

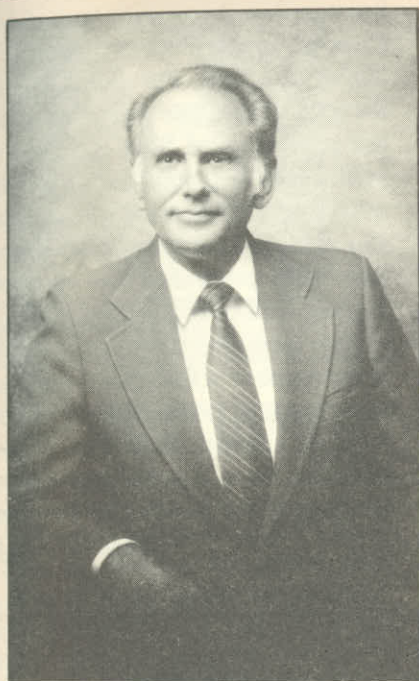

STAN THOMAS APPOINTED SIXTH CIF-SS COMMISSIONER OF ATHLETES

Stan Thomas, Administrator of Commerce and Technology for the Tustin Unified School District, has been named the new CIF Southern Section Commissioner of Athletics, it was announced by Moe Chavez, President of the CIF-SS Executive Committee.

Thomas, 54, replaces Ray Plutko, who will move on to assume the commissionership of the Colorado High School Association in July. Thomas becomes the sixth commissioner in the history of the 73-year old organization, following Seth Van Patten (1913-1951), William W. Russell (1951-1954), J. Kenneth Fagans (1954-1975), Thomas E. Byrnes (1975-1980) and Plutko (1980-1986).

Since joining the administrative staff at the Tustin Unified School District in 1984, Thomas has overseen the instruction for grades K-12, as well as the district's programs in applied arts, athletics, computer literacy, the coastline regional occupation program, driver education, foreign language and physical education. He has also been the district liaison with the local business community, as well as developing the Partnership in Education Program.

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MINUTES OF THE CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING May 8, 1986

The May meeting of the CIF Southern Section Council was called to order by President Moe Chavez at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 8, 1986 at the Ramada Inn in Norwalk. All leagues were present with the exceptions of the Camino Real, Prep, Sunrise, Sunshine and Victory Leagues.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF Southern Section Council meeting of March 20, 1986 as mailed to the Council.

2. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: Mr. Moe Chavez extended his appreciation to the Council for its efforts during his term of office as CIF Southern Section President. In addition, President Chavez commended the CIF Southern Section office staff and Executive Committee member Cynthia Grennan for the successful Superintendents and Board Members Symposium.

3. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE: Commissioner Ray Plutko provided an update on the Hall of Fame Awards; the addition to the CIF Southern Section Offices in Cerritos, with the ground breaking set for June 1; and the Team Academic Competition Awards to be held at Anaheim Stadium in late May. In addition, Commissioner Plutko reported that during 1985-86, the greatest gain in the area of students transferring under the provisions of Rule 214 was from public school to public school, with all other areas remaining status quo. It was also noted that the total number of 214 forms processed was up approximately 200 over the past year.

This past year there was a decrease in the number of forfeitures and a great improvement in the number of soccer incident reports. However, it should be noted there is some concern in the increase in the number of ejections of

MEET THE NEW EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERS

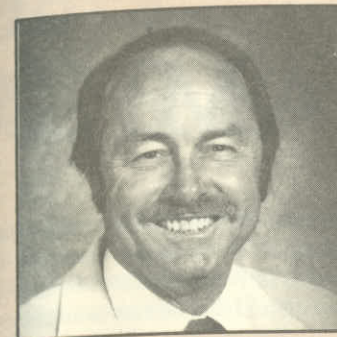
We are pleased to introduce the two educators who are the new additions to the roster of the CIF-SS Executive Committee.

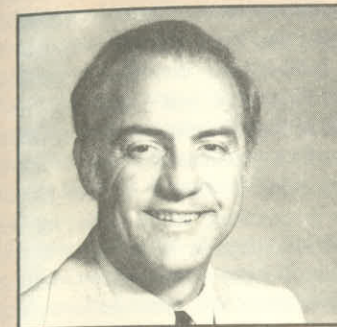

SIX NAMES ADDED TO CIF-SS HALL OF FAME RECOGNITION AWARD LIST

The California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section has added six names to its list of inductees for the Hall of Fame recognition Award, it was announced by Commissioner Ray Plutko. The class of 1986 will have their names added to the perpetual plaque displayed at the CIF-SS Office, along with the 20 inductees who have been honored since the program was initiated in 1984.

The 1986 CIF-SS Hall of Fame inductees include: Howard Frost, Bishop Union High School's leading supporter as a journalist, historian and sportscaster; Richard "Dick" Olmstead, a highly-respected member of the Channel Coast Officials Association for over 37 years; the late Walter Opp, Muir High School's legendary track and field coach of 34 years; Harry "Cap" Sheue, the man who instituted interscholastic athletics at Huntington Beach High School; Walter Stewart, Harvard High School's highly successful swimming and water polo coach; and Tex Wallis, La Habra High School's outstanding basketball coach of 26 years.

"The CIF Southern Section is privileged to honor the people who have contributed to the strength of the organization for so many years," noted Com-

missioner of Athletics, Ray Plutko. "And this year's inductees are truly representative of that group. Their achievements and dedication have helped the CIF Southern Section to grow and prosper."

The awards will be presented to each of the new inductees at meritorious ceremonies in their local areas.

The CIF-SS initiated the Hall of Fame Recognition Award in 1984 to

**HOWARD
FROST**



Long known in the Eastern Sierra as the most knowledgeable and faithful supporter of Bishop Union High School, Howard Frost has devoted over 40 years to the benefit of Bronco athletes, coaches and members of the Bishop community as a sportswriter, radio-broadcaster and sports historian.

Frost, who moved to Bishop with his family as a high-school-aged youngster in 1939, had a deep seeded love affair with athletics, which he developed into somewhat of a secondary career. He recently retired from a long and successful career as the Bishop Postmaster.

He spent thousands of hours on the field and at courtside, watching and recording the triumphs and disappointments of local athletes and stayed with it long enough to see three generations compete for the Broncos. For over 20 years, he acted as Master of Ceremonies for Bishop High School athletic awards banquets as well.

He was occasionally able to convert his love for athletics into a paycheck, covering local sports for the newspaper and radio station. But paycheck or not, Frost was a fixture at Bronco home and road games alike. Many times, the games would be well over 200 miles away, but Frost would be there, to cover the event in some form for those who couldn't make the journey.

He began writing sports for the Inyo Register in 1946 and was first heard over the airways on radio station KIBS in 1954.

His fondest memories of Bishop sporting events include the Broncos' last-second football victory over undefeated Trona for the 1957 Desert-Inyo League title and eventual CIF-SS Small Schools championship, the Broncos' drive to the 1963 1A basketball semifinals and Bishop's 1969 CIF-SS 1A Division baseball championship.

Frost's own stepson, Butch Cross, was the school's first-ever 1,000-yard rusher as well

as being named the 1A Baseball Player of the Year following the 1969 championship season.

Bishop High Director of Athletics pointed out, "Howard Frost has been a tremendous part of our athletic program. He was always there to help out and has been the guy to turn to for records and information of any type concerning Bishop athletics."

**RICHARD
OLMSTEAD**



A longtime friend of Southern California high school athletics, Dick Olmstead has exemplified the highest standards of sportsmanship, ethical conduct and professionalism as a CIF-SS sports official.

A resident of Carpinteria, he has been a dedicated member of the Channel Coast Officials Association for over 37 years as a football and basketball official. Over the years, his demonstrated ability netted him several CIF-SS playoff assignments, including four appearances in the Los Angeles Coliseum for major division football championships. In 1979, he was appointed referee for the CIF-SS Northwestern Conference title game.

For the past seven years, Olmstead has been the instructional chairman for the Channel Coast Association, developing classroom curriculum and training techniques for experienced and newcoming officials alike. He has been a member of the instructional staff for the past 16 years and is a past president of the Channel Coast Association as well.

Olmstead has also officiated at the Carpinteria Russell Cup track meet for 30 years, and in 1983, was named the Honorary Meet Director. He has also donated his time as referee for the Santa Barbara County All-Star football game and worked the state junior college basketball finals.

Olmstead has also served his community

as a Scoutmaster for Troops 50 and 51 of the Boy Scouts of America and has been honored as an Honorary Life Member of the PTA. Additionally, he has been named an honorary life member of the Tri-County Blood Bank for his numerous blood donations, is an active member in the Carpinteria Lions Club and has been honored with the "Key Man Award" for community service by Pacific Telephone and Telegraph.

Born in Kalamazoo, Michigan, Olmstead was a 1940 graduate of Detroit's Northern High School. Although he had planned a career in coaching while attending Wayne State University, he soon found himself in the South Pacific with a Navy Construction Battalion when the United States entered World War II. Upon his return from overseas, Olmstead settled in Carpinteria, where he became an assistant to Carpinteria High Head Football Coach Frank Fielding. In 1945 the team completed an undefeated season.

**WALTER
OPP**



Perhaps the most successful track and field coach in CIF-SS history, the late Walter Opp will long be remembered for his ability to bring out the best in the hundreds of young athletes he coached at John Muir High School in Pasadena.

Over the length of his legendary 34-year career, Opp directed the Mustangs to 20 Pacific and Foothill League titles, ten CIF-SS crowns and two state championships. His teams finished runner-up in the CIF-SS team championships five times and on five other occasions were runner-up in the state meet.

In dual-meet competition, Opp's teams were virtually unbeatable, collecting 326 wins to just 18 losses for a remarkable winning percentage of .947. In the mid-sixties, Opp's Mustangs strung together 51

consecutive dual-meet wins. He was named the State Coach of the Year in 1977 and 1981. Opp was also the National Coach of the Year runner-up in 1977.

Opp produced many of Pasadena's greatest track and field athletes, including top national performers Jerry Proctor, Fred Shaw, John House, Ralph Allen, David Buchanan, Bobby Buss, Harold Busby, Mel Clipper, Wayne Herron, Oscar Moore, Paul Heglar, Jerry Sanders, Charles Mayfield, Ed Tave, Ricky Holliday, Scott Garnett, Ron Brown, Wayne Carroll, Bernard Mathis and Terry Parks.

He was also a key figure in the success of the Pasadena Games from 1948 to 1982, the year he passed away. The Pasadena Jaycees, current meet sponsor, renamed the Male Athlete of the Year Award "The Walter Opp Award" in his memory in 1982.

A native of Santa Ana, Opp was a graduate of Santa Ana High School and the University of Redlands before completing post-graduate work at USC. After a two-year stint in San Bernardino (1946-48), he moved to John Muir College in Pasadena, which was changed to Muir High School in 1955.

**HARRY M.
"CAP"
SHEUE**



A name synonymous with Huntington Beach High School, Harry M. "Cap" Sheue initiated the development of interscholastic athletics as one of Southern California's oldest prep institutions.

Sheue began coaching at Huntington Beach in 1925, when the district stretched from Long Beach to San Juan Capistrano. He was a genuine pioneer, who single-handedly operated the Oiler athletic department in his early years there. Huntington Beach had football, basketball, track and baseball teams back then, and Cap coached them all. He also taught physical education

and biology. Some of Sheue's early football teams consisted entirely of 11 players. His 1926 team, co-champions of the Orange League, returned intact for a 50-year reunion during the Oiler's 1976 homecoming.

Sheue would coach a total of seven varsity sports at Huntington Beach in his 29-year career, adding cross-country, swimming, golf and gymnastics to the list. He managed the prestigious Southern Counties Track Meet for 50 years, and founded the Southern Counties Basketball Tournament in 1929, the first basketball tournament ever held in Southern California. In addition, Sheue was constantly involved with recording the history and tradition of the HBHS athletic program. He was especially proud of the fact that 32 of his student-athletes chose coaching as a profession.

During his career, Sheue was honored many times. He was elected to the California Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1975, presented the Helms Athletic Foundation Award on the 50th Anniversary of the Southern Counties Track Meet, the Helms Founders Award in 1929 for the Southern Counties Basketball Tournament, the Citizen Savings Athletic Foundation Medallion in 1978 and the Orange County Athletic Directors Association Award in 1984. In honor of his coaching legacy, the HBHS football stadium was named Sheue Field by the Huntington Beach School District in 1967.

Born near Peoria, Iowa in 1895, Sheue moved to Iola, Kansas as a youth and was an outstanding athlete in his high school days. While attending Iola High, he lettered many times in football, basketball and track. In 1915, he broke the Kansas state high jump record and captained the basketball team to a state championship. He went on to Baker University (Baldwin City, Kansas), but had his education interrupted by World War I, in which Sheue saw action in France.

He graduated from Baker in 1920 and began his coaching career at Osawatomie (Kansas) in 1921. After a short stint at Bartlesville (Oklahoma) High School, he moved to Southern California to enroll at USC and begin work on his masters degree. Sheue first coached in California at Lompoc High School before moving to Huntington Beach in 1925.

**WALTER VAN V.
STEWART**



Credited with building and maintaining one of the CIF Southern Section's most outstanding aquatics programs, Walter Stewart of Harvard High School has earned the respect and admiration of his athletes, opposing coaches and school administrators during a 35-year career.

When Stewart first arrived at the North Hollywood school in 1951, the swimming program was in a shambles, with very little direction, organization or participation. In a short two-year span, however, Coach Stewart turned things around. Soon the Saracens had a representative swim team and was able to do well against much larger schools. His patience and coaching ability led to a heightened level of enthusiasm and team depth soon increased.

Harvard proceeded to fashion a swimming dynasty under Stewart's direction. The Saracens won the Prep League title in 1952, 1954 and 1955 and were moved to the Olympic League, where they won league championships 11 of the next 12 years. Stewart also guided his team to championships in the Southern California Swim League in 1973 and the Pioneer League in 1974. In 1954 he coached Harvard to a CIF-SS Class "B" championship and in 1976 a CIF-SS 4A Division Frosh/Soph championship.

When high school water polo came into its own in 1968, Stewart founded a team at Harvard and quickly learned the game itself. Soon, the Saracens developed into one of the stronger teams in the area and went on to Pioneer League championships in 1973, 1980 and 1982. During his coaching career, Stewart tutored no less than 11 Prep School All-Americans.

In addition to coaching swimming (1951-1986) and water polo (1968-86) at Harvard, Stewart has served as the school's Director of Athletics since 1975. He was also active in

CIF Southern Section affairs as the Pioneer League representative between 1976 and 1979.

A native Californian, Stewart graduated from San Diego High School in 1940, where he was an outstanding swimmer. In his senior year, he finished fifth in the 200-yard Individual Medley at the CIF-SS Championships and later won the AAU Junior National one-mile title. He went on to the University of Michigan, where his swimming career blossomed. As a three-year varsity letterman, Stewart was a member of three NCAA runner-up teams as well as a Big Ten Champion. Individually, he earned NCAA All-American honors in 1942, 1943 and 1947. Between 1944 and 1946, Stewart served his country in the U.S. Army.

Stewart has also been highly successful in rugged ocean swimming competitions. In 1938, 1939 and again in 1948, he won the prestigious La Jolla Rough Water Swim. He has also won the Oceanside Rough Water Swim, Seal Beach Round-the-Pier, Manhattan 70, Hermosa Beach, Straits of Mackinac, Cabrillo Beach Five-Mile and Balboa 'Round-the-Island' events. Stewart is a member of the San Diego Athletic Hall of Fame.

TEX WALLIS



Well known for his composed court-side exterior, Coach Tex Wallis directed the La Habra High School basketball fortunes for 26 years. Under his calm, effective leadership, the Highlanders made 19 CIF Southern Section playoff appearances between 1958 and 1984.

Wallis built the La Habra varsity basketball program into one of the CIF Southern Section's most consistent, winning 15 league championships. His 1971, 1976 and 1981 teams reached the CIF-SS playoff semifinals with sparkling records of 27-2, 25-4 and 24-5, respectively. On five other occasions (1961, 1963, 1970, 1982 and 1984), the Highlanders advanced to the quarterfinals.

Wallis coached a total of nine sports at La Habra, including football (12 years), Track and Field (10 years), Tennis (1 year), Cross Country (1 year), Baseball (7 years), Softball (7 years), Girls Varsity Basketball (4 years),

Boys' Frosh-Soph Basketball (1 year) and Boys' Varsity Basketball (26 years). He coached championship teams in football, baseball, track and field, softball and cross country. Wallis was the Chairman of the La Habra P.E. Department for 15 years as well as the City of La Habra Sports Director for 15 years.

His overall varsity basketball record (including boys and girls teams) stands at 656-273 for a total of 18 titles. During his basketball coaching career, Wallis tutored 15 All-CIF players and 65 all-leaguers.

Wallis was named League Coach of the Year eight times, Orange County Coach of the Year three times and North Orange County Coach of the Year twice. He has also been honored by the Orange County Hall of Fame, the City of La Habra as "Citizen of the Month" and has been awarded the PTA Outstanding Achievement Award. The City of La Habra also honored him by proclaiming a "Tex Wallis Day." Among his many professional affiliations, Wallis served a year as president of the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Association and was a member of the organization's executive committee for 10 years.

A product of Bailey Boro, Texas, Wallis grew up in the West Texas farm community of Muleshoe. He moved to Portales, New Mexico as a prep and graduated from Portales High School in 1943. He went on to attend Texas Tech on scholarship, where he spent two years before entering the military. He spent 30 months in the army before returning to finish his education at Eastern New Mexico University.

He landed his first coaching job at Socorro High School (New Mexico) in 1950, where he stayed for seven years. In 1957, a friend notified Wallis of a coaching opportunity in California and he made the move to La Habra.

bring public recognition to the numerous individuals who have contributed to the advancement of interscholastic athletics in the section. Until the award was founded, the only means for recognition of such individuals was through the Life Pass Program, which could only involve a limited number of recipients. A total of 26 names now belong to the CIF-SS Hall of Fame list, 14 having been selected in 1984 and six in 1985, in addition to the new six inductees.

"The Hall of Fame awards were a long time in coming," added Plutko. "Over the course of the 73-year history

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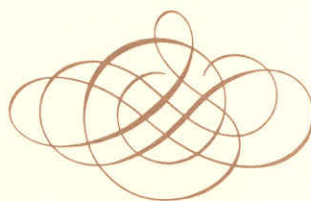

23-POINT DEFENSIVE GAME PLAN FOR LAWSUIT-CONSCIOUS COACHES

10 years ago, halftime conversation between A.D.'s usually meant talk about coaching needs, budget restraints and scheduling problems. Today such gab sessions include a new topic - concern over debilitating lawsuits in the athletic arena.

"But what can I tell my people, right now? Give me some practical suggestions for my coaches, who are on the firing line!" These kinds of comments, which I hear continually, are the genesis for the following legal defensive game plan. Each suggestion has already been shown to effectively deter legal entanglements.

Preseason Warm-ups for Legal Stamina

1. Realize you are not the one coach who'll never be sued. In the 1950s, one out of 100,000 people in the United States was involved in a lawsuit. In 1990, it is projected to be one in every five! The potential of being sued is there, and we must realize we have specific legal responsibilities. Being aware of this simple fact is the foundation of the defensive game plan.

2. Join professional groups and become familiar with their insurance programs.

3. Meet with your athletic director and other coaches to review policies, procedures and requirements. Don't accept, "We'll look into that question." Get the answers before the problem arises.

4. Make sure every player has passed a preseason medical exam.

5. Communicate with your players over the summer. Offer a general physical conditioning program to keep them in shape. The more you demonstrate your care for the well-being of your players, the lower your chances of being sued. Such actions establish your credibility, and nothing protects you from a lawsuit like credibility does.

6. Check your equipment and facilities. Yes, I know, the maintenance department told you the football goalpost ground sleeve has been covered and will not cause a problem during the upcoming season - but please, check it out anyway. It'll only take a minute and it may save you months of litigation.

7. Establish a member of your staff as the team's "safety czar." He is the one who will routinely check out all safety problems and policies. Assigning someone to continually evaluate the safety policies of the program can't hurt, and such documented sensitivity looks very good in a court of law.

Defensive Drills for the Playing Season

8. Staff meetings should include more than X's and O's. Give the safety czar some time at each meeting. Again, such foresight demonstrates your concern and that demonstrates your credibility.

9. Usually a coach is sued because of an alleged failure to meet one of the following duties:

- warn players about the possibility of being injured
- properly condition a player for the specific activity
- properly supervise players at all times
- offer proper equipment and facilities
- offer proper instruction and
- give proper first aid and/or emergency care.

Any defensive game plan must be predicated on these duties.

10. Maintain records of everything you do - and I mean everything. Such documentation should demonstrate progressive, sequential and well-planned practice procedures. In short, written records demonstrate your professionalism.

11. Establish training rules that not only include the standard items such as the avoidance of alcohol, drugs, smoking, etc., but also include policies about transportation, equipment care, the reporting of injuries to the athletic trainer and horseplay in the locker room. Include such items as proper rest and nutritional needs.

12. Follow your league rules to the letter, especially as they apply to safety considerations.

13. Establish an emergency procedure. One school I know of not only reviews such procedures but also distributes wallet-sized cards listing these procedures and important phone numbers.

14. Work with your athletic director. If the trainer says your best spiker cannot play in the championship volleyball game, accept that decision as if it were written in stone.

15. Don't allow an injured player to return to participation without the approval of the athletic trainer and/or team doctor.

16. Know the basics of equal competition, especially in the early stages of the season. The "green" 185-pound wrestler should not be scrimmaging against the 185-pound returning state champion.

17. Learn to say no. This is the hardest word in the coach's vocabulary. If you have to leave for a scouting trip, say no to the athlete who wants to stay after practice for extra work. Today's litigious sensitivity no longer permits such age-old practices.

18. If a potential legal situation does arise, avoid unnecessary communication. Take care of the injured player, and be considerate and professional. Do not, however, offer your opinion, accept blame or give unnecessary information to the public at large.

Post-Season Strategies to Stay Legally Fit

19. Review your program. Keep what worked, not only from the viewpoint of wins and losses, but also from meeting your safety and legal responsibilities.

20. Ask for constructive criticism and/or recommendations from those you respect, including players.

21. Evaluate and recondition all equipment.

22. Place orders for new equipment and communicate your needs for the next season. For example, was there a field problem, such as holes that need to be filled? Again, put everything in writing.

23. Attend clinics and workshops to remain abreast with current issues, regulations and procedures.

Following all these suggestions will not insure you immunity from becoming a defendant in a lawsuit. They will, however, lower the chances considerably, and that's about all you can expect from any defensive game plan.

As part of his final address to the Council, the Commissioner identified the following areas to be addressed by the organization:

- Finance and budget
- Area assigners
- Master TV contract for all member schools
- The R & R concept to include football
- The summer involvement of student athletes
- Forfeitures and their relationship to non-participation in playoffs
- The non-involvement of coaches in youth traveling team programs
- Eligibility rules dealing with joint custody
- Foreign exchange and foreign students
- Legal and liability services
- Promotion of CIF Southern Section programs through audio visual programs
- Continuation of administrative and coaching workshops
- Increased involvement in chemical and alcohol awareness programs
- State Legislature and Section relations concerns
- Mandatory workshops for administrative personnel
- Regional matchups in playoffs to eliminate travel costs
- Gross split rather than a net split of gate receipts in the playoffs
- The organization give some thought to the addition of a Budget Director to the staff in order to maintain a balanced budget for an organization as large as the CIF Southern Section.

4. TREASURER'S REPORT:

Bruce Keuning, treasurer, reviewed with the Council the financial report of the winter playoffs and an update of the current 1985-86 working budget.

5. STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL UPDATE: Mr. Pat Mauch reported the State Federated Council rescinded State and Southern Section By-law 306 as it pertains to physicals. The rule as currently written in the Southern Section Blue Book will be in effect for the 1986-87 school year. Additionally, the Council was updated on the passage of the State

budget for the 1986-87 school term.

6. GOLF LIFE PASS COMMITTEE REPORT: Mr. Lon Hardgrave, chairman of the Committee, introduced recipients of the Gold Life Pass in recognition of their long-standing service to the CIF Southern Section. Recipients for the 1985-86 year were Dr. Dick Cordano, Mr. Gene Hartley, and Mr. H.L. Looney.

7. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS: Mr. Jim Douglas presented the report of the Nominating Committee. Following a vote by the Council, the following were elected: President-elect, Robert Paisola, Lompoc High School; Treasurer, Bruce Keuning, Valley Christian High School; Girls' AD Representative, Sheila Burrud, Muir High School; Citrus Belt Representative, Bruce Kitchen, Hesperia High School; Private Area #2 Representative, Dr. Gary Smidderks, LA Baptist High School; and Desert Area Representative, Jim Carmichael, Palmdale High School.

8. PLAYOFF GROUPINGS: Dr. Bill Brand, Chairperson of the Playoff Groupings Committee, presented the final proposal of the playoff groupings for the 1986-88 cycle. An appeal by the Valle Vista League in football failed to carry the necessary majority. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the playoff groupings as recommended by the Playoff Groupings Committee.

9. BUDGET PROPOSAL FOR 1986-87: Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, presented the 1986-87 proposed budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed by a margin of 55-1 to adopt the budget as presented.

10. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE PROPOSAL: Mr. Stan Thomas, Chairman of the Blue Book Committee, reviewed items pertaining to amendments in the Constitution and By-laws effective with the 1986-87 school term. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the following amendments to the Constitution and By-laws:

Rule 2011 in the sport of WATER POLO setting a limit on the number of high school participants with remaining eligibility (33-11 vote)
Rule 2710, SOCCER, setting a limit on the number of high school participants with remaining eligibility (40-

13 vote)

Rule 205.31, CONTINUING SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY with respect to clarity and definition of an incomplete grade (50-6 vote)

Rule 224, HARDSHIP, requiring utilization of a specific form 224 when requesting hardship appeals (54-2 vote)
Rule 221, LEGAL GUARDIAN, defining what specifically constitutes a legal guardianship (51-5 vote)

In addition, a proposal relating to Rule 212.1, residence eligibility requirements pertaining to foreign exchange students was defeated by a margin of 34-21.

11. OFFICIALS FEES COMMITTEE PROPOSAL: The combined CIF Southern Section and L.A. City Section Officials Fees Committee presented its proposal for 1986 through 1989. Following appeal presentations by representatives of the Basketball, Football and Baseball Officials Associations, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the proposed three-year package, effective 1986 through 1989, by a vote of 51-5.

12. NEW COMMISSIONER NAMED: Mr. Stan Thomas, former Principal of Foothill High School and presently Administrator within the Tustin Unified School District, was introduced as the new CIF Southern Section Commissioner. Mr. Thomas will assume his position in the Office effective July 1, 1986, with Commissioner Plutko remaining for a smooth transition until July 25, 1986.

13. PASSING OF THE GAVEL: Mr. Moe Chavez, Chairman, relinquished his duties to President-elect Pat Mauch for the 1986-88 term of the CIF Southern Section Council.

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:10 p.m.

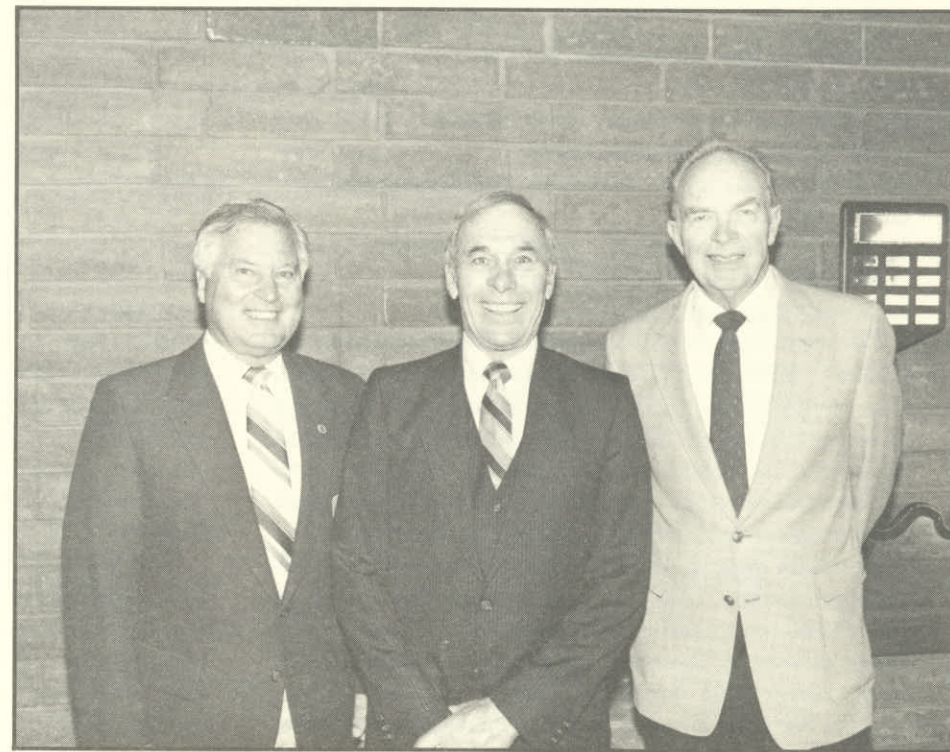

SPECIAL NOTICE

STATE BY-LAW 306 RESCINDED

The State Federated Council, at its meeting of May 2-3, 1986, **RESCINDED** its previous position which called for a change in State and Southern Section By-Law 306 as it pertains to **PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS** for student participants.

Various representatives from different medical associations appeared to provide testimony to the State Federated Council on the by-law which was scheduled to go into effect July 1, 1986. These included State Nurses Practitioners Association, Chiropractors, etc.

Following this input and upon recommendation of CIF State Attorney, Andrew Patterson, and CIF State Medical Advisory, Dr. Robert Loveland, the Federated Council **RESCINDED** its previous position.

Thus, the current By-Law and wording as reflected in the Blue Book under Rule

306 will remain in place effective with the 1986-87 school term:

"An annual physical examination, or a statement by a medical practitioner, certifying that the student is physically fit to participate in athletics is required before a student may try out, practice or participate in interscholastic athletic competition. A student will be excused from this physical examination provided there is compliance with the Education Code provisions concerning Parent's Refusal to Consent"

It should be pointed out the State has also been instructed to develop research in order to provide Sections and schools with a proper interpretation for the term, "medical practitioner."

Please pass the above information along to your respective athletic administrators, athletic directors and all coaches.

The California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section, in cooperation with the California Angeles and the Ford Motor Company have implemented a new academic program whose purpose is to recognize outstanding teams and individual student-athletes for academic excellence.

The inaugural recipients, selected in objective, open competition, will be honored in a public ceremony prior to an Angels game this year.

"When we initiated the corporate sponsorship program in 1980," pointed out CIF-SS Commissioner Ray Plutko, "we envisioned our sponsors becoming involved in the development of our youth. will receive a large award banner for permanent display in its campus gymnasium, in addition to certificates for all squad members.

All CIF Southern Section schools have been given the opportunity to single out a boy and girl "Student-Athlete of the Year" as well. A total of 68 boys and 61 girls have been selected. To qualify for the individual award, applicants were required to meet the following criteria: they had to be a senior with a minimum 3.5 GPA in college prep courses throughout their sophomore and junior years, as well as the fall semester of their senior year; in addition, they must have competed in at least one varsity sport and participated in two other extra-curricular activities (such as band, debate, drama or service organizations) during their senior year, or two varsity sports and one extra-curricular activity.

"We are impressed with the vision these fine corporations have shown in joining hands to develop a program that will encourage and salute the true student-athlete," added Plutko. "The Angels and Ford have recognized that the encouragement of today's youth is also the development of their employees of tomorrow."

Adohr Farms will again underwrite the entire cost of commemorative plaques for each of the winning schools, in addition to two large perpetual plaques including all the names of the honored schools. The perpetual plaques will be displayed at the CIF-SS and Los Angeles City section offices.

Whitfield, now in his third year with the Dodgers, is a former All-CIF and All-American outfielder from Palo Verde High School in Blythe. He has played in the major leagues with the New York Yankees and San Francisco Giants as well as the Dodgers.

"We in the CIF-SS are ecstatic about our continuing relationship with the Dodgers and Adohr Farms," noted CIF-SS Commissioner of Athletics Ray Plutko. "The need to create a unified public awareness and to provide accountability of the high school activity programs we foster is an obligation of the highest priority."

Added Whitfield, "The CIF motivated me as a high school athlete to go on to bigger and better things. Thanks to the opportunity to play organized, competitive baseball in high school, I am in the major leagues today."

At the May 8, 1986 council meeting, the following Blue Book change was made in the sport of soccer.

Blue Book Rule 2711.1 Outside Individual's Season of Sport During School Year - A member of a soccer team with remaining eligibility **AND** who participated on a school team, at any level, in the most recent season, may compete as an individual on a non-school sponsored soccer team outside his or her high school season of sport during the school year. However, the non-school sponsored soccer team may not have on its roster more than **five** members of that high school's soccer team who have remaining eligibility **AND** who participated on a school team, at any level, in the most recent season.

The effective date will be December 1, 1986. Please inform all athletes and staff involved in your soccer programs.
