LA JOLLA SUCCESSFULLY DEFENDS LARGE SCHOOL TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

The CIF, SS was privileged to hold their large school team tennis championship playoff on the excellent courts at the Los Angeles Tennis Club, on Monday, June 1, where La Jolla HS successfully defended their championship by defeating a good Arcadia team 18½ to 9½. The 9½ points scored by Arcadia represented the largest total to be scored against the La Jolla team in CIF playoffs during the past two seasons.

Billy Bond again led the Vikings by sweeping all 4 of his singles matches in the round robin type of play. Bentley Hill and Pete Sanderson of La Jolla, one of the finest prep doubles teams in the Southland, swept both of their doubles matches. The outstanding player for Arcadia was little Joe Taylor who won three of his four singles matches, losing only to Billy Bond.

La Jolla gained the finals by swamping Grossmont 26½ to 1½, defeating Chaffey 20 to 8, and then taking the measure of Santa Ana in the Semi-Finals 21½ to 6½. Arcadia on the other hand defeated Montebello 22½ to 5½, eliminated Fullerton 18½ to 9½, and then eked out a narrow victory over Loyola 15 to 13 to qualify for the finals.

In CIF team tennis, 8 boys (4 singles players and two doubles teams) make up the team. No boy may compete in both singles and doubles. Each singles participant plays one set with each of his four opponents; and each doubles team plays two sets with each of two opponent teams. Each set won in singles scores one point, and each doubles set won scores 1½ points. In event of a tie in scoring, the total number of games won by each school in the dual match would determine the winner.

TOP GOLFERS PLAY IN CIF, SS TOURNEY

Seven outstanding prep golfers shot rounds of 74 to wind up in a tie for top honors in the CIF, SS Individual Golf Tournament played on the beautiful Crystalaire Course located near Palmdale, on Monday, June 1, 1959. This is the first time in the history of this event that so many golfers tied for first place, and as SS rules provide that there will not be a sudden death playoff, duplicate trophies will be presented to each of the seven winners.

Those winding up tied for the championship included Bob Small of L.B. Poly, Dave Lynch of Downey, Steve Lane of Wilson, Ron Rhoads of Beverly Hills, Fred Murray of Capistrano, Mel Curci of Ventura and Dave Stockton of Pacific HS. A number of these boys had an opportunity on the 18th green to sink eight- to ten-foot puts for a one over par 73, which would have given them sole claim to top honors. The pressure was terrific, however, and none of them were able to sink the tie breaker.

A record total of 116 boys, representing 49 schools, entered this year's competition. The majority of the entries shot excellent rounds of golf but, as usual, there were many boys entered by enthusiastic coaches who had no business being in this championship tournament. The golf coaches at their meeting next January will have to come up with some new regulations requiring higher qualifying standards for the CIF Individual tournament.

MORNINGSIDE HS CAPTURES CIF, SS BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Morningside High School's underdog base-ball team ended Chaffey's three-year domination of the CIF, SS baseball playoffs when they blanked Santa Monica 4 to 0 in the champion-ship game played before an overflow crowd of enthusiastic spectators on Friday, June 5, on the Morningside diamond. A fine display of good sportsmanship was exhibited throughout and after the contest by the competing teams, the rival coaches, and the student bodies of both institutions. It would appear that Morningside and Santa Monica have initiated an excellent athletic rivalry which will continue next year in all sports as Morningside becomes a regular member of the Bay League.

As they had all year, the Monarchs relied on the strong right arm of their pitching ace Bob Anderson, and he came through in fine style to check the visitors on six scattered hits. He did not walk a man and the six hits were distributed over six different innings. The outcome was actually never in doubt after the first inning, when ten Monarchs paraded to the plate and 4 runs were scored. Goodrich, the Viking's fine hurler who was pitching with only two days rest, was not at his best, although he settled down after the disastrous first inning to blank the Monarchs the rest of the way.

With 32 of the finest prep baseball teams in the Southland entered in the SS playoffs the road to the championship is never an easy one. In the first round Morningside was pitted against their city rivals, Inglewood, and were fortunate to win by a narrow 1 to 0 score. In the 2nd round they travelled to Oxnard and were forced to battle for eleven long innings before they came away with a 5 to 3 victory. Chaffey, the defending champions, and the team picked by the

experts to go all the way for the fourth straight year, provided the opposition in the quarter finals. The Monarchs were equal to the test however, and eliminated Chaffey in a well played 6 to 4 contest. In the semi-finals a good Santa Ana team went down to defeat 4 to 3 to catapult Morningside into the championship game.

In the lower half of the draw Santa Monica also met tough opposition and was hard pressed to defeat San Gabriel 3 to 2, Millikan 4 to 3, and Huntington Beach 3 to 1, to reach the semifinals. Glendale, led by their outstanding pitcher Darrel Sutherland, faced Samohi in the semis, but when the game was over the Vikings had qualified for the finals with a fine 3 to 1 victory.

Interest was high in this year's baseball playoffs, and nearly all of the games attracted record crowds. With this increase in interest in our national past time, plans are now being formulated which will provide that our championship game in 1960 will be played in a neutral baseball park that will provide good playing conditions and accommodate comfortably those fans who are interested in witnessing prep baseball at its best. MINUTES OF CIF, SS SWIM COACHES MEETING

The meeting was called to order at 3:15 P.M. at the conclusion of the water polo coaches meeting on May 26, 1959. The same persons were in attendance as were present for the water polo coaches meeting.

INVITATIONAL SWIM RELAYS — The CIF, SS relays were brought up for discussion and it was decided to follow the pattern used during the past two years in which three preliminary meets were held, with each meet qualifying the first two teams along with the next two fastest times from the three preliminary meets into the finals. The locations and dates for the swim relays were set as follows:

P.M. @ Santa Monica City College Entries—Each league will be entitled up to four entries in each event provided all entries have a time better than the qualifying standards which will be established by a special committee which will meet after the NCAA Swimming Guide has been published. This committee will be composed of one coach from each league. Leagues are reminded to submit the name of their representative to the CIF Office at the earliest opportunity.

Qualification—With the establishment of three preliminary meets it was decided to qualify the 1st four boys from each preliminary, in each event, plus the next fastest four times from the combined three preliminary meets. This will give us two heats of eight contestants each in the semi-finals. Times must be submitted on each entry coming from the league meets into

the preliminary meets and from each preliminary meet into the semi-finals.

Order of Events—In line with the new proposed NCAA interscholastic swim regulations it was decided to change the A-Individual Medley from 150 yds to 200 yds. The B-Individual Medley was changed from 75 yds to 100 yds. The breast stroke and the free style events were reversed in the official order of events. By a majority vote it was decided to add the Class C-100 yd Individual Medley to our list of swimming events. This race will be placed in the Order of Events just prior to the B-Individual Medley.

DIVING—A discussion was held and action was taken to eliminate Class B Diving from the CIF, SS swim program. Beginning with the 1960 season our member schools will conduct Class A Diving only, in dual and championship meets. In both dual and championship meets boys will be permitted to execute their dives from either the high or low board. Each league will be entitled to 3 entries in Class A Diving into the CIF, SS championship meet.

It appears that Harvard will be a tennis power for at least another two years, as the two outstanding players on their squad are sophomores. In the championship match these second year men, Elty Brown and Ron Breissman, each won 4 singles matches without the loss of a set. San Marino placed most of their strength in doubles, but Harvard still managed to win 3 out of the 8 sets played.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING—June 22, 1959

The annual June meeting of the CIF, SS Executive Committee was called to order by the Chairman, Mr. B. L. Bergstrom, at Ojai on Monday, June 22, 1959, at 9:00 A.M. Those present were Messrs. Oliver Corbin, Principal, Covina HS; Winston Nelson, Principal, Ganesha HS; Ben F. Jamison, Principal, Centennial HS; John R. Taylor, Principal, Nordhoff HS; Frank O. Hopkins, Principal, Brea-Olinda HS; Keith Gunn, Principal, Victor Valley HS; Matt Korwin, Principal, San Dieguito HS; Vaughan Cummings, Pasadena City Schools; Robert J. Schilling, Principal, Los Altos HS; Ray Charlson, Vice Principal, Culver City HS; and J. Kenneth Fagans, Commissioner of Athletics.

- 1. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of May 22, 1959, be approved as published in the May, 1959, Monthly Bulletin.
- 2. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Minutes of the Water Polo and Swimming Coaches meeting, as published in the June, 1959, Monthly Bulletin, be recommended to the Council for acceptance.
- 3. The 1959 football schedule of Rubidoux HS was reviewed and it was moved, seconded and carried that in order to quality for the 1959 CIF, SS football playoffs, Rubidoux HS must win all but one of the following six games on their 1959 schedule: Coachella JV, Banning JV, Lawndale HS, Ramona JV, Edgewood HS, and Northview HS.
- 4. Effective September 1959, the new Fermin Lasuen HS will be opened in San Pedro and will accept freshmen only. It is expected that in three years this new school will replace Mary Star of the Sea HS, which will become an all girls school. The new principal of Fermin Lasuen HS has requested permission for the freshmen boys in his school to participate on the athletic teams representing Mary Star of the Sea during the 1959-60 school year. After a discussion of the case it was moved, seconded and carried, that in line with CIF, SS policy all boys attending Fermin Lasuen HS during the coming school year be permitted to compete on athletic teams representing Mary Star of the Sea HS, because of administrative necessity.
- 5. It was moved, seconded and carried to send Mr. Fagans, with expenses paid, as the CIF, SS representative to the National Federation Foctball Rules Meeting in January, 1960, and the National Federation Annual Convention in June, 1960. Funds are included in the coming year's budget.
- 6. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Commissioner be authorized to represent the Southern Section at the California State Workshop, to be held in San Luis Obispo in August, 1959.
- 7. Aviation HS requested permission to begin the Aviation-El Camino Baseball Tournament, sanctioned for March 2, 3, 4, and 5, 1960, earlier

- than 3:00 P.M. Leuzinger HS requested permission to begin the Wrestling Tournament, approved for January 29, 1960, earlier than 3:00 P.M. The reasons for the above requests were carefully considered by members of the Executive Committee, but in line with recent action of the SS Council prohibiting sanctioned events from beginning earlier than 3:00 P.M. on a school day, it was moved, seconded and carried that these requests for an earlier starting time be denied.
- 8. The committee was informed that the Pioneer League had gone on record as requesting that their league be placed in the "AA" playoffs for the 1959-60 school year. It was pointed out that the 1959 football playoffs would be handled by a special committee and as the "AA" playoff grouping applied only to basketball and baseball, both non-contact sports, it was in the best interest of the majority of the leagues to leave the Pioneer League in the "AAA" classification for the coming school year.
- 9. It was moved, seconded and carried that because of increased costs the mileage allowance for use of private cars in connection with CIF, SS business be set at 10c per mile, effective with the beginning of the new fiscal year on July 1, 1959.
- 10. The Commissioner advised the group of a problem that had arisen in connection with the establishment of the date and location of the 1960 spring Council Meeting. In the past it has been the custom to hold this meeting on Saturday morning in connection with the Championship Track meet at the school hosting the meet. In 1960 the track meet has been scheduled for Saturday, May 28, which is the opening day of an extended Memorial Day holiday weekend. A discussion revealed that holding the meeting in connection with the championship track meet always caused considerable rush and did not always give ample time for conducting the business of the organization. Mr. Hopkins extended an invitation to the group to hold this meeting at Brea-Olinda HS. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the kind invitation of Mr. Hopkins to hold the 1960 Spring Meeting of the Council at Brea-Olinda HS, on Saturday, Morning, May 21, 1959.
- a number of schools were holding interschool spring football practices or scrimmages in violation of Article XVI, paragraph 15, page 33 of the By-Laws. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Commissioner should write to the principals of the schools involved, calling attention to the violation of our rule. It was further agreed that this particular rule should be publicized next fall so that all member schools would be aware of this regulation.
- 12. The Ventura League requested an interpretation of the rule pertaining to the use of cadet teachers as coaches of athletic teams. The new State CIF Constitution contains in its

By-Laws the following rule pertaining to this matter:

"Participation of cadet teachers is approved in coaching activities when they are regularly assigned to a school for practice teaching and under the supervision of a regular certified coach."

It was moved, seconded and carried that this state CIF rule, with the addition of the phrase "at all times" at the end of the regulation, be included in our By-laws under Article XII, paragraph 13, page 28 of the Blue Book.

- 13. Because of the recent action of the Council in adopting a new format for the conducting of the 1959 CIF, SS football playoffs, it will be necessary for leagues to be bracketed into groups of no more than eight, for this fall's football playoffs. After a discussion of this matter it was moved, seconded and carried that the Commissioner be directed to gather all available data pertaining to the size of schools in each league, the overall athletic strength of the leagues, and the geographical location of the leagues in the Southern Section who participate in tackle football, for presentation to the Executive Committee for consideration at their September meeting.
- 14. Mr. Nelson, Treasurer of the CIF, SS presented a Financial report showing the income and expenditures of the CIF, SS for the 1958-59 school year as compared with the estimated budget for 1958-59; and proposed budget for the fiscal year, July 1, 1959 to June 30, 1960. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the Financial Report, and adopt the proposed budget for 1959-60.
- 15. It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the transfer of \$5,000.00 from the Savings and Loan to the CIF, SS checking account as of the end of the current fiscal year.
- 16. Although past policy called for the presentation of copies of the Financial Report and Budget to all Council members for dissemination to the leagues, it was the opinion of the members of the executive committee that this report should be sent directly to the member schools. It was moved, seconded and carried that a copy of the Financial Report for the 1958-59 fiscal year and the proposed budget for the coming year be mailed to the principal of each member school prior to October 1, 1959.
- 17. Treasurer Nelson reported that although the office staff had moved into our new building about two months ago, all work had not been completed and there were still some outstanding bills. He indicated that he would present his final report on the new building at the next meeting of the Executive Committee scheduled for September.
- 18. It was moved, seconded and carried that the first regular meeting of the Executive Committee, for the 1959-60 school year, be held in the San Diego area, on Monday, September 28,

- 1959. Mr. Matt Korwin, San Diego County representative was authorized to make the necessary arrangements for the meeting.
- 19. It was moved, seconded and carried to cast a unanimous ballot for the re-election of Mr. B. L. Bergstrom as Chairman of the Executive Committee for the 1959-60 school year.
- 20. It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. John R. Taylor be given a vote of thanks for his efforts in arranging the details connected with this meeting.
- 21. There being no further business to come before the committee the meeting was adjourned at 12:33 P.M.

NEEDLES HS REPEATS AS CIF SS "A" BASEBALL CHAMPION

For the second straight year Needles High School's magnificent Mustangs galloped off with the CIF "A" baseball crown by crushing the Desert HS Scorpions, May 29, by the one-sided score of 12 to 0. The game was played before a record crowd of 1,000 wildly cheering fans who watched the Mustangs' outstanding catcher, Jim Shepherd, lead his hard hitting club to a virtual repetition of last year's successful playoff victory over Villanova.

Needles' senior pitcher, Jerry Lyons, climaxed a spectacular season with the shut out over a fighting Desert squad which had previously eliminated the title holders in the Hi-Lo, Tri-Valley, and San Luis Obispo leagues. The Mustangs had battled their way to the finals by disposing of Twenty-nine Palms and Flintridge by the identical scores of 5 to 1.

With a high school enrollment of less than 350 students the Mustangs have compiled a remarkable two-year record of 42 wins against only 4 defeats. Each of these losses has come against "AA" and "AAA" schools. Despite the loss of six regulars from this year's team Coach Roy Patterson warns Needles' opponents for next year to again look out for the Blue and White. With an excellent junior varsity team, replacements for the departing veterans will be forthcoming and the Mustangs are looking forward to a successful defense of their CIF championship.

LEAGUES SEND OUTSTANDING PLAYERS TO CIF TENNIS TOURNAMENT

With each league eligible to enter its two top singles players, and its two top doubles teams, competition was keen in the 15th Annual CIF, SS Individual Tennis Tournament, which was held on the Long Beach City College Courts, on Saturday, June 6, 1959. Exactly 100 boys, representing the best prep players in Southern California, except for defending singles champion Billy Bond of La Jolla, who was forced to default because of illness, entered the competi-

With Bond not in attendance, Ramsey Earnhart of Ventura, swept through to the singles championship by besting Dave Reed, of Glendale, in a torrid 3 set match in the finals 6-4, 3-6, 6-4. Until the final match Earnhart had little competition and displayed the form that should earn him a position on the 1959 Davis Cup Tennis Team.

Neither of the top seeded teams in the doubles reached the final round as upsets prevailed throughout this portion of the tournament. Hill and Sanderson of La Jolla, who were picked by most experts to win the title, bowed in the semi-finals to Doug Mathews and Guy Archambault of Santa Ana 4-6, 6-3, 6-4. In the lower half of the draw Don Kliss and Stan Kula of Anaheim defeated 2nd seeded John Minna, and Bob Ray of St. Augustine's HS 6-2, 3-6, 9-7, to make it an all Sunset League finals. Playing brilliant tennis the Anaheim pair proved too tough for the boys from Santa Ana in the championship match and walked off with the CIF doubles championship by scores of 6-3, 7-5.

Most of the credit for completing this fine tournament in one day must go to Mr. Walter Sheek of the Long Beach Recreation Department, who in his capacity as tournament manager kept things moving along, and still permitted all contestants their proper amount of rest between matches. We appreciate the use of the fine battery of courts at the Long Beach City College and are appreciative of the assistance rendered to this tournament by Mr. Sheek.

Entries into the Class A playoffs will be as follows: 2 entries for each of the following leagues-Bay-Pioneer, Sunset, Coast-Moore; and one entry each for the San Gabriel Valley League and Free Lance League. In the Class B and C playoffs each league will be permitted one entry along with one entry from the free lance schools. The balance of the bracket of 8 will be selected from 2nd place teams on the basis of their season record.

There are no rule changes for the 1959 water polo season. The Southern Section has approved the awarding of water polo medals for the 14 boys on the championship and runner-up teams in each division, plus the coach and manager. These awards are to be financed through entry fees assessed the competing teams. The CIF will make an effort to secure four new water polo balls to be used for this tournament, which will be awarded to the winning teams in each playoff division.

SS TRACK AND FIELD MEET HELD AT LONG BEACH PROVES OUTSTANDING

Records continue to fall as the CIF, SS track and field season was brought to a most successful conclusion with the holding of the championship meet on Saturday, May 23, before 6,000 persons at the Veterans Memorial Stadium in Long Beach. Beginning with the preliminary meets held on May 9, and continuing through the championship meet, six new records were established and one was tied, as this year's crop of prep stars battled for top honors.

A great duel had been anticipated in the mile between Dale Story of Orange, who had set a new record of 4:16.9 in the semi-finals, and Jack Hudson of El Cajon who had also broken the old record in the semi-finals by touring the distance by 4:19.9. Although Story won the event in the fine time of 4:17.7, a new record did not materialize as the strong wind proved too great an obstacle for the competitors. The old CIF record of 4:21.2 had been set by Louis Zamperini of Torrance HS way back in 1934, and had withstood the assault of many great high school milers for 25 years until Story's fine performance in the semi-final meet at Bellflower.

The second oldest mark on the books was the 24' 61/2" leap of Steve Turner of Glendale HS in the broad jump back in 1950. This mark was eclipsed by Arnold Tripp of Crawford HS who went 24' 9", almost a foot better than his previous best recorded leap. In the varsity pole vault John Rose of Glendale Hoover wrote his name into the record book with a fine jump of 14' made in the semi-final meet held at Comp-

New Class B standards were set in the high jump when Darryl Nelson of Kearny HS jumped 6' 31/4" and in the 660 yd relay when the fast Muir foursome was clocked in the excellent time of 1:05.8. The Class C boys also got into the record picture when Bill Pace of El Rancho HS put the shot 59' 31/2" in the preliminaries at Riverside, for a new record, and Centennial's speedy relay team tied the old mark of LB Polv 44.2.

Team honors in the varsity division went to LB Poly whose well balanced aggregation scored 24 points to easily out-distance San Bernardino and Crawford who scored 15 and 14 points, respectively. Muir won the Class B title with 18 points, followed by San Diego with 12 and Notre Dame with 10. In the Class C competition it was all Centennial as they racked up 18 points to runner-up Compton's 10.

There were four preliminary meets held on May 9 at San Diego, Redondo, Paramount, and Riverside. The boys who qualified at San Diego and Riverside were entered in the semi-finals at Bellflower, while the qualifiers at Paramount and Redondo earned the right to compete in the other semi-final meet held at Compton HS. From these semi-final meets held on May 16, boys were qualified into the championship meet which was

staged at Long Beach.


