendale HS in 1940 of 12' 21/8". In the final meet held at Excelsion HS. two more records were broken. The B four man, 660 vard relay team of Alhambra HS ran the distance in 1:07.0, to lower the old standard held by Glendale Hoover HS since 1950, of 1:07.1. The only Class A record set was by Joe Rose of Glendale Hoover and Bob McKay of Inglewood, who both vaulted 13' 71/2" at Excelsior HS, to erase the record of 13' 7" held by Richard McDonald of Long Beach Wilson High School, since 1950.

Centennial HS of Compton, with an enrollment of 600 students, all sophomores and juniors, provided the big surprise in Class A competition when they amassed 15 points to tie premeet favorite, Santa Ana HS for the championship. Santa Monica finished a strong third with 12 points and San Diego took fourth spot with 101/2 points. Alhambra walked away with Class B honors scoring 22 3/5 points to second place Baldwin Park's 12 points. Rosemead edged Hart HS for the Class C plaque 14 to 13.

Four preliminary meets were held Saturday. May 15, at San Diego State College, Riverside HS, Compton HS, and Santa Barbara HS. The San Diego and Riverside meets were brought together in semi-final competition at El Rancho HS, while Carpinteria HS was the semi-final site for the qualifiers from Compton and Santa Barbara. Semi-finals were held Tuesday afternoon, May 18. The Championship Meet was held under ideal conditions at Excelsior HS, Saturday, May 22.

At the semi-final meet at El Rancho High School, CIF stop watches in good condition at the start of the meet, proved to be out of adjustment after a few events so that the times recorded in the B high hurdles and the A 100 could not be considered for records.

While attendance at the preliminary and semifinal meets was not up to previous years records, the final meet at Excelsior HS was attended by a most enthusiastic crowd of about 2,000 paid admissions.
