LANCERS RALLY IN LATE INNINGS TO WIN 5-4

Lakewood High, scoring three unearned runs in the sixth inning, posted a 4 victory over Ventura High School to win the CIF "AAAA" baseball championship June 1 at Anaheim Stadium before a crowd of 4,520.

The lancer victory keeps the 4-A championship in the Moore League after Long Beach Millikan annexed the crown in 1969. It also marks the second CIF title for coach John Herbold of Lakewood, as Long Beach Poly won the coveted title in 1963 when he was the head mentor.

Trailing 3-0 in the fifth, Lakewood scored a run on two successive errors, a balk, and a ground-out. A single, walk and error loaded the bases for the Lancers in the sixth. Craig Cleveland flied to center but the throw to home was wild and a second run scored.

Shortstop Jerry Pitts then sliced a wrong field single to right to drive in the tying and go ahead runs. Then some strong base running in the seventh scored the decisive run, as Ron Marquez reached first on a fielder's choice, stole second, took third on a passed ball and scored on the front half of a double steal.

Ventura built a 3-0 lead on a run producing double by Al Rodriquez in the second, and a towering 375 foot two run home run by Duane Roberts in the third that landed some 10 rows deep in the left field stand.

Lakewood's Tom Lederer, who relieved starting pitcher Russ McQueen in the fourth, was credited with the win and pitched a fine game in relief. In the last of the seventh, Ventura had the bases loaded with one out. Lederer induced Roberts to fly to deep right field to get home the Cougars fourth run, then proceeded to pick Steve Carroll off second base to end the game.

Lakewood ended the season with a 22-2-1 record, while Ventura's season record was 20-6.

SANTA ANA CAPTURES CIF, SS, TRACK TITLE

Santa Ana Saints, coached by Earl Longman, swept to the CIF, SS, team track title May 28th at Cerritos College, before 11,101 spectators. This was the first time an Orange County school has captured the coveted varsity trophy since 1954 and it was Santa Ana who pulled off that trick.

The Saints were led by their sprint star Jackie White, who captured the 220 in 21.7 and was second in the 100 to junior Alan Carter of Bonita in 9.7. A first in the 440 relay and a second by Jim Davis in the low hurdles contributed to the 24 points (Continued on page 9)

Before an overflow crowd at Ventura College, St. Bonaventure copped the CIF, SS, AA Championship 3-0 over Bloomington High. All the St. Bonaventure runs were unearned as both pitchers threw exceedingly well. Bloomington's Dave Love struck out 8 and allowed only 3 hits, while Bonny's Stone whiffed 10 and allowed four hits.

St. Bonaventure scored in the fourth when Ron Romo singled, advanced to 2nd on a fielder's choice and scored on a bouncer to shortstop Sandy Fernandez who tossed it wild past first allowing the runner to score. In the sixth with two out, Vince O'Neil reached first on a miscue by 3rd baseman Jim Scott and then Stone and Stephenson followed with doubles scoring O'Neil and Stone for the final scores of the game.

Bloomington coached by Don Lee ended with a 19-6 season record. Wilber Little coached the champion Seraphs, winners of the Tri-Valley league.

Lompoc defeats El Segundo for AAA Baseball title

Lompoc High, beaten in its opening game of the season, completed a "perfect" year at Anaheim Stadium on June 1 by defeating El Segundo, 8-5, to win the CIF, SS, AAA baseball championship, in the first half of the play-off double bill. A crowd of 4,520 witnessed the play-off games.

Lompoc, twice taking advantage of a drawn-in El Segundo infield, scored three runs in both the second and third innings and then received an over powering relief performance from Roy Thomas to claim its 26th straight victory.

Thomas, a 6-5, junior right-hander, took over in the fifth inning after El Segundo had rallied for four runs to cut the Lompoc lead to 7-5. He retired the side on a groundout and pitched hitless ball the rest of the way, striking out four. Junior left-hander, Ted Torres of the Braves, was credited with his 11th victory of the season. This was the first CIF baseball Championship win for Coach Dan Bodary and Lompoc High School.

Edwards came to bat in the 11th inning and singled in the winning run to give Elsinore the championship in a thrilling climax to the Single A championships.

Coach Bob Cooper's tigers pounded out 18 hits throughout the contest, but pitcher McElroy of St. Genevieve tightened up to limit Elsinore in the run-producing column and almost was a winner until Edwards' home run blow.

An example of this was included in the March, 1970 issue of the Scholastic Coach. We are reprinting the following editorial with the magazine's permission. The item which as the magazine's editor commented, has been done so beautifully, written by Bill Hewgley, basketball player from South Pittsburgh High School, Tennessee, 1969. Who could deny that interscholastic athletics have almost unlimited possibilities for educating boys after sharing Bill Hewgley's thoughts?)

Another season is over, finished, a season which will be preserved only in the record books . . . and in the memories of a great bunch of fellows. Why would anyone remember such a hard grind and the physical punishment? . . . running the mountain course until your lungs felt like bags of fire, the feel of sweat oozing from every pore and leaving a burning sensation in your eyes, the taste of blood from a nose or lip, getting your fingers jammed or ankle sprained . . . the agony of apewalks, oblique drills, sprints, and calisthenics, the throbbing lumps from elbows and fists a hundred different practice drills designed to draw upon your innermost reserve of strength and force you to decide whether or not you really love the game . . . the cloud of dejection and self crucifixion when you are jerked from the game, chewed out, and told to sit on the far end of the bench for failing to follow instructions.

The meet was hosted by Riverside Poly High School. Athletic Director George Wrentmore and Golf Coach Glen McGowan were meet directors of this outstanding event.

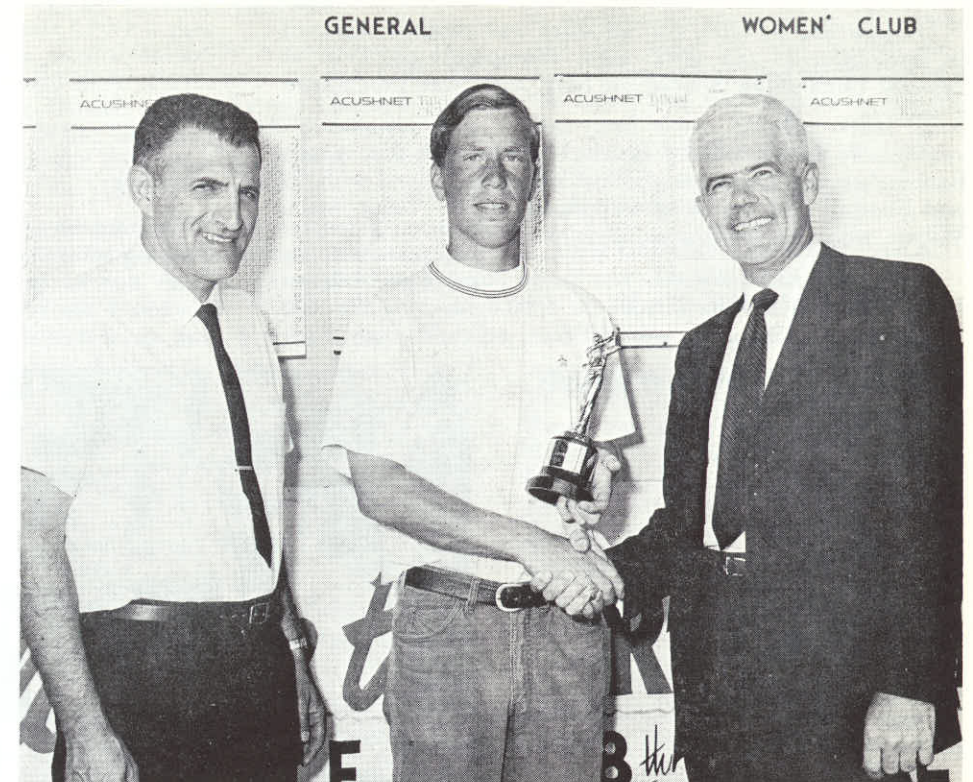

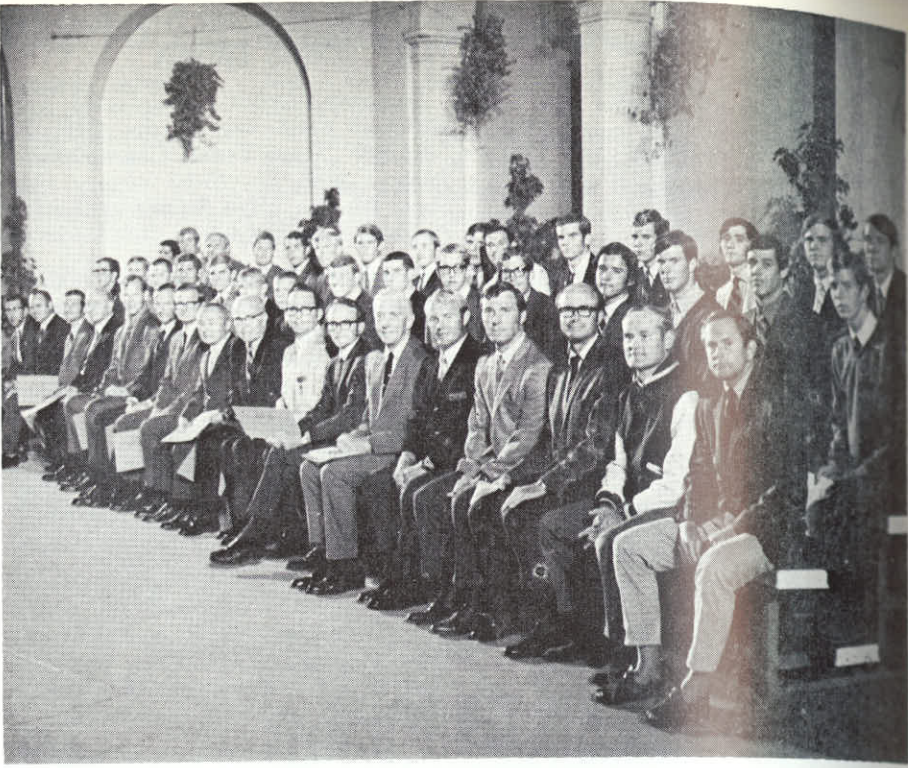

SOLID COLOR FOR BASKETBALL SHIRT

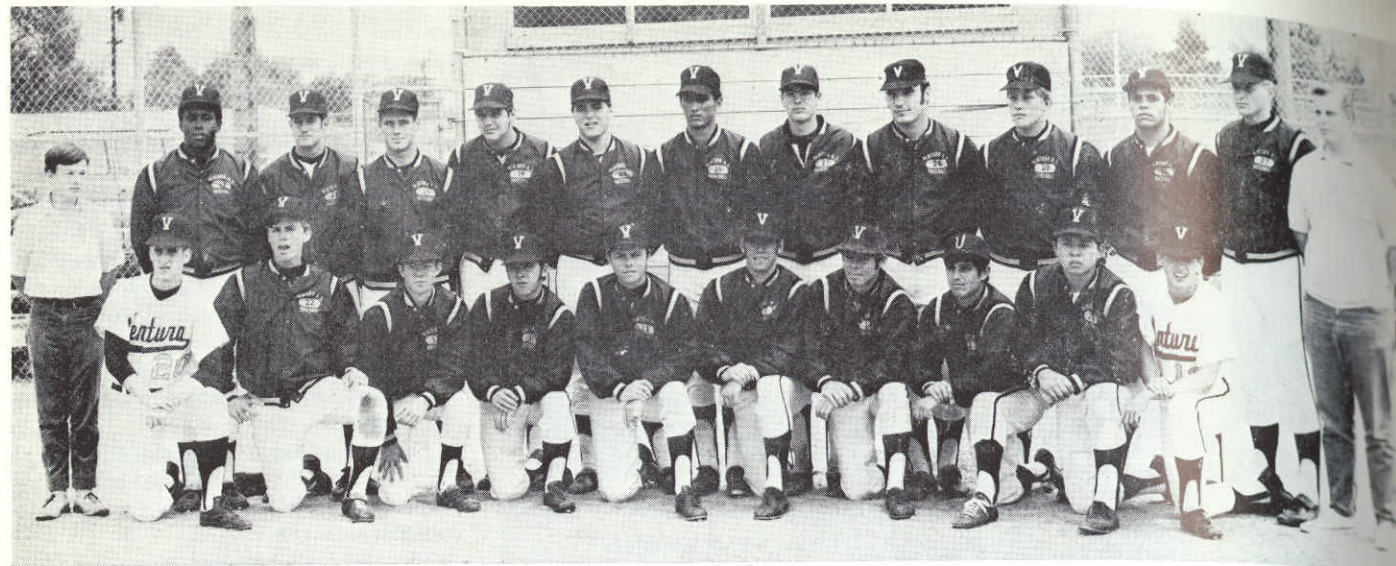
It won't go into effect until the 1973-74 season but now is a good time to keep in mind an upcoming new basketball rule!

"Beginning with the 1973-74 season, shirts shall be the same solid color front and back. A side seam insert or a side seam trim of any color and not to exceed 4" in width, and piping not to exceed 1/4" around the neck and the arm opening will be permissible."

The provision will be included in the National Alliance BASKETBALL RULES publication beginning with the 1970-71 season.

It is important for schools to know this regulation now inasmuch as it affects the purchasing of uniforms.

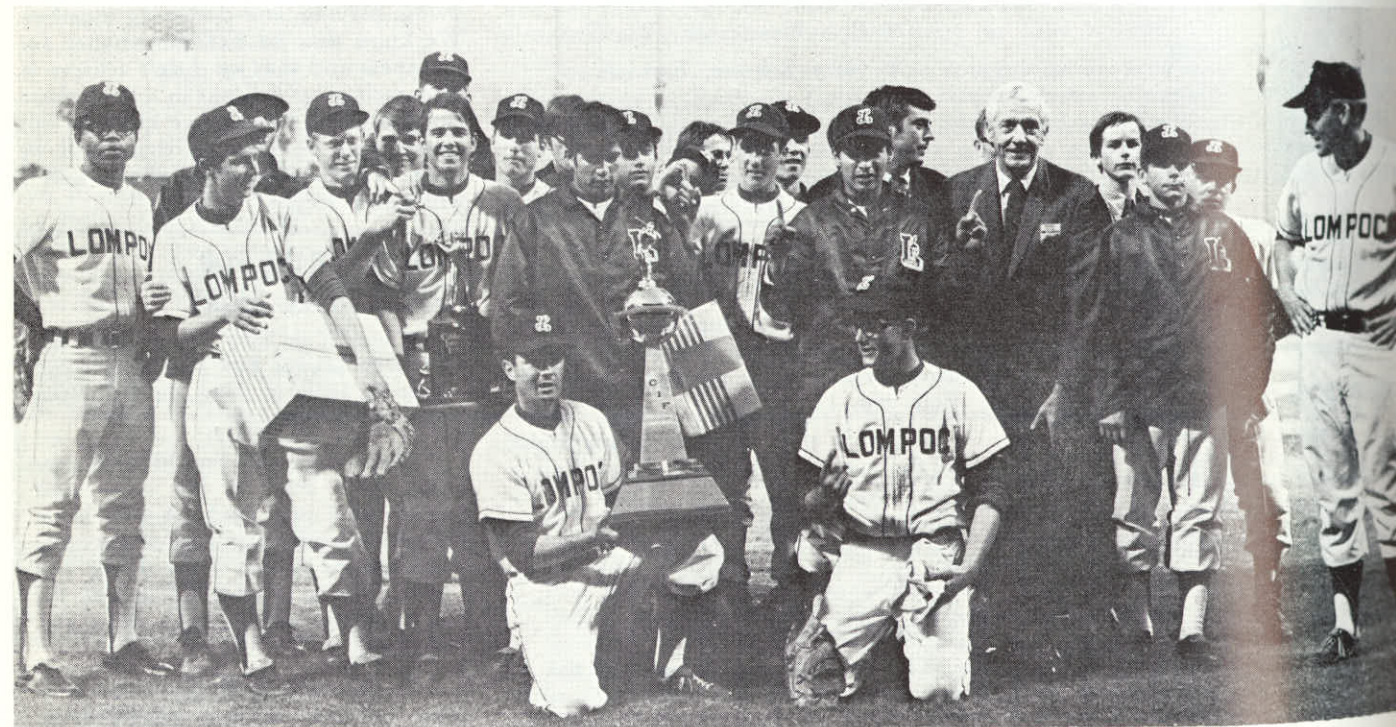

VALUE OF OFFICIALS' RATING CARDS

We sometimes hear the complaint from coaches, "The official rating cards do not receive any attention from the CIF office". This is far from true, as every card returned is read by Darold Roundy, the assignment secretary. If negative remarks are made concerning an official, officials and coaches are contacted to see what the problem was and if interpretation of the rules are being carried out correctly. During the school year 1969-70, Mr. Roundy initiated a pilot rating system of officials. The purpose of the new system is to have additional criteria to more accurately evaluate the officials. This was done in football, basketball and baseball.

All rating cards were tabulated for each official as to preferreds, satisfactory, or unsatisfactory ratings. Any rating cards not returned were scored as satisfactory. The total number of games worked was listed for each official. Then a point value was given to each preferred (5), satisfactory (3), and unsatisfactory (1), so that each official had a total number of points. This score was divided by the number of games worked to give the official an average score.

We realize that the score of any one individual is not of value, but it is of value when compared to the "mean" of the association and to others who have worked approximately the same number of games.

A rating is only as valid as the person doing the rating. Therefore, we would hope that the coaches would take more time and do a good objective job of rating their officials and return all rating cards promptly.
