Poly Wins State Title; Rich Joyce Runs 1:48.8

Long Beach Poly won the 1965 State CIF track and field championship last Saturday night at Bakersfield in a meet featured by a national record for Richard Joyce of Sierra and seven first places for representatives of the Southern Section.

Poly scored 16 points to 13 for runners-up Muir of Pasadena and Castlemont of Oakland.

Joyce, who started the season as a quarter-miler, turned into the nation's greatest prep half miler in history when he blazed around the Bakersfield College track in a record 1:48.8. The old mark, 1:50.4, was set last year by Laurence Kelly of Maine East High in Park Ridge, Ill. Joyce's spilts on his record race were 54 and 54.8.

Poly got first place performances from Manuel Murrell in both the long jump (24-93/4) and the 180 lows (18.2); John Hubbell, a junior, put the shot 63-9 for second and Larry Freeman placed fourth in the high jump

for the 16 points.

Harold Busby of Muir ran 9.5 and 21.0 to collect first places in both sprints while the other two firsts came from Paul Wilson (15-61/2) in the pole vault and Randy Julian of Bolsa Grande who ran 47.4 to win the 440.

Leonard Wins Tennis Title In Upset Over Bohrnstedt

Tom Leonard of Arcadia High, blanked 0-6 in the first set, came back to capture the next two sets by scores of 6-4 and 6-4 and win the CIF Individual tennis championship from Ron Bohrnstedt of Redlands in a major upset in the finals Saturday, June 3, at the Riviera Tennis Club.

Leonard's win over Bohrnstedt was his second "spectacular" of the day as he dumped Redlands' Doug Ver-

dieck in the semi-finals.

In the doubles it was an all Santa Monica final with the Vikings' number one team of Mike Talmadege and Tom Moeller knocking off the number two entry of Jerry Shaw and Louis Grobnick. Scores were 6-3, 3-6 and 6-2.

Long Beach Poly Captures CIF, SS, Track Championship

Long Beach Poly sent eight men into the CIF track and field finals at Cerritos College on Friday night, May 28, and when the dust had cleared all eight had scored points and Poly reigned as the new CIF team champion ending a two-year domination of Muir High of Pasadena.

It was Poly's first team title since 1959 when Dee Andrews led the Jackrabbits to the championship and the fifth Southern Section title for Poly since 1913 when the CIF held its first

While Poly got winning efforts from Manuel Murrell (long jump) John Hubbell (shot put) and its 880 relay team, it was the performance of unheralded Carl Trentadue of Westminster than stole the show.

Trentadue ran the mile in the blistering 4:08.5 to establish a new CIF record in the event and smash the previous mark of 4:12.6 set by Tracy Smith of Arcadia in 1963.

Defending champion, Muir, got a double from Harold Busby in the sprints but had to settle for second with 21 points behind Poly's titlewinning 31. Compton was third with

In the class B division, Millikan captured the title with 161/2 points followed closely by Compton with 15, Lakewood 14 and Oxnard 13.

Arcadia Tops Warren, 5-0, To Win CIF Baseball Title In AAA Division

Arcadia High, the bridesmaid in 1964, became the bride in 1965 when the Apaches rode the strong left arm of Bill Seinsoth to the CIF baseball championship with a 5-0 win over Warren High of Downey in the finals played on Friday, June 4 at Blair Field in Long Beach.

Arcadia was runner-up to champion Lynwood in 1964 and Seinsoth was the losing hurler in the title game. But '65 was a totally different story.

Seinsoth scattered three Warren hits while his teammates were rapping Rick Dahlgren, who had not allowed a run in 26 previous play-off innings, for five runs on eight hits.

A two-out, two-run double by Jim Schultz in the first inning got Arcadia off on the right foot. The Apaches scored three in the first and two more in the third then let Seinsoth set the Bears down without a run.

Clarence Schutte—Mr. Santa Barbara of Sports— Plans Retirement After 40 Years In Business By Charles Ireland

Clarence H. Schutte, the "Mr. Santa Barbara of sports" for 40 years, announced that he will retire at the end of the spring term as athletic director and head of the physical education department at Santa Barbara High School.

Schutte came to Santa Barbara in the fall of 1925 after graduating from the University of Minnesota where he gained enduring fame as "the man who stopped Red Grange" in football.

He has headed the athletic department at Santa Barbara High School ever since, and his retirement signals the end of an era.

Schutte actually retired as football coach of the Dons in 1951 after developing many champions and establishing a glorious tradition in football that ranks as an itegral part of the highly-stylized blend of beauty, architecture, climate, culture and sports that is Santa Barbara.

As athletic director, Schutte continued to hand-pick Santa Barbara coaches in all sports, including track and basketball which he coached along with football during his early tenure at SBHS.

As head football coach for 23 years, Schutte compiled a staggering record. His teams won 174 games, lost 49 and tied six.

His squads were in the CIF, SS football play-offs 18 times during those 23 seasons.

It took Schutte four years to build a CIF team, and he missed the play-offs only two other times. The latter seasons were in 1946-47 when he returned from four years of service with the Air Force during World War II during which he rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel.

Oddly, it was in basketball that Schutte coached the Dons to a CIF championship for the first time. That was in 1935, and his Dons repeated as CIF cage champions the next year.

Schutte-coached teams were in the CIF gridiron title game nine times, won the championship three times and lost it on first downs in a tie-score game in 1948.

Currently golf coach as well as athletic director, Schutte's teams won the CIF golf championship two years when his players included Al Geiberger, now one of the nation's best.

Schutte also coached baseball at SBHS for eight years and had Eddie Mathews, the famous Milwaukee Braves slugger, on his CIF title diamond teams on 1949 and 1950.

But it was in football that Schutte scaled the heights.

A crack halfback at the University of Minnesota where he scored the first two touchdowns in the then-new Memroial Stadium, Schutte came directly from the Gopher campus to Santa Barbara and started an empire.

The real glory years were 1937-41 when his gridiron juggernauts won 50 games while losing only four.

Such intoxicating success packed Peabody Stadium year after year. It became fashionable to be seen at Santa Barbara High School games, a custom that has endured with crowds rarely less than 5,000 for regular games and far larger for play-off contests.

Schutte retired from coaching football in 1951 for a second tour of duty with the Air Force. On his return he devoted full time to his duties as athletic director and in the department of physical education.

Asked about his biggest thrill over the years, Schutte laughed and said "Maybe it was beating Santa Maria the first time in football."

That came in the fall of 1928, and it was just about that time that first mention of the nickname "Dons" is found in school records.

Lutheran Wins Second Straight "A" Title, 6-3, Over Needles

Lutheran High won its second straight CIF "A" division baseball championship and its 15th straight game on May 28 when the Lions downed Needles, 6-3, in 105 degree heat in Needles.

Rod Poteete, Lutheran's strongarmed right-hander turned in an outstanding mound performance striking out 16 Needles hitters while allowing just three hits.

Poteete brought his season record to 11 wins against just one loss. His two-year record is 23-1.

After scoring a single run in the first inning, the Lions broke the game open in the third coming up with five like this: Poteete sliced a double to right; Dave Zuber singled over second, Poteete stopping at third; Don Romsa beat out an infield hit and the first run of the inning scored. Ray Kalthoff ripped a double clearing the bases and scored when Pancho Martinez singled. Martinez scored later on an infield error.

Joe Blizzard walked, stole second and scored Needles' first run in the bottom of the third on a single by Ed Lorea. The Mustangs, 15-3 for the season, scored twice more in the fourth on two base hits.

Poteete, despite the intense heat, struck out eight of the last nine hitters he faced.

In addition to two straight "A" division titles Lutheran has won four Olympic League crowns in succession. The Lions have a two year mark of 39-1, a three year record of 59-6 and a four year total of 71-13.

In the championship game Kalthoff, Martinez and Zuber each had two hits. Kalthoff drove in three runs.

Long Beach Wins Team Golf Championship

Long Beach Wilson, the golf scourge of the CIF in the forties and fifties won its first CIF team championship since 1953 on Monday, May 26, when three men shot 75s to pace Coach Skip Rowland's team to the title.

Wilson's team total was 381, eight strokes better than second place Montebello and 13 ahead of third place Millikan. The Team Tournament was played over the par-72 El Dorado Golf Club course in Long Beach with Millikan serving as the host school.

While a morning mist and blustery wind shot scores somewhat higher than usual for this tournament, the 6569 yard layout was much to the liking of Glendora High's Jim Hargis who toured the course in one-over-par 73 to claim medalist honors. Hargis would have had an even par round had he not missed a three footer on the 18th hole.

Rick Ziegler and Mark Meade of Montebello each shot 74s for runnerup honors among the 155 boys competing. Thirty-one high school teams competed in the event.

Wilson's number one man, Fred Good, had his problems and soared to an 80, some seven shots over his average but the other four men more than

made up for Good's round. Bruce Dummitt carded a 76 while the other three members of the team — Jim Singleton, Steve Lockyer and Steve Rhorer—all turned in rounds of 75.

The tournament was managed by Jim Haddy of Millikan and coaches from throughout the Southern Section hailed it as one of the finest ever.

In addition to a devastating attack which produced 13 hits including four doubles and a triple in the big fourth inning, the Eagles were led by pitcher Steve Brett who handcuffed the Saxons on two base hits. Prior to the final Loara had averaged 11 runs per game in the play-offs.

Loara scored the game's first run in the first when Dick Armstrong walk ed, stole second and scored on a single by his brother John. Don Lee's pind single in the last inning was the only other hit allowed by Brett. Incidentally, Brett didn't confine himself to pitching alone. In four trips to the plate he lashed out two singles and a triple.

In advancing to the finals John Stevenson's Eagles knocked off Har High of Newhall in the first round 6-2, blanked Bishop Amat 10-0, and defeated top seeded Antelope Valle 5-2 in the semis. Loara scored a 64 win over San Clemente, 16-0 win over Duarte and an 11-5 battle with Coachella en route to the finels.

Wrestling By-Laws Change

In the May issue of the Monthly Bulletin an item appeared in the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting regarding a change in By-Laws pertaining to wrestling. A line of type was inadvertantly missing from item 6 of the minutes. It should read as follows:

6. CHANGE IN BY-LAWS PERTAINING TO WRESTLING — It was moved, seconded and carried to change the first two sentences in Article XXXX, Section 4 of Wrestling Regulations in the CIF, SS, By-Laws to read as follows:

"A wrestling team will be permitted to schedule and compete in a maximum of 16 matches during the season including dual, triangular, quadrangular and tournaments, but excluding CIF, SS, championship competition. Each triangular and quadrangular meet shall count as two matches and each tournament shall count as two matches."

McHatton Beats Harmon In Sudden Death Play-Off for Individual Golf Title

Greg McHatton, national junior golf champion two seasons ago, fired a one over par 73 at Burmuda Dunes on Tuesday, June 1, to tie the early leader Dick Harmon for first place in the CIF Individual Tournament and then knocked in a crucial 12-footer for his par on the first extra hole to claim the championship.

After McHatton canned his 12-footer, Harmon's 11-footer failed to go and McHatton became the new champion.

McHatton is from La Serna High in Whittier while Harmon attends Palm Springs High.

The Individual Tournament was hosted by Indio High at the world famous Bermuda Dunes Country Club and the 7000 yard course proved an outstanding test for the high school golfers. Of the 97 entrants, 42 were able to shoot 79 or better.

Joe Piedmont, golf coach at Indio High, managed the tournament while members of the women's clubs of Bermuda Dunes, Cochran Ranch and other courses in the desert area served as scorers. Visiting coaches called this event one of the finest individual tournaments in CIF history.

Bob Sader of La Mirada fired nines of 38-36-74 to take the third place trophy while a six-way tie for fourth place forced a sudden death play-off for the fourth and fifth place awards.

Ross Day of Santa Maria, Bill Madsen of Muir, Chuck Nearhoff of La Mirada, Bob Dalton of Riverside, Randy Noble of West Covina and Larry Benson of Long Beach Millikan each had 75s.

On the first extra hole Nearhoff, Benson and Noble carded par fives and the field was cut from six to three.

The second hole at Bermuda is a four par of better than 400 yards and Benson and Nearhoff hit the green while Noble was short with his second. Benson's approach putt rolled three feet past, Noble chipped to within four feet and Nearhoff sank his 10footer for a birdie and fourth place.

Noble holed his putt for a par but Benson's slid off the lip of the cup and he had to settle for a bogie and sixth place. Noble was fifth.

The best nine hole score of the day was turned in by John Hutchins of Corona del Mar who made the turn in two-under-par 34. Hutchins found the going somewhat tougher on the back nine and slipped to a nine over 45 for a 79 total.

Jim Hargis of Glendora who won medal honors in the team tournament had a 76.

Fullerton Wins Third Straight Varsity Swimming Championship

Fullerton High failed to gain a single first place in the 11 events on the varsity swim program but nevertheless the Indians waltzed to their third straight CIF swimming title in the finals held on May 8 at Cerritos College in Norwalk.

Coach Lee Arth's charges picked up five second place finishes, two thirds, a fourth and a fifth in amassing 47½ points to just 25 for runner-up Chadwick and 22 for third place Downey.

Corona del Mar and Newport completed the Orange County sweep of the swimming championships by winning titles in Class B and C respectively.

Eleven CIF records were equalled or bettered in the meet and Ken Ziskin of Burbank worked his way into the national record book with a 1:01.6 clocking in the 100-yard breast-stroke event. The time equals the national mark established by Russ Webb of Fullerton in 1963.

In the preliminary meet Zac Zorn

of Buena Park set a new national interscholastic mark in the 50 yard freestyle when he was timed for the distance in 21.5. The old mark—21.6—was held by Steve Clark of Los Altos High in Northern California, established in 1961.

New CIF records were set in the following events during the championship meet: 100 butterfly—53.6 by Jim Nickoloff of Pasadena; 100 freestyle—47.8 by Morgan Manning of Arcadia; 100 breaststroke—Ziskin's 1:01.6; and 200 free relay—1:29.9 by Downey High.

Corona del Mar captured both relay events in record time in the B division —1:44.4 in the medley and 1:32.6 in the freestyle—but three first place finishes by Fullerton individuals nearly turned the tide. Spike Burnett won the 100 backstroke, Danny Stunkard the 100 breaststroke and the 100 individual medley to lead Fullerton's charge to second place. Corona del Mar total 54½ to 48 for Fullerton.

In the Cee division Newport Harbor won both relay events to score 28 of its 29 points. Lasuen totaled 22 and Palos Verdes 19½ in the C division.
