VETERAN C.I.F. LEADERS HONORED

At the council meeting held at Inglewood HS on May 26, time was taken from the meeting to honor four men, who although now retired from active participation in C.I.F. activities, have contributed so much over the years to the development and growth of this organization. Each was presented with a gold life pass which will admit him to any athletic event conducted by the C.I.F. or one of our member schools.

These men have established basic policies and are largely responsible for what the C.I.F. is today. Mr. Harry Moore, at the present time Superintendent of Schools in Long Beach, has been with the C.I.F. since its founding, and has probably had more to do with its organization and development than any other living person. As president of the State Federated Council for many years, Harry gave leadership & direction to activities on a state level.

Mr. S. Chester McIntosh, now retired, is a former coach and principal at Puente HS and until four years ago served the Southern Section faithfully and well as treasurer. Mr. McIntosh's greatest contribution to the C.I.F. came through his leadership in setting up the C.I.F. Protection Fund. Realizing the need for adequate financial protection for boys injured in athletics, Mac along with other leaders in the C.I.F., developed an insurance program that now ranks with the finest in the nation.

Another man who has been with the C.I.F. since its founding is Mr. Kinter Hamilton, who for many years was Principal of Harvard School, and a representative on the Council from the Prep League. Mr. Hamilton was invaluable in helping to set up policies whereby the private and public schools could compete together in athletics on a friendly basis. As a result of his untiring efforts in behalf of the Southern Section, Kinter was honored by being elected to the office of President of the Executive Committee. At the present time Mr. Hamilton is retired from school work and is serving as Personnel Manager at Douglas Aircraft, but we know his thoughts are still with the C.I.F.

Competing in athletics in high school and holding the Southern California record in the mile run gave Ernest W. Fischer an early interest in athletics. He was later to become Principal of Chaffey HS where he served for 40 years, during which time he continued to be deeply interested in athletics and served the C.I.F. as a representative from the Citrus Belt League for many years. At one time Mr. Fischer was given the task of rewriting the Blue Book, and he did an outstanding job on that difficult assignment.

All of these men have contributed greatly to

the development of our present day high school athletic program, and we know that they are still as actively interested as they were during the days when they were active participants in the work of shaping the destiny of the C.I.F. We thank each and every one of them for their great contributions, and cordially invite them to attend our meetings and activities whenever time permits. They may be gone from our active ranks but they will never be forgotten as long as high school boys enjoy athletic competition.

INDIVIDUAL TENNIS TOURNAMENT HELD AT LONG BEACH

Sixty of the outstanding tennis players in our Southern Section schools were entered in the C.I.F. SS Class A, Singles and Doubles Tennis

Championship Tournament held on the Long Beach City College battery of courts on Saturday, June 9. Competition in the singles was close and hard fought but all four seeded boys won their way into the semi-finals, where Allan Fox of Beverly Hills defeated Harry Coleman of El Monte, and Forrest Stewart of Muir, took the measure of Mike Bouck of Anaheim, to earn the right to compete in the finals. In the finals Allen Fox proved his right to top seeding by defeating Stewart in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4.

The doubles competition also proved formful as the top seeded duos of Earl and Conway of Santa Monica, and Newmark and Ellis of Beverly Hills, swept aside all opposition to reach the tournament finals. The Santa Monica pair emerged victorious over their friendly rivals, 6-3, 6-4, to be crowned as the CIF, Doubles Champions for 1956.

With Mr. Walter Sheek, who is in charge of tennis for the Long Beach Recreation Department assisting as tournament manager, all twenty courts were put into service and the entire tourney was completed in one day. Entries in this tournament are limited to the top two singles players and top two doubles teams from each league.

C.I.F., SS COUNCIL MEETING, MAY 26, 1956 — MINUTES

The regular meeting of the CIF, SS Council was called to order by President Frank O. Hopkins, in the library of Inglewood High School, at 10:00 A.M., May 26, 1956. The roll of league representatives was taken with the following league members present — Arrowhead, Thomas Sanchez, Big Bear HS; Avocado, Matthew Korwin, San Dieguito HS; Bay, Harold Walden, Redondo HS; Catholic, Rev. Representative, Winston Nelson, Pomona HS; and Executive Committee members—B. L. Bergstrom, Supt. of El Monte Schools; Oliver Corbin, Principal of Covina HS; Doug White, Principal of Santa Barbara HS; B. F. Jamison, Principal of Centennial HS; and Ken Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics.

Representatives were absent from the following leagues: Foothill, Imperial Valley, Mt. Baldy, and Southern.

1. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Minutes of the Council meeting of February 4, 1956, be approved as published in February Monthly Bulletin, 1956.

2. Minutes of the following special meetings of the Executive Committee were approved: April, 9, 1956, as published in the April Monthly Bulletin of 1956; May 7, 1956, as per mimeographed copy; May 26, 1956, as read by Mr. Fagans.

3. Mr. Robert Farrar, Sunset League Representative, presented a progress report of the committee appointed to study the problem of televising of high school football games. It was moved, seconded, and carried to thank Mr. Farrar and his committee for the excellent job they had accomplished and to accept the progress report as presented by Mr. Farrar.

4. A proposal from the Orange League pertaining to change in the method of electing members to the Executive Committee, was presented to the Council for their consideration by Mr. Frank O. Hopkins. After considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded, and carried that the proposal be tabled and that the Secretary be directed to send copies of the proposal to league representatives to be referred to member schools of each league for their consideration.

5. Mr. Fred Greenough, Principal of Carpinteria HS, representing the committee appointed to study the small school football playoffs, gave an outstanding presentation on this controversial subject. In conclusion, he reported that it was the opinion of the committee that adjustments should be made, but because a major reshuffling of schools and leagues was anticipated for 1957, any changes in the present methods of holding football playoffs be postponed for one year. It was moved, seconded, and carried to thank Mr. Greenough and his committee for the fine job they did on this report and to authorize the committee to continue work on this important problem during the coming school year with the hope that a more satisfactory arrangement for small school football playoffs could be developed.

6. Mr. Ted Gorrell, Principal of Baldwin Park HS, and a member of the Committee on the Recruitment of Officials, reminded the Council that they had been furnished copies of the committees report at the February Council meeting and were to have taken this report back to their leagues for consideration. In line with this he then presented individually the committees recommendations and requested the Council to take action on each recommendation.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that all schools in the Southern Section, as far as possible, attempt to carry out the following recommendations of the committee:

(a) Free school men whenever possible so they may accept afternoon officiating assignments, so that the CIF athletic program that is carried on during the afternoons may have the best men available to serve in an officiating capacity.

(b) It is expected that schools will treat all officials as guests and provide a clean adequate place where they may change clothes and shower.

(c) Recommended that timers be assigned to games for the entire season and that they be paid a small fee when finances permit, so they will feel more of an obligation to study the rules and do a better job.

(d) That coaches be urged to attend two meetings of the officials association where special instruction on rules and mechanics of officiating will be provided. The coach in turn should then disseminate this information to his players, student body, and even service clubs in the community.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the maximum fee to be paid officials for night contests be set at \$15.00, with travel expenses to be set by the individual leagues where necessary.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the official's preference list submitted to the Southern Section Office by football coaches, apply only to varsity contests.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the CIF Office send to member schools a roster of all officials, which will contain their addresses, phone numbers and other pertinent information.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Commissioner of Athletics will send at least five copies of new rules in football and basketball to all schools.

7. In recognition of their long and outstanding service to the C.I.F., Southern Section, it was announced that gold life passes were to be awarded to the following four men: Messrs. S. Chester McIntosh, formerly of Puente HS; Mr. Ernest W. Fischer, formerly of Chaffey HS; Mr. Kinter Hamilton, formerly of Harvard School; and Mr. Harry J. Moore, Assistant Superintendent, of the Long Beach City Schools. All of the men to be honored were present except Mr. Fischer, and they all responded with a few words when presented with their passes by President Hopkins. The Secretary was directed to see that Mr. Fischer's pass was mailed to him. (Story of this presentation appears elsewhere in this issue.)

8. Mr. Floyd A. Johnson, Principal of Hoover

HS, San Diego, and a member of the Executive Committee, State Federated Council, and the Southern Section Council for many years, and who is retiring from school work this year, was presented with a gold life pass by Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, Chairman of the Executive Committee, on behalf of the Southern Section.

9. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Winston Nelson, of Pomona HS, be elected as the Southern Section representative to the State Federated Council for a two year term, beginning July 1956 and terminating June 1958.

10. Mr. Floyd A. Johnson, one of the two C.I.F., Southern Section representatives to the State Federated Council of the C.I.F., announced that he was retiring as Principal of Hoover HS of San Diego in June, which would make it necessary for him to resign his position on the Federated Council. It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Phil Morell of El Cajon HS be elected as the Southern Section representative to the State C.I.F. Council, to replace Mr. Johnson, and serve out the one year remaining in his term of office.

11. The election of the Southern Section Council Officers was the next item of business.

(a) In accordance with the C.I.F. Constitution, the Pacific League will succeed to the presidency for the 1956-57 school year. Mr. Frank O. Hopkins, outgoing Council president turned the meeting over to the incoming president, Mr. Frank Williamson of Monrovia HS.

(b). In similar manner the Parochial League representative, Rev. Lawrence Caruso, of St. Francis HS, of Flintridge, was announced as Vice-President of the Council for the 1956-57 school year.

(c) It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Winston Nelson, of Pomona HS, be re-elected as treasurer for the 1956-57 school year.

(d) The election of a Commissioner of Athletics was discussed, and it was suggested that Mr. Ken Fagans be re-elected to the office and be offered a four year contract. Attention was called to the Constitution of the Southern Section, which states that, "The Commissioner of Athletics shall be a school man selected annually by the Council at the regular May meeting." It was then moved, seconded, and carried unanimously to change the first sentence of Article V, Sec. 3, of the Constitution to read as follows: "The Commissioner of Athletics will be elected by the Council for a period of from one to four years, with his salary to be determined by the Executive Committee."

(e) It was moved, seconded, and carried that Mr. Ken Fagans be re-elected as Commissioner to serve from July 1956 through June 1960.

(f) Six candidates were nominated for positions on the Executive Committee. A ballot was cast, and the following five men who received the greatest number of votes were elected as members of the Executive Committee for the 1956-57 school year: Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, El Monte; Mr. Oliver Corbin, Covina HS; Mr. Ben F. Jam-

ison, Centennial HS; Douglas White, Santa Barbara HS; Keith Gunn, Victor Valley HS.

12. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Southern Section Council, extend its appreciation to the outgoing President, Mr. Frank O. Hopkins of Brea-Olinda HS, for his outstanding service during his term of office.

13. The meeting was adjourned at 11:59 A.M., in time for a delicious luncheon served to the Council members in the Inglewood HS Cafeteria. After the luncheon, the Council members enjoyed the C.I.F. Southern Section Championship Track & Field meet held at Sentinel Field in Inglewood.

CHAFFEY HS CAPTURES CENTRAL GROUP BASEBALL CROWN

A poised and well coached Chaffey High School Baseball team defeated Oxnard by a score of 3-0 to win the championship of the CIF, in a hard fought game played before a capacity crowd of enthusiastic rooters on the Oxnard HS diamond. Getting excellent pitching from big Hal Reniff, who allowed his hard hitting opponents only four scattered hits, Coach Ken Proctor's Tigers made excellent use of two hits, three errors by Oxnard and some wildness on the part of Mike Dalton, to push over three runs which was enough to assure victory for the Citrus Belt League Champions.

Chaffey, which finished the season with a 21-5 record; advanced to the finals by walloping Mira Costa 11-1, edging Hoover of San Diego 4-3 and nosing out Montebello in the semi-finals 8-6. Oxnard; behind their ace pitcher Mike Dalton, won close decisions over Loyola 1-0, Keppel 3-0, and Burbank 3-1 to gain the right to participate in the championship contest.

For the first time in the history of the Southern Section, both first and second place teams from each of the 12 leagues in the Central Group were eligible to enter the playoff competition. Twenty-four outstanding clubs vied for the championship and the results of all games are listed below:

1956 TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS
PROVIDE OUTSTANDING COMPETITION

The C.I.F., Southern Section's great Track & Field program for 1956 was brought to a successful conclusion with the holding of the championship meet at Sentinel Field in Inglewood on Saturday, May 26, 1956. Starting with the preliminary meet on May 12 and continuing through the Semi-Final and Championship meet, competition was exceptionally keen, which forced the boys to tie old records or set new ones in 15 events.

Homer Robertson, the young giant from Pa-

cific HS, eclipsed Don Vick's 12# Shot Put record of 61' 2 7/8" by heaving the iron ball 61' 10 1/4" for a new Southern Section record. This was a tremendous put by a high school boy but even this outstanding mark was beaten in the State meet when Robertson set a new National High School mark of 62' 5 1/4" which was more than a foot better than the old standard. Two Pasadena boys got into the act when Bob Poynter tied the 15 year old mark in the 100 Yd. Dash by turning in a fast 9.6, while his team-mate, Charles Piggee flew over the 120 High Hurdles in 14.0 flat to set another Southern Section record.

One of the outstanding marks in the Class "B" competition came at Inglewood when Tom Lile, a freshman at Antelope Valley HS, set a new mark of 3:10.2 in the 1320. Tom is a big, strong youth and if brought along properly, he should be one of America's finest runners in the not too distant future. Many other records were tied or broken, and they are indicated in the summary which can be found elsewhere in this Bulletin.

Pasadena High's three man team scored heavily in the sprints and hurdles to give the Crown City school the Varsity Championship with a total of 20 points. They were closely followed by California HS with 16 1/2 points. In the Class "B" competition, L. B. Poly nosed out Rosemead and San Diego for the Championship when the pictures of the finishes showed that a Long Beach Poly sprinter who had gone unplaced at the meet, really took 4th place in the finals. Glendale and L. B. Poly waged a bitter fight for the Class "C" plaque with Glendale finally winning out by scoring 15 points to 14 for L. B. Poly.

Four preliminary meets were held Saturday, May 12 at San Diego, Santa Monica, Riverside, and L. B. Poly High Schools. The San Diego and Riverside qualifiers were brought together in the semi-finals at Chaffey HS, while Compton was the semi-final site for the qualifiers from Santa Monica and L. B. Poly meets. Semi-finals were held Saturday, May 19, with the Championship meet being staged at Inglewood HS on May 26.

Interest in Track and attendance at all meets was greater than in any previous year. All high schools in the Southern Section, and the C.I.F. Office is indebted to the many officials who gave of their time to serve at the seven C.I.F. meets. Particular tribute to the excellent work of the following meet managers is in order:

Divers in each class will qualify for the finals on the same basis as other swimming events. Jimmy Smith Diving Forms must accompany entry blanks for championship meet.

2. It was recommended that the National Collegiate rules be adopted with the exception of Order of Events, and that a uniform set of rules be established for all State high school competition. Mr. Fagans was requested to place this item on the Agenda for the next State Council meeting.

3. **Rule changes** — Any combination of strokes may be used in breast stroke event for 1957. Relays will remain same. Detailed information on new rule changes will be distributed at a later date. NCAA and AAU starting methods will now be used — instead of "get set" command, it will be "take your mark."

4. **Order of Events:** By majority vote the following events were added for the championship

7. It was recommended that the 1st and 2nd place teams in the Varsity competition be eligible to enter the playoffs. In B & C competition only the champions of each league will be eligible to enter the playoffs. It was agreed that the Finals would be staged as a night program.

Site: It was recommended that the preliminaries be held in neutral high school pools. It was further recommended that the semi-finals and finals be held in the Lynwood, Municipal pool.

RULES: The NCAA water polo rules will be followed except in scoring. In all water polo games in the C.I.F., Southern Section, 2 points will be allowed for a successful try for goal, with (1) one point allowed for a successful penalty throw. In the last two minutes of a game, when a personal foul is called, if the offended team fails to score, the ball is in play. If the offended team scores on the penalty throw the ball is then awarded to the goal keeper of the scoring team who will put the ball in play.
