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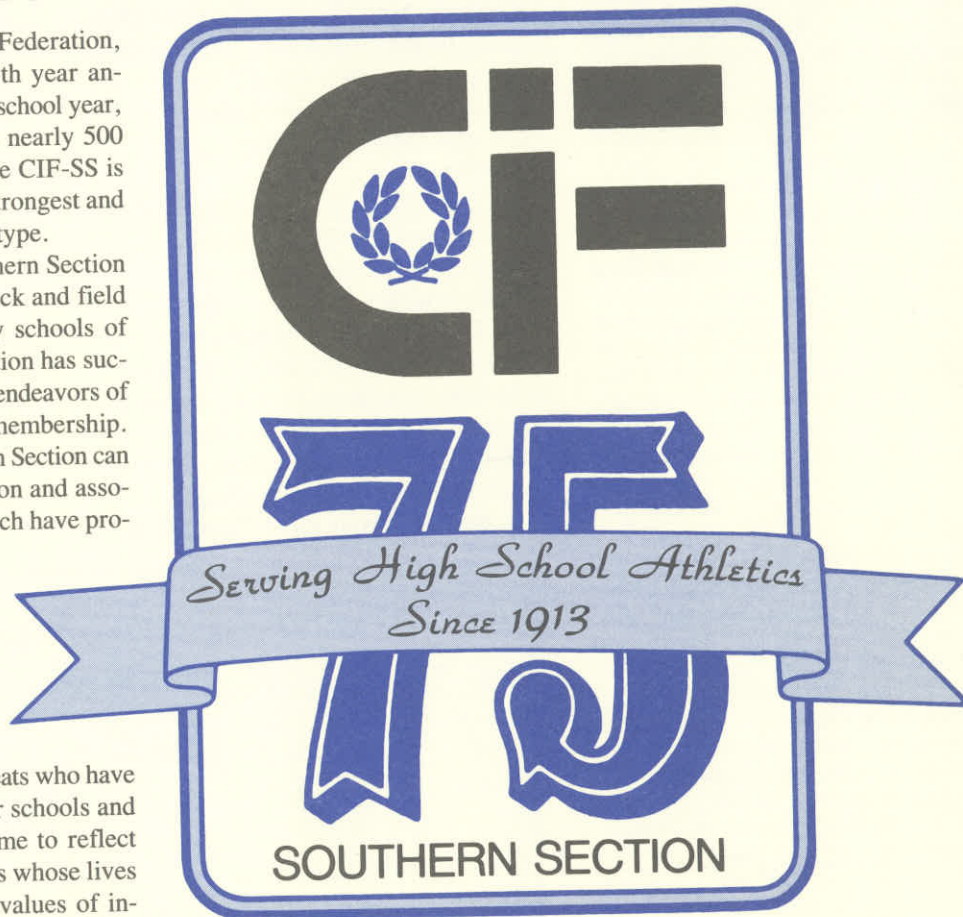
CIF-SS SET TO KICK-OFF 75TH YEAR CELEBRATION

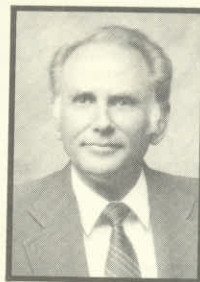

The upcoming 1987-88 school year marks the 75th Anniversary of organized interscholastic competition for the member schools of the CIF Southern Section. The archives of the CIF Southern Section date back to 1913. That was the year in which a man of considerable foresight—Mr. Seth F. Mr. Van Patten, who was appointed to manage that first event, soon became the first CIF-SS Commissioner of Athletics, beginning a personal association with the organization that lasted until his retirement in 1951.

To kick-off our Diamond Jubilee, a benefit golf tournament will be held at California Country Club in Whittier on August 27. All CIF Southern Section personnel and friends are welcome and invited to participate. Flyers have been forwarded to member schools describing the activity.

In addition, we will attempt to bring back many of the athletic legends of the CIF Southern Section in honor of their participation and accomplishments—at our major sports championships next year.

During the spring of 1988 we will bring closure to the 75th year anniversary by hosting a dinner at one of our larger hotels, inviting principals, spouses, Executive Committee alumni, corporate sponsor personnel and all who have actively supported and participated in Southern Section activities over the years. It is hoped that former commissioners Bill Russell, Ken Fagans, Tom Byrnes and Ray Plutko will have an opportunity to attend this gala affair. The Master of Ceremonies will be a person who has participated in the world of athletics, but more importantly, a previous participant in the CIF Southern Section.

We look forward to a grand celebration in honor of 75 years of cooperation, participation and athletic excellence in our area. We encourage our member schools to get involved and join each other in the celebration of this enduring association.

CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MINUTES April 9, 1987

The April meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation, Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by Chairman Pat Mauch at 10:45 am in the Conference Room at Anaheim Stadium on Thursday, April 9, 1987. All members were present with the exception of Cynthia Grennan, Dr. Tom Jacobson and Andy Patterson.

1. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE — Mr. Pat Mauch commended the CIF-SS office staff for its organization of the winter playoff activities. Mr. Mauch updated the Committee on the current status of work being done with the Amateur Athletic Foundation, survey on walk-on coaches, and plans for the June Executive Committee meeting.

Additionally, he reviewed with the Committee liability concerns and the culmination of Southern Section and State championship activities in the sport of wrestling and boys' and girls' basketball.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE — Commissioner Stan Thomas updated the Committee with reference to closure on incidents involving Hart High School in basketball, Riverside Poly High School in football and Sunny Hills High School in

swimming.

Additionally, he reviewed with the Committee the Amateur Athletic Foundation pilot program being conducted in the Moore league in the sport of track and field, progress of the building addition, relegating appeals, and the CIF-SS golf tournament to be held at the California Country Club on August 27, 1987 as the initial activity of the Southern Section's 75th Anniversary celebration.

Additionally, a question relative to league qualifications in the discus event was reviewed. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to allow leagues to conduct the discus as a non-scoring event for qualification for CIF-SS championship competition.

3. BOYS' A.D. UPDATE — Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Boys' Athletic Directors Representative, reported on the recruitment of athletic officials and the evaluation of the "R & R" week.

4. GIRLS' A.D. UPDATE — Ms. Sheila Burrud, Girls' Athletic Directors Representative, reviewed with the Committee concerns relative to the water polo season of sport.

CIF-SS STAFF REORGANIZATION APPROVED FOR 1987-88 SCHOOL YEAR

In a continued effort to better serve the athletic programs of its nearly 500 member schools, the CIF Southern Section Office will undergo a reorganization of assignments for staff members effective with the new fiscal year beginning July 1. The move was ratified by the CIF-SS council at its May 7 meeting.

The staff reorganization involves the upgrading of positions of three current staff members, Administrator Dean Crowley, who will take on the new assignment of Associate Commissioner; Marketing Director Larry Zucker, who will become a full-time administrator; and Publicity Director Scott Cathcart, whose scope as Media and Public Relations Director will be widened.

The key component of the reorganization is the appointment of Mr. Crowley to the newly established position of Associate Commissioner of Athletics. Crowley has been a CIF Southern Section Administrator for the past 11 years. During his tenure, he has overseen literally all phases of operation within the organization, including eligibility, advisory committees, stadium and arena arrangements, press and publicity, publications and the administration of numerous CIF-SS sports. His new role will include the responsibilities of all areas relating to the office of commissioner in the commissioner's absence, and any matter of major importance requiring immediate attention.

Before joining the CIF-SS Staff in 1976, Crowley spent 10 years as an assistant principal, counselor, coach, instructor and departmental chairman at Gahr High

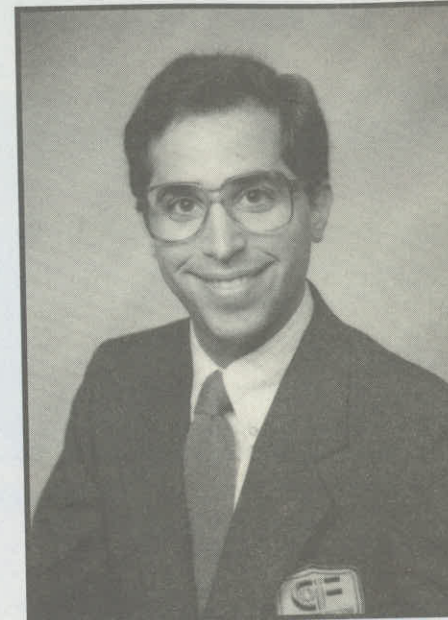
School in Cerritos. He is a past president of the Southern California Basketball Officials' Association, the instructional chairman of the Long Beach Unit of the Southern California Basketball Officials' Association, instructor for the Long Beach Unit of the Southern California Football Officials' Association and an active football official on both the secondary and collegiate levels.

Larry Zucker, who joined the CIF-SS staff in 1980 to establish and oversee the corporate support/sponsorship program, will become a fourth staff administrator in charge of financial analysis. His new responsibilities will include budget development, contractual negotiations and expense projections.

Since becoming a member of the CIF-SS staff, Zucker is responsible for raising approximately \$1.5 million to offset school dues and the ever-increasing costs of conducting the many championship athletic programs of the CIF Southern Section. In addition to his fund-raising efforts, Zucker has overseen the publication of programs for championship events and is responsible for development of the popular new CIF-SS Ford-Angels Academic Awards Program.

A 1981 graduate of the University of Redlands, Zucker held the position of Sports Information Director at Redlands before joining the CIF-SS staff. He is on target to receive his masters degree in Athletic Administration from Cal Poly Pomona in June.

Currently in his fourth year as a member of the CIF-SS staff, Scott Cathcart will

have his position of Director of Media and Public Relations upgraded. His responsibilities include media relations, master schedules, press accommodations and credentials for championship events, the weekly CIF-SS top-ten polls and press release, athletic record keeping and the CIF-SS Bulletin.

A 1977 graduate of Fresno State University, Cathcart was an assistant sports information director at Cal State Long Beach before coming aboard the CIF-SS staff in 1984. Between 1977 and 1979 he had a three-year stint as an assistant football coach and sports publicist at Santa Barbara City College and is currently a member of both the Southern California Football and Basketball Officials' Associations.

1423. From the close of school in June until the first day of the conditioning period there shall be no restriction on high school coaches working with high school students or entering them in summer football competition, except as listed in the CIF-SS Blue Bok, page 79. A member school, however, may not sponsor a team's entry, provide uniforms, transportation or equipment, or otherwise be responsible for students in summer camps or flag or pass competition. **Please refer to your CIF-SS Blue Book for further explanation.**

CIF SOUTHERN SECTION COUNCIL MINUTES

May 7, 1987

The May meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by President Pat Mauch at 9:40 a.m. on Thursday, May 7, 1987 at the Ramada Inn in Norwalk. All leagues were present with the exceptions of the Christian, Collegiate, Horizon, Liberty, Tri-County, Victory and Junior High School.

1. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF Southern Section Council meeting of March 19, 1987 as mailed to the Council, and the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee minutes of April 9, 1987 as mailed to the Council.

2. **PRESIDENT'S UPDATE:** Pat Mauch, President of the CIF-SS Council, reviewed the basketball 3 point play as adopted by the National Federation for the 1987-88 season; announced that a committee composed of Executive Committee members will be reviewing concerns relative to travel allowance for playoffs. In addition he reviewed with the Council the upcoming spring playoff activities in the sports of baseball, badminton, golf, gymnastics, softball, boys' and girls' swimming and diving, boys' tennis, boys' and girls' track and field, and boys' volleyball.

3. **COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE:** Commissioner Stan Thomas provided an update on scholastic eligibility; concerns relative to summer programs; spring sports championships; the Amateur Athletic Foundation pilot program in the Moore League; the officials' assignment process in Orange County which will be a pilot program during the 1987-88 school year; and state corporate support. In addition, the Commissioner reviewed with the Council rule violations in the sports of swimming, water polo, basketball and football.

Commission Thomas thanked the Council for their support during his first year as Commissioner of Athletics and expressed his desire for continued involvement through attendance at league meetings.

4. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, reviewed with the Council the financial report of the winter playoffs and an update of the current 1986-87 working budget.

5. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL REPORT:** Mr. Bob Paisola, represen-

tative to the State Federated Council, reviewed with the Council the following items that were passed at the State Federated Council meeting held in Sacramento on May 1 and 2, 1987:

A. **STATE BUDGET** - The proposed State budget for the 1987-88 year was adopted.

B. **STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERS** - Gloria Webster of the Los Angeles City Section and Charles Nelson of the Northern Section were elected to posts on the State Executive Committee.

C. **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT** - The State Federated Council passed a constitutional amendment in order for the State organization to be in compliance with the newly modified Brown Act (State Constitution Article 5, Sections 50-51; Article 7, Section 70).

D. **BASKETBALL** - The five-divisional format for State playoffs in basketball with divisional placement by enrollment was passed.

E. **STATE CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS** - A State cross country championship was approved for the upcoming 1987 season.

F. **STATE BY-LAW CHANGE** - A by-law change mandating minimum entries in playoffs was approved (State CIF By-law 518).

6. **GOLD LIFE PASS COMMITTEE REPORT:** Mr. Lon Hardgrave, chairman, introduced recipients of Gold Life Passes for 1986-87 in recognition for their long-standing service to the CIF Southern Section: Les Billinger, Moe Chavez, Ted Andrews, Mike Michaels and Ray Plutko.

7. **R & R WEEK UPDATE:** Administrator Dean Crowley reviewed with the Council the R & R Week set for May 18-23 and before and after school spring practice which will begin on Monday, May 25. Additionally, to properly assess the R & R Week program, a survey will be distributed to all Building Principals to evaluate the first year of the program, the results of which will be reviewed with the Council in September.

8. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ELECTIONS:** Mr. Jim Douglas presented the report of the Nominating Committee as it relates to vacancies on the Executive Committee. Following a vote by the Council,

Mike Shanahan, Principal of Buena High School, was elected as the Northern Area Representative.

9. **CIF SOUTHERN SECTION 1987-88 BUDGET:** Mr. Bruce Keuning, treasurer, presented the 1987-88 proposed budget. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the budget as presented.

10. **BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:** Mr. Gary Goff, Chairman of the Blue Book Committee, reviewed items pertaining to amendments in the constitution and by-laws, effective with the 1987-88 school term. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to consider all items together as one with reference to outside competition and the number of players on a team during the school year outside the season of sport—

- RULE 2712.1 - Soccer
- RULE 1914.1 - Softball
- RULE 2213.1 - Volleyball
- RULE 1814.1 - Basketball
- RULE 2012.1 - Water Polo
- RULE 2413.1 - Baseball

A motion to support the recommendation of the Blue Book Committee to eliminate the outside competition rule with reference to the number of players on a team outside the season of sport during the school year in the sports of soccer, basketball, softball, water polo, volleyball and baseball was defeated by a vote of 30-21, with one abstention.

Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the following interpretations and amendments to the Southern Section Constitution and By-laws:

RULE 221— (Question and answer for interpretation purposes)

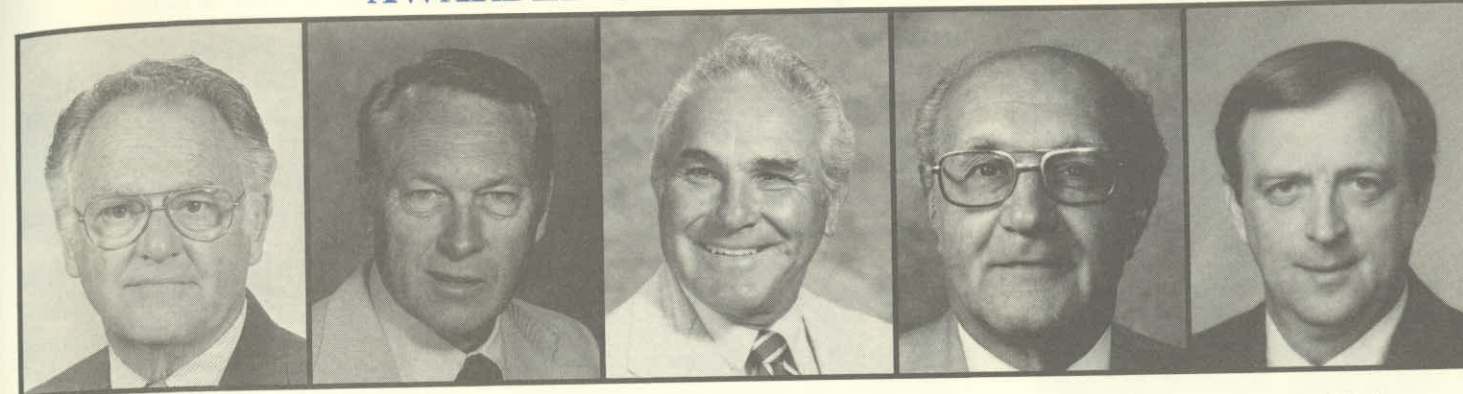
QUESTION: What is the status of a foreign student living with a legal guardian (not a foreign exchange student)?

ANSWER: To be eligible, the student must be living with a court-appointed legal guardian and a hardship must be established. The CIF-SS Office will approve the final eligibility status of said students.

The CIF Southern Section honored five men with the prestigious Life Pass Award for dedicated service to the organization and high school athletics at the May 7 council meeting in Norwalk.

The honorees included Ted Andrews of Glendale High School, Les Billinger of Excelsior, Neff and La Mirada High Schools, former CIF-SS Council President Moe Chavez of Downey High School, Mike Michael of Rio Mesa High School and former CIF-SS Commissioner of Athletics Ray Plutko.

The Gold Life Pass Award is the highest honor the CIF Southern Section can bestow upon former Council members, Executive Committee members, administrators or coaches who have contributed directly over the years to the CIF-SS through the management of playoff activities or by serving on special committees. Life Pass recipients must be nominated by a member of the council or executive committee. Final selection of those nominated are made by a committee composed of the Council President, Commissioner of Athletics, two members of the Council and one member of the Executive Committee, appointed by the Council President.

A brief biography of each of the 1987 CIF-SS Life Pass recipients follows...

TED ANDREWS

A former member of the CIF Southern Section Executive Committee, Ted Andrews was actively involved in the operation of the organization for some 25 years. Specifically, Andrews served on the Life Pass and Blue Book Committees, as well as representing the organization at numerous playoff contests and championship events during his three-year term. Andrews also served as president of the Foothill League for four years and was a

CIF-SS Council Representative for both the Foothill and Pacific Leagues for a total of 21 years.

A product of Glendale High School, Andrews went on to San Jose State on a football scholarship. After a four-year stint of war-time duty in the Air Force, he returned to teach at his high school alma mater, where he also coached football and swimming for 14 years. Andrews moved into administration in 1962, becoming the first assistant principal at Crescenta Valley High School. His career in athletic administration also included a term as Commissioner of the Glendale Parks and Recreation Department.

LES BILLINGER

A dedicated contributor to CIF Southern Section activities, Les Billinger served as a CIF-SS League Council Representative on three separate occasions. Billinger's long-time educational career included stints as principal at Norwalk, Neff and La Mirada High Schools.

During his tenure, Billinger was well known as an administrator with a willingness to serve in any capacity to perpetuate the institution of high school athletics.

A graduate of UC Santa Barbara, where he was an outstanding football player, Billinger went on to a successful 15-year career as the Head Football Coach and Director of Athletics at Excelsior High School in Norwalk. During his coaching career, he was actively involved in the original formation and operation of the Southern California Football Coaches Association.

MOE CHAVEZ

Moe Chavez, who retired last June after 17-years as the principal of Downey High

School, dedicated a great portion of his career in education to the betterment of high school athletics in Southern California and specifically to the operation of the CIF Southern Section.

Chavez was very active in CIF-SS operations, serving as president of the San Gabriel Valley League for two years, as a representative to the CIF-SS Council for seven years, as a member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee between 1977-86 and finally, as CIF-SS Council President from 1984 to 1986.

A graduate of Mt. Carmel High School in Los Angeles, Chavez went on to the University of Santa Clara, where he enjoyed an outstanding football career. In 1951, he completed work on his masters' degree at the University of Southern California. He coached football and basketball at Mt. Carmel for three years and at Downey High for four additional years before becoming the principal of South Junior High School in 1956.

Chavez remains involved with the organization as chairman of the inaugural CIF-SS Invitational Golf Tournament, a fund raiser to benefit high school athletics, which is scheduled for Aug. 27 at California Country Club in Whittier.

MIKE MICHAEL

Formerly the assistant principal and athletic director at Rio Mesa High School in Oxnard, Mike Michael devoted many years of dedicated service to the member schools of the CIF Southern Section.

As the representative of the Frontier League, Michael served for 12 years on the CIF Southern Section Council. During his council term, he was heavily involved with the Blue Book and Nominating Committees in addition to others. Upon leaving see **LIFE PASS** page 6

CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MINUTES

April 9, 1987

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5. **TREASURER'S UPDATE** — Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, updated the Committee on the winter playoffs in the sports of basketball, soccer and wrestling.

Additionally, concerns were expressed relative to five (5) schools that were still delinquent in filing financial reports in the sport of basketball. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct Commissioner Stan Thomas to notify, in writing, Leuzinger High School, Wilson High School of Hacienda Heights, Notre Dame Academy, Wilmington Christian and Rosamond High School that they will be terminated as members of the CIF-SS unless the delinquent reports are filed by May, 1987.

6. **LEGAL UPDATE** — Commissioner Stan Thomas provided an overview of the Trona High School appeal to the State CIF.

7. **STATE FEDERATED COUNCIL UPDATE** — Dr. Robert Packer reviewed background information relative to the upcoming State CIF meeting to be held in Sacramento on May 1 and 2, 1987.

8. **CONDOR LEAGUE PROPOSAL** — Administrative representatives from Cate, Thacher, Dunn, Laguna Blanca, Ojai Valley, Midland and Villanova Prep presented an appeal to the Executive Committee relative to fall soccer and non-member schools of the Condor League becoming members of the Southern Section for the 1987-88 school year. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve boys' soccer as a fall sport due to the unique school environments of those schools that are members of the Condor League. It should be noted that current non-member schools will apply for membership effective with the 1987-88 school year.

9. **NEW MEMBERSHIP** — It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the membership of Colton Christian School, Abundant Life Christian Academy (Colton), New Catholic High School (Rancho Santa Margarita) and Harvest Christian Academy (Buena Park) effective with the 1987-88 school term.

10. **NEWPORT CHRISTIAN APPEAL** — Mr. Willard May and Van Medina presented an appeal to the Executive Committee relative to participation by a group of small schools in the sport of boys' volleyball during the fall season of sport.

Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve, for the 1987-88 school term, the request pending approval of all leagues which the schools involved represent.

Additionally, it was requested that a progress report be furnished to the CIF-SS Executive Committee for review at their meeting in December of 1987.

11. **EL CENTRO BASEBALL/SOFTBALL OFFICIALS** — Administrator Bill Clark reviewed with the Committee progress being made relative to the assignment process in the sport of baseball and softball in the El Centro area.

12. **ORANGE COUNTY ASSIGNER** — Administrator Bill Clark informed the Committee that Orange County Area Coordinator Darol Roundy had submitted his resignation effective July 1, 1987 after 30 years of service to the CIF-SS.

13. **CALENDAR FOR 1987-88** — The calendar meeting dates for 1987-88 were approved as submitted with minor changes.

14. **NATIONAL FEDERATION SUMMER MEETING** — Mr. Bob Paisola updated the Committee on the National Federation summer meeting to be held in Denver, Colorado on June 28

through July 3, 1987-88.

15. **BASKETBALL 3 POINT GOAL** — Administrator Dean Crowley reviewed, with the Committee, the 3 point goal that has been adopted by the National Federation as a playing rule effective with the 1987-88 season.

16. **ALLOWABLE EXPENSES FOR PLAYOFFS** — Mr. Mike Moropoulos discussed concerns with the Committee relative to allowable expenses for football and basketball playoffs. Following discussion, Chairman Pat Mauch appointed a committee of Commissioner Stan Thomas, Joe Rotcher, Mike Moropoulos and Bruce Keuning to review and bring back a recommendation to the full Executive Committee.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:40 pm.

Michael's devoted service and hard work at Rio Mesa High School resulted in the development of a powerful, high class athletic program, which has several CIF-SS championships to its credit.

RAY PLUTKO

The fifth Commissioner of Athletics in the 75-year history of the CIF Southern Section, Ray Plutko completed a 12-year association with the organization last June, when he moved on to become Commissioner of the Colorado State High School Association.

In an administration spanning six years, Plutko was instrumental in the introduction and maintenance of the highly successful

CIF-SS corporate sponsorship program. Commissioner Plutko also initiated the popular CIF-SS Athletic Administrator's Symposium and Hall of Fame Recognition Award program, developed a written account of playoff pairings procedures and countless reports to assist the section's athletic administrators and coaches. He was also active in several functions of the National Federation of State High School Associations and served as the organization's keynote speaker at its 1982 convention in Florida.

A former sportswriter with both the Ontario Daily Report and the Pomona Progress Bulletin, Plutko served as assistant principal, athletic director and varsity basketball coach at Notre Dame High School in Riverside prior to joining the CIF-SS Office staff as an administrative assistant in 1975.

A total of 58 CIF Southern Section schools were honored at Dodger Stadium on Saturday afternoon, May 30, in the fifth annual CIF-SS "Shake for Sportsmanship" program, co-sponsored by the Los Angeles Dodgers and Adohr Farms Dairies. A representative from each of the selected schools was recognized prior to the start of the Dodgers-Philadelphia Phillies game.

The schools awarded, representing each of the CIF Southern Section member leagues, distinguished themselves in the principles of positive sportsmanship throughout the 1986-87 school year. In 1985 the seven leagues of the Los Angeles City Section were added to the program, bringing the total of Central and Southern California high schools encompassed by the program to over 520.

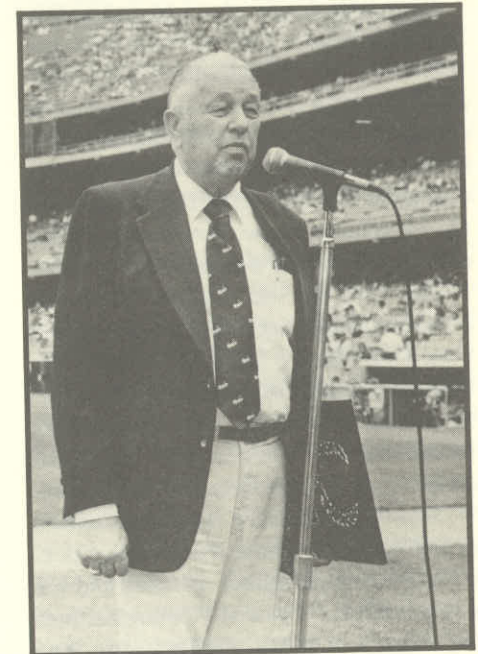

CIF SOUTHERN SECTION ADDS THREE NAMES TO HALL OF FAME RECOGNITION AWARD LIST

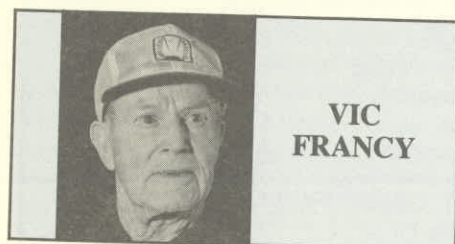
Three names have been added to the CIF Southern Section Hall of Fame Recognition Award list, it was announced by Commissioner of Athletics Stan Thomas. The class of '87 will have their names added to the perpetual plaque on permanent display at the CIF-SS Office, along with the 26 inductees who have been honored since the program was initiated in 1984.

The 1987 CIF-SS Hall of Fame inductees include: Legendary Hoover Track Coach Vic Francy; Dr. Ivan Mears of Los Angeles Baptist, a successful athletic director, coach and official; and the late Ray Murakami, a popular and dedicated athletic trainer from Ontario High School.

"The CIF Southern Section is indeed proud to honor these outstanding contributors to high school athletics and the organization," noted Commissioner Thomas. "Their dedication and achievements have benefitted countless individual student-athletes in support of our entire association."

The awards will be presented in honor of each of the inductees at meritorious ceremonies in their local areas.

The CIF-SS initiated the Hall of Fame Recognition Award three years ago to bring public recognition to the numerous individuals who have contributed to the advancement of interscholastic athletics in the section. Until the award was founded, the only means of recognizing such individuals was through the Life Pass program, which is limited by its very nature.

FRANCY**

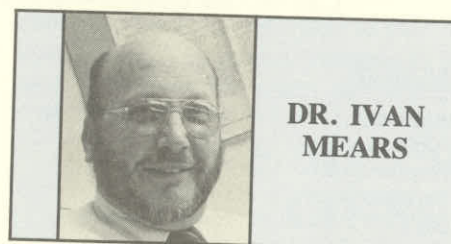
One of the most successful coaches in any sport the CIF Southern Section has ever had, Hoover High School track coach Vic Francy ended his 27-year career in 1956 with an amazing 532 dual meet victories. During his 35-year association with Hoover High School, Coach Francy stood for superior education, sportsmanship and camaraderie with not only the Hoover team, but with their competitors as well.

Francy coached his varsity teams to four CIF Southern Section championships, his "B" squad five and his "C" team four.

In addition, his teams won a staggering 45 league titles. The highlight of his coaching career came in 1949, when Hoover swept CIF-SS championships in all three classes, the only time a member school achieved the feat.

Francy's success was attributed to his development of sprinters and hurdlers, along with his knack for switching athletes in the three divisions to form the strongest possible combination in each. More importantly, he was a strong influence on the young men with which he worked. Francy was a man who loved to win, but his major emphasis was to teach the lasting values of citizenship to his student-athletes.

Francy began his coaching and teaching career in 1924 at Glendale High School, where he spent five years. In 1929 he moved to Hoover, where he remained until his retirement in 1956. During his career, Francy coached all sports with the exception of basketball, but track and field was his passion. A 1921 graduate of Glendale High, Francy completed his bachelors' degree at the University of Southern California in 1924.



**DR. IVAN
MEARS**

Regarded as the man responsible for establishing the athletic program at Los Angeles Baptist High School in Sepulveda, Dr. Ivan Mears has devoted a tremendous amount of his career to the growth and betterment of the CIF Southern Section as an athletic director, coach and sports official.

Dr. Mears became the first coach ever at L.A. Baptist in 1962 and headed up its programs in football (1962-68), track and field (1962-73) and lower-level baseball and basketball (1962-70). He was also an assistant football coach between 1968 and 1982 and assistant track coach between 1978 and 1985. Over the entire period, he served as the L.A. Baptist Director of Athletics. Under his administration, the school won two CIF-SS titles, one in football and one in basketball, in addition to numerous league championships.

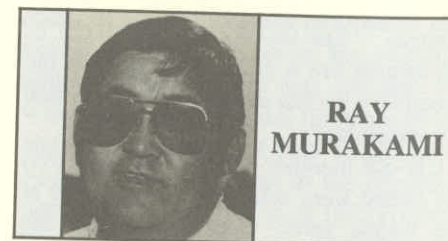
As an official, Mears remains active, having served the CIF Southern Section



and various other organizations in football and track since 1951. He was a field judge for the USA-USSR track and field series and officiated National AAU meets as well. Dr. Mears also trained three officials who participated in the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

Prior to joining the L.A. Baptist staff, Dr. Mears coached football at the California Institute of Technology and at the California Baptist Seminary. He also played a key role in setting up the Alpha League in 1980, as a member of a select group commissioned to write the league constitution. The Alpha League has functioned in an efficient, competitive fashion due in large part to his knowledge and guidance.

A 1946 graduate of North Hollywood High School, Dr. Mears completed his undergraduate work at UCLA in 1950, his MAE at California Baptist Seminary in 1953, his masters degree at Los Angeles State College in 1960 and his doctorate in education at USC in 1970.

MURAKAMI**

To school administrators, coaches, members of the community and most of all the young athletes he provided so much of his personal attention to, trainer Ray Murakami was considered one of Ontario High School's most beloved, respected and responsible persons. His hard work, dedication and love for student-athletes earned him these accolades.

Over an 11-year career which ended with his untimely death in 1985, Murakami touched the lives of countless Ontario High School students. He is remembered as being one of the first people to arrive on campus in the morning and one of the last to leave at night. He was in attendance at every athletic contest on campus—regardless of the level or importance—always at the ready to lend a hand to injured athletes of either team. When the Ontario facilities were used by another school, or for CIF-SS events, he made himself available to lend support, and did this without compensation.

Above all, Murakami's greatest gift was his ability to touch the students. He constantly gave of himself, acting much as a father to students who did not have one. He was a friend, a coach and a motivator. Students at all places where he worked benefitted from his expertise as a trainer, but even more so from his willingness to listen to them, assist them and spur them on to reach their highest potential.

A graduate of Los Angeles Dorsey High School, Murakami went on to complete his bachelors degree at Los Angeles City College and Cal State Los Angeles. Before moving to Ontario, he spent seven years as the trainer at L.A.C.C., in addition to short stints at Claremont Men's College and St. Paul High School. He also worked for nine years as a physical therapist at the Wood Memorial Clinic.

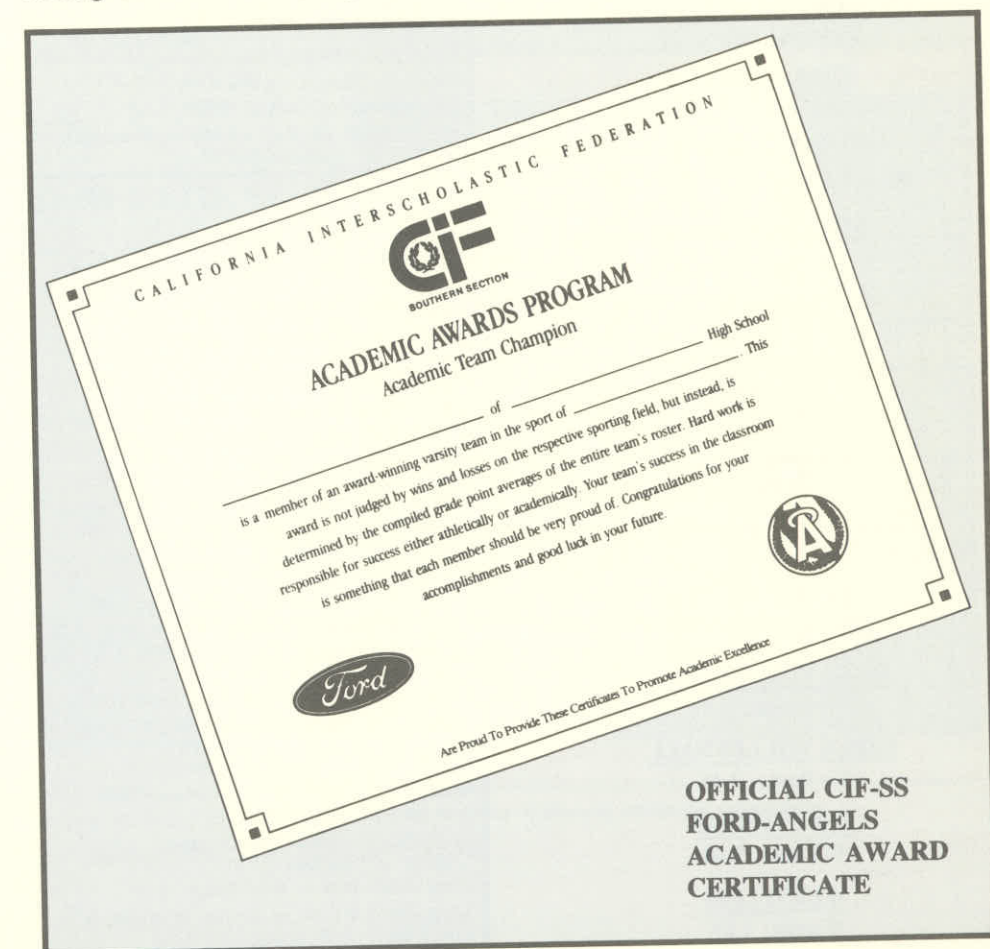

The team winners, representing each of the 21 CIF-SS sanctioned sports, were determined by the highest combined grade point average compiled by squad members. The team GPA was computed strictly from college prep courses, including communications, english/litera-

ture, fine arts, foreign language, mathematics, natural sciences and social sciences. Each honored team received a large award banner for permanent display on its campus, in addition to certificates for all squad members.

The "Student-Athlete of the Year" award allows each CIF Southern Section school to single out an individual boy and girl student-athlete for academic accomplishment. To qualify, applicants were required to meet the following criteria: They had to be a senior with a minimum 3.5 GPA in college prep courses throughout their sophomore and junior years, as well as in the fall semester of their senior year; they must have competed in at least one varsity sport in their senior year and have participated in an extracurricular activity (such as band, debate, drama or service organizations).

RULE 217—Boarding School (Question and answer for interpretation purposes)

QUESTION: What constitutes a boarding school?

ANSWER: A school providing lodging and meals for students and is duly licensed.

RULE 221.1— Legal Guardian

Add to the wording "due to hardship" with the change as follows:

If a student transfers from one high school to another and a new guardian is appointed **DUE TO HARDSHIP**, only a court appointed legal guardian will constitute a basis for consideration of a waiver, and all requests, along with proper legal verification, must be submitted to the CIF-SS Office for review and determination by the receiving school administration and the CIF-SS.
