NEW LEAGUE AND PLAYOFF STRUCTURES IN PLACE FOR NEXT YEAR

CALIFORNIA ANGELS, ROUND TABLE PIZZA LEND SUPPORT

The California Angels sponsored this year's baseball and softball championships for the fourth consecutive year while the Round Table Pizza Corporation completed its second season as the sponsor of the track and field championships.

The Angels, in addition to their sponsorship of baseball and softball, also co-sponsor the popular Academic Awards Program with the Ford Motor Company.

League and playoff competition for the member schools of the CIF Southern Section will take on a new appearance next fall, as the section swings into the 1988-90 cycle for releaguing and playoff groupings.

Under the procedures outlined in the CIF-SS Blue Book, competition for the member schools was realigned on the mandatory two-year cycle during this past school year. The results of the realignments, as adopted by the CIF-SS Council, figure to provide for interesting and exciting interscholatic competition in the coming school year.

The most notable change will take place in the sport of basketball, where member schools have adopted a playoff system based soley upon school enrollment. The change was initiated to bring the Southern Section in line with the state playoff system and provide the best representatives possible in each of the five divisions.

"The adoption of 'Proposition B' for the basketball playoffs is the most dramatic change we've had since going to the conference setup for football in 1977," points out Dean Crowley, Associate Commissioner of Athletics and CIF-SS Administrator for the sport of basketball. "By going to a strict enrollment classification, we will provide an opportunity for more schools than ever to join in the post-season competition. We figure to have openings for some fourth-place teams in the playoffs, as long as they have records of .500 or better."

The new system will not change the established process of determining playoff entries in league competition, but it will have a major effect upon

where teams are placed. Once the league season is completed, each of the CIF-SS leagues will submit the top three finishers as entries. At that point, the entries will be placed in divisional classifications according to enrollment, providing the possibility for schools from the same league to enter post-season play in different divisional brackets.

"We want to maintain the integrity of the Southern Section playoffs as one of the most prestigious events in the nation," said Crowley, "However, the state championship must be looked upon as the ultimate goal. One of the major concerns we had was for strong private-school programs playing in the lower-enrollment divisions, but we have assurances from representatives of those schools that they will continue to compete at the top level."

Another major change taking effect

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MINUTES April 13, 1988

The April meeting of the California Interscholastic Federation Southern Section Executive Committee was called to order by President Pat Mauch at 12:35 p.m. in the Conference Room at Anaheim Stadium on Thursday, April 13, 1988. All members were present with the exceptions of Cynthia Grennan, Jim Carmichael and Andy

1. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - President Pat Mauch updated the Committee on the upcoming State Athletic Directors Conference. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to support the attendance of the Athletic Director Representatives on the Executive Committee to this Conference and reimburse them for non-reimbursable expenses for 1988.

President Mauch commended the CIF-SS Office Staff for its organization of the winter playoff activities. Additionally, he reviewed with the full Executive Committee the philosophical discussions held by the Administrative Committee dealing with the future direction of the CIF Southern Section and the role of the Executive Committee in terms of continuing the strong lines of communication between the Executive Committee and the schools they represent to create a strong foundation in terms of overall lines of communication and representation.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE - Commissioner Stan Thomas reviewed with the Committee the May 5 Council meeting which will be the culminating activity of this, the 75th year of the CIF Southern Section. A formal program and luncheon has been planned at the Sequoia Club

following the regular meeting of the CIF-SS Council. Additionally, Commissioner Thomas updated the Committee on 8-Man Football cross leaguing and corporate support.

Additionally, a football request from Lone Pine High School was approved, pending league review and approval, due to their geographical isolation. A request for an early start to participate in a tournament in volleyball by Lone Pine HS was denied.

It was moved, seconded and passed to allow employees of the CIF Southern Section Office staff to participate in a tax deferment plan offered by PERS. It should be noted that this will reflect no cost to the organization.

- 3. TREASURER'S REPORT Mr. Bruce Keuning, Treasurer, updated the Committee on the current 1987-88 working budget which reflects the success of the winter playoffs in the sports of basketball, soccer and wrestling.
- 4. STATE REPORT Mr. Tony Balsamo updated the Committee on the Reebok Anti-drug Program; the School Properties Proposal; and other promotional programs being developed by


The Norwalk-La Mirada Unified School District is proud of its athletes and their visual committment to be drug and alcohol free. Their courageous stand represents a first for high school athletes across the nation. The patch will be displayed on all athletic uniforms in all levels of competition for teams at John Glenn, La Mirada and Norwalk High Schools.

A district-wide drug free policy was adopted in the fall of 1987, which states "athletes pledge to be drug and alcohol free during their season of sport". The policy further states that any athlete wanting assistance in counseling, referrals and/or intervention will be assisted by the school district.



The patch design is a cooperative effort of students, coaches and members of the local GRADE (Grass Roots Alcohol and Drug Education) project. It is the intent of the students to display the three points of the triangle to symbolize the Home-School-Community as well as the three district schools.

SUMMERTIME RULES

For the second-consecutive year, the governing body of the CIF Southern Section has waived current rules and regulations regarding summertime activities on the part of member schools and their coaches.

When summertime athletic activity is to be conducted by Southern Section schools, the schools involved must establish appropriate rules and procedures regulating the establishment, implementation, maintenence, monitoring and accountability of each athletic activity.

Additionally, schools, districts or booster clubs may pay entry fees for summer activities, with the approval of the principal.

This new interpretation will permit member schools to use equipment, uniforms, facilities, utilities, etc., for summer activity with the authorization of the principal. Please note CIF-SS Blue Book rules 1423 (football), 1512 (track and field/cross country), 1610 (swimming and diving), 1710 (wrestling), 1812 (basketball), 1912 (softball), 2010 (water polo), 2109 (gymnastics), 2211 (volleyball), 2308 (badminton), 2411 (baseball), 2510 (field hockey), 2608 (golf), 2710 (soccer) and 2809 (tennis).

For football, it should be noted that the use of air dummies, stand-up dummies, two and seven-man sleds, tackling dummies and protective equipment are prohibited for summer activity. With reference to rules 1423.2, 1423.3, 1423.4 and 1423.5, there will be no changes.

For summer services by coaches, payment may be made by the school district office. A.S.B. through the principal, or a duly-licensed community organization such as parks and recrea-

the requirements of Rule 205 (b) and (d). Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the Principal of Mater Dei High School to establish in writing, administrative procedures with regard to transfer eligibility. These procedures are to be submitted to the CIF Southern Section Office prior to June 1, 1988. The Executive Committee, at its June meeting, will review the procedures as submitted in order that Mater Dei High School implement same immediately. Additionally, the Committee encourages Mater Dei High School to utilize the CIF Southern Section staff to in-service appropriate school personnel with regard to eligibility and the use of the CIF-SS transfer eligibility card.

- **6. 8-MAN FOOTBALL** Administrator Bill Clark reviewed with the Committee the addition of several schools from the Central Section in the sport of 8-Man Football.
- 7. STATE WRESTLING TOURNAMENT Administrator Bill Clark updated the Committee on the State Championship Wrestling Tournament held in Stockton and the recommendtion from Southern Section coaches, as well as coaches from outside the Section, that the State CIF give consideration to the establishment of a Wrestling Advisory Committee at the State level.
- 8. ASSIGNERS PROGRAM UPDATED Administrator Bill Clark reviewed the Master Plan and Time Line for the Officials Assignment Program implementation within the Southern Section.
- 9. VICTOR VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL WRES-TLING PROGRAM – Chairman Stan Thomas and Tony Balsamo reviewed with the committee information with regard to transfer students at Victor Valley High School and their participation in the wrestling program.
- 10. PLAYOFF EXPENDITURES COMMITTEE REPORT Chairman Tom Jacobson reviewed the current work in progress by the Committee, which included a review of financial reports and the development of a survey to all leagues in the Section with the intent to establish reasonable game costs for playoffs, with a report forthcoming to the Committee in the fall.
- 11. MT. SAN ANTONIO GEOGRAPHICAL RELEAGUING AREA Commissioner Stan Thomas updated the Committee on the progress of releaguing in the Mt. San Antonio are due to the recent closure of Edgewood High School.
- 12. GEOGRAPHICAL RELEAGUING As sociate Commissioner Dean Crowley reviewed concerns with regard to the Coast and San Gabriel Valley geographical areas where the greatest number of school closures have been experienced in the last five years, creating a decline in the number of schools in these two specific releaguing areas. In terms of equity of competing, balance, school enrollment, and the number of schools in the releaguing area, it has been very difficult for schools to come to an equitable agreement in terms of releaguing configuration. The CIF-SS staff, after several meetings with league representatives and principals, is recommending the elimination of the current San Gabriel Valley Releaguing area and attaching the 21 schools to other existing areas. At the present time, several plans are

being drafted which will be reviewed by league representatives and school principals of the affected areas.

- 13. 33-INCH HURDLE UPDATE Associate Commissioner Dean Crowley advised the Committee that the State CIF has pushed back the implementation date of the 33 inch hurdles for girls to 1993.
- **14. GIRLS' GOLF** Associate Commissioner Dean Crowley reviewed with the Committee a recent directive from the State CIF requiring girls participating on boys' golf teams to hit from the womens' tees during competition.

15. SUMMER ACTIVITIES PROPOSAL -Commissioner Thomas reviewed a recommendation with regard to summertime rules. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to permit member schools to use equipment, uniforms, facilities, utilities, etc. for summer actitities with the AUTHORIZATION OF THE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL. This would affect summertime rules 1423, 1512, 1610, 1710, 1812, 1912. 2010, 2109, 2308, 2411, 2510, 2608, 2710, and 2809. Additionally, school districts or booster clubs may pay entry fees for summer activities. Special Note: In the sport of football, prohibited use of school equipment would still include air dummies, stand-up dummies, two or seven-man sleds, tackling dummies and other protective equipment (such as helmets, pads, etc.). In addition, the Executive Committee authorized the following entities only to pay coaches for summer services - district office, ASB through the Principal duly licensed community organizations (i.e. parks and recreations). Under no circumstances will the Southern Section condone payment by individuals, special interest groups or booster clubs.

When Southern Section member schools undertake summertime athletic competition, appropriate rules and procedures regulating the establishment, implementation, maintenance, monitoring and accountability of said activity should come under the governance of the appropriate school district and/or school governing body.

16. CALENDER FOR 1988-89 – The calender meeting dates for 1988-89 were approved as submitted.

17. NEW SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP – It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the membership of Marie Manoogian School, Canoga Park, and Rolling Hills Prep, Rolling Hills Estates, effective with the 1988-89 school year.

The membership of Faith Christian School of Riverside was approved for the balance of this year only, pending a review of grading policies and scholastic standards prior to the start of school in the fall. Membership to Delphi Academy, La Canada, was tabled untill more information is made available to the Committee.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 5:04 p.m.

in the 1988-89 school year are new designations for the 11-man football conferences, which will change to numerical divisions, replacing the old geographical names.

"The purpose of this move is to eliminate confusion for all observers," noted Bill Clark, CIF-SS Football Administrator. "The divison numbers have been established by using a combination of competitive status and average enrollments of the schools in the member leagues."

Thus, the Big-Five Conference becomes Division I, the Coastal-Division II, the Southern-Division III, the Eastern-Division IV, the Southeastern-Division V, the Central-Division VI, the Northwestern-Division VII, the Desert-Mountain-Division VIII and the Inland-Division IX. The Eight-Man Large and Eight-Man Small Divisions will remain unchanged.

Many changes will be evident concerning school placement in leagues and league placement in playoff groupings for each of the other 19 CIF-SS sanctioned sports. The general purpose of the two-year cycle for releaguing and playoff groupings is to provide for the most equitable balance of competition possible.

tion. It must be understood that coaches may not be paid directly by special interest groups, individuals, parents or booster clubs.

It should further be noted that Senate Bills 19 and 1533 direct the CIF to conduct the business of interscholastic athletics. It is noted in this legislation that athletics are discontinued during the summer months. Therefore, we have a dilemma. It is the belief of our section officers that in order to comply with our legislative mandate, state bylaws and section rules and regulations, that administrators (specifically superintendents and principals) are accountable for whatever summer program takes place in their respective districts or schools.

RAMMONDETTI, OSWALT RECEIVE GOLD LIFE PASS

Two long-time supporters of the CIF Southern Section, Coach Margaret Rammondetti of Tustin High School and Dr. Stanley G. Oswalt, Superintendent of the Rowland Unified School District, were awarded the CIF-SS Gold Life Pass at the May council meeting.

Rammondetti, a major contributor in pioneering the CIF-SS girls athletic program, taught physical education at Tustin High for 35 years. She also coached the lady Tillers' swimming, field hockey, basketball and volleyball teams during her career. Her leadership was instrumental in assisting young coaches as a mentor and role model for the physical education and athletic staff at Tustin.

Rammondetti maintained a high profile in CIF-SS activities and helped to develop the original rules and bylaws governing girls athletics for the Blue Book. She was also active as a member of the basketball coaches' advisory board, in addition to serving as meet director for the girls tennis championships.

"Coach Ray" was also active in several professional organizations. She held the position of treasurer and vicepresident of physical education for the Orange County Chapter of CAPHER, served two terms as president of the Orange County Women's Physical Education Teacher's Association, and was a member of the California Coaches Association. In 1975, Rammondetti was a Speaker at the National Physical Education Health and Recreation Convention. Since her retirement in June of 1986, she has continued to assist in the organization and staging of the Tustin Relays.

Dr. Oswalt became involved in CIF Southern Section activities in 1969, when the Rowland Unified School District was preparing to become operable. Since that time, his encouragement and support has been largely responsible for the development of the athletic programs at Rowland and Nogales High Schools.

Oswalt's strong backing and leadership has opened the door for booster

clubs to provide athletic funds for the two schools, which have enabled their teams to enjoy a wide range of activities and hire additional coaches. His initiative with support groups has also led to the development of the new Thomas M. Aney Stadium at Rowland High School. His support of use of district personnel for the facility has led to the installation of electrical systems, sound systems, fencing and necessary cement work so that the stadium could become operative in 1985.

Oswalt also worked to develop a strong discipline policy within the Rowland Unified School District in relation to interscholastic athletics. Under his guideance, Rowland was one of the first five districts in the State of California to adopt the nowrequired policy for scholastic achievement in order to be eligible for athletic competition. This program has proven to be effective and has garnered the support of district coaches. Oswalt's direction has led to the total development of a well-rounded interscholastic program within his district as a component of the CIF Southern Section.



Eighty-seven boys and 87 girls were honored as Student-Athletes of the Year. These students compiled a minimum 3.50 grade point average in college preparatory courses during their sophomore, junior and senior years. To qualify, participation was also required in a varsity sport and extra-curricular activity during the student's senior year.

Twenty-one teams were selected as Academic Team Champions in the Southern Section's 20 team sports. The combined grade point average for the entire varsity team's roster was required to be in excess of 3.00 in college preparatory courses during the first semester of the 1987-88 school year. All teams that met the minimum 3.00 grade point average were sent a certificate for each team member to honor this achievement.

The individual Student-Athletes of the Year and all members of the Academic Team Champion's roster were presented with certificates at Anaheim Stadium, prior to the May 9 Angels-Indians game. The head coach and team representative from each Academic Team Champion were presented with a permanent banner at that time.
