## CENTENNIAL WINS SOUTHERN SECTION, STATE TITLES

### Centennial Sets Two Relay Records In 50th State Meet



**EDESEL GARRISON**

... Paces Apache Victories

Coming off a decisive CIF, SS, team championship, coach Bill Gill's Centennial Apaches trekked to Edwards Stadium at the University of California at Berkeley and walked off with the team title, parlaying two new CIF relay records and the fastest two-turn 440 ever run in California to the throne.

Centennial's spearhead was lanky Edesel Garrison, who won the 440 in convincing fashion, clicking off a 46.7, which equalled the existing State Meet record set in 1956 by Jerry White of Cocoran, but which will go into the books as the fastest two-turn quarter ever run. White's record was set over a one-turn course.

Garrison came back to rip off a 46.6 relay leg for the Apaches as Gill's charges went on to victory in the mile relay in 3:14.3, establishing a new State record, a new Edwards Stadium record and recording the fastest time run in 1968 by a prep squad.

In all, three State Meet records were broken and one tied, six Edwards Stadium prep marks fell, and one listed national interscholastic record was bet-

### San Marino Defends Team Tennis Crown

San Marino, displaying outstanding balance, rolled through its matches with Hemet, 23-5, to successfully defend the CIF, SS, Small Schools Team Tennis Championship it has won six times in the last seven years.

The Titans rolled through their matches enroute to the championship, allowing only 12¼ points to be scored against them in four matches.

Hemet, in gaining the finals, topped Bishop Montgomery, Palm Springs and Claremont, allowing only 14 points prior to the final match.

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tered although a pending mark was not reached.

Compton's fantastic junior high jumper, Reynaldo Brown, successfully defended his 1967 State title in an exciting head-to-head duel with another junior standout, Otis Hailey of Wasco. While Hailey has a pending mark of 7-1¼, it was Brown who had the crowd on its feet with a winning leap of 7-0, which established new CIF and Edwards Stadium marks and bettered the listed national standard.

But Centennial wasn't to be outdone, as the Apaches started the ball rolling with new CIF and Edwards prep records in the 440 relay in the event's inaugural year in the State Meet. Then Garrison and Co. continued their onslaught on the record books, winding up with 26 points to outdistance second-place Compton, which wound up with 13½.

Junior-class standouts were in abundance at the meet as Brown, Steve Smith of South Torrance, George Alfaro of Pittsburgh, Ruben Chappins of Excelsior and Huelon Hewitt of Merced will all be back to defend their titles next year.

### Garrison Paces Apaches To Second Straight SS Track Championship

Centennial's Apaches, paced by strong-running Edesel Garrison, captured their second consecutive CIF, SS, track championship in convincing fashion before a capacity crowd at Cerritos College.

Garrison, who garnered two gold medals and anchored a record-setting relay team, sparked coach Bill Gill's charges to a 10-point victory over cross-town rival Compton.

Seven meet records were broken and another tied in varsity, Bee and Cee competition. Lakewood walked off with the Bee team title while Eisenhower claimed the Cee crown.

Garrison turned in his double in the 100-yard-dash (9.7) and the 440-yard-dash (47.5), and also anchored the record-setting Apache mile relay team which won in 3:16.6, well under its 3:18.2 semi-final clocking which had stood as the record in the first-year event.

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### Savanna Tops L.B. Poly, 5-1, for 1968 CIF, SS, "AAA" Baseball Crown

Behind the standout pitching performance of junior ace Andy Bielanski, Savanna High of Anaheim dumped Long Beach Poly, 5-1, before a standing-room-only crowd at Cerritos College to garner the 1968 CIF, SS, "AAA" division baseball title.

Coach Jim Reach's Rebels were in command of the game from the outset as the Freeway League titlists tallied two runs in the top of the first frame and were never headed.

Bielanski, who went all the way enroute to his 14th victory in 15 starts, allowed only three hits and one unearned run in the championship match.

Shortstop Bob Canary got things going for the titlists in the first frame when he smacked a bases-loaded single which, coupled with a Poly error, produced a pair of runs, enough for a victory.

Bishop Amat's Lancers, behind the four-hit pitching of Frank O'Conner, topped Royal Oak, 3-2, at Mt. San Antonio College to annex the 1968 CIF, SS, "AA" division baseball title.

O'Conner and his Royal Oak counterpart, Gordon Blackard, staged a pitching duel which saw only seven hits recorded with all the scoring occurring in the second frame.

The Lancers tallied all three markers in the top of the second on various Royal Oak miscues. None of the Lancer runs was earned.

Battling back, the Romans managed to score twice in the home half of the second, but couldn't push across the all-important tally.

Blackard, in a losing cause, allowed only three hits, all singles, and retired the last 11 batters he faced.

O'Conner, meanwhile, gave up four singles and fanned seven enroute to his 10th victory in 11 starts.

## MINUTES OF CIF, SOUTHERN SECTION, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING—JUNE 17, 1968

The final meeting of the CIF, Southern Section, Executive Committee for the 1967-68 school year was called to order by Chairman Steve Miletich at 9 a.m. on Sunday, June 16, 1968, at Palm Springs.

The following members were in attendance: Chairman Miletich, vice principal, Beverly Hills HS; Richard H. Spaulding, principal, Buena Park HS; Claud Hardesty, principal, Santa Barbara HS; Robert D. Ashton, assistant superintendent, Norwalk-La Mirada USD; Keith J. Lee, principal, Yucca Valley HS; Keith Gunn, principal, Victor Valley HS; Clair Franklin, principal, Trona HS; Alex Alexander, principal, Indio HS; James Faul, principal, Workman HS; Rev. Thomas Kiefer, principal, Bishop Amat HS; Lou Joseph, principal, Desert HS; Rev. John J. Reilly, principal, Mater Dei HS, and Commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans.

1. APPROVE MINUTES—It was moved, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting of May 3, 1968, as published in the May, 1968, Monthly Bulletin.

2. APPLICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP—It was moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Pine Junior High School of Anaheim be admitted to associate membership in the CIF, Southern Section, effective September, 1968.

3. FOOTBALL CARNIVAL—Because of the unavailability of a suitable stadium in San Luis County, the member schools of the San Luis Athletic League have been granted permission to begin official football practice on Monday, September 2, 1968, in order to enable them to complete the required number of days of practice prior to the holding of their League Football Carnival on Friday, September 13, 1968.

### 4. ELIGIBILITY CASES—

A. It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the residence rule to permit Gary Butler to be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at Cathedral High School, effective September, 1968.

B. It was moved, seconded and carried to deny the request of South High School of Torrance to waive our 19-year-old rule in order to permit Fausto Silva to have an additional year of eligibility for athletics at South High School.

C. It was moved, seconded and carried to waive the previous semester rule in order to permit Peter van Ribbinik to be eligible for athletics as of September 1, 1968, at Camarillo High School.

5. COMMISSIONER TO ATTEND MEETINGS—It was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the Commissioner to attend the following meetings, with expenses paid, as the representative of the CIF, Southern Section: Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo) Workshop in August, 1968; National Federation Football Rules Meeting in Chicago in January, 1969; and National Federation Convention in Wisconsin in June, 1969.

6. BLUE BOOK EXAMINATION—The Commissioner reported that work had been started on the preparation of an objective examination, covering CIF, Southern Section, eligibility rules and sports regulations.

The committee discussed this project and it was unanimously agreed that such an examination would greatly assist in acquainting coaches and administrative personnel with CIF, Southern Section, rules governing our interscholastic athletic program. Chairman Miletich then appointed Jim Faul, Art Hobson, Dick Spaulding and Rev. Kiefer as a committee to assist the Commissioner in preparing the final draft of the examination.

When the exam is completed, 20 copies along with the answer sheets will be mailed to the principal of each member school. It is hoped that this examination will be given either on the league or individual school level to all coaches and administrators associated with the conduct of our interscholastic athletic program.

7. WRESTLING WEIGH-IN RULE—Because of a serious problem that developed last winter, the Coast League formally requested approval from the Executive Committee to experiment with the weigh-in procedures affecting Coast League wrestling matches during the 1969 season.

Being concerned with some of the practices which go hand in hand with wrestling and the problem of "making weight," the Coast League would like to conduct weigh-ins during the last period of school (and before 4 o'clock) on the day prior to the match.

After a discussion of the request, it was moved, seconded and carried to grant permission to the Coast League to follow the above plan concerning the weigh-in of wrestlers during the 1969 season. This would apply only to league matches involving Coast League schools. In dual matches with schools not members of the Coast League and in tournaments, all Coast League schools will follow Blue Book rules. At the conclusion of the 1969 wrestling season, the Coast League will be expected to advise the Executive Com-

mittee concerning the merit of this experiment.

8. BLACK-FOXES INACTIVATED—After enjoying membership in the CIF, Southern Section, for nearly 40 years, Black-Foxe School for Boys finds it necessary to drop their membership, as the school will be officially closing with the competition of the current school year.

The closing of Black-Foxe will, of course, require their freshmen, sophomores and juniors to transfer to other schools for the purpose of continuing their education. In line with past policy, it was moved, seconded and carried to grant immediate athletic eligibility to all Black-Foxe transfers at the public school in the attendance area in which their parents reside or in any private school in the CIF, Southern Section.

9. SAN JACINTO HS CASE—During the 1968 "A" CIF baseball play-offs, it was necessary to disqualify the San Jacinto HS baseball team because some of the members of their team illegally held batting practice prior to a scheduled contest with Calipatria HS. Calipatria registered an official protest prior to the game, and after San Jacinto had won the game, the protest was upheld and Calipatria replaced San Jacinto in the play-offs.

As a result of this incident, a letter was received from Doug Brown, principal of San Jacinto HS, requesting the Executive Committee to revoke the rule prohibiting batting practice prior to a play-off contest and further asking that his letter be published in the Monthly Bulletin.

After the letter had been read, a thorough discussion of the situation ensued, and the members of the Executive Committee were in unanimous agreement that the rule served a good purpose and should not be changed. They were concerned that the illegal batting practice took place without the supervision of a coach. They were further concerned that the boys on the San Jacinto team had not been properly instructed in all of the rules governing team participation in the CIF baseball play-offs.

The committee then directed the Commissioner to send a letter to the Calipatria baseball coach, commending him on his action in calling to the CIF's attention a violation of a CIF rule by members of the San Jacinto team. It is the responsibility of all coaches to know and understand CIF rules. In addition, it is also the responsibility of all coaches and administrators who follow the rules to report any violations of such rules to the pro-

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per authority.

This has been the fourth time in the last five years that baseball teams have been removed from the play-offs because of a violation of a play-off regulation. It would appear that coaches are not assuming the responsibility of knowing and informing their students of CIF sports regulations.

**10. ELIGIBILITY INTERPRETATION**—Effective September, 1968, a graduate of the ninth grade of a junior high school which conducts an interscholastic athletic program will be eligible only in the public senior high school in the attendance area in which his parents reside. If such a graduate enrolls in the tenth grade of a private school or in another public high school other than the one in whose district the boy resides, he shall be ineligible for interscholastic athletics for a period of one year.

After discussing this new regulation, the committee ruled that a boy who transfers from a junior high school to a private school may secure permission to participate in other than Varsity competition at the new school. The principal of the private school would send a copy of Form 99 to the principal of the junior high school from which the boy graduated, requesting a waiver of the rule in order to permit the boy to participate in JV or Class B, C or D competition during the year. It would be expected that such permission would be granted if there was no evidence that the boy had been recruited by the private school.

**11. CIF CHAMPIONSHIP AWARDS**—The question as to the quantity and quality of CIF championship awards was discussed by the committee. Samples of present awards given to individuals and teams winning CIF championships were shown to the committee.

Some criticism had been directed to the CIF because in some cases the awards had been considered inferior to those given in certain invitational tournaments and meets during the year. After reviewing the situation, the committee generally agreed that the awards presently given were satisfactory. It was felt, however, that a boy who wins a CIF championship or is a member of a team winning a CIF championship should also receive some sort of plaque which would have a lasting value and could be properly displayed by the boy for many years after he completed high school. The Commissioner was directed to investigate this matter and report back at the fall meeting of the Executive Committee.

**12. UNDUE INFLUENCE RULE**—At the present time, Article XVII of the Blue Book covers our undue influence or recruiting rule and has a note explaining this particular rule.

In line with recent problems involving alleged recruiting, it was felt that this note should be rewritten to better cover the situation. After a thorough discussion of the situation, it was moved, seconded and carried to amend Article XVII to provide that the note would read as follows:

"NOTE—This rule is interpreted to mean that no representative (official or unofficial) of a member school shall exert undue influence. Contacts with prospective athletes made by a member school's booster, quarterback club or any friend of the school would be in violation. Undue influence in "securing" is considered as any influence beyond reasonable normal courtesy and hospitality extended to any prospective student. Undue influence in "retaining" is considered as any influence beyond reasonable normal consideration for the welfare of any member of the student body.

"Undue influence would also include phone calls, correspondence, or personal contact initiated by any school representative."

**13. COUNCIL MEETINGS**—The following dates and sites were established for meetings of the CIF, SS, Council for the 1968-69 school year:

The fall meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, September 28, at Bishop Amat HS.

The winter meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, January 25, 1969, at Gahr HS.

The spring Council meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 3, 1969, at Fountain Valley HS.

**14. FALL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING**—In order to speedily handle eligibility cases arising with the opening of the 1968-69 school year, it was decided to hold an Executive Committee meeting on Saturday, September 21, in the Newport area. The Commissioner was directed to contact the local high school in an effort to secure a suitable meeting place.

**15. FINANCIAL REPORT**—Treasurer Lee informed the committee that although the fiscal year would not close until June 30, he was presenting a financial report showing estimated income and expenditures of the CIF, SS, for the 1967-68 school year, as compared with the budget for the same period.

The report indicated that revenues were greater than anticipated, and with expenses pretty much in line with the budget, it appeared that we would show a net gain of approximately \$19,000.

The treasurer then presented a proposed budget for the 1968-69 fiscal year. After discussing each item in detail and making certain minor changes, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve the financial report and adopt the revised budget for the 1968-69 fiscal year.

Upon completion of the report by our auditor, the Commissioner will prepare copies of the financial report and budget for distribution to all principals.

**16. RESERVE FUND**—For some time there has been a question as to the amount of cash reserves that should be maintained by the CIF, Southern Section. A recent survey conducted by the Colorado High School Activities Association revealed that the great majority of state associations maintain a reserve equal to one year's operating budget.

This matter was thoroughly discussed by the committee, and it was felt that an adequate reserve should be maintained so that the CIF operation would not be disrupted for at least one year in case an emergency prohibited play-off activities.

It was then moved, seconded and carried that it be recommended to the Council that the Southern Section maintain a cash reserve equal to 75% of its annual operating budget.

**17. STATE REPRESENTATIVES**—At the present time, Article VI of our Constitution provides that two representatives to the State Council shall be elected each year to serve for a term of two years. They shall be eligible for re-election for two additional terms.

Mr. Gunn brought to the attention of the committee the fact that the limited term of office for Southern Section representatives to the State Federated Council made it difficult for our men to become acquainted and gain experience in State athletic matters. This weakened the position of the Southern Section representatives, and he suggested that we consider electing men for a four-year term, with the right of re-election for one additional term.

This matter was discussed, and it was the unanimous feeling of the committee that a change should be made to eliminate the necessity of electing two State representatives each year for a two-year term. It was then moved, seconded and carried to recommend to the Council that Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 1. One representative to the State Council shall be elected each year at the regular meeting in May to serve for a term of four years. A representative

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one additional term. A representative must be a school administrator."

**18. CIF, SS, HI-LITE FILM**—The possibility of developing a sound film, showing the activities of the CIF, Southern Section, was discussed. It was the feeling of the group that such a film, showing hi-lites from the various championship contests and other Southern Section activities, would be a worthwhile investment. It could be shown at service clubs, booster clubs, student assemblies and at other interested organizations where it could pictorially show the CIF interscholastic athletic program.

The Commissioner was directed to contact the photographer now employed to record CIF championship events on film for the purpose of determining the cost of such a project. He is to make a preliminary report on the matter to the Executive Committee at its September meeting.

**19. TERMS EXPIRE**—With the conclusion of this meeting, The Executive Committee terms of Robert Ashton and Clair Franklin expire. On behalf of the CIF, SS, Chairman Miletich commended each man for his many contributions to the organization over the years. These men have both contributed in many ways to the development of our fine interscholastic athletic program, and they will be sorely missed. The Chairman also welcomed Lou Joseph, principal of Desert High School, and Rev. John J. Reilly, principal of Mater Dei High School to the committee.

**20. ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN**—It was moved, seconded and carried to cast a unanimous ballot for the re-election of Steve Miletich as Chairman of the CIF, SS, Executive Committee for the 1968-69 school year.

There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting was adjourned at 1:50 p.m.

## San Clemente Golfer Scott Pomeroy Survives Play-Off for Crown
