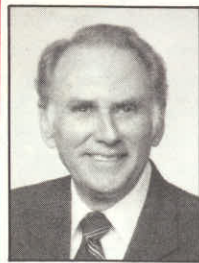

CIF-SS COUNCIL MINUTES March 16, 1989

The March meeting of the CIF-SS Council was called to order by President Tom Jacobson at 9:35 a.m. at the Sequoia Athletic Club in Buena Park. All leagues were present with the exception of the Del Rey and Los Padres.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the minutes of the CIF-SS Council meeting of January 19, 1989 as mailed to the Council, and the minutes of the CIF-SS Executive Committee meeting of February 16, 1989 as distributed to the Council.

2. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - Dr. Tom Jacobson announced with regret, the resignation of President Bruce Keuning, due to personal and professional obligations. Further, it should be noted that the Executive Committee, at their meeting of February 16, 1989, approved the recommendation of the administrative committee to have President-elect Dr. Tom Jacobson fill Bruce Keuning's vacancy. Additionally, Dr. Gary Smidderks was appointed to fill the position of President-elect and will stand for election in 1990. He will also continue to fulfill the duties of treasurer until his term expires in June of 1989.

In other business, Dr. Jacobson reviewed with the Council, the School Properties contract currently being negotiated by the State CIF; long-range planning for the year 2000 under the direction of Dr. Pat Rooney at the State level; Southern Section and State playoffs; and relegating issues.

3. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE - Commissioner Stan Thomas updated the Council on the current relegating process; concerns dealing with the Reebok corporate sponsorship; the assignment of officials and the problems being

created when schools submit inaccurate schedules; Southern Section basketball playoffs; concerns dealing with incidents in baseball; and the Santa Margarita High School Relegating question.

4. TREASURER'S REPORT - Dr. Gary Smidderks, treasurer, reviewed background information and the proposed Southern Section budget for the 1989-90 school year. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 Council meeting.

5. NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT - Mr. Jim Douglas, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, reviewed the recommendations for representatives on the CIF-SS Executive Committee. The following names were placed in nomination:

SUMMERTIME RULES, REVISITED

When summertime athletic activity is to be conducted by Southern Section schools, the schools involved **must establish** appropriate rules and procedures regulating the establishment, implementation, maintenance, monitoring and accountability of each athletic activity.

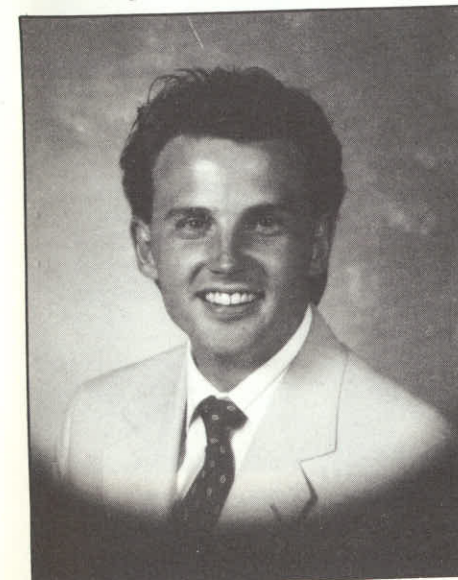
Additionally, schools, districts or booster clubs may pay entry fees for summer activities, with the **approval of the principal**.

This new interpretation will permit member schools to use equipment, uniforms, facilities, utilities, etc., for summer activity with the authorization of the principal. Please note CIF-SS Blue Book rules 1423 (football), 1512 (track and field/cross country), 1610 (swimming and diving), 1710 (wrestling), 1812 (basketball), 1912 (softball), 2010 (water polo), 2109 (gymnastics), 2211

CHRIS THOMAS NAMED NEW CIF-SS DIRECTOR OF SPORTS MARKETING

The CIF Southern Section is pleased to announce that Chris Thomas has been named as its new Director of Marketing. Thomas was selected by a

three-person panel, including executive committee members Bruce Kitchen, Assistant Superintendent-Hesperia Unified School District, Ken Gunn, Principal of Walnut High School, and Dean Crowley, Associate Commissioner of Athletics.

Thomas, 25, replaces Larry Zucker, who left the CIF-SS staff to accept a position as associate director of athletics at California State University, Bakersfield. Thomas' primary function will be to conduct the CIF-SS corporate sponsorship program, which was officially founded in 1980 to offset school membership dues. Thomas is the son of CIF-SS Commissioner Stan Thomas.

Since July of 1988, Thomas has been an independent sales representative for the Herff Jones Company, a CIF-SS sponsor and maker of school rings and awards. In that position, he put together effective written and oral presentations, designed and created

graphics, printing and promotional materials, underwent formal sales training and developed successful relationships with corporate participants in the CIF-SS member schools.

Prior to joining the Herff Jones staff, Thomas worked his way into an assistant managership with the Ralphs Grocery Company (1981-88), coached football, basketball and track at Ladera Vista Junior High of Fullerton (1981-83), and worked as a lifeguard, pool manager and swim instructor at Fullerton's Independence Park (1979-81).

A 1987 graduate of Cal State Fullerton, Thomas majored in Business Administration with an emphasis in marketing and management as a collegian. In the 1986-87 school year, he was recognized in the Who's Who among students in American universities and colleges. Thomas prepped at Fullerton High School, where he excelled in athletics as a football quarterback and sprinter on the Indian track team.

This is a non-action item and will be voted upon at the April 27, 1989 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

6. STATE COMPETITION COMMITTEE REPORT - Commissioner Stan Thomas updated the Council on items currently being discussed by the State Competition Committee:

(A) STATE VOLLEYBALL CONFIGURATION - This proposal would expand the girls' volleyball from the current 3 divisions to 5 divisions, as is currently being done in boys/girls State basketball. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27, 1989 meeting of the CIF-SS Council in order to give the delegates to the State Federated Council voting direction.

(B) BASKETBALL STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS - This proposal would create separate sites for boys/girls championship games, beginning next year. The boys, all divisions, would play their championship games in Oakland at a single site; and the girls' championships would be conducted in Southern California at a single site on Saturday, March 17, 1990. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27, 1989 meeting of the CIF-SS Council in order to give the delegates to the State Federated Council voting direction.

7. BLUE BOOK COMMITTEE REPORT - Mr. Gary Goff, Chairman of the Blue Book Committee, reviewed with the Council, items currently being reviewed and discussed by the Blue Book Committee:

(A) RELEAGUING - Geographical placement and releguing procedures will be defined for clarity in the Blue Book as a housekeeping item for the 1989-90 school year.

(B) FOOTBALL SCRIMMAGE - The Orange League is recommending that schools be allowed one scrimmage and 10 games or 2 scrimmages and 9 games, beginning with the 1989 football season. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

(C) SUMMER FOOTBALL CONTACT CAMPS - As noted in the Blue Book under Rule 1423, schools are prohibited from sponsoring a team's entry, providing uniforms, helmets and other items such as safety equipment, for students in summer camps. League representatives are asked to review this with their respective league members.

(D) SOUTH COAST LEAGUE FOOTBALL PROPOSAL - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to allow for a pilot program for freshman football in the South Coast League permitting contests to be played in 12-minute quarters for the 1989 season only, with a report submitted to the CIF-SS at the conclusion of the season.

(E) STATE BY-LAW/RECOMMENDATION TO STATE - The Blue Book Committee is recommending a change in the State By-laws deleting Item C 4 under Rule 604 Unattached Competition Special Programs. It should be noted, if approved by the Southern Section Council, this item would be forwarded to the State Federated Council for its vote. This is a non-action item and will be voted upon at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

(F) SUNSET LEAGUE FOOTBALL PROPOSAL - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve a proposal from the Sunset League to modify Rule 720.1 allowing schools to schedule contests before the first allowable playing date for travel outside of the State of California once every three years.

(G) WINTER SEASON OF SPORT - The Blue Book Committee is endorsing a recommendation from the Pacific League changing the December 1 first starting date for boys and girls' basketball, boys and girls' soccer and field hockey, to the first Wednesday after Thanksgiving, but no later than December 1, with an implementation date of the 1990-1991 school year.

(H) VIDEO TAPING POLICY (RULE 522) - The Rio Hondo League is proposing a mandatory video exchange in all sports, and a policy mandating that participating schools advise a school that they have competed against that they are releasing a video to another school. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council. It should be noted that the Blue Book Committee is recommending that the current rule be left as written and interpreted. It should be noted that should a league desire to be more restrictive with reference to video exchange, they could adopt rules within their own league, constitution and by-laws.

(I) STUDENT PARTICIPATION DURING THE SUMMER-STATE RULE 1203 - A proposal from the State CIF Commissioners' Committee to delete the present wording of State By-law 1203 (b) and substitute the following: "The California Interscholastic Federation and its member schools are prohibited from engaging in interscholastic athletic competition or practice under the jurisdiction and authority of the CIF between the close of school in June and opening of fall section practice. This would not prohibit Boards of Trustees and their schools from permitting the use of their facilities, personnel, or equipment for summertime recreational activity."

This by-law change is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council in order to give the CIF-SS delegates to the State Federated Council voting direction.

(J) ALUMNI GAMES - The Alumni Committee recommended that the following rule be considered for inclusion in the 1989-1990 edition of the CIF-SS Blue Book: It is recommended that student teams confine their competition to other student teams and that faculty, celebrity and alumni teams, which are composed of adults, play among themselves, rather than against student teams. It should be noted that if approved, all references to alumni games will be deleted from the Blue Book. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

8. OFFICIALS ASSIGNING UPDATE - Administrator Bill Clark reported that the officials assigning program will be in place Section-wide beginning next year.

9. STATE WRESTLING PROPOSAL - Administrator Bill Clark reviewed a proposal from the State Commissioners to modify Rule 1700 (d) so that a maximum of 18 points for a wrestling competition be applicable only to individuals and not to teams. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the Council in order to give the Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council voting direction.

10. BASEBALL PITCHING LIMITATIONS - Administrator Bill Clark reviewed a recommendation of the Southern Section Baseball Coaches Advisory Committee with reference to baseball pitching limitations. This is a non-action item

and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council in order to give the Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council voting direction.

11. PROPOSED STATE BUDGET FOR 1989-90 - Dr. Gary Smidderks reviewed with the Council the proposed State CIF budget for the 1989-90 school year. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the Council in order to give the Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council voting direction.

12. LEAGUE COORDINATOR CONCERNS - Sherri Ross, Girls A.D. Representative to the Executive Committee, reviewed concerns with reference to reporting playoff entries to the CIF-SS Office. The purpose of the proposal is to relieve the league representatives of the task of gathering statistical information for the purpose of reporting league standings and entries for CIF team championships. This is a non-action item and will be voted on at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

13. RIO HONDO LEAGUE PROPOSAL - The Rio Hondo League Representative reviewed a proposal which would allow baseball teams to begin organized conditioning practice on February 5, 1989 as opposed to the 1989 calendar which allows for all spring sports to begin practice on February 19, 1989. This is a non-action item and will be voted upon at the April 27 meeting of the CIF-SS Council.

14. STATE CONSTITUTION REVISION - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to direct the Southern Section delegates to the State Federated Council to support a proposal from the CIF Central Coast Section pertaining to Article 8, Section 80 of the State CIF Constitution dealing with the election of members to the State CIF Executive Committee.

15. OFFICIALS FEE CONTRACT PROPOSAL - Gary Norton, Chairman of the Officials Fee Committee, reviewed the CIF-SS Officials Fee Committee Proposal. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the \$3-\$2-\$1 concept for officials fees beginning with the 1989 school year through the 1991-92 school year. Additionally, a provision was passed allowing the Office to make adjustments, utilizing the \$3-\$2-\$1 concept as requested by various associations, in their respective fee schedules. It should be noted that a majority of the adjustments would be with the varsity level officials, saving the schools money, due to the fact that more games are played at the lower levels. The travel fee adjustment from 15 cents to 18 cents was approved (rule 1210.4). Items dealing with contest changes (1213.1 and 1213.2) were defeated. Additionally, items pertaining to officials failing to appear and late arrivals (1215.1 and 1215.2) were defeated. It should be noted that the Council had some serious concerns with regard to official no-shows, late arrivals, officials changing games, and master schedules not being received on time from the association assigners. There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 12:20 p.m.

SOUTHERN SECTION HONORS 12 CONTRIBUTORS WITH GOLD LIFE PASS AWARD

The CIF Southern Section honored 12 long-time proponents and loyal contributors to high school athletics with the Gold Life Pass at its final Council meeting of the 1988-89 school year.

The honorees included Tony Balsamo, Joe Deal, Clyde Francisco, Bob Howard, Pat Mauch, Sam Nicholson, Tom Noel, Bob Paisola, Sam Pecchia, Darol Roundy, Doug Rozelle and Blinn Tenney.

As the highest honor the CIF-SS can bestow upon an individual, eligibility for the award includes service on the Council or Executive Committee or direct contribution to the CIF-SS through management of playoff events or serving on special committees. A brief sketch of the 1989 honorees follows.

TONY BALSAMO

Tony Balsamo began his teaching

and coaching career at Palo Verde College in Blythe as a science instructor and football coach in 1951. He moved to New Mexico State University to serve as the Aggies' line coach in 1955, and then on to Victor Valley High School in 1958 as a science teacher and head football coach. He later served as athletic director and assistant principal at Victor Valley. In 1967, Balsamo was named the first principal at newly-opened Apple Valley High School, where he remained as the school's only principal until his retirement in 1988.

Balsamo's extensive service to the CIF began as a league representative from 1967-69. In 1971 he was elected to the Executive Committee, on which he served until 1988. During his term, Balsamo served as president of the Southern Section, president of the State CIF, member of the National Federation Executive Committee and

finally as vice-president of the National Federation.

JOE DEAL

A member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee from 1973-80, Joe Deal began his career in education as a history teacher and basketball coach at Bonita High School in La Verne in 1946. In 1951, he directed his Bearcats to a CIF-SS Championship and soon afterward became the school principal.

In 1956, Deal moved to West Covina High School as assistant principal and two years later was named principal of newly-opened Charter Oak High. In 1964, he accepted a similar offer when South Hills High School of Covina opened, a position he would hold until his retirement in 1980. Prior to being elected as a member of the Executive Committee, Deal served the CIF-SS for many years as a league council representative.

CIF-SS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MINUTES

April 12, 1989

The April meeting of the CIF-SS Executive Committee was called to order by President-elect Dr. Gary Smidderks in the absence of Dr. Tom Jacobson, President, who is away on school accreditation, at 10:15 a.m. on Wednesday, April 12, 1989 in the Conference Room at Anaheim Stadium. All members were present with the exception of Dr. Jacobson.

1. PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - Dr. Gary Smidderks announced to the Committee the resignation of Administrator Larry Zucker who will be accepting a position as Associate Athletic Director at California State University, Bakersfield, and he outlined with the Committee, the timeline for the filling of Mr. Zucker's position. Additionally, he updated the Committee on the National Federation Summer meetings; litigation; and extended congratulations to Cynthia Grennan on being named Woman of the Year by the North Orange County YWCA.

2. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE - Commissioner Stan Thomas reviewed with the committee, corporate support and the State contract with School Properties; the appointment of Larry Rice, former Commissioner of the Central Coast Section, to act as liaison for the State corporate sponsorship program with the 10 State CIF Sections; relegating and geographical placement issues; officials fees; AAF Program involving soccer coaches, with workshops scheduled to begin this summer.

3. BOYS A.D. UPDATE - Mr. Mike Moropoulos, Boys' Athletic Director Representative, reported on the need for awareness on the part of all parties involved in interscholastic athletics on the issues and problems dealing with steroids.

4. GIRLS A.D. UPDATE - Sherri Ross, Girls' A.D. Representative, updated the Committee on the California State Athletic Directors Assn. Conference to be held in Palm Springs, with the focus on administering a drug-free athletic program.

5. SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE - Cynthia Grennan, Superintendent's Representative, and Dr. Robert Packer updated the Committee with regard to the Assembly Bill 2134, open enrollment, and other pending legislation pertaining to schools of CHOICE-AB 149, AB 175 and AB 375. Additionally, Dr. Packer reviewed the summer rules and regulations proposal now before the State Federated Council, with a vote due in May and concerns of superintendents with regard to the impact of this issue on their respective school districts.

6. TREASURER'S REPORT - Dr. Gary Smidderks, Treasurer, updated the Committee on the current 1988-89 working budget with reference to playoffs in the sports of basketball, soccer and wrestling. Due to the large number of schools still delinquent in the filing of financial reports for the basketball playoffs that were completed on March 4, 1989, Executive Committee members were asked to contact principals in their area who were still delinquent in filing reports with the CIF-SS Office. All outstanding reports are to be filed no later than April 24, 1989. Additionally, it was moved, seconded and passed to have the staff develop a proposal, to be reviewed with the Executive Committee at its meeting of June 17, 1989, with reference to facilitating the basketball financial reports, which, as noted in the Basketball Playoff Handbook, are due within one week after the conclusion of the playoff contest. Six weeks after the completion of the Southern Section basketball finals, over twenty reports were still outstanding.

7. LEGAL UPDATE - Attorney Andy Patterson updated the Committee on the successful litigation of the Bloodworth Case which dealt with a football injury.

8. STATE REPORT - Dr. Robert Packer, State CIF President-elect, discussed with the Committee progress on the School Properties contract with the State.

9. WINTER PLAYOFF ACTIVITIES - Administrators Dean Crowley, Bill Clark and Karen Hellyer reviewed with the Committee the success of the winter playoff activities.

10. AT-LARGE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER - Dr. Gary Smidderks discussed with the Committee the proposed timeline for the appointment of an at-large Executive Committee member which will be a constitutional amendment to the CIF-SS Constitution and By-laws. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to have a written proposal introduced at the September 21, 1989 meeting of the CIF-SS Council, with formal action to take place at the January 18, 1990 meeting of the CIF-SS Council. It should be noted that if this proposal is approved, the position will be a two-year appointment beginning in February, 1990.

11. WATER POLO RULES FOR 1990 - Administrator Bill Clark announced that the National Federation will continue publishing Water Polo Rules as they have done in the past.

12. JOHN W. NORTH APPEAL - Principal Doug Wolfe and Assistant Principal Bob Sievers of John W. North High School, appeared before the Executive Committee to appeal a decision pertaining to CIF Rule 151.3. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to uphold the appeal of John W. North High School and place only the girls' basketball program on probation until June of 1990, based upon the positive actions taken by the administration of John W. North High School.

13. PALO VERDE HIGH SCHOOL APPEAL - Dr. Leamon Hanson, Superintendent, Steven Sperry, Board Member, David Hansen, Principal and Phil Ramsey, Athletic Director of Palo Verde High School, Blythe, appeared before the Executive Committee to appeal the original decision of the Executive Committee of January 14, 1989, placing Palo Verde High School in the Desert Area for relegating purposes. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to sustain the original decision of the Executive Committee, based upon relegating procedures as outlined in the CIF-SS Blue Book. It should be noted the next level of appeal of Palo Verde High School would be before the State CIF.

14. OLYMPIC LEAGUE APPEAL - Mr. Glenn Voss, Olympic League Representative, appeared before the Executive Committee to appeal a decision placing Santa Margarita High School in the Olympic League for the 1989 football season. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to deny the appeal of the Olympic League.

15. NEWPORT CHRISTIAN HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL PLAYOFF VIOLATION - Jerry Ternes, Principal, Newport Christian High School, and Jacques Ribet, Headmaster, Ernest Daley, Principal and Patrick Moyal, Athletic Director/Coach, Ribet Academy, appeared before the Executive Committee to review a violation of the alternate court rule in the Southern Section Boys' Basketball Semi-finals between Newport Christian and Ribet Academy at the West Newport Beach Community Center

gym. Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to vacate Newport Christian High School's runner-up award in the Boys' Small School Division and that the Boys' Basketball program be placed on probation for the 1989-90 school year, with a report to be filed with the Executive Committee for review at their meeting of June 16, 1990. The report is to include progress the administration has made with reference to in-service all coaches, athletic administrators and others responsible for conducting the athletic program with reference to compliance with all Blue Book rules and regulations and other rules as they would apply to playoff activities conducted by the CIF Southern Section.

16. 1989-90 MEETING DATES - Following discussion, it was moved, seconded and passed to approve the calendar meeting dates for the 1989-90 school year with corrections as noted. There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:40 p.m.

(volleyball), 2308 (badminton), 2411 (baseball), 2510 (field hockey), 2608 (golf), 2710 (soccer) and 2809 (tennis).

For football, it should be noted that the use of air dummies, stand-up dummies, two and seven-man sleds, tackling dummies and protective equipment are prohibited for summer activity. With reference to rules 1423.2, 1423.3, 1423.4 and 1423.5, there will be no changes.

For summer services by coaches, payment may be made by the school district office, A.S.B. through the principal, or a duly-licensed community organization such as parks and recreation. It must be understood that coaches may not be paid directly by special interest groups, individuals, parents or booster clubs.

It should be further noted that Senate Bills 19 and 1533 direct the CIF to conduct the business of interscholastic athletics. It is noted in this legislation that the athletics are discontinued during the summer months. Therefore, we have a dilemma. It is the belief of our section officers that in order to comply with our legislative mandate, state by-laws and section rules and regulations, that administrators (specifically superintendents and principals) are accountable for whatever summer program takes place in their respective districts or schools.

JIM O'HARA, GENE "SKIP" ROWLAND INDUCTED INTO CIF-SS HALL OF FAME

The CIF Southern Section added two names to its Hall of Fame Recognition Awards list this spring, inducting the late Jim O'Hara of Westminster High School and Gene "Skip" Rowland of Long Beach Wilson High School.

The CIF-SS initiated the Hall of Fame Recognition Award in 1984 to bring public recognition to the numerous individuals who have contributed directly to the advancement of interscholastic athletics within the organization. The awards will be presented in honor of each of the inductees at meritorious ceremonies in their local areas.

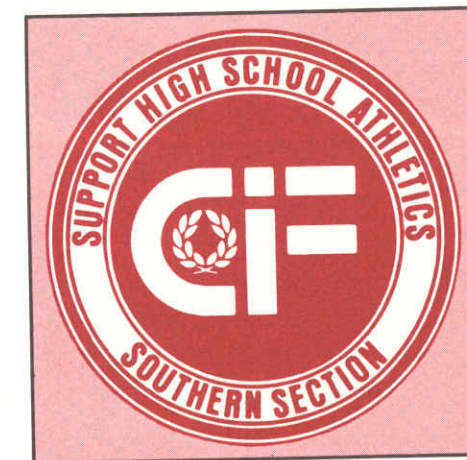
"The CIF Southern Section is indeed proud to honor these most deserving contributors to interscholastic athletics and this organization," noted Stan Thomas, Commissioner of Athletics. "Their dedication to the development of countless student-athletes is commendable indeed."

A brief biographical sketch of the 1989 inductees follows.

JIM O'HARA - In his 20-year career at Westminster High School, Jim O'Hara was a coach notable for establishing relations with his student-athletes based on a foundation of mutual friendship and respect.

O'Hara had a tremendous impact on the Westminster athletic program. During his tenure, he served as head

track coach (1972-74), head football coach (1982-86), assistant baseball coach, assistant wrestling coach and director of athletics (1973-77). Westminster teams guided by O'Hara captured four league championships and reached the CIF-SS playoffs on eight occasions. In the 1980 and 1981 seasons, he served as the head football coach at Santa Ana Valley High School.



O'Hara was responsible for establishing a progressive academic program for student-athletes at Westminster, including a study program before school, periodic grade checks and better working relationships with the faculty.

O'Hara was named Orange County Football Coach of the Year after guiding the Lions to the CIF-SS Big Five Conference semifinals in 1985. A graduate of Cal State Long Beach, O'Hara received his Masters' Degree from Chapman College. Coach O'Hara, who passed away from a heart attack in December of 1986, is survived by his wife, Sue O'Hara.

SKIP ROWLAND - One of Southern California's most successful coaches, Gene "Skip" Rowland, has certainly left his mark on Woodrow Wilson High School of Long Beach, spanning the years from his school days until his recent retirement.

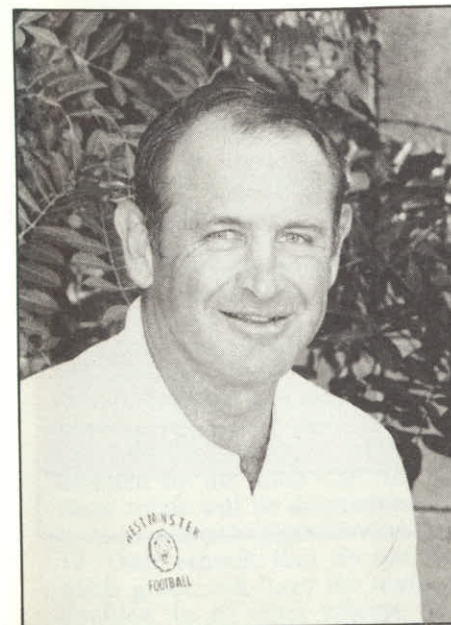
As an athlete, Rowland earned All-CIF football honors as a quarterback in 1944. It was Rowland who led the famed Wilson "Jinx-Busters", the first-ever Bruin eleven to beat cross-town rival Long Beach Poly. He went on to attend UCLA, where he continued as a

football and baseball standout, establishing a school record that still stands for receiving eight varsity letters. Rowland was a starting halfback on UCLA's 1946 Rose Bowl team. After graduation, he returned to Wilson to begin his long and successful career coaching in three sports: football, baseball and golf.

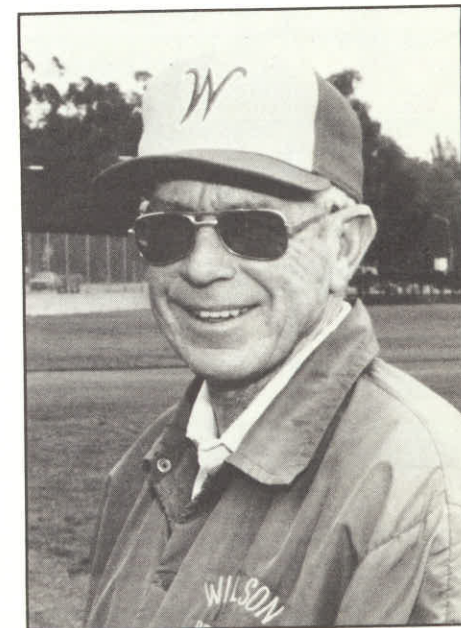
In his 11 years as head football coach, Rowland compiled a record of 63-31-6 and captured six Moore League titles. In 14 baseball seasons under his guidance, Wilson went 163-135-12 and won three league championships. In golf, his Bruins posted a sparkling 217-41-3 record, winning 18 league titles, a CIF-SS championship and a second-place finish in the CIF-SS championships.

Rowland also coached in the 1963 Shrine North-South All-Star Football Game, as well as a two-year stint at the University of the Pacific (1960-61). At Pacific, he tutored eventual NFL-greats Dick Bass and Tom Flores. His Wilson High charges included Dennis Dummitt, Bobby Grich, Bob Bailey, Jeff Burroughs, Gary Allen, Kent Peterson, Craig Vestermark, Terri Dekraai, Sid Smith, Ronnie Fukikawa, Pinky Stevenson, Gary Wishon, John Tigner and Steve Cook.

Rowland was named to the Long Beach Century Club Athletic Hall of Fame in 1987.

NEW BASKETBALL PLAYOFF FORMAT TO BE 'FINE-TUNED' FOR 1990

The new divisional groupings for the CIF-SS Basketball Championships, ratified by a vote of the Council last May, classified schools by enrollment for placement into divisional classifications for championship play. This change was initiated to bring the Southern Section in line with the State championship tournament and provides the fairest procedure for determining Southern Section representatives. This was the most dramatic change the CIF-SS has had concerning playoff competition since employing the nine-division conference set-up for football in 1977.

After meeting with the Board of Directors of the Southern California Basketball Coaches Association and reviewing the playoffs with the Coaches Advisory Committee, it is our feeling that the objectives of the new format were achieved. During the 1987-88 season, the Southern Section qualified a total of 20 schools for State competition - 10 boys and 10 girls, and not one team in State Division III (middle-size schools). This past season, 37 Southern Section teams advanced to State competition - 19 girls and 18 boys teams. From this, we had eight Southern California Regional Champions of 10 possible. On Saturday, March 18, eight Southern Section teams competed for State championships: Glendora HS, Trabuco Hills HS, Santa Clara HS and Bel-Air Prep for the boys; and Katella HS, Brea HS, Morningside HS and Mission Prep for the girls. Of the 10 State champions, three were from the Southern Section: Santa Clara boys; Morningside girls; and Brea girls. This is the greatest number of teams from the Southern Section to be recognized for their success in the State championships, and we are genuinely proud of their success!!

Last year, not one single boy's team was involved in the State finals and the Palos Verdes girls and Morningside girls were runners-up in their respective divisions. We had only two teams participate in State finals in 1988, as opposed to eight in 1989, and three were champions. We are headed in the right direction!

With our successes in mind, there are still some areas of concern that we want to address with regard to the new format:

(A) ENROLLMENT - Next year, as directed by the State CIF, the enrollment totals will be determined by the total enrollment of grades nine through 12. Only schools that do not have a ninth grade will have the tenth grade doubled. In all other schools, all four grade levels will be computed. Single gender schools will have their enrollment

ment doubled.

(B) DIVISIONAL PLACEMENT - In order to better balance the divisions (5A, 5AA, 4A, 4AA, etc.) the divisional alignments will not be made until AFTER the Office receives the October enrollment reports from the member schools. Once we determine the number of schools in each State division, then we will split those schools in order to determine a better balance between AA and A categories. For example, once the total number of schools in State Division I is identified, then we will split them approximately in half and the top half would become "AA" and the bottom half would be designated "A". In other words, if there are 50 schools in a State Division, the top 25 would be AA and the bottom 25 would be A. That way we will have a better balance in each division. Additionally, if the numbers fall as we anticipate, we will split Division III into two divisions and combine Divisions IV schools in one single division. We will do this only if the numbers dictate. As an example, we do not want to get into a situation, as this past year, where in State Division IV we had 27 schools in 2AA and close to 50 schools in 2A. If there was a true balance, there should have been 30-35 schools in each of those divisions to make competition equitable.

(C) MOVING UP - To better facilitate the playoff format once the divisions are published and distributed to the schools, schools that desire to move up in classification must make that decision prior to the start of competition on December 1, 1990. Additionally, moves will only be allowed from one State Division to a new State Division - not from "A" category to "AA" category. So schools desiring to move, must move to a new State Division.

(D) LEAGUE DESIGNATION - Each league will be guaranteed three entries into the playoffs, which will be referred to as "automatic entries."

If two teams tie for first place in a league and are going to be placed in different playoff divisions, each will be allowed to take their No. 1 entry with them. The only time we will need leagues to determine their respective No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3 entry is if the teams are playing in the SAME DIVISION. As an example, if School A and School B tied for first place in their league and were going to the same playoff division, say 4A, then the league would have to determine which school was the No. 1 and which was the No. 2 entries. However, if School A were going to 3A and School B were going to 5A, then they could both go into their respective divisions carrying

their No. 1 entry with them and the guarantee of a home game.

(E) **.500 RECORD OR BETTER** – The .500 record or better format for filling openings in the brackets will be OUTF for next year. In reviewing school records, it is quite evident that a number of teams with less than .500 records were stronger than some teams with .500 records or better that were not automatic entries but were permitted entry because of openings in the brackets. We know that there will be openings in the brackets, and we are going to consider schools to fill the openings based upon their strength of schedule. We had a number of schools with 11-12, 12-13, 11-14, etc. that were much stronger because of the competition and the leagues that they were in than some schools that gained entry just because they made the .500 or better criteria.

After all automatic entries have been accepted by the leagues, schools wishing to petition for entry where there are openings will be allowed to do so regardless of record. Selections to fill the brackets will be made by a committee with the major criteria being strength of schedule. The responsibility of the league will be to submit the three automatic entries. After that, schools will have the responsibility of submitting petitions for consideration for entry regardless of record.

(F) **BYES/FILLING BRACKETS** – Eliminating the .500 record or better will give the Office and the selection committee more latitude in filling brackets and eliminating byes. However, the staff is currently reviewing the bye rule as it is written in the CIF-SS Blue Book (rule 2904.1, page 123), and we anticipate a change in this rule. In the past, seeded teams or No. 1 entries have been given byes, and as noted during the past playoff season, in some situations seeded teams that were byed out in the first round had to travel to schools that were No. 3 entries in the second round. It is our feeling that when a top-seeded team or No. 1 entry that is byed in the first round should be able to play at home in the second round for their first game.

We strongly feel that the Southern Section playoffs remain the main focal point for our schools. However, as long as the Section is involved in State playoffs, we have a responsibility to get the best of our basketball programs to State competition. We feel strongly that by going to the strict enrollment classifications, we not only improved the position of our member schools in the State tournament but we also provided more schools than ever before an opportunity to participate in the Southern Section playoffs.

An administrator who devoted 27 years of service to the CIF Southern Section, Clyde Francisco served as a member of the Executive Committee from 1976 to 1982. For the three-year period 1977-79, he further bolstered the state's athletic program as president of the California Coaches' Association.

A 1951 graduate of UC Santa Barbara, Francisco began his teaching and coaching career at Shandon High School. The remainder of his career was spent at Chaffey High School in Ontario, where he held the position of athletic director for 19 years. Francisco was also an active member of his community, as a member of both the Ontario Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, the local Planning Commission and Recreation Commission.

BOB HOWARD

A man whose association with the CIF Southern Section traces back to his days as a high school student, Bob Howard devoted 37 years to education and interscholastic athletics. As a senior at Long Beach Poly High School in 1939, Howard led the Jackrabbits to a CIF-SS basketball championship under Coach Charlie Church and was named the section's Most Valuable Player.

Howard went on to a long and successful career at Lynwood High School, where he coached the Knight varsity basketball team for 17 years, was the director of athletics for 23 years and served the CIF Southern Section as Secretary of the San Gabriel Valley League for over 10 years.

PAT MAUCH

An administrator with a keen sense for interscholastic athletics, Pat Mauch served the CIF Southern Section for many years in a number of capacities. From 1980 until his retirement in 1988, Mauch was a member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, culminating his stint as President from 1986-88. Mauch was also a member of the State Federated Council from 1985-88.

Mauch began his career in education at St. Roseliana Jr. High in Maywood from 1945-49. He followed with a 15-year stay at Puente (now La Puente) High School, where he taught social studies, coached and was a counselor

before becoming assistant principal. In 1966, Mauch moved to the newly-opened Workman High School in the City of Industry as an assistant principal. In 1970, he was named principal of Los Altos High School in Hacienda Heights, where he remained until his retirement in 1988.

SAM NICHOLSON

A highly successful track and cross country coach who moved into administration, Sam Nicholson was a strong contributor to CIF Southern Section activities for many years. Nicholson served as president of both the Pacific and Foothill Leagues and was a CIF-SS League Representative.

Nicholson began his 34-year teaching, coaching and administrative career at John Burroughs High School of Burbank, followed by stints at both Glendale and Hoover High Schools. In 1980, Nicholson became the principal at Crescenta Valley High School, where until his retirement in 1988, served the CIF-SS as the Pacific League Council Representative.

TOM NOEL

In a career spanning 27 years at Magnolia High School of Anaheim, Tom Noel was a loyal and dedicated supporter of CIF Southern Section Activities. During his tenure at Magnolia, Noel coached Sentinel varsity teams in the sports of football, basketball, track and field and tennis. From 1969 to 1988 he served as the school's Director of Athletics.

Last year, Noel moved to Vista, California (San Diego County) High School and is still involved in interscholastic athletics as a football and tennis coach at Rancho Bernardo High School.

BOB PAISOLA

As principal of Lompoc High School from 1965 until his retirement in 1988, Bob Paisola provided tremendous influence and effort in the support interscholastic athletics within the CIF Southern Section. He was long recognized as a strong leader of the Northern League and the Tri-County Principals' Association.

Paisola began his service to the CIF Southern Section as Council Representative of the Northern League, and by 1979 was elevated to the CIF-SS Executive Committee. Prior to his retirement, Paisola was elected to the posi-

tion of CIF-SS President. His loyal support and commitment to interscholastic athletics has been solidified by the fact that he has attended 285 consecutive Lompoc varsity football games, following the Braves at home and on the road.

SAM PECCHIA

Whenever the subject of interscholastic athletics is brought up in the Inland Empire, the name of Sam Pecchia comes immediately to the fore. Pecchia began his career at Ramona High School of Riverside in 1961, as a teacher and assistant football coach. During his 12-year stay, he also served as the Rams' head baseball coach. In 1973 Pecchia accepted the head football coaching job at Riverside Arlington, where he also held the position of director of athletics. He was named Riverside County Coach of the Year in 1973 and 1978.

Throughout his career in the Riverside School District, Pecchia also officiated athletic contests for the CIF-SS, the West Coast Athletic Conference, the Pacific Coast Athletic Association and the California Collegiate Athletic Association. He currently serves the CIF Southern Section as liaison of officials for the Inland Area.

DAROL ROUNDY

Beginning a 30-year relationship with the CIF Southern Section as an assistant to Commissioner Kenny Fagans in 1957, Darol Roundy made a major contribution to the organization as an assigner of officials in all sports. Roundy remained on the CIF-SS Office staff until 1978. He maintained his service to interscholastic athletics and the CIF-SS as coordinator of officials' assignments in the Long Beach-Whittier and Orange County Areas through 1987.

DOUG ROZELLE

A former member of the CIF-SS Executive Committee, Doug Rozelle began his career in education as a teacher and coach at Paramount High School in the mid 1950's. In 1961, he became the school's director of athletics and in 1972 was elevated to the position of assistant principal. Rozelle accepted the position of Paramount High School Principal in 1976, a post he held until his retirement in 1988.

CIF-SS SELECTED AS RECIPIENT OF ALL-STAR WORKOUT PROCEEDS

The California Angels and Major League Baseball have named the CIF Southern Section as one of six charitable beneficiaries of proceeds from the All-Star Workout and Skills Competition, scheduled for Monday, July 10 at Anaheim Stadium. The Angels will host the 1989 Major League All-Star Game the following day.

Four years ago, Major League Baseball designated "All-Star Workout Day", prior to the All-Star Game, as a vehicle to raise funds for worthy local charities. It has since become an effective way for Baseball to leave a lasting impact on the communities that annually host the Midsummer Classic.

The Angels and Major League Baseball have advanced the program one step further. Instead of a one-time contribution, proceeds from this year's All-Star Workout will provide an annual source of funding for refurbishment of existing fields throughout Orange and Riverside Counties, plus donations of equipment to non-profit groups meeting specific criteria.

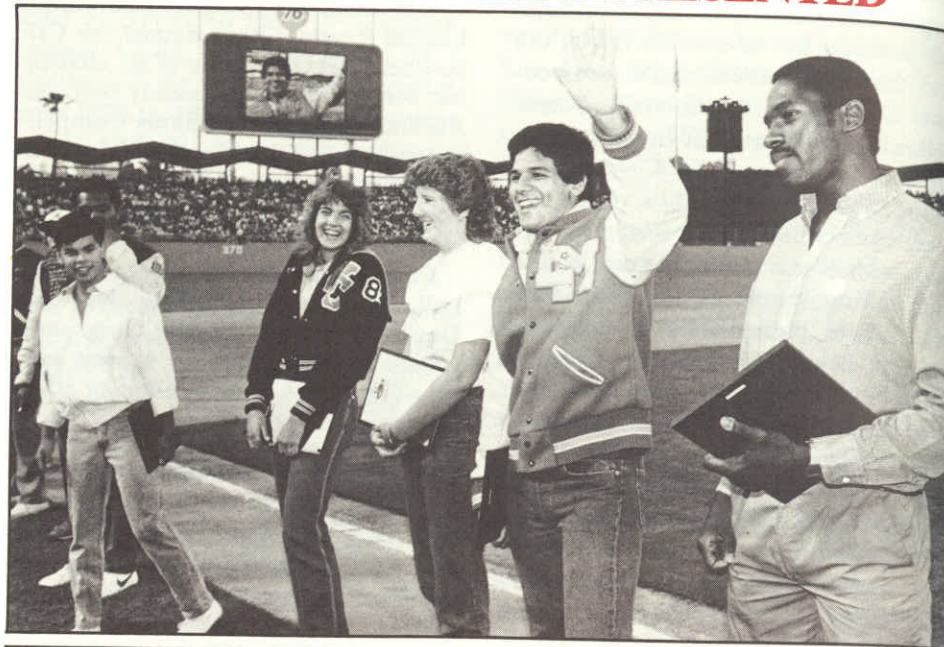

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CHEERLEADING GUIDELINES OFFERED BY NATIONAL FEDERATION

In its continuing effort to meet the needs of high school activities participants, the National Federation has added cheerleading to its structure.

Because of the growth and development of cheerleading in the nation's high schools, the National Federation has adopted recommended guidelines and will provide services for this important high school activity.

The National Federation Spirit Committee established guidelines and constructed a statement of philosophy for cheerleading in 1988. This committee also adopted the first Cheerleading Guide, which contains the philosophy statement, recommended safety guidelines, photographs of partner stunts that are permitted and are not permitted, suggestions for cheerleader advisors/coaches and guidelines for cheerleaders. The guide will be updated annually as are all National Federation rule-related publications.

Included in the statement of philosophy adopted by the Spirit Committee was the following: "... Cheerleaders shall serve as a support group for the interscholastic athletic program within the school, and, as such, play a very important role in the administration of athletics contests. Each squad should strive to boost school spirit, promote good sportsmanship, develop

positive crowd involvement and help student participants and spectators achieve the most worthwhile educational objectives of the interscholastic program."

that cheerleading activities should center on leading or directing the cheers of fans and that performing is a secondary role of cheerleading.

Following are the recommended cheerleader safety guidelines that were adopted:

1. Adequate warm-up must precede all activities.
2. Jewelry is prohibited with the exception of religious or medical medals. If such medals are worn, they shall be taped to the body and be under the uniform.
3. Cheerleaders shall wear athletic-type shoes which are appropriate for cheerleading activities.
4. Tumbling and partner stunts should not be performed on wet surfaces. Tumbling, partner stunts and pyramids should not be performed on concrete.
5. Use of mini-tramps, spring boards or any apparatus that increases the height of a stunt is not allowed.
6. All pyramids and/or mounts are limited to two persons high, meaning the base(s) is in direct contact with the floor or ground.

7. Stunts higher than a shoulder stand (e.g., above-the-shoulder extensions) must have a spotter(s).

8. Free-falling flips or swan dives from mounts, pyramids or basket tosses are not allowed.

9. The catcher must have continual eye contact with the top person/flyer throughout the entire stunt. The top person must look before dismounting backwards to a cradle catch.

10. Toe and thigh pitches are not permitted.

11. Knee drops, split drops and tension drops are not allowed.

12. Double-base, split catches are not allowed.

13. Suspended splits are permitted provided the person performing the split is able to lower his/her own weight into the split position, and/or bases provide support at thigh level.

14. Basket tosses or any type of toss must be performed from ground level and must be cradled by the original bases. If there are only two bases, there must be a spotter at the head/shoulder area when the top person/flyer is caught.

The Spirit Committee noted that cheerleading can be dangerous, and that responsibility for safety rests with each high school.
